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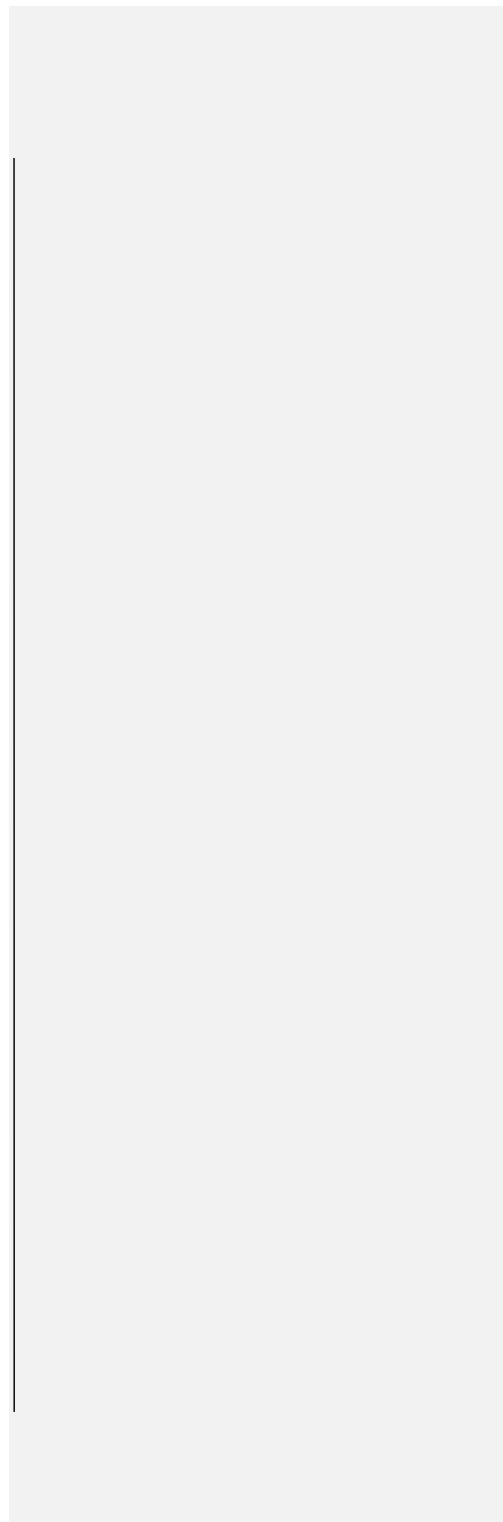

II. ALTERATION OF TERMS

14 A. This Contract, together with Exhibit(s) A, B and C attached hereto and incorporated herein,
15 fully expresses the complete understanding of COUNTY and CONTRACTOR with respect to the
16 subject matter of this Contract.

17 B. Unless otherwise expressly stated in this Contract, no addition to, or alteration of the terms of
18 this Contract or any Exhibits, whether written or verbal, made by the parties, their officers, employees
19 or agents shall be valid unless made in the form of a written amendment to this Contract, which has
20 been formally approved and executed by both Parties.

III. ASSIGNMENT OF DEBTS

23 Unless this Contract is followed without interruption by another contract between the Parties
24 hereto for the same services and substantially the same scope, at the termination of this Contract,
25 CONTRACTOR shall assign to COUNTY any debts owing to CONTRACTOR by or on behalf of
26 persons receiving services pursuant to this Contract. CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify by mail
27 each of the respective Parties, specifying the date of assignment, the County of Orange as assignee,
28 and the address to which payments are to be sent. Payments received by CONTRACTOR from or on
29 behalf of said persons, shall be immediately given to COUNTY.

IV. COMPLIANCE

32 A. COMPLIANCE PROGRAM - ADMINISTRATOR has established a Compliance Program
33 for the purpose of ensuring adherence to all rules and regulations related to federal and state health
34 care programs.

35 1. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide CONTRACTOR with a copy of the policies and
36 procedures relating to ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and access to
37 General Compliance and Annual Provider Trainings.

1 2. CONTRACTOR has the option to provide ADMINISTRATOR with proof of its own
 2 compliance program, code of conduct and any compliance related policies and procedures.
 3 CONTRACTOR's compliance program, code of conduct and any related policies and procedures shall
 4 be verified by ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Department to ensure they include all required
 5 elements by ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer as described in this Compliance Paragraph to
 6 this Contract. These elements include:

- 7 a. Designation of a Compliance Officer and/or compliance staff.
- 8 b. Written standards, policies and/or procedures.
- 9 c. Compliance related training and/or education program and proof of completion.
- 10 d. Communication methods for reporting concerns to the Compliance Officer.
- 11 e. Methodology for conducting internal monitoring and auditing.
- 12 f. Methodology for detecting and correcting offenses.
- 13 g. Methodology/Procedure for enforcing disciplinary standards.

14 3. If CONTRACTOR does not provide proof of its own compliance program to
 15 ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall internally comply with ADMINISTRATOR's
 16 Compliance Program and Code of Conduct, CONTRACTOR shall submit to ADMINISTRATOR
 17 within thirty (30) calendar days of execution of this Contract a signed acknowledgement that
 18 CONTRACTOR will internally comply with ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program and Code of
 19 Conduct. CONTRACTOR shall have as many Covered Individuals it determines necessary complete
 20 ADMINISTRATOR's annual compliance training to ensure proper compliance.

21 4. If CONTRACTOR elects to have its own compliance program, code of conduct and any
 22 Compliance related policies and procedures reviewed by ADMINISTRATOR, then CONTRACTOR
 23 shall submit a copy of its compliance program, code of conduct and all relevant policies and
 24 procedures to ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days of execution of this Contract.
 25 ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer, or designee, shall review said documents within a
 26 reasonable time, which shall not exceed forty-five (45) calendar days, and determine if
 27 CONTRACTOR's proposed compliance program and code of conduct contain all required elements to
 28 ADMINISTRATOR's satisfaction as consistent with the HCA's Compliance Program and Code of
 29 Conduct. ADMINISTRATOR shall inform CONTRACTOR of any missing required elements and
 30 CONTRACTOR shall revise its compliance program and code of conduct to meet
 31 ADMINISTRATOR's required elements within thirty (30) calendar days after ADMINISTRATOR's
 32 Compliance Officer's determination and resubmit the same for review by ADMINISTRATOR.

33 5. Upon written confirmation from ADMINISTRATOR's compliance officer that
 34 CONTRACTOR's compliance program, code of conduct and any compliance related policies and
 35 procedures contain all required elements, CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Covered Individuals
 36 relative to this Contract are made aware of CONTRACTOR's compliance program, code of conduct,
 37 related policies and procedures and contact information for ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance

1 Program.

2 B. SANCTION SCREENING – CONTRACTOR shall screen all Covered Individuals employed
3 or retained to provide services related to this Contract monthly to ensure that they are not designated
4 as Ineligible Persons, as pursuant to this Contract. Screening shall be conducted against the General
5 Services Administration's Excluded Parties List System or System for Award Management, the Health
6 and Human Services/Office of Inspector General List of Excluded Individuals/Entities, and the
7 California Medi-Cal Suspended and Ineligible Provider List, the Social Security Administration's
8 Death Master File at date of employment, and/or any other list or system as identified by
9 ADMINISTRATOR.

10 1. For purposes of this Compliance Paragraph, Covered Individuals includes all employees,
11 interns, volunteers, contractors, subcontractors, agents, and other persons who provide health care
12 items or services or who perform billing or coding functions on behalf of ADMINISTRATOR.
13 CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Covered Individuals relative to this Contract are made aware of
14 ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and related policies and procedures (or
15 CONTRACTOR's own compliance program, code of conduct and related policies and procedures if
16 CONTRACTOR has elected to use its own).

17 2. An Ineligible Person shall be any individual or entity who:

18 a. is currently excluded, suspended, debarred or otherwise ineligible to participate in
19 federal and state health care programs; or

20 b. has been convicted of a criminal offense related to the provision of health care items
21 or services and has not been reinstated in the federal and state health care programs after a period of
22 exclusion, suspension, debarment, or ineligibility.

23 3. CONTRACTOR shall screen prospective Covered Individuals prior to hire or
24 engagement. CONTRACTOR shall not hire or engage any Ineligible Person to provide services
25 relative to this Contract.

26 4. CONTRACTOR shall screen all current Covered Individuals and subcontractors semi-
27 annually to ensure that they have not become Ineligible Persons. CONTRACTOR shall also request
28 that its subcontractors use their best efforts to verify that they are eligible to participate in all federal
29 and State of California health programs and have not been excluded or debarred from participation in
30 any federal or state health care programs, and to further represent to CONTRACTOR that they do not
31 have any Ineligible Person in their employ or under contract.

32 5. Covered Individuals shall be required to disclose to CONTRACTOR immediately any
33 debarment, exclusion or other event that makes the Covered Individual an Ineligible Person.
34 CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately if a Covered Individual providing
35 services directly relative to this Contract becomes debarred, excluded or otherwise becomes an
36 Ineligible Person.

37 6. CONTRACTOR acknowledges that Ineligible Persons are precluded from providing

1 federal and state funded health care services by contract with COUNTY in the event that they are
 2 currently sanctioned or excluded by a federal or state law enforcement regulatory or licensing agency.

3 If CONTRACTOR becomes aware that a Covered Individual has become an Ineligible Person,
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5 CONTRACTOR shall remove such individual from responsibility for, or involvement with, COUNTY
 6 business operations related to this Contract.

7 7. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately if a Covered Individual or
 8 entity is currently excluded, suspended or debarred, or is identified as such after being sanction
 9 screened. Such individual or entity shall be immediately removed from participating in any activity
 10 associated with this Contract. ADMINISTRATOR will determine appropriate repayment from, or
 11 sanction(s) to CONTRACTOR for services provided by ineligible person or individual.
 12 CONTRACTOR shall promptly return any overpayments within forty-five (45) business days after the
 13 overpayment is verified by ADMINISTRATOR.

14 C. GENERAL COMPLIANCE TRAINING - ADMINISTRATOR shall make General
 15 Compliance Training available to Covered Individuals.

16 1. CONTRACTORS that have acknowledged to comply with ADMINISTRATOR's
 17 Compliance Program shall use its best efforts to encourage completion by all Covered Individuals;
 18 provided, however, that at a minimum CONTRACTOR shall assign at least one (1) designated
 19 representative to complete the General Compliance Training when offered.

20 2. Such training will be made available to Covered Individuals within thirty (30) calendar
 21 days of employment or engagement.

22 3. Such training will be made available to each Covered Individual annually.

23 4. ADMINISTRATOR will track training completion while CONTRACTOR shall provide
 24 copies of training certification upon request.

25 5. Each Covered Individual attending a group training shall certify, in writing, attendance at
 26 compliance training. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide instruction on group training completion while
 27 CONTRACTOR shall retain the training certifications. Upon written request by ADMINISTRATOR,
 28 CONTRACTOR shall provide copies of the certifications.

29 D. SPECIALIZED PROVIDER TRAINING - ADMINISTRATOR shall make Specialized
 30 Provider Training, where appropriate, available to Covered Individuals.

31 1. CONTRACTOR shall ensure completion of Specialized Provider Training by all Covered
 32 Individuals relative to this Contract. This includes compliance with federal and state healthcare
 33 program regulations and procedures or instructions otherwise communicated by regulatory agencies;
 34 including the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services or their agents.

35 2. Such training will be made available to Covered Individuals within thirty (30) calendar
 36 days of employment or engagement.

37 3. Such training will be made available to each Covered Individual annually.

1 4. ADMINISTRATOR will track online completion of training while CONTRACTOR shall
2 provide copies of the certifications upon request.

3 5. Each Covered Individual attending a group training shall certify, in writing, attendance at
4 compliance training. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide instructions on completing the training in a
5 group setting while CONTRACTOR shall retain the certifications. Upon written request by
6 ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall provide copies of the certifications.

7 E. MEDI-CAL BILLING, CODING, AND DOCUMENTATION COMPLIANCE
8 STANDARDS

9 1. CONTRACTOR shall take reasonable precaution to ensure that the coding of health care
10 claims, billings and/or invoices for same are prepared and submitted in an accurate and timely manner
11 and are consistent with federal, state and county laws and regulations. This includes compliance with
12 federal and state health care program regulations and procedures or instructions otherwise
13 communicated by regulatory agencies including the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services or
14 their agents.

15 2. CONTRACTOR shall not submit any false, fraudulent, inaccurate and/or fictitious claims
16 for payment or reimbursement of any kind.

17 3. CONTRACTOR shall bill only for those eligible services actually rendered which are also
18 fully documented. When such services are coded, CONTRACTOR shall use proper billing codes
19 which accurately describes the services provided and must ensure compliance with all billing and
20 documentation requirements.

21 4. CONTRACTOR shall act promptly to investigate and correct any problems or errors in
22 coding of claims and billing, if and when, any such problems or errors are identified.

23 5. CONTRACTOR shall promptly return any overpayments within forty-five (45) business
24 days after the overpayment is verified by ADMINISTRATOR.

25 6. CONTRACTOR shall meet the HCA MHP Quality Management Program Standards and
26 participate in the quality improvement activities developed in the implementation of the Quality
27 Management Program.

28 7. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the provisions of ADMINISTRATOR's Cultural
29 Competency Plan submitted and approved by the state. ADMINISTRATOR shall update the Cultural
30 Competency Plan and submit the updates to the State for review and approval annually. (CCR, Title 9,
31 §1810.410.subds.(c)-(d).

32 F. Failure to comply with the obligations stated in this Compliance Paragraph shall constitute a
33 breach of this Contract on the part of CONTRACTOR and grounds for COUNTY to terminate this
34 Contract. Unless the circumstances require a sooner period of cure, CONTRACTOR shall have thirty
35 (30) calendar days from the date of the written notice of default to cure any defaults grounded on this
36 Compliance Paragraph prior to ADMINISTRATOR's right to terminate this Contract on the basis of
37 such default.

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V. CONFIDENTIALITY

A. CONTRACTOR shall maintain the confidentiality of all records, including billings and any audio and/or video recordings, in accordance with all applicable federal, state and county codes and regulations, including 42 USC §290dd-2 (Confidentiality of Records), as they now exist or may hereafter be amended or changed.

B. Prior to providing any services pursuant to this Contract, all members of the Board of Directors or its designee or authorized agent, employees, consultants, subcontractors, volunteers and interns of CONTRACTOR shall agree, in writing, with CONTRACTOR to maintain the confidentiality of any and all information and records which may be obtained in the course of providing such services. This Contract shall specify that it is effective irrespective of all subsequent resignations or terminations of CONTRACTOR members of the Board of Directors or its designee or authorized agent, employees, consultants, subcontractors, volunteers and interns.

C. CONTRACTOR shall have in effect a system to protect patient records from inappropriate disclosure in connection with activity funded under this Contract. This system shall include provisions for employee education on the confidentiality requirements, and the fact that disciplinary action may occur upon inappropriate disclosure. CONTRACTOR agrees to implement administrative, physical, and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of all confidential information that it creates, receives, maintains or transmits. CONTRACTOR shall provide ADMINISTRATOR with information concerning such safeguards.

D. CONTRACTOR agrees to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known to CONTRACTOR, or its subcontractors or agents in violation of the applicable state and federal regulations regarding confidentiality.

E. CONTRACTOR shall monitor compliance with the above provisions on confidentiality and security, and shall include them in all subcontracts.

F. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR within twenty-four (24) hours during a work week, of any suspected or actual breach of its computer system.

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VI. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

CONTRACTOR shall exercise reasonable care and diligence to prevent any actions or conditions that could result in a conflict with COUNTY interests. In addition to CONTRACTOR, this obligation shall apply to CONTRACTOR's employees, agents, and subcontractors associated with the provision of goods and services provided under this Contract. CONTRACTOR's efforts shall include, but not be limited to establishing rules and procedures preventing its employees, agents, and subcontractors from providing or offering gifts, entertainment, payments, loans or other considerations which could be deemed to influence or appear to influence COUNTY staff or elected officers in the performance of their duties.

1 B. CONTRACTOR agrees that if there is a change or transfer in ownership of CONTRACTOR's
2 business prior to completion of this Contract, and COUNTY agrees to the change or transfer in
3 ownership as it relates to this Contract, the new owners shall be required under the terms of sale or
4 other instruments of transfer to assume CONTRACTOR's duties and obligations contained in this
5 Contract and complete them to the satisfaction of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR may not assign the
6 rights hereunder, either in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of COUNTY.

7 1. If CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit organization, any change from a nonprofit corporation
8 to any other corporate structure of CONTRACTOR, including a change in more than fifty percent
9 (50%) of the composition of the Board of Directors within a two (2) month period of time, shall be
10 deemed an assignment for purposes of this paragraph, unless CONTRACTOR is transitioning from a
11 community clinic/health center to a Federally Qualified Health Center and has been so designated by
12 the Federal Government. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of this subparagraph
13 shall be void.

14 2. If CONTRACTOR is a for-profit organization, any change in the business structure,
15 including but not limited to, the sale or transfer of more than ten percent (10%) of the assets or stocks
16 of CONTRACTOR, change to another corporate structure, including a change to a sole proprietorship,
17 or a change in fifty percent (50%) or more of Board of Directors or any governing body of
18 CONTRACTOR at one time shall be deemed an assignment pursuant to this paragraph. Any attempted
19 assignment or delegation in derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

20 3. If CONTRACTOR is a governmental organization, any change to another structure,
21 including a change in more than fifty percent (50%) of the composition of its governing body (i.e.
22 Board of Supervisors, City Council, School Board) within a two (2) month period of time, shall be
23 deemed an assignment for purposes of this paragraph. Any attempted assignment or delegation in
24 derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

25 4. Whether CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit, for-profit, or a governmental organization,
26 CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification of CONTRACTOR's intent to assign the
27 obligations hereunder, either in whole or part, to ADMINISTRATOR not less than sixty (60) calendar
28 days prior to the effective date of the assignment.

29 5. Whether CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit, for-profit, or a governmental organization,
30 CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification within thirty (30) calendar days to
31 ADMINISTRATOR when there is change of less than fifty percent (50%) of Board of Directors or any
32 governing body of CONTRACTOR at one time.

33 6. COUNTY reserves the right to immediately terminate this Contract in the event
34 COUNTY determines, in its sole discretion that the assignee is not qualified or is otherwise
35 unacceptable to COUNTY for the provision of services under this Contract.

36 C. CONTRACTOR's obligations undertaken pursuant to this Contract may be carried out by
37 means of subcontracts, provided such subcontractors are approved in advance by ADMINISTRATOR,

1 meet the requirements of this Contract as they relate to the service or activity under subcontract,
 2 include any provisions that ADMINISTRATOR may require, and are authorized in writing by
 3 ADMINISTRATOR prior to the beginning of service delivery.

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5 1. After approval of the subcontractor, ADMINISTRATOR may revoke the approval of the
 6 subcontractor upon five (5) calendar days' written notice to CONTRACTOR if the subcontractor
 7 subsequently fails to meet the requirements of this Contract or any provisions that
 8 ADMINISTRATOR has required. ADMINISTRATOR may disallow subcontractor expenses reported
 9 by CONTRACTOR.

10 2. No subcontract shall terminate or alter the responsibilities of CONTRACTOR to
 11 COUNTY pursuant to this Contract.

12 3. ADMINISTRATOR may disallow, from payments otherwise due CONTRACTOR,
 13 amounts claimed for subcontracts not approved in accordance with this paragraph.

14 4. This provision shall not be applicable to service contracts usually and customarily entered
 15 into by CONTRACTOR to obtain or arrange for supplies, technical support, and professional services
 16 provided by consultants.

17 D. CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY in writing of any change in CONTRACTOR's status
 18 with respect to name changes that do not require an assignment of this Contract. CONTRACTOR is
 19 also obligated to notify COUNTY in writing if CONTRACTOR becomes a party to any litigation
 20 against COUNTY, or a party to litigation that may reasonably affect CONTRACTOR's performance
 21 under this Contract, as well as any potential conflicts of interest between CONTRACTOR and
 22 COUNTY that may arise prior to or during the period of Contract performance. While
 23 CONTRACTOR is required to provide this information without prompting from COUNTY any time
 24 there is a change in CONTRACTOR's name, conflict of interest or litigation status, CONTRACTOR
 25 must also provide an update to COUNTY of its status in these areas whenever requested by COUNTY.

26 **X. DISPUTE RESOLUTION**

27 A. The Parties shall deal in good faith and attempt to resolve potential disputes informally. If the
 28 dispute concerning a question of fact arising under the terms of this Contract is not disposed of in a
 29 reasonable period of time by CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR, such matter shall be brought
 30 to the attention of the County Purchasing Agent or designee by way of the following process:

31 1. CONTRACTOR shall submit to the County Purchasing Agent a written demand for a
 32 final decision regarding the disposition of any dispute between the Parties arising under, related to, or
 33 involving this Contract, unless COUNTY, on its own initiative, has already rendered such a final
 34 decision.

35 2. CONTRACTOR's written demand shall be fully supported by factual information, and, if
 36 such demand involves a cost adjustment to this Contract, CONTRACTOR shall include with the
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1 demand a written statement signed by an authorized representative indicating that the demand is made
 2 in good faith, that the supporting data are accurate and complete, and that the amount requested
 3 accurately reflects the Contract adjustment for which CONTRACTOR believes COUNTY is liable.

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5 B. Pending the final resolution of any dispute arising under, related to, or involving this Contract,
 6 CONTRACTOR agrees to proceed diligently with the performance of services secured via this
 7 Contract, including the delivery of goods and/or provision of services. CONTRACTOR's failure to
 8 proceed diligently shall be considered a material breach of this Contract.

9 C. Any final decision of COUNTY shall be expressly identified as such, shall be in writing, and
 10 shall be signed by a COUNTY Deputy Purchasing Agent. If COUNTY does not render a decision
 11 within ninety (90) calendar days after receipt of CONTRACTOR's demand, it shall be deemed a final
 12 decision adverse to CONTRACTOR's contentions.

13 D. This Contract has been negotiated and executed in the State of California and shall be
 14 governed by and construed under the laws of the State of California. In the event of any legal action to
 15 enforce or interpret this Contract, the sole and exclusive venue shall be a court of competent
 16 jurisdiction located in Orange County, California, and the Parties hereto agree to and do hereby submit
 17 to the jurisdiction of such court, notwithstanding Code of Civil Procedure Section 394. Furthermore,
 18 the Parties specifically agree to waive any and all rights to request that an action be transferred for
 19 adjudication to another county.

20 **XI. EMPLOYEE ELIGIBILITY VERIFICATION**

21 CONTRACTOR attests that it shall fully comply with all federal and state statutes and regulations
 22 regarding the employment of aliens and others and to ensure that employees, subcontractors, and
 23 consultants performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirements set
 24 forth in federal statutes and regulations. CONTRACTOR shall obtain, from all employees,
 25 subcontractors, and consultants performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation
 26 of employment eligibility status required by federal or state statutes and regulations including, but not
 27 limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 USC §1324 et seq., as they currently
 28 exist and as they may be hereafter amended. CONTRACTOR shall retain all such documentation for
 29 all covered employees, subcontractors, and consultants for the period prescribed by the law.

30 **XII. EQUIPMENT**

31 A. Unless otherwise specified in writing by ADMINISTRATOR, Equipment is defined as all
 32 property of a Relatively Permanent nature with significant value, purchased in whole or in part by
 33 ADMINISTRATOR to assist in performing the services described in this Contract. "Relatively
 34 Permanent" is defined as having a useful life of one (1) year or longer. Equipment which costs \$5,000
 35 or over, including freight charges, sales taxes, and other taxes, and installation costs are defined as
 36
 37

1 Capital Assets. Equipment which costs between \$600 and \$5,000, including freight charges, sales
 2 taxes and other taxes, and installation costs, or electronic equipment that costs less than \$600 but may
 3 contain PHI or PII, are defined as Controlled Equipment. Controlled Equipment includes, but is not
 4 limited to phones, tablets, audio/visual equipment, computer equipment, and lab equipment. The cost
 5 of Equipment purchased, in whole or in part, with funds paid pursuant to this Contract shall be
 6 depreciated according to GAAP.

7 B. CONTRACTOR shall obtain ADMINISTRATOR's written approval prior to purchase of any
 8 Equipment with funds paid pursuant to this Contract. Upon delivery of Equipment, CONTRACTOR
 9 shall forward to ADMINISTRATOR, copies of the purchase order, receipt, and other supporting
 10 documentation, which includes delivery date, unit price, tax, shipping and serial numbers.
 11 CONTRACTOR shall request an applicable asset tag for said Equipment and shall include each
 12 purchased asset in an Equipment inventory.

13 C. Upon ADMINISTRATOR's prior written approval, CONTRACTOR may expense to
 14 COUNTY the cost of the approved Equipment purchased by CONTRACTOR. To "expense," in
 15 relation to Equipment, means to charge the proportionate cost of Equipment in the fiscal year in which
 16 it is purchased. Title of expensed Equipment shall be vested with COUNTY.

17 D. CONTRACTOR shall maintain an inventory of all Equipment purchased in whole or in part
 18 with funds paid through this Contract, including date of purchase, purchase price, serial number,
 19 model and type of Equipment. Such inventory shall be available for review by ADMINISTRATOR,
 20 and shall include the original purchase date and price, useful life, and balance of depreciated
 21 Equipment cost, if any.

22 E. CONTRACTOR shall cooperate with ADMINISTRATOR in conducting periodic physical
 23 inventories of all Equipment. Upon demand by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall return any
 24 or all Equipment to COUNTY.

25 F. CONTRACTOR must report any loss or theft of Equipment in accordance with the procedure
 26 approved by ADMINISTRATOR and the Notices Paragraph of this Contract. In addition,
 27 CONTRACTOR must complete and submit to ADMINISTRATOR a notification form when items of
 28 Equipment are moved from one location to another or returned to COUNTY as surplus.

29 G. Unless this Contract is followed without interruption by another contract between the Parties
 30 for substantially the same type and scope of services, at the termination of this Contract for any cause,
 31 CONTRACTOR shall return to COUNTY all Equipment purchased with funds paid through this
 32 Contract.

33 H. CONTRACTOR shall maintain and administer a sound business program for ensuring the
 34 proper use, maintenance, repair, protection, insurance, and preservation of COUNTY Equipment.

35 **XIII. FACILITIES, PAYMENTS AND SERVICES**

36 A. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide the services, staffing, facilities, and supplies in accordance
 37

1 with this Contract. COUNTY shall compensate, and authorize, when applicable, said services.
 2 CONTRACTOR shall operate continuously throughout the term of this Contract with at least the
 3 minimum number and type of staff which meet applicable federal and state requirements, and which
 4 are necessary for the provision of the services hereunder.

5 B. In the event that CONTRACTOR is unable to provide the services, staffing, facilities, or
 6 supplies as required, ADMINISTRATOR may, at its sole discretion, reduce the Total Amount Not to
 7 Exceed for the appropriate Period as well as the Total Amount Not to Exceed shall be in an amount
 8 proportionate to the number of days in which CONTRACTOR was determined to be unable to provide
 9 services, staffing, facilities or supplies.

10 **XIV. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE**

11 A. CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by COUNTY,
 12 and hold COUNTY, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents and those special
 13 districts and agencies for which COUNTY's Board of Supervisors acts as the governing Board
 14 ("COUNTY INDEMNITEES") harmless from any claims, demands or liability of any kind or nature,
 15 including but not limited to personal injury or property damage, arising from or related to the services,
 16 products or other performance provided by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Contract. If judgment is
 17 entered against CONTRACTOR and COUNTY by a court of competent jurisdiction because of the
 18 concurrent active negligence of COUNTY or COUNTY INDEMNITEES, CONTRACTOR and
 19 COUNTY agree that liability will be apportioned as determined by the court. Neither Party shall
 20 request a jury apportionment.
 21

22 B. Prior to the provision of services under this Contract, CONTRACTOR agrees to
 23 purchase all required insurance at CONTRACTOR's expense, including all endorsements required
 24 herein, necessary to satisfy COUNTY that the insurance provisions of this Contract have been
 25 complied with. CONTRACTOR agrees to keep such insurance coverage current and to provide
 26 Certificates of Insurance and endorsements to COUNTY during the entire term of this Contract.

27 C. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all subcontractors performing work on behalf of
 28 CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Contract shall be covered under CONTRACTOR's insurance as an
 29 Additional Insured or maintain insurance subject to the same terms and conditions as set forth herein
 30 for CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall not allow subcontractors to work if subcontractors have
 31 less than the level of coverage required by COUNTY from CONTRACTOR under this Contract. It is
 32 the obligation of CONTRACTOR to provide notice of the insurance requirements to every
 33 subcontractor and to receive proof of insurance prior to allowing any subcontractor to begin work.
 34 Such proof of insurance must be maintained by CONTRACTOR through the entirety of this Contract
 35 for inspection by COUNTY representative(s) at any reasonable time.

36 D. All self-insured retentions (SIRs) shall be clearly stated on the Certificate of Insurance. Any
 37 SIRs in excess of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) shall specifically be approved by COUNTY's

1 Risk Manager, or designee. COUNTY reserves the right to require current audited financial reports
 2 from CONTRACTOR. If CONTRACTOR is self-insured, CONTRACTOR will indemnify COUNTY
 3 for any and all claims resulting or arising from CONTRACTOR's services in accordance with the
 4 indemnity provision stated in this Contract.

5 E. If CONTRACTOR fails to maintain insurance acceptable to COUNTY for the full term of this
 6 Contract, COUNTY may terminate this Contract.

7 F. QUALIFIED INSURER

8 1. The policy or policies of insurance must be issued by an insurer with a minimum rating of
 9 A- (Secure A.M. Best's Rating) and VIII (Financial Size Category as determined by the most current
 10 edition of the **Best's Key Rating Guide/Property-Casualty/United States or ambest.com**).

11 2. If the insurance carrier does not have an A.M. Best Rating of A-/VIII, the CEO/Risk
 12 Management retains the right to approve or reject a carrier after a review of the company's
 13 performance and financial ratings.

14 G. The policy or policies of insurance maintained by CONTRACTOR shall provide the
 15 minimum limits and coverage as set forth below:

34 H. REQUIRED COVERAGE FORMS

35 1. The Commercial General Liability coverage shall be written on occurrence basis utilizing
 36 Insurance Services Office (ISO) form CG 00 01, or a substitute form providing liability coverage at
 37 least as broad.

1 2. The Business Auto Liability coverage shall be written on ISO form CA 00 01, CA 00 05,
2 CA 0012, CA 00 20, or a substitute form providing coverage at least as broad.

3 I. REQUIRED ENDORSEMENTS

4 //

5 1. The Commercial General Liability policy shall contain the following endorsements,
6 which shall accompany the Certificate of Insurance:

7 a. An Additional Insured endorsement using ISO form CG 20 26 04 13, or a form at
8 least as broad naming the ***County of Orange, its elected and appointed officials, officers, agents, and***
9 ***employees*** as Additional Insureds, or provide blanket coverage, which will state ***AS REQUIRED BY***
10 ***WRITTEN CONTRACT.***

11 b. A primary non-contributory endorsement using ISO form CG 20 01 04 13, or a form
12 at least as broad evidencing that CONTRACTOR's insurance is primary and any insurance or self-
13 insurance maintained by COUNTY shall be excess and non-contributing.

14 2. The Network Security and Privacy Liability policy shall contain the following
15 endorsements which shall accompany the COI:

16 a. An Additional Insured endorsement naming the ***County of Orange, its elected and***
17 ***appointed officials, officers, agents, and employees*** as Additional Insureds for its vicarious liability.

18 b. A primary and non-contributory endorsement evidencing that CONTRACTOR's
19 insurance is primary and any insurance or self-insurance maintained by COUNTY shall be excess and
20 non-contributing.

21 J. The Workers' Compensation policy shall contain a waiver of subrogation endorsement
22 waiving all rights of subrogation against the ***County of Orange, its elected and appointed officials,***
23 ***officers, agents, and employees*** or provide blanket coverage, which will state ***AS REQUIRED BY***
24 ***WRITTEN CONTRACT.***

25 K. All insurance policies required by this Contract shall waive all rights of subrogation against
26 the County of Orange, its elected and appointed officials, officers, agents, and employees when acting
27 within the scope of their appointment or employment.

28 L. CONTRACTOR shall provide thirty (30) calendar days prior written notice to COUNTY of
29 any policy cancellation or non-renewal and ten (10) calendar days prior written notice where
30 cancellation is due to non-payment of premium and provide a copy of the cancellation notice to
31 COUNTY. Failure to provide written notice of cancellation may constitute a material breach of the
32 Contract, upon which COUNTY may suspend or terminate this Contract.

33 M. If CONTRACTOR's Professional Liability and Network Security & Privacy Liability are
34 "Claims -Made" policies, CONTRACTOR shall agree to the following:

35 1. The retroactive date must be shown and must be before the date of the Contract or the
36 beginning of the Contract services.

37 2. Insurance must be maintained, and evidence of insurance must be provided, for at least

1 three (3) years after expiration or earlier termination of contract services.

2 3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made
3 policy form with a retroactive date prior to the effective date of the Contract services, CONTRACTOR

4 //

5 must purchase an extended reporting period for a minimum of three (3) years after expiration of earlier
6 termination of this Contract.

7 N. The Commercial General Liability policy shall contain a severability of interests clause also
8 known as a "separation of insureds" clause (standard in the ISO CG 0001 policy).

9 O. Insurance certificates should be forwarded to the department address listed in the Referenced
10 Contract Provisions of this Contract.

11 P. If CONTRACTOR fails to provide the insurance certificates and endorsements within seven
12 (7) calendar days of notification by COUNTY, COUNTY may immediately terminate this Contract for
13 cause.

14 Q. COUNTY expressly retains the right to require CONTRACTOR to increase or decrease
15 insurance of any of the above insurance types throughout the term of this Contract. Any increase or
16 decrease in insurance will be as deemed by County of Orange Risk Manager as appropriate to
17 adequately protect COUNTY.

18 R. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR in writing of changes in the insurance requirements.
19 If CONTRACTOR does not provide acceptable Certificates of Insurance and endorsements to
20 COUNTY incorporating such changes within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of such notice, this
21 Contract may be in breach without further notice to CONTRACTOR, and COUNTY shall be entitled
22 to all legal remedies.

23 S. The procuring of such required policy or policies of insurance shall not be construed to limit
24 CONTRACTOR's liability hereunder nor to fulfill the indemnification provisions and requirements of
25 this Contract, nor act in any way to reduce the policy coverage and limits available from the insurer.

26 T. SUBMISSION OF INSURANCE DOCUMENTS

27 1. The COI and endorsements shall be provided to COUNTY as follows:

28 a. Prior to the start date of this Contract.

29 b. No later than the expiration date for each policy.

30 c. Within thirty (30) calendar days upon receipt of written notice by COUNTY
31 regarding changes to any of the insurance requirements as set forth in the Coverage Subparagraph
32 above.

33 2. The COI and endorsements shall be provided to COUNTY at the address as set forth in
34 the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Contract.

35 3. If CONTRACTOR fails to submit the COI and endorsements that meet the insurance
36 provisions stipulated in this Contract by the above specified due dates, ADMINISTRATOR shall have
37 sole discretion to impose one or both of the following:

1 a. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any or all payments due CONTRACTOR
 2 pursuant to any and all contracts between COUNTY and CONTRACTOR until such time that the
 3 required COI and endorsements that meet the insurance provisions stipulated in this Contract are
 4 submitted to ADMINISTRATOR.

5 b. CONTRACTOR may be assessed a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each
 6 late COI or endorsement for each business day, pursuant to any and all contracts between COUNTY
 7 and
 8 CONTRACTOR, until such time that the required COI and endorsements that meet the insurance
 9 provisions stipulated in this Contract are submitted to ADMINISTRATOR.

10 c. If CONTRACTOR is assessed a late penalty, the amount shall be deducted from
 11 CONTRACTOR's monthly invoice.

12 4. In no cases shall assurances by CONTRACTOR, its employees, agents, including any
 13 insurance agent, be construed as adequate evidence of insurance. COUNTY will only accept valid
 14 COIs and endorsements, or in the interim, an insurance binder as adequate evidence of insurance
 15 coverage.

16 **XV. INSPECTIONS AND AUDITS**

17 A. ADMINISTRATOR, any authorized representative of COUNTY, any authorized
 18 representative of the State of California, the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and
 19 Human Services, the Comptroller General of the United States, or any other of their authorized
 20 representatives, shall to the extent permissible under applicable law have access to any books,
 21 documents, and records, including but not limited to, financial statements, general ledgers, relevant
 22 accounting systems, medical and Client records, of CONTRACTOR that are directly pertinent to this
 23 Contract, for the purpose of responding to a beneficiary complaint or conducting an audit, review,
 24 evaluation, or examination, or making transcripts during the periods of retention set forth in the
 25 Records Management and Maintenance Paragraph of this Contract. Such persons may at all reasonable
 26 times inspect or otherwise evaluate the services provided pursuant to this Contract, and the premises in
 27 which they are provided.
 28

29 B. CONTRACTOR shall actively participate and cooperate with any person specified in
 30 Subparagraph A. above in any evaluation or monitoring of the services provided pursuant to this
 31 Contract, and shall provide the above-mentioned persons adequate office space to conduct such
 32 evaluation or monitoring.

33 C. CONTRACTOR shall make all of its premises, physical facilities, equipment, books, records,
 34 documents, contracts, computers, or other electronic systems pertaining to Medi-Cal/Drug Medi-Cal
 35 enrollees, Medi-Cal/Drug Medi-Cal-related activities, services and activities furnished under the terms
 36 of this Contract or determinations of amounts payable available at any time for inspection,
 37 examination or copying by the State, CMS, HHS Inspector General, the United States Comptroller

1 General, their designees, and other authorized federal and state agencies. (42 CFR §438.3(h)) This
 2 audit right will exist for ten (10) years from the final date of the contract period or from the date of
 3 completion of any audit, whichever is later. (42 CFR §438.230(c)(3)(iii).) The State, CMS, or the
 4 //

5 HHS Inspector General may inspect, evaluate, and audit CONTRACTOR at any time if there is a
 6 reasonable possibility of fraud or similar risk. (42 CFR §438.230(c)(3)(iv).)

7 D. CONTRACTOR shall retain a licensed certified public accountant, who will prepare an
 8 annual Single Audit as required by 31 USC 7501 – 7507, as well as its implementing regulations under
 9 2 CFR Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for
 10 Federal Awards. CONTRACTOR shall forward the Single Audit to ADMINISTRATOR within
 11 fourteen (14) calendar days of receipt.

12 E. ADMINISTRATOR shall inform providers and CONTRACTOR, at the time they enter into a
 13 contract, of the following:

14 1. Beneficiary grievance, appeal, and fair hearing procedures and timeframes as specified in
 15 42 C.F.R. 438.400 through 42 C.F.R. 438.424.

16 2. The beneficiary's right to file grievances and appeals and the requirements and
 17 timeframes for filling.

18 3. The availability of assistance to the beneficiary with filling grievances and appeals.

19 4. The beneficiary's right to request continuation of benefits that ADMINISTRATOR seeks
 20 to reduce or terminate during an appeal or state fair hearing filing, if filed within the allowable
 21 timeframes, although the beneficiary may be liable for the cost of any continued benefits while the
 22 appeal or state fair hearing is pending if the final decision is adverse to the beneficiary.

23 5. The conduction of random reviews to ensure beneficiaries are being notified in a timely
 24 manner.

25 F. CONTRACTOR shall forward to ADMINISTRATOR a copy of any audit report within
 26 fourteen (14) calendar days of receipt. Such audit shall include, but not be limited to, management,
 27 financial, programmatic or any other type of audit of CONTRACTOR's operations, whether or not the
 28 cost of such operation or audit is reimbursed in whole or in part through this Contract.

30 **XVI. LICENSES AND LAWS**

31 A. CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees, affiliates, and subcontractors shall,
 32 throughout the term of this Contract, maintain all necessary licenses, permits, approvals, certificates,
 33 accreditations, waivers, and exemptions necessary for the provision of the services hereunder and
 34 required by the laws, regulations and requirements of the United States, the State of California,
 35 COUNTY, and all other applicable governmental agencies. CONTRACTOR shall notify
 36 ADMINISTRATOR immediately and in writing of its inability to obtain or maintain, irrespective of
 37 the pendency of any hearings or appeals, permits, licenses, approvals, certificates, accreditations,

1 | waivers and exemptions. Said inability shall be cause for termination of this Contract.

2 | B. CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable governmental laws, regulations, and

1 25. Title 2, Division 3, Article 9.5 of the Gov. Code, commencing with Section 11135.

2 26. Noncompliance with the requirements of nondiscrimination in services shall constitute
3 grounds for state to withhold payments under this Agreement or terminate all, or any type, of funding
4 provided hereunder.

5 27. Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 (42 USC 3601 et seq.) prohibiting
6 discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, handicap, familial status or national origin in
7 the sale or rental of housing.

8 28. Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (45 CFR Part 90), as amended 42 USC Sections 6101 –
9 6107), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age.

10 29. Age Discrimination in Employment Act (29 CFR Part 1625).

11 30. Title I of the Americans with Disabilities Act (29 CFR Part 1630) prohibiting
12 discrimination against the disabled in employment.

13 31. Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (28 CFR Part 35) prohibiting
14 discrimination against the disabled by public entities.

15 32. Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (28 CFR Part 36) regarding access.

16 33. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 USC Section 794),
17 prohibiting discrimination on the basis of individuals with disabilities.

18 34. Executive Order 11246 (42 USC 2000(e) et seq. and 41 CFR Part 60) regarding
19 nondiscrimination in employment under federal contracts and construction contracts greater than
20 \$10,000 funded by federal financial assistance.

21 35. Executive Order 13166 (67 FR 41455) to improve access to federal services for those with
22 limited English proficiency.

23 36. The Drug Abuse Office and Treatment Act of 1972, as amended, relating to
24 nondiscrimination on the basis of drug abuse.

25 37. Confidentiality of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Patient Records (42 CFR Part 2, Subparts A –
26 E).

27 38. Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code Section 12900 et seq.) and the
28 applicable regulations promulgated thereunder (2 CCR 7285.0 et seq.).

29 39. Title 2, Division 3, Article 9.5 of the Government Code, commencing with Section 11135.

30 40. Title 9, Division 4, Chapter 8 of the CCR, commencing with Section 13000.

31 41. No federal funds shall be used by the County or its subcontractors for sectarian worship,
32 instruction, or proselytization. No federal funds shall be used by the County or its subcontractors to
33 provide direct, immediate, or substantial support to any religious activity.

34
35 **XVII. LITERATURE, ADVERTISEMENTS, AND SOCIAL MEDIA**

36 A. Any written information or literature, including educational or promotional materials,
37 distributed by CONTRACTOR to any person or organization for purposes directly or indirectly related

1 to this Contract must be approved at least thirty (30) calendar days in advance and in writing by
 2 ADMINISTRATOR before distribution. For the purposes of this Contract, distribution of written
 3 materials shall include, but not be limited to, pamphlets, brochures, flyers, newspaper or magazine ads,
 4 and electronic media such as the Internet.

5 B. Any advertisement through radio, television broadcast, or the Internet, for educational or
 6 promotional purposes, made by CONTRACTOR for purposes directly or indirectly related to this
 7 Contract must be approved in advance at least thirty (30) calendar days and in writing by
 8 ADMINISTRATOR.

9 C. If CONTRACTOR uses social media (such as Facebook, Twitter, YouTube or other publicly
 10 available social media sites) in support of the services described within this Contract, CONTRACTOR
 11 shall develop social media policies and procedures and have them available to ADMINISTRATOR
 12 upon reasonable notice. CONTRACTOR shall inform ADMINISTRATOR of all forms of social
 13 media used to either directly or indirectly support the services described within this Contract.
 14 CONTRACTOR shall comply with COUNTY Social Media Use Policy and Procedures as they pertain
 15 to any social media developed in support of the services described within this Contract.
 16 CONTRACTOR shall also include any required funding statement information on social media when
 17 required by ADMINISTRATOR.

18 D. Any information as described in Subparagraphs A. and B. above shall not imply endorsement
 19 by COUNTY, unless ADMINISTRATOR consents thereto in writing.

20 E. CONTRACTOR shall also clearly explain through these materials that there shall be no
 21 unlawful use of drugs or alcohol associated with the services provided pursuant to this Contract, as
 22 specified in HSC, §11999-11999.3.

23 **XVIII. AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED**

24 A. The Total Amount Not to Exceed of COUNTY for services provided in accordance with this
 25 Contract, and the separate Amount Not to Exceed for each Period under this Contract, are as specified
 26 in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Contract, except as allowed for in Subparagraph B.
 27 below.

28 B. ADMINISTRATOR may amend the Amount Not to Exceed by an amount not to exceed ten
 29 percent (10%) of Period One funding for this Contract.

30 **XIX. MINIMUM WAGE LAWS**

31 A. Pursuant to the United States of America Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended, and
 32 State of California Labor Code, §1178.5, CONTRACTOR shall pay no less than the greater of the
 33 federal or California Minimum Wage to all its Covered Individuals (as defined within the
 34 "Compliance" paragraph of this Contract) that directly or indirectly provide services pursuant to this
 35 Contract, in any manner whatsoever. CONTRACTOR shall require and verify that all of its Covered
 36
 37

1 Individuals
2 providing services pursuant to this Contract be paid no less than the greater of the federal or California
3 Minimum Wage.

4 B. CONTRACTOR shall comply and verify that its Covered Individuals comply with all other
5 federal and State of California laws for minimum wage, overtime pay, record keeping, and child labor
6 standards pursuant to providing services pursuant to this Contract.

7 C. Notwithstanding the minimum wage requirements provided for in this clause,
8 CONTRACTOR, where applicable, shall comply with the prevailing wage and related requirements,
9 as provided for in accordance with the provisions of Article 2 of Chapter 1, Part 7, Division 2 of the
10 Labor Code of the State of California (§§1770, et seq.), as it now exists or may hereafter be amended.

13 **XX. NONDISCRIMINATION**

14 A. EMPLOYMENT

15 1. During the term of this Contract, CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals (as defined
16 in the "Compliance" paragraph of this Contract) shall not unlawfully discriminate against any
17 employee or applicant for employment because of his/her race, religious creed, color, national origin,
18 ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status,
19 sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status.
20 Additionally, during the term of this Contract, CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall
21 require in its subcontracts that subcontractors shall not unlawfully discriminate against any employee
22 or applicant for employment because of his/her race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry,
23 physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex,
24 gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status.

25 2. CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall not discriminate against employees or
26 applicants for employment in the areas of employment, promotion, demotion or transfer; recruitment
27 or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination; rate of pay or other forms of compensation; and
28 selection for training, including apprenticeship.

29 3. CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate between employees with spouses and employees
30 with domestic partners, or discriminate between domestic partners and spouses of those employees, in
31 the provision of benefits.

32 4. CONTRACTOR shall post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants
33 for employment, notices from ADMINISTRATOR and/or the United States Equal Employment
34 Opportunity Commission setting forth the provisions of the EOC.

35 5. All solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of
36 CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor shall state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration
37 for employment without regard to race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical

1 disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender
 2 identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status. Such requirements
 3 shall be deemed fulfilled by use of the term EOE.

4 6. Each labor union or representative of workers with which CONTRACTOR and/or
 5 subcontractor has a collective bargaining contract or other contract or understanding must post a notice
 6 advising the labor union or workers' representative of the commitments under this Nondiscrimination
 7 Paragraph and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places, available to employees and
 8 applicants for employment.

9 B. SERVICES, BENEFITS AND FACILITIES – CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor shall not
 10 discriminate in the provision of services, the allocation of benefits, or in the accommodation in
 11 facilities on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability,
 12 mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity,
 13 gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status in accordance with Title IX of
 14 the Education Amendments of 1972 as they relate to 20 USC §1681 - §1688; Title VI of the Civil
 15 Rights Act of 1964 (42 USC §2000d); the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 USC §6101); Title 9,
 16 Division 4, Chapter 6, Article 1 (§10800, et seq.) of the CCR; and Title II of the Genetic Information
 17 Nondiscrimination Act of 2008, 42 USC 2000ff, et seq. as applicable, and all other pertinent rules and
 18 regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, and as otherwise provided by state law and regulations, as
 19 all may now exist or be hereafter amended or changed. For the purpose of this Nondiscrimination
 20 paragraph, discrimination includes, but is not limited to the following based on one or more of the
 21 factors identified above:

- 22 1. Denying a Client or potential Client any service, benefit, or accommodation.
- 23 2. Providing any service or benefit to a Client which is different or is provided in a different
 24 manner or at a different time from that provided to other Clients.
- 25 3. Restricting a Client in any way in the enjoyment of any advantage or privilege enjoyed by
 26 others receiving any service and/or benefit.
- 27 4. Treating a Client differently from others in satisfying any admission requirement or
 28 condition, or eligibility requirement or condition, which individuals must meet in order to be provided
 29 any service and/or benefit.
- 30 5. Assignment of times or places for the provision of services.

31 C. COMPLAINT PROCESS – CONTRACTOR shall establish procedures for advising all
 32 Clients through a written statement that CONTRACTOR's and/or subcontractor's Clients may file all
 33 complaints alleging discrimination in the delivery of services with CONTRACTOR, subcontractor,
 34 and ADMINISTRATOR or the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' OCR.

- 35 1. Whenever possible, problems shall be resolved at the point of service. CONTRACTOR
 36 shall establish an internal problem resolution process for Clients not able to resolve such problems at
 37 the point of service. Clients may initiate a grievance or complaint directly with CONTRACTOR either

1 orally or in writing.

2 a. COUNTY shall establish a formal resolution and grievance process in the event
3 grievance is not able to be resolved at point of service.

4 2. Within the time limits procedurally imposed, the complainant shall be notified in writing
5 as to the findings regarding the alleged complaint and, if not satisfied with the decision, has the right
6 to request a State Fair Hearing.

7 D. PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES – CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor agree to comply
8 with the provisions of §504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, (29 USC 794 et seq., as
9 implemented in 45 CFR 84.1 et seq.), and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 as amended (42
10 USC 12101 et seq.; as implemented in 29 CFR 1630), as applicable, pertaining to the prohibition of
11 discrimination against qualified persons with disabilities in all programs or activities, and if applicable,
12 as implemented in Title 45, CFR, §84.1 et seq., as they exist now or may be hereafter amended
13 together with succeeding legislation.

14 E. RETALIATION – Neither CONTRACTOR nor subcontractor, nor its employees or agents
15 shall intimidate, coerce or take adverse action against any person for the purpose of interfering with
16 rights secured by federal or state laws, or because such person has filed a complaint, certified, assisted
17 or otherwise participated in an investigation, proceeding, hearing or any other activity undertaken to
18 enforce rights secured by federal or state law.

19 F. In the event of non-compliance with this paragraph or as otherwise provided by federal and
20 state law, this Contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and
21 CONTRACTOR or subcontractor may be declared ineligible for further contracts involving federal,
22 state or COUNTY funds.

23 G. NONDISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT AND SERVICES - County certifies that
24 under the laws of the United States and the State of California, County will not unlawfully
25 discriminate against any person.

26 **XXI. NOTICES**

27 A. Unless otherwise specified, all notices, claims, correspondence, reports and/or statements
28 authorized or required by this Contract shall be effective:

29 1. When written and deposited in the United States mail, first class postage prepaid and
30 addressed as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Contract or as otherwise directed
31 by ADMINISTRATOR;

32 2. When faxed, transmission confirmed;

33 3. When sent by Email; or

34 4. When accepted by U.S. Postal Service Express Mail, Federal Express, United Parcel
35 Service, or any other expedited delivery service.

36 B. Termination Notices shall be addressed as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of
37

1 this Contract or as otherwise directed by ADMINISTRATOR and shall be effective when faxed,
2 transmission confirmed, or when accepted by U.S. Postal Service Express Mail, Federal Express,
3 United Parcel Service, or any other expedited delivery service.

4 C. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, within twenty-four (24) hours
5 of becoming aware of any occurrence of a serious nature, which may expose COUNTY to liability.
6 Such occurrences shall include, but not be limited to, accidents, injuries, or acts of negligence, or loss
7 or damage to any COUNTY property in possession of CONTRACTOR.

8 D. For purposes of this Contract, any notice to be provided by COUNTY may be given by
9 ADMINISTRATOR.

10 **XXII. NOTIFICATION OF DEATH**

11 A. Upon becoming aware of the death of any person served pursuant to this Contract,
12 CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify ADMINISTRATOR.

13 //

14 B. All Notifications of Death provided to ADMINISTRATOR by CONTRACTOR shall contain
15 the name of the deceased, the date and time of death, the nature and circumstances of the death, and
16 the name(s) of CONTRACTOR’s officers or employees with knowledge of the incident.

17 1. TELEPHONE NOTIFICATION – CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR by
18 telephone immediately upon becoming aware of the death due to non-terminal illness of any person
19 served pursuant to this Contract; notice need only be given during normal business hours.

20 2. WRITTEN NOTIFICATION

21 a. NON-TERMINAL ILLNESS – CONTRACTOR shall hand deliver, fax, and/or send
22 via encrypted email to ADMINISTRATOR a written report within sixteen (16) hours after becoming
23 aware of the death due to non-terminal illness of any person served pursuant to this Contract.

24 b. TERMINAL ILLNESS – CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR by
25 written report hand delivered, faxed, sent via encrypted email, within forty-eight (48) hours of
26 becoming aware of the death due to terminal illness of any person served pursuant to this Contract.

27 c. When notification via encrypted email is not possible or practical CONTRACTOR
28 may hand deliver or fax to a known number said notification.

29 C. If there are any questions regarding the cause of death of any person served pursuant to this
30 Contract who was diagnosed with a terminal illness, or if there are any unusual circumstances related
31 to the death, CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify ADMINISTRATOR in accordance with this
32 Notification of Death Paragraph.

33 **XXIII. NOTIFICATION OF PUBLIC EVENTS AND MEETINGS**

34 A. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR of any public event or meeting funded in
35 whole or in part by COUNTY, except for those events or meetings that are intended solely to serve
36
37

1 Clients or occur in the normal course of business.

2 B. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR at least thirty (30) business days in advance
3 of any applicable public event or meeting. The notification must include the date, time, duration,
4 location and purpose of the public event or meeting. Any promotional materials or event related flyers
5 must be approved by ADMINISTRATOR prior to distribution.

6
7 **XXIV. RECORDS MANAGEMENT AND MAINTENANCE**

8 A. CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees and subcontractors shall, throughout the term
9 of this Contract, prepare, maintain and manage records appropriate to the services provided and in
10 accordance with this Contract and all applicable requirements.

11 1. CONTRACTOR shall maintain records that are adequate to substantiate the services for
12 which claims are submitted for reimbursement under this Contract and the charges thereto. Such
13 records shall include, but not be limited to, individual patient charts and utilization review records.

14 //

15 2. CONTRACTOR shall keep and maintain records of each service rendered to each MSN
16 Patient, the identity of the MSN Patient to whom the service was rendered, the date the service was
17 rendered, and such additional information as ADMINISTRATOR or DHCS may require.

18 3. CONTRACTOR shall maintain books, records, documents, accounting procedures and
19 practices, and other evidence sufficient to reflect properly all direct and indirect cost of whatever
20 nature claimed to have been incurred in the performance of this Contract and in accordance with
21 Medicare principles of reimbursement and GAAP.

22 4. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the maintenance of medical records required by §70747
23 through and including §70751 of the CCR, as they exist now or may hereafter be amended, the
24 medical necessity of the service, and the quality of care provided. Records shall be maintained in
25 accordance with §51476 of Title 22 of the CCR, as it exists now or may hereafter be amended.

26 B. CONTRACTOR shall implement and maintain administrative, technical and physical
27 safeguards to ensure the privacy of PHI and prevent the intentional or unintentional use or disclosure
28 of PHI in violation of the HIPAA, federal and state regulations. CONTRACTOR shall mitigate to the
29 extent practicable, the known harmful effect of any use or disclosure of PHI made in violation of
30 federal or state regulations and/or COUNTY policies.

31 C. CONTRACTOR's participant, Client, and/or patient records shall be maintained in a secure
32 manner. CONTRACTOR shall maintain participant, Client, and/or patient records and must establish
33 and implement written record management procedures.

34 D. CONTRACTOR shall retain all financial records for a minimum of ten (10) years from the
35 termination of the Contract, unless a longer period is required due to legal proceedings such as
36 litigations and/or settlement of claims.

37 E. CONTRACTOR shall retain all Client and/or patient medical records for ten (10) years

1 following discharge of the participant, Client and/or patient.

2 F. CONTRACTOR shall make records pertaining to the costs of services, participant fees,
3 charges, billings, and revenues available at one (1) location within the limits of the County of Orange.
4 If CONTRACTOR is unable to meet the record location criteria above, ADMINISTRATOR may
5 provide written approval to CONTRACTOR to maintain records in a single location, identified by
6 CONTRACTOR.

7 G. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR of any PRA requests related to, or arising
8 out of, this Contract, within forty-eight (48) hours. CONTRACTOR shall provide ADMINISTRATOR
9 all information that is requested by the PRA request.

10 H. CONTRACTOR shall ensure all HIPAA DRS requirements are met. HIPAA requires that
11 Clients, participants and/or patients be provided the right to access or receive a copy of their DRS
12 and/or request addendum to their records. Title 45 CFR §164.501, defines DRS as a group of records
13 maintained by or for a covered entity that is:

14 //

15 1. The medical records and billing records about individuals maintained by or for a covered
16 health care provider;

17 2. The enrollment, payment, claims adjudication, and case or medical management record
18 systems maintained by or for a health plan; or

19 3. Used, in whole or in part, by or for the covered entity to make decisions about individuals.

20 I. CONTRACTOR may retain Client, and/or patient documentation electronically in accordance
21 with the terms of this Contract and common business practices. If documentation is retained
22 electronically, CONTRACTOR shall, in the event of an audit or site visit:

23 1. Have documents readily available within twenty-four (24) hour notice of a scheduled
24 audit or site visit.

25 2. Provide auditor or other authorized individuals access to documents via a computer
26 terminal.

27 3. Provide auditor or other authorized individuals a hardcopy printout of documents, if
28 requested.

29 J. CONTRACTOR shall ensure compliance with requirements pertaining to the privacy and
30 security of PII and/or PHI. CONTRACTOR shall, upon discovery of a Breach of privacy and/or
31 security of PII and/or PHI by CONTRACTOR, notify federal and/or state authorities as required by
32 law or regulation, and copy ADMINISTRATOR on such notifications.

33 K. CONTRACTOR may be required to pay any costs associated with a Breach of privacy and/or
34 security of PII and/or PHI, including but not limited to the costs of notification. CONTRACTOR shall
35 pay any and all such costs arising out of a Breach of privacy and/or security of PII and/or PHI.
36 CONTRACTOR shall obtain an NPI for each site identified as a location for providing contractual
37 services. Provider's site NPIs must be submitted to the ADMINISTRATOR prior to rendering services

1 to Clients. Contractors providing direct or indirect services for State reporting must also submit
 2 rendering (individual) provider NPIs to ADMINISTRATOR for each staff member providing Medi-
 3 Cal billable services. CONTRACTOR reimbursement will not be processed unless NPIs are on file
 4 with ADMINISTRATOR in advance of providing services to Clients. It is the responsibility of each
 5 contract provider site and individual staff member that bills Medi-Cal to obtain an NPI from the
 6 NPPES. Each contract site, as well as every staff member that provides billable services, is responsible
 7 for notifying the NPPES within thirty (30) calendar days of any updates to personal information,
 8 which may include, but is not limited to, worksite address, name changes, taxonomy code changes,
 9 etc.

10 **XXV. RESEARCH AND PUBLICATION**

11
 12 CONTRACTOR shall not utilize information and/or data received from COUNTY, or arising out
 13 of, or developed, as a result of this Contract for any purpose other than performance of services under
 14 this Contract.

15 **XXVI. SEVERABILITY**

16 If a court of competent jurisdiction declares any provision of this Contract or application thereof to
 17 any person or circumstances to be invalid or if any provision of this Contract contravenes any federal,
 18 state or county statute, ordinance, or regulation, the remaining provisions of this Contract or the
 19 application thereof shall remain valid, and the remaining provisions of this Contract shall remain in
 20 full force and effect, and to that extent the provisions of this Contract are severable.

21 **XXVII. SPECIAL PROVISIONS**

22
 23 A. CONTRACTOR shall not use the funds provided by means of this Contract for the following
 24 purposes:

- 25 1. Making cash payments to intended recipients of services through this Contract.
- 26 2. Lobbying any governmental agency or official. CONTRACTOR shall file all
 27 certifications and reports in compliance with this requirement pursuant to Title 31, USC, §1352 (e.g.,
 28 limitation on use of appropriated funds to influence certain federal contracting and financial
 29 transactions).
- 30 3. Fundraising.
- 31 4. Purchase of gifts, meals, entertainment, awards, or other personal expenses for
 32 CONTRACTOR's staff, volunteers, interns, consultants, subcontractors, and members of the Board of
 33 Directors or governing body.
- 34 5. Reimbursement of CONTRACTOR's members of the Board of Directors or governing
 35 body for expenses or services.
- 36 6. Making personal loans to CONTRACTOR's staff, volunteers, interns, consultants,
 37 subcontractors, and members of the Board of Directors or governing body, or its designee or

1 authorized agent, or making salary advances or giving bonuses to CONTRACTOR's staff.

2 7. Paying an individual salary or compensation for services at a rate in excess of the current
3 Level I of the Executive Salary Schedule as published by the OPM. The OPM Executive Salary
4 Schedule may be found at www.opm.gov.

5 8. Severance pay for separating employees.

6 9. Paying rent and/or lease costs for a facility prior to the facility meeting all required
7 building codes and obtaining all necessary building permits for any associated construction.

8 10. Purchasing or improving land, including constructing or permanently improving any
9 building or facility, except for tenant improvements.

10 11. Satisfying any expenditure of non-federal funds as a condition for the receipt of federal
11 funds (matching).

12 12. Contracting or subcontracting with any entity other than an individual or nonprofit entity.

13 13. Producing any information that promotes responsible use, if the use is unlawful, of drugs
14 or alcohol.

15 14. Promoting the legalization of any drug or other substance included in Schedule 1 of the
16 Controlled Substance Act (21 USC 812).

17 15. Distributing or aiding in the distribution of sterile needles or syringes for the hypodermic
18 injection of any illegal drug.

19 16. Assisting, promoting, or deterring union organizing.

20 17. Providing inpatient hospital services or purchasing major medical equipment.

21 B. Unless otherwise specified in advance and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR,
22 CONTRACTOR shall not use the funds provided by means of this Contract for the following
23 purposes:

24 1. Funding travel or training (excluding mileage or parking).

25 2. Making phone calls outside of the local area unless documented to be directly for the
26 purpose of Client care.

27 3. Payment for grant writing, consultants, certified public accounting, or legal services.

28 4. Purchase of artwork or other items that are for decorative purposes and do not directly
29 contribute to the quality of services to be provided pursuant to this Contract.

30 5. Purchase of gifts, meals, entertainment, awards, or other personal expenses for
31 CONTRACTOR's Clients.

32 C. Neither Party shall be responsible for delays or failures in performance resulting from acts
33 beyond the control of the affected Party. Such acts shall include, but not be limited to, acts of God,
34 fire, flood, earthquake, other natural disaster, nuclear accident, strike, lockout, riot, freight, embargo,
35 public related utility, or governmental statutes or regulations imposed after the fact.

37 **XXVIII. STATUS OF CONTRACTOR**

1 CONTRACTOR is, and shall at all times be deemed to be, an independent contractor and shall be
 2 wholly responsible for the manner in which it performs the services required of it by the terms of this
 3 Contract. CONTRACTOR is entirely responsible for compensating staff, subcontractors, and
 4 consultants employed by CONTRACTOR. This Contract shall not be construed as creating the

15 **XXIX. TERM**

10 removes such physician or licensed person from serving persons treated or assisted pursuant to this
11 Contract.

12 C. CONTINGENT FUNDING

13 1. Any obligation of COUNTY under this Contract is contingent upon the following:

33 A. CLIENT FEES – CONTRACTOR shall not charge a fee to DMC beneficiaries to whom
34 services are provided pursuant to this Contract, their estates and/or responsible relatives, unless a
35 Share of Cost is determined per Medi-Cal eligibility.

36 B. THIRD-PARTY REVENUE – CONTRACTOR shall make every reasonable effort to obtain

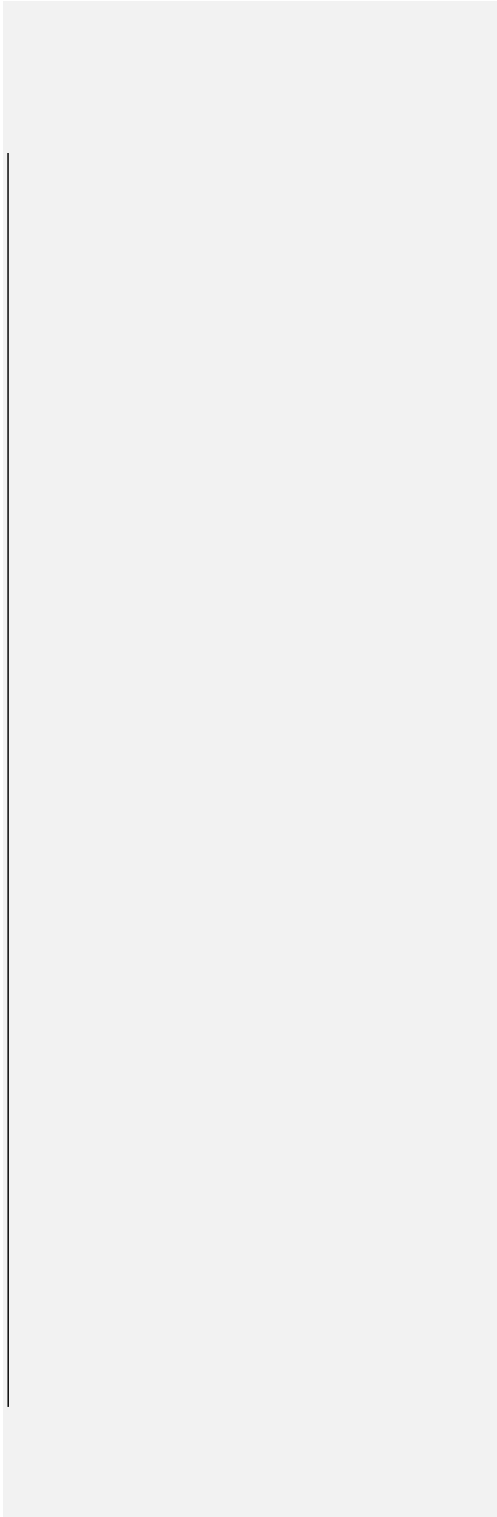

I. COMMON TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

A. The parties agree to the following terms and definitions, and to those terms and definitions which, for convenience, are set forth elsewhere in this Contract.

1. AB109 Services means services for DMC covered Clients deemed eligible by California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and/or OCPD. Clients in AB 109 Services are those who have received sentencing for a felony or misdemeanor that is non-violent, non-sexual, and non-serious.

2. American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Criteria means a comprehensive set of guidelines for placement, continued stay and transfer/discharge of Clients with addiction and co-occurring conditions.

3. California Outcomes Measurement System (CalOMS) means a statewide Client-based data collection and outcomes measurement system as required by the State to effectively manage and improve the provision of alcohol and other drug services at the state, COUNTY, and provider levels.

4. Care Coordination means services which include, but are not limited to, referral and Linkage to ancillary services not provided by CONTRACTOR such as contacting outside agencies and making referrals for services, including academic education, vocational training, medical and dental treatment, pre-and-post counseling and testing for infectious diseases, legal assistance, job search assistance, financial assistance, childcare, and self-help programs such as 12-step programs. Additionally, care coordination includes helping Clients build support in the community and helping Clients deal with impairments in life skills due to their substance use problems. Care coordination service include periodic reassessment of the Client's need for continued care coordination services and assistance to successfully transition to lower or higher levels of care, as determined by review of the treatment plans.

5. Client means a male or female aged 18 and over residing in the County of Orange who has a primary problem of opiate use disorder and/or other qualifying substance use disorder allowable by the DMC-ODS formulary that also qualifies for admission as per Title 9 and contractual eligibility requirements.

6. Collateral Services means sessions with the significant persons in the Client's life, focusing on their treatment needs to support the achievement of the Client's treatment goals. Significant persons

//

1 are individuals that have a personal, not official or professional, relationship with the Client. The Client
2 may or may not be present during the session.

3 7. Completion –

4 a. Satisfactory Completion means Clients who have attended sessions as prescribed and
5 are discharged from treatment after making significant positive progress on their treatment plan goals.

6 b. Unsatisfactory Completion means Clients who have not attended sessions and are
7 discharged without making progress on their treatment plan goals.

8 8. Co-Occurring means a person who has at least one substance use disorder and one mental
9 health disorder that can be diagnosed independently of each other.

10 9. Counselor means a staff member who is registered or certified by one of the State approved
11 Counseling Certification programs or who is a registered intern or licensed by the Board of Behavioral
12 Sciences. A Counselor must remain in good standing with the certification or licensing process.

13 10. Crisis Intervention means providing emergency assessment and counseling with the Client
14 in a crisis situation. This shall include an actual relapse or an unforeseen event or circumstance which
15 presents an imminent threat of relapse to stabilize the emergency situation. Crisis sessions shall be
16 limited to the stabilization of the Client's emergency situation.

17 11. Detoxification Therapy means narcotic therapy used in decreasing medically determined
18 dosage levels for a period of not more than twenty-one (21) calendar days, to reduce or eliminate opiate
19 dependence.

20 12. Diagnosis means the definition of the nature of the Client's substance use disorder. When
21 formulating the diagnosis of Client, CONTRACTOR shall use the diagnosis codes as specified in the
22 most current edition of the DSM published by the American Psychiatric Association. DSM diagnosis
23 shall be recorded on all IRIS documents, as appropriate. It shall also be recorded on the Medical
24 Necessity form and Treatment Plans.

25 13. Discharge/Referral and Linkage means providing the needed resources upon discharge from
26 the program through Discharge Planning services via an Exit Plan for those completing their
27 individualized course of maintenance services so that Client has the knowledge and resources to seek
28 treatment again as needed or outside supportive services. As part of the Discharge/Referral and Linkage
29 process, CONTRACTOR must perform a discharge summary for Clients within thirty (30) calendar
30 days of discharge.

31 14. Dose means the administration of a specific amount of methadone and/or other MAT
32 prescribed by a physician for the Client's care along with medical care and individual and/or group
33 counseling.

34 15. Drug and Alcohol Treatment Access Report (DATAR) means the Department of Health
35 Care Services (DHCS) system to collect data on Substance Use Disorder treatment capacity and waiting
36 lists.

37 //

1 16. Drug/Alcohol Screening means providing drug/alcohol screening/testing once a month or as
2 delineated by HCA.

3 17. Early Periodic Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) means the federally
4 mandated Medicaid benefit that entitles full-scope Medi-Cal-covered beneficiaries less than twenty-one
5 (21) years of age to receive any Medicaid service necessary to correct or help to improve a defect,
6 mental illness, or other condition, such as a substance-related disorder, that is discovered during a health
7 screening.

8 18. Group Counseling means group-based services, with a minimum of two (2) and a maximum
9 of twelve (12) Clients, with at least one DMC beneficiary per group, billed in fifteen (15) minute
10 increments. Group counseling sessions are provided in a developmentally appropriate environment (i.e.,
11 age, culture, etc.) and utilize evidence-based practices (EBP). ~~Group Counseling means group-based~~
12 ~~services with a minimum of two (2) Clients and a maximum of twelve (12) Clients with at least one~~
13 ~~DMC beneficiary per group billed in ten (10) minute increments. Group counseling sessions are~~
14 ~~provided in a developmentally appropriate environment (i.e., age, culture, etc.) and utilize evidence-~~
15 ~~based practices (EBP).~~

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16 19. Individual Counseling means counseling provided to an individual as needed and identified
17 on the treatment plan as appropriate for Clients. Individual Counseling shall be performed at a minimum
18 of one (1) fifty (50) minute session per month. Utilization of EBPs in these sessions is required by the
19 County DMC-ODS standards.

20 20. Intake means the initial meeting between a Client and CONTRACTOR staff in which
21 specific information about the Client is gathered and standard admission forms completed pursuant to
22 this Contract. This includes utilization of an ASAM-based Assessment, or any other tools as designated
23 by COUNTY HCA, to provide a standardized, comprehensive risk and needs assessment to each Client.
24 Assessment tools will be co-occurring capable, and meet best practice standards.

25 21. Integrated Records Information System (IRIS) means a collection of applications and
26 databases that serve the needs of programs within HCA and includes functionality such as registration
27 and scheduling, laboratory information system, billing and reporting capabilities, compliance with
28 regulatory requirements, electronic medical records, and other relevant applications.

29 22. Level of Care Assessment means a comprehensive set of guidelines for placement,
30 continued stay, and transfer/discharge of Clients with addiction and co-occurring conditions developed
31 by HCA based on ASAM criteria. Level of care determination must be documented by a LPHA within
32 their scope of practices.

33 23. Licensed Practitioner of the Healing Art (LPHA) means any Physicians, Nurse
34 Practitioners, Physician Assistants, Registered Nurses, Registered Pharmacists, Licensed Clinical
35 Psychologists, Licensed Clinical Social Worker, Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor, Licensed
36 Marriage and Family Therapists, or license-eligible practitioners working under the supervision of
37 licensed clinicians, working within their scope of practice.

1 24. Linkage means connecting Clients to ancillary services such as outpatient and/or residential
2 treatment and supportive services which may include self-help groups, social services, rehabilitation
3 services, vocational services, job training services, or other appropriate services.

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5 25. Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) means the assessment, prescription, administration,
6 and monitoring of FDA-approved medications for SUD. MAT services are conducted by staff lawfully
7 authorized to provide such services within their scope of practice or licensure.

8 26. Maintenance Therapy means the treatment modality whereby narcotic replacement therapy
9 is used in sustained, stable, medically determined dosage levels for a period in excess of twenty-one (21)
10 calendar days, to reduce or eliminate chronic opioid use disorder, while the patient is provided a
11 comprehensive range of treatment services.

12 27. Medical Director means the physician licensed to practice medicine in California who is
13 responsible for medical services provided by CONTRACTOR. The Medical Director shall be enrolled
14 with DHCS under applicable state regulations. The Medical Director duties encompass signing of
15 documentation, placing Clients in treatment, initiating, altering and terminating therapy medications and
16 dosage amounts, supervising the administration and dispensing of medications, and planning and
17 supervising provision of treatment, including regular review and notes in the Clients' records.

18 28. Medical Necessity means the decision by CONTRACTOR's Medical Director that a Client
19 meets admission criteria and continuing care justification pursuant to CCR, Title 22 and Title 9, Section
20 10270. Medically Necessary services are provided in accordance with an individualized treatment plan
21 determined by a licensed physician or licensed prescriber and approved and authorized according to
22 State requirements.

23 29. Medication Psychotherapy means a type of counseling service consisting of a face-to-face
24 discussion conducted by the Medical Director of the NTP on a one-on-one basis with the Client on
25 issues identified in the treatment plan.

26 30. Medication Services means the physician prescribed medications related to a Client's SUD
27 treatment services covered under the DMC-ODS formulary including methadone, buprenorphine,
28 naloxone, buprenorphine-naloxone, naltrexone, and disulfiram. CONTRACTOR staff will regularly
29 communicate with physicians unless the Client refuses to consent to sign a 42 CFR Part 2 compliant
30 Authorization to Disclose form.

31 31. Notice of Adverse Benefit Determination (NOABD) means a formal communication to the
32 Medi-Cal beneficiary of any action regarding their Drug Medi-Cal services and their right to appeal,
33 consistent with 42 CFR 438.404 and 438.10.

34 32. Perinatal means the condition of being pregnant or up to sixty (60) calendar days
35 postpartum. In addition to the services established for outpatient Clients, the provider must offer
36 Perinatal Clients additional parenting education, referrals, transportation, childcare, and other services,
37 as specified by the DHCS Perinatal Practice Guidelines. If Client no longer meets this Perinatal

1 definition, the Client would be eligible for non-Perinatal services as long as they meet medical necessity
 2 for the designated level of care.

3 33. Physician Extender means a registered nurse practitioner and physicians’ assistants only.

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5 34. Program Protocol means the written program description, goals, objectives, and policies
 6 established by CONTRACTOR for the methadone therapy program provided pursuant to the Contract.

7 35. Screening means the process by which the program obtains information about the individual
 8 seeking admission for methadone therapy services.

9 36. Self Help Meeting means a non-professional, peer participatory meeting formed by people
 10 with a common problem or situation offering mutual support to each other towards a goal of healing or
 11 recovery.

12 37. Substance Use Disorder (SUD) means a condition in which the use of one or more
 13 substances leads to a clinically significant impairment or distress as specified in the most current edition
 14 of the DSM published by the American Psychiatric Association.

15 38. Telehealth means office or outpatient visits between provider and Client via interactive
 16 audio and video telecommunication systems. Telehealth between providers means communication
 17 between two providers for purpose of consultation, performed via interactive audio and video
 18 telecommunication systems.

19 39. Token means the security device which allows an individual user to access the HCA
 20 computer-based IRIS.

21 40. Unit of Service means a calendar month of treatment services at a Narcotic Treatment
 22 Program provided pursuant to Title 22 and Title 9. Dosing and counseling services may be provided on
 23 the same day to a single Client.

24 B. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
 25 Common Terms and Definitions Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Contract.

B. MAT will be reimbursed for onsite administration and dispensing at NTP programs; additionally, physicians and licensed prescribers in DMC programs will be reimbursed for the ordering, prescribing, administering, and monitoring of MAT as per DMC-ODS Waiver STC's. However, the total of monthly payments to CONTRACTOR shall not exceed COUNTY's Amount Not to Exceed set forth in the Referenced Contract Provisions of the Contract; and provided further that CONTRACTOR's invoicing and billing are allowable pursuant to applicable COUNTY, federal and state regulations. ADMINISTRATOR may, at its discretion, pay supplemental invoices for any month for which the negotiated amount for actual units of service provided during Period One and/or Period Two, as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Contract, has not been fully paid. Non-compliance will require the completion of a CAP by CONTRACTOR. If CAPs are not completed within timeframes approved by ADMINISTRATOR, payments may be reduced accordingly.

C. COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR monthly, in arrears, however, the total of such payments during any Period shall not exceed COUNTY's corresponding Period Amount Not to Exceed. CONTRACTOR's invoices shall be on a form approved or provided by ADMINISTRATOR and shall provide such information as is required by ADMINISTRATOR. Invoices are due by the tenth (10th) calendar day of each month, and payments to CONTRACTOR should be released by COUNTY no later than thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of the correctly completed invoice form.

D. Monthly payments are interim payments only, and subject to Final Settlement of this Contract. Invoices received after the due date may not be paid in accordance with Subparagraph II.B of this Exhibit A to this Contract.

E. All invoicing and billing to COUNTY shall be supported at CONTRACTOR's facility, by source documentation, including, but not limited to, Client charts, electronic health records, treatment plans, records of services, etc. that clearly denote the appropriate and allowable provision of specified units of service to eligible Clients to which CONTRACTOR is entitled to compensation as a result of and in the performance of duties for COUNTY.

F. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any payment if CONTRACTOR fails to comply with any provision of this Contract or is not in compliance with federal, state or COUNTY regulations governing the provision of contracted services.

G. COUNTY shall not reimburse CONTRACTOR for services provided beyond the expiration

1 and/or termination of this Contract, except as may otherwise be provided for under this Contract.

2 H. In conjunction with Subparagraph II.A and B. above, CONTRACTOR shall not enter Units of
3 Service into COUNTY IRIS system for services not rendered. If such information has been entered,
4 CONTRACTOR shall make corrections within ten (10) calendar days from notification by
5 ADMINISTRATOR. Additionally, to assist in the protection of data integrity, CONTRACTOR shall
6 create a procedure to ensure separation of duties between the individual performing direct services
7 (LPHA, clinicians, counselors, etc.), and the clerical staff who enter information into the IRIS system.
8 Clerical staff shall enter data into IRIS using the chart information provided by the direct service staff.

9 I. CONTRACTOR shall ensure compliance with all DMC billing and documentation
10 requirements when entering Units of Service into COUNTY IRIS system. ADMINISTRATOR shall
11 withhold payment for non-compliant Units of Service, and may reduce, withhold or delay any payment
12 associated with non-compliant billing practices.

13 J. CONTRACTOR may be required to have an audit conducted in accordance with federal OMB
14 Circular A-133. CONTRACTOR is responsible for complying with any federal audit requirements
15 within the reporting period specified by OMB Circular A-133.

16 K. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
17 Payments Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Contract.

18 III. RECORDS

19 A. CLIENT RECORDS – CONTRACTOR shall maintain adequate records in accordance with the
20 DHCS as they may be amended or superseded at a later time during the course of this Contract, the
21 COUNTY Guidelines, California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 22, Title 9, and
22 ADMINISTRATOR’s requirements on each individual Client in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation
23 of services, which shall include documentation of all activities, services, sessions, and assessment,
24 including but not limited to:

25 1. Documentation that the prescribed treatment for substance use disorders is appropriate for
26 the Client. This shall include the Medical Director or LPHA’s initial medical necessity determination for
27 the DMC-ODS benefit, including evidence of prior treatment history and/or current use of opiates
28 and/or alcohol;

29 2. SUD Diagnosis;

30 3. Date of Birth;

31 4. Intake and admission data, including a physical examination;

32 5. Treatment Plans;

33 6. Reassessments of Client functioning;

34 7. Progress notes, including those for required monthly counseling sessions;

35 8. Medication orders and regular reviews signed by the physician;

36 9. Continuing Service Justifications;

1 10. Laboratory test orders and results, including Tuberculosis clearance and other lab results as
2 required by Title 9 and HCA Contract;

3 11. Evidence of care coordination to support Clients in meeting their essential needs;

4 12. Screening for Human Trafficking – each Client’s chart shall contain the results of screening
5 for victims of human trafficking (TVPA 2000);

6 13. California Outcomes Measurement System (CalOMS);

7 14. Outcome measures and screening tools as determined by ADMINISTRATOR;

8 15. Drug screening results, as well as CONTRACTOR’s response to a test or analysis for illicit
9 drug use which discloses: the absence of methadone and/or other prescribed medications and their
10 primary metabolites, the presence of any illicit drugs, or abuse of other substances, including alcohol;

11 a. Discharge plan;

12 b. Discharge summary;

13 c. Quality Review Check Sheet; and

14 d. Any other Client information which the program finds useful in treating the Client or as
15 ADMINISTRATOR deems necessary;

16 16. CONTRACTOR shall retain all Client medical records for ten (10) years following
17 discharge of the Client, with the exception of non-emancipated minors for whom records must be kept
18 for at least one (1) year after such minors have reached the age of eighteen (18) years, or for ten (10)
19 years after the last date of service, whichever is longer.

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23 B. FINANCIAL RECORDS – CONTRACTOR shall prepare and maintain accurate and complete
24 financial records of its costs and operating expenses. Such records shall reflect the actual costs of the
25 type of service for which payment is claimed in accordance with generally accepted accounting
26 principles.

27 1. Any apportionment of or distribution of costs, including indirect costs, to or between
28 programs or cost centers of CONTRACTOR shall be documented, and shall be made in accordance with
29 generally accepted principles.

30 2. CONTRACTOR shall account for funds provided through this Contract separately from
31 other funds, and maintain a clear audit trail for the expenditure of funds.

32 3. CLIENT FEES – Pursuant to 42 CFR 438.106, CONTRACTOR shall not collect fees from
33 a Medi-Cal beneficiary or persons acting on behalf of the beneficiary for any SUD or related
34 administrative services provided under this Contract, except to collect other health insurance coverage,
35 share of cost, and co-payments. Drug Medi-Cal is payment in full for treatment services rendered for
36 Medi-Cal beneficiaries. The Client eligibility determination and fee charged to and collected from
37 Clients, together with a record of all billings rendered and revenues received from any source, on behalf

1 of Clients treated pursuant to the Contract, must be reflected in CONTRACTOR's financial records.

2 C. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
3 Records Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Contract.

4
5 **IV. REPORTS**

6 **A. MONTHLY PROGRAMMATIC**

7 1. CONTRACTOR shall submit a monthly programmatic report to ADMINISTRATOR,
8 including information required and on a form approved or provided by ADMINISTRATOR. These
9 monthly programmatic reports should be received by ADMINISTRATOR no later than the twentieth
10 (20th) business day of the month following the report month.

11 2. CONTRACTOR shall report any problems in implementing the provisions of the Contract,
12 pertinent facts or interim findings, staff changes, status of license(s) and/or certification(s), changes in
13 population served, and reasons for any changes. Additionally, a statement that CONTRACTOR is or is
14 not progressing satisfactorily in achieving all the terms of the Contract shall be included.

15 3. FOLLOW-UPS – CONTRACTOR shall conduct follow-ups with Clients after discharge at
16 intervals designated by ADMINISTRATOR. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide information/questions
17 to CONTRACTOR for follow up. CONTRACTOR shall track data on Client functioning which at
18 minimum shall include current substance use.

19 B. MONTHLY IRIS – CONTRACTOR shall input all Units of Service provided in COUNTY's
20 IRIS database for the preceding month no later than the tenth (10th) calendar day of the month
21 following the report month. Services entered into IRIS must match the monthly billing documents prior
22 //

23 to funds being released. CONTRACTOR shall utilize monitoring reports available in IRIS to ensure the
24 accuracy of Units of Service and other forms that are entered by CONTRACTOR into IRIS.

25 C. CalOMS – CONTRACTOR shall: (1) enter an error-free CalOMS admission record within
26 twenty-one (21) calendar days of the start of services, (2) enter an error-free CalOMS annual record
27 between one (1) and sixty (60) calendar days prior to the admission anniversary, and (3) enter an error-
28 free CalOMS discharge record within twenty-one (21) calendar days after the last face-to-face service.
29 CONTRACTOR shall utilize the CalOMS Error Detail Report (CEDR) to ensure that any CalOMS
30 entry errors are corrected within two (2) business days of the entry. CONTRACTOR shall utilize other
31 available CalOMS monitoring reports to ensure correct and timely submission and will report findings
32 of these reports at monthly meetings with ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that a
33 minimum of ninety-six percent (96%) of their CalOMS are completed on time monthly. Any individual
34 provider of services must have an NPI number and be listed in IRIS as the provider of the service
35 conducted prior to performing any clinical services.

36 D. MONTHLY DATAR – CONTRACTOR shall provide reports under the DATAR and/or any
37 other State Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs Reporting System no later than the fifth (5th)

1 business day of the month following the report month.

2 E. ACCESS LOG – CONTRACTOR shall track and enter information on requests for services
3 into a designated form provided by ADMINISTRATOR.

4 F. ADDITIONAL REPORTS – CONTRACTOR shall make additional reports, as required by
5 ADMINISTRATOR, concerning CONTRACTOR’s activities as they affect the services hereunder.
6 ADMINISTRATOR will be specific as to the nature of information requested and the timeframe the
7 information is needed.

8 G. CONTRACTOR agrees to enter psychometrics into COUNTY’s EHR system as requested by
9 ADMINISTRATOR. Said psychometrics are for COUNTY’s analytical uses only, and shall not be
10 relied upon by CONTRACTOR to make clinical decisions. CONTRACTOR agrees to hold COUNTY
11 harmless, and indemnify pursuant to Paragraph XIV. of the Contract, from any claims that arise from
12 non-COUNTY use of said psychometrics.

13 H. CONTRACTOR shall submit reports as required by ADMINISTRATOR and/or the State.

14 I. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that data submitted is accurate and complete by verifying the
15 accuracy and timeliness of reported data, screening the data for completeness, logic, and consistency,
16 submitting data in standardized formats as determined appropriate by ADMINISTRATOR.

17 J. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
18 Reports Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Contract.

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23 **V. SERVICES**

24 A. ADMINISTRATOR reserves the right to amend the scope of services as written in this Exhibit
25 A in order to meet State mandated California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM)
26 requirements once published.

27 B. CONTRACTOR shall order, prescribe, administer, and monitor methadone and all other DMC-
28 ODS reimbursable medications for the treatment of substance use disorders. CONTRACTOR shall
29 make available all reimbursable forms of the following medications: methadone, buprenorphine,
30 buprenorphine-naloxone, naloxone, naltrexone, and disulfiram.

31 C. FACILITY – CONTRACTOR shall provide contracted services in accordance with the
32 standards established by COUNTY and State DHCS as they may be amended or superseded at a later
33 time during the course of this Contract within the specifications stated below, unless otherwise
34 authorized by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall provide services within a DMC certified, and
35 state-licensed NRT program, in accordance with the standards established by COUNTY and under Title
36 9, Division 4, Chapter 4 of the CCR by the State of California, DHCS. The environment shall be healthy
37 and safe and the facility shall be clean and in good repair. Services shall be provided at the following

1 location, or at any other Certified DMC facility approved in advance, in writing, by
2 ADMINISTRATOR:

6 1. CONTRACTOR’s facility shall operate 365 days per year with scheduled closures only as
7 permitted by state and federal regulations and guidelines. Hours of operation may be adjusted with prior
8 approval from ADMINISTRATOR.

9 2. CONTRACTOR’s holiday schedule shall be consistent with COUNTY’s holiday schedule,
10 unless otherwise authorized, in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR.

11 CONTRACTOR’s treatment program shall be accessible to people with disabilities in accordance with
12 Title 45, Code of Federal Regulations (herein referred to as CFR), Part 84 and the American with
13 Disabilities Act.

14 3. CONTRACTOR shall provide at a minimum, on site or by referral, prenatal and postpartum
15 medical care, pediatric care, vocational/educational services to pregnant or parenting Clients.

16 4. CONTRACTOR shall be DMC Certified to provide DMC NTP services to DMC
17 beneficiaries prior to initiating this Contract. CONTRACTOR is expected to provide DMC treatment
18 services and bill per NTP billing guidelines. Therefore, CONTRACTOR must be:

- 19 a. DMC certified and with a billing system established before services commence.
- 20 b. Diligent and maintain active DMC certification throughout all Period(s) of this
21 Contract.

- 22 //
- 23 c. In close proximity to public transportation for easy access for Clients and their
24 parents/caregivers or other family/support persons who are participating in the Client’s treatment.

- 25 d. A safe, drug-free, and welcoming environment and staff.
- 26 e. Able to provide private rooms for individual counseling, separate administrative area
27 for operations, billing and file storage.

- 28 f. Located in Orange County.
- 29 g. Certain to include DMC administrative costs of ten percent (10%) of the annual DMC
30 budget allocation for purposes of quality assurance to be provided by COUNTY.

31 D. PERSONS TO BE SERVED – CONTRACTOR shall serve adults eighteen (18) years of age or
32 older. In order to receive services through the DMC-ODS, the Client must be enrolled in Medi-Cal,
33 reside in Orange County, and meet medical necessity criteria, as outlined below. As COUNTY
34 resources allow and as approved by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR may serve Clients that are in
35 the process of applying for Medi-Cal or those Clients that are in the process of having Medi-Cal
36 reinstated as long as Clients reside in Orange County and meet medical necessity criteria, as outlined
37 below.

1 E. MEDI-CAL ELIGIBILITY - MEDICAL NECESSITY

2 1. CONTRACTOR must verify the Medicaid eligibility determination of potential Clients.
 3 The verification shall be reviewed and approved by ADMINISTRATOR prior to payment for services,
 4 unless the individual is eligible to receive services from tribal health programs operating under the
 5 Indian Self Determination and Education Assistance Act (ISDEAA – Pub.L 93-638, as amended). If the
 6 individual is eligible to receive services from tribal health programs operating under the ISDEAA, then
 7 the determination shall be conducted as set forth in the Tribal Delivery System – Attachment BB to the
 8 STCs. CONTRACTOR may accept uninsured persons with proof of Medi-Cal application.

9 2. The initial medical necessity determination for an individual to receive a DMC-ODS
 10 benefit must be performed face-to-face by the Medical Director or appropriate designee within their
 11 scope of practice and as allowed by state and federal regulations.

12 3. All Medi-Cal beneficiaries under the age of twenty-one (21) are eligible to receive
 13 Medicaid services pursuant to the Early Periodic Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT)
 14 mandate. Under the EPSDT mandate, beneficiaries under the age of twenty-one (21) are eligible to
 15 receive all appropriate and medically necessary services needed to correct and ameliorate health
 16 conditions that are coverable under section 1905(a) Medicaid authority, even if they do not meet criteria
 17 for a substance use disorder (SUD) diagnosis. This includes treatment for risky substance use and early
 18 engagement services. Nothing in the DMC-ODS overrides any EPSDT requirements. CONTRACTOR
 19 is responsible for the provision of services pursuant to the EPSDT mandate. Beneficiaries under age
 20 twenty-one (21) are eligible for DMC-ODS services without a diagnosis from the DSM for Substance-
 21 Related and Addictive Disorders.

22 //

23 4. CONTRACTOR shall ensure Clients are reassessed for continued medical necessity and
 24 appropriate level of care placement.

25 F. ADMISSIONS

26 1. CONTRACTOR shall accept any person who is physically and mentally able to comply
 27 with the program's rules and regulations and is Medi-Cal eligible. Persons with co-occurring disorders
 28 and/or chronic conditions who require prescribed medication shall not be precluded from acceptance or
 29 admission solely based on their licit use of prescribed medication(s).

30 2. Beneficiaries may contact CONTRACTOR directly to request services. Beneficiaries may
 31 also be referred to CONTRACTOR by the 24/7 Beneficiary Access Line, network providers, and other
 32 access points determined by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall enter data regarding requests
 33 for service into an access log established by ADMINISTRATOR.

34 3. CONTRACTOR shall have policies and procedures in place to screen for emergency
 35 medical conditions and immediately refer beneficiaries to emergency medical care.

36 4. CONTRACTOR shall have a policy that requires Clients who show signs of any
 37 communicable disease, or through medical disclosure during the intake process admitting to a health-

1 related problem that would put others at risk, to be cleared medically before services are provided by the
2 program.

3 5. CONTRACTOR shall initiate services within reasonable promptness and shall have a
4 documented system for monitoring and evaluating the quality, appropriateness, and accessibility of care,
5 including a system for addressing problems that develop regarding admission wait times.

6 6. ADMISSION POLICY – CONTRACTOR shall establish and make available to the public
7 a written Admission Policy. CONTRACTOR’s Admission Policy shall reflect all applicable federal,
8 state and county regulations.

9 G. INFORMING MATERIALS – CONTRACTOR is responsible to distribute informing materials
10 and provider lists that meet the content requirements of 42 CFR 438.100 to Clients when they first
11 access SUD services through the DMC-ODS and on request. Informing materials will be provided by
12 ADMINISTRATOR.

13 H. INTERIM SERVICES – Any DMC Client participating in NTP treatment not admitted within
14 three (3) calendar days due to lack of capacity shall be provided interim services. Interim services shall
15 consist of: Voluntary testing, referral for medical evaluation, if appropriate; and HIV education, HIV
16 risk assessment and disclosure counseling and voluntary confidential HIV antibody testing. For pregnant
17 women, interim services shall also include counseling on the effects of alcohol and drugs on the
18 developing fetus and referral to prenatal medical care services. Interim services may be provided
19 directly or by referral to ADMINISTRATOR or another appropriate provider and given to prospective
20 Clients within 48 hours. Provision of interim services for DMC covered Client with alcohol and/or other

23 drug problems, who could otherwise be admitted into substance use disorder outpatient treatment, shall
24 be documented in IRIS, and reported monthly by the fifth (5th) business day or as determined by
25 ADMINISTRATOR.

26 I. In the event of non-compliance with timely access to care requirements, ADMINISTRATOR
27 shall provide CONTRACTOR assistance to adhere to the requirements. ADMINISTRATOR shall also
28 issue a written report documenting the non-compliance and require CONTRACTOR to submit a CAP
29 within thirty (30) calendar days of the report. ADMINISTRATOR is responsible for approving the CAP
30 and verifying that corrections have been made to resolve timely access.

31 J. NTP SERVICES shall include: screening, assessment, physical examination, care coordination,
32 individual counseling, group counseling, collateral services, medication services, medical
33 psychotherapy, patient education, SUD crisis intervention services, and discharge services, as required
34 by federal, state, and COUNTY rules and regulations. NTP services are provided when determined to be
35 medically necessary by a physician or Physician Extender. All services and documentation shall meet
36 DMC standards. Components of NTP Services are:

37 1. ASSESSMENT – Within three (3) calendar days of admission, CONTRACTOR shall

1 assess the Client utilizing an ASAM-based Assessment tool approved by ADMINISTRATOR to
 2 provide a standardized, comprehensive risk and needs assessment. Assessment of each Client shall
 3 include, at a minimum, their history and current functioning status in the following categories: substance
 4 use and prior treatment history, medical, family, psychiatric/psychological, social/recreational, financial,
 5 educational, employment, criminal, legal status. Additionally, CONTRACTOR is encouraged to assess
 6 each Client for stress management, literacy, developmental and cognitive levels, emotional skills, self-
 7 help/independent living skills, risk of suicide, current/history of physical and/or sexual abuse, and
 8 perpetration of physical and/or sexual abuse. Individuals assessed to need SUD services outside of NTP
 9 services will be referred to providers within the network who can provide the needed service. If the
 10 assessment indicates there is no medical necessity for any SUD treatment levels, an NOABD will be
 11 provided to the Client after the assessment or mailed to the Client no later than three (3) business days
 12 after the decision to deny SUD services has been made. The content of Client records shall follow Title
 13 9, Section 10165 and all other requirements specified by this Contract.

14 2. PHYSICAL EXAMINATION - Before admitting a Client to treatment, the Medical
 15 Director shall determine Medical Necessity by either conducting a medical evaluation or documenting
 16 the review in agreement with a medical evaluation conducted by the physician's designee.

17 3. COUNSELING - Upon completion of the initial treatment plan, CONTRACTOR shall
 18 arrange for Client to receive a minimum of fifty (50) minutes to a maximum of two hundred (200)
 19 minutes of counseling services per calendar month for Maintenance, except when waived and
 20 documented by CONTRACTOR's Medical Director. Counseling services shall be in accordance with
 21 the following requirements:

22 a. Program staff member conducting the session must be a Counselor or LPHA;

23 b. The session must be conducted in a private setting in accordance with all applicable
 24 federal, state, and COUNTY regulations regarding confidentiality; and

25 c. The format of the counseling session shall be in an Individual session, Group session,
 26 or medical psychotherapy, with all services including a face-to-face discussion with the Client on issues
 27 identified in the Client's treatment plan.

28 4. CARE COORDINATION – Consists of activities to provide coordination of SUD care,
 29 mental health care, and medical care, and to support the Client with Linkages to services and supports
 30 designed to restore the Client to their best possible functional level. Care coordination includes one or
 31 more of the following components:

32 a. Coordinating with medical and mental health care providers to monitor and support
 33 comorbid health conditions.

34 b. Discharge planning, including coordinating with SUD treatment providers to support
 35 transitions between levels of care and to recovery resources, referrals to mental health providers, and
 36 referrals to primary or specialty medical providers.

37 c. Coordinating with ancillary services, including individualized connection, referral, and

1 linkages to community-based services and supports including but not limited to educational, social,
 2 prevocational, vocational, housing, nutritional, criminal justice, transportation, childcare, child
 3 development, family/marriage education, cultural sources, and mutual aid support groups.

4 5. COLLATERAL SERVICES – Sessions with therapists or counselors and significant
 5 persons in the life of the Client, focused on the treatment needs of the Client in terms of supporting the
 6 achievement of their treatment goals. Significant persons are individuals that have a personal, not
 7 official or professional, relationship with the Client.

8 6. NARCOTIC REPLACEMENT THERAPY – Medication prescription, administration, and
 9 monitoring services provided in a stable, medically determined manner to reduce or eliminate chronic
 10 opioid use disorder, while the Client is provided a comprehensive range of treatment services.

11 7. MEDICATION ASSISTED TREATMENT – CONTRACTOR shall either directly offer or
 12 have an effective referral mechanism to MAT for Clients with SUD diagnoses that are treatable with
 13 Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-approved medications or biological products. CONTRACTOR's
 14 referral mechanism shall include a warm handoff by CONTRACTOR to the MAT provider to ensure the
 15 Client has been accepted into the MAT provider's program. The warm handoff must be done in real-
 16 time with the Client. Medically necessary MAT services directly offered by CONTRACTOR must be
 17 provided in accordance with an individualized treatment plan determined by a licensed physician or
 18 LPHA working within their scope of practice.

19 a. CONTRACTOR must ensure ability to continue MAT after discharge through Linkage
 20 to appropriate prescriber. MAT shall include the assessment, treatment planning, ordering, prescribing,
 21 administering, and monitoring of all medications for SUDs.

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23 b. CONTRACTOR must provide administration of buprenorphine, buprenorphine
 24 injectable (Sublocade), buprenorphine-naloxone, naltrexone, naltrexone injectable (Vivitrol)
 25 acamprosate, disulfiram, and naloxone as clinically appropriate for this population and approved by the
 26 FDA. Other approved medications in the treatment of SUDs may also be prescribed and administered,
 27 as medically necessary and clinically appropriate."~~CONTRACTOR must provide administration of~~
 28 ~~buprenorphine, buprenorphine-naloxone, naltrexone, acamprosate, disulfiram, and naloxone as clinically~~
 29 ~~appropriate for this population and approved by the FDA. Other approved medications in the treatment~~
 30 ~~of SUDs may also be prescribed and administered, as medically necessary and clinically appropriate.~~

31 c. CONTRACTOR must provide care coordination with treatment and ancillary service
 32 providers and facilitate transitions between levels of care. Clients may simultaneously participate in
 33 MAT services and other ASAM LOCs.

34 8. MAINTENANCE TREATMENT PLANNING - CONTRACTOR shall, within twenty-
 35 eight (28) calendar days of initiation of Narcotic Replacement Therapy for a Maintenance Client, have a
 36 registered, certified, and/or licensed Counselor/LPHA develop an individualized treatment plan with
 37 each Client per Title 9, Section 10305 which shall be based on the multi-dimensional assessment and

1 health assessment.

2 a. Maintenance treatment plans shall include:

3 i) Goals, based on identified needs, to be achieved by the Client with estimated target

4 dates for attainment in accordance with the following. Short-term goals are estimated to require eighty-

5 nine (89) calendar days or less for Client to achieve. Long-term goals are estimated to require a

6 specified time exceeding ninety (90) calendar days for Client to achieve.

7 ii) Specific behavioral tasks the Client must accomplish to complete each short-term

8 and long-term goal;

9 iii) A description of the type and frequency of counseling services to be provided to

10 the Client;

11 iv) An effective date based on the day the Counselor signed the initial treatment plan;

12 v) The SUD diagnosis shall appear on the treatment plan;

13 b. The Supervising Counselor shall review the initial maintenance services plan, along

14 with the needs assessment, and all updated maintenance services plans within fourteen (14) calendar

15 days from the effective dates and shall countersign these documents to signify concurrence with the

16 findings; and

17 c. Medical Director or Designee will review the needs assessment, and sign the initial and

18 all updated treatment plans within fourteen (14) calendar days of Counselor's signature.

19 d. CONTRACTOR's registered, certified, and/or licensed Counselor/LPHA shall evaluate

20 and update the Client's treatment plan whenever necessary, or at a minimum once every three (3)

21 months from the date of admission. The updated treatment plan shall include:

22 i) A summary of the Client's progress or lack of progress toward each goal identified

23 in the initial treatment plan;

24 ii) New goals and behavioral tasks for any newly identified needs, and related changes

25 in the type and frequency of counseling services.

26 //

27 9. DETOXIFICATION TREATMENT PLANNING – CONTRACTOR shall develop an

28 individualized treatment plan for each detoxification Client which shall include:

29 a. Provisions to assist the Client to understand illicit drug addictions and how to deal with

30 them.

31 b. Provisions for furnishing services to the Client as needed when the period of

32 detoxification treatment is completed.

33 c. The treatment services required and a description of the role they play in achieving the

34 stated goals.

35 d. The type and frequency of scheduled counseling services.

36 10. SUBSTANCE USE SCREENING

37 a. CONTRACTOR shall have a written policy and procedure statement regarding alcohol

1 and drug screening that includes unannounced drug and/or alcohol testing upon admission to the
 2 program and at a minimum of once a month and more often in situations where there is suspicion of use.
 3 The urine specimen collection shall be observed by sex-congruent staff. This policy shall be approved
 4 by ADMINISTRATOR. A Client shall not be denied admittance to treatment for a positive alcohol
 5 and/or drug screen at admission if they meet all other criteria for admission. For those situations where
 6 drug screening is deemed appropriate and necessary, CONTRACTOR shall:

7 i. Establish procedures that protect against the falsification and/or contamination of
 8 any body specimen sample collected for drug screening;

9 ii. Document results of the drug screening in the Client's record; and

10 iii. Maintain a copy of on-site testing results in the Client's record indicating the
 11 outcome and include the signature and date of the Client and staff conducting the testing.

12 b. Drug and/or alcohol test results can be used to assist in diagnosis, confirm clinical
 13 impressions, help modify the treatment plan, and determine the extent of the Client's reduction in
 14 substance use. However, clinical decisions should not be based solely on these results.

15 c. If any Maintenance Client's drug screen results indicate a negative pattern of testing
 16 positive for non-opioid illegal substances, or methadone diversion, CONTRACTOR shall thoroughly
 17 document the corrective action taken to refocus the Client. All counseling session discussions and
 18 referrals/Linkages shall be documented.

19 d. In the event CONTRACTOR wishes to utilize the COUNTY-contracted laboratory for
 20 drug screening purposes, CONTRACTOR shall collect and label samples from Clients.

21 e. Drug and/or Alcohol testing is not a DMC reimbursable service and is not to be
 22 conducted during an Individual or Group session.

23 11. SUD CRISIS INTERVENTION SERVICES – CONTRACTOR shall provide sessions
 24 between a therapist or counselor and a Client in crisis. Crisis means an actual relapse or an unforeseen
 25 event or circumstance, which presents an imminent threat of relapse. Crisis intervention services shall
 26 focus on alleviating the crisis problem and be limited to the stabilization of the Client's immediate
 27 situation. These types of services are not scheduled and do not appear on the treatment plan and may be
 28 provided on the same day as a scheduled group or individual service as initiated by the Client.

29 12. DISCHARGE SERVICES - The process to prepare the Client for referral into another level
 30 of care, post treatment return or reentry into the community, and/or the Linkage of the Client to essential
 31 community treatment, housing and human services. CONTRACTOR shall begin discharge planning
 32 immediately upon enrollment. CONTRACTOR shall develop written procedures regarding Client
 33 discharge.

34 a. Discharge Plan – CONTRACTOR shall develop a formal discharge plan within thirty
 35 (30) calendar days prior to Client's planned discharge from the program. A discharge plan is to be
 36 completed for each Client, except a Client with whom the provider loses contact. The discharge plan
 37 shall be completed and signed by CONTRACTOR staff and the Client. A copy of the discharge plan

1 shall be provided to the Client and retained in the Client's record. The discharge plan shall include, but
2 not be limited to, all of the following:

3 i) A description of each of the Client's relapse triggers;
4 ii) A plan to assist the Client to avoid relapse when confronted with each trigger;
5 iii) A support plan, including linkage and referral of the Client to appropriate services,
6 such as outpatient treatment, other support services such as self-help groups, social services, vocational
7 rehabilitation, job training and other services, as needed.

8 b. Discharge Summary – The discharge summary is to be completed by the LPHA or
9 counselor within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of the last face-to-face treatment contact with the
10 Client. The discharge summary shall include all of the following:

11 i) The duration of the Client's treatment as determined by the dates of admission to
12 and discharge from treatment;
13 ii) The reason for discharge;
14 iii) A narrative of the treatment episode, including services provided and the Client's
15 progress during treatment; and
16 iv) The Client's prognosis

17 13. EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICES - CONTRACTOR will implement at least two of the
18 following EBPs. The required EBPs include:

19 a. Motivational Interviewing: A Client-centered, empathetic, but directive counseling
20 strategy designed to explore and reduce a person's ambivalence toward treatment. This approach
21 frequently includes other problem-solving or solution-focused strategies that build on Clients' past
22 successes.

23 b. Cognitive-Behavioral Therapy: Based on the theory that most emotional and behavioral
24 reactions are learned and that new ways of reacting and behaving can be learned.

25 c. Relapse Prevention: A behavioral self-control program that teaches individuals with
26 substance addiction how to anticipate and cope with the potential for relapse. Relapse prevention can be
27 used as a stand-alone substance use treatment program or as an aftercare program to sustain gains
28 achieved during initial substance use treatment.

29 d. Trauma-Informed Treatment: Services must take into account an understanding of
30 trauma, and place priority on trauma survivors' safety, choice and control.

31 e. Psycho-Education: Psycho-educational groups are designed to educate Clients about
32 substance abuse, and related behaviors and consequences. Psycho-educational groups provide
33 information designed to have a direct application to Clients' lives; to instill self-awareness, suggest
34 options for growth and change, identify community resources that can assist Clients in recovery,
35 develop an understanding of the process of recovery, and prompt people using substances to take action
36 on their own behalf.

37 14. CLINICAL DOCUMENTATION shall occur for each session attended by the Client and

1 include treatment plan progress on each note for at least one problem area. Staff documenting for any
 2 Client's group or individual service shall understand progress notes are individualized narrative
 3 summaries and shall include the following:

4 a. The type and topic of the session and how the topic relates to substance use disorders in
 5 the content of the progress note;

6 b. A narrative describing the service, including how the service addressed the Client's
 7 behavioral health need (e.g., symptom, condition, diagnosis, and/or risk factors);

8 c. Information on attendance, including the date, start and end times of each group or
 9 individual and duration of the service, including travel and documentation time;

10 d. Location of the Client at the time of receiving the service;

11 e. Type or legibly print the name, date and signature of the counselor or therapist who
 12 conducted the session and document services within three (3) business days of providing a service
 13 except for crisis services notes which shall be completed within twenty-four (24) hours;

14 f. ICD 10 code;

15 g. Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) or Healthcare Common Procedure Coding
 16 System (HCPCS) code and the number of Clients in attendance;

17 h. Next steps including, but not limited to, planned action steps by the provider or by the
 18 Client, collaboration with the Client, collaboration with other provider(s) and any update to the
 19 treatment plan, as appropriate.

20 15. HEALTH, MEDICAL, PSYCHIATRIC, AND EMERGENCY SERVICES

21 a. CONTRACTOR shall provide directly or by referral: HIV education, voluntary,
 22 confidential HIV antibody testing and risk assessment and disclosure counseling.

23 b. CONTRACTOR shall have and post written procedures for obtaining medical or
 24 psychiatric evaluation and emergency services.

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27 c. CONTRACTOR shall have readily available the name, address, and telephone number
 28 for the fire department, a crisis center, local law enforcement, and a paramedical unit or ambulance
 29 service.

30 d. CONTRACTOR shall obtain the medical records and record the Client's medical
 31 information in their file including all applicable authorizations to disclose information, primary care
 32 physician (PCP) name and location, medical history, medications, and significant conditions.
 33 CONTRACTOR shall notify the medical home provider immediately upon intake and shall request
 34 medical records within one (1) week. After review of medical records received, the Medical Director of
 35 CONTRACTOR shall consult with the PCP at the medical home to ensure proper coordination of care
 36 within thirty (30) calendar days. If medication is prescribed, SUD clinical staff will notify the medical
 37 home provider within one (1) week of prescribing. If no medical home is identified, CONTRACTOR

1 will discuss the benefits of coordinated/integrated care and identifying a medical home shall be a goal
 2 on the treatment plan. All progress towards and attempts to link the Client to a medical home will be
 3 documented in the file.

4 16. Physician/Clinician Consultation Services – Clinician Consultation consists of DMC-ODS
 5 LPHAs consulting with LPHAs, such as addiction medicine physicians, addiction psychiatrists, licensed
 6 clinicians, or clinical pharmacists, to support the provision of care. CONTRACTOR will have access to
 7 Clinician Consultation Services defined as DMC clinicians consulting with addiction medicine
 8 physicians, addiction psychiatrists, clinicians or clinical pharmacists. Clinician consultation services are
 9 designed to support DMC-ODS licensed clinicians with complex cases and may address medication
 10 selection, dosing, side effect management, adherence, drug-drug interactions, or level of care
 11 considerations. It includes consultations between clinicians designed to assist DMC clinicians with
 12 seeking expert advice on treatment needs for specific DMC-ODS beneficiaries. This service is distinct
 13 from internal care coordination or supervision.

14 K. ORIENTATION – CONTRACTOR shall advise Client of the nature and purpose of treatment
 15 and shall document the Client's acknowledgement of orientation in the Client's file. The program
 16 orientation shall be documented in the Client's file, and shall include, but not be limited to:

- 17 1. The addicting nature of medications used in replacement narcotic therapy;
- 18 2. The hazards and risks involved in replacement narcotic therapy;
- 19 3. The Client's responsibility to the program;
- 20 4. The program's responsibility to the Client;
- 21 5. The Client's participation in the program is wholly voluntary and the Client may terminate
 22 his/her participation in the program at any time without penalty;
- 23 6. The Client will be tested for evidence of use of opiates and other illicit drugs;
- 24 7. The Client's medically determined dosage level may be adjusted without the Client's
 25 knowledge, and at some later point the Client's dose may contain no medications used in replacement
 26 narcotic therapy;
- 27 8. Take-home medication which may be dispensed to the Client is only for the Client's
 28 personal use;
- 29 9. Misuse of medications will result in specified penalties within the program and may also
 30 result in criminal prosecution;
- 31 10. The Client has a right to a humane procedure of withdrawal from medications used in
 32 replacement narcotic therapy and a procedure for gradual withdrawal is available;
- 33 11. Possible adverse effects of abrupt withdrawal from medications used in replacement
 34 narcotic therapy;
- 35 12. Protection under the confidentiality requirements.

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37 L. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PREGNANT CLIENTS - Within fourteen (14)

1 calendar days from the date the primary counselor becomes aware the Client may be pregnant, as
 2 documented in the Client's file, the medical director shall review, sign, and date a confirmation of
 3 pregnancy, document acceptance of medical responsibility of the Client's prenatal care, or verify and
 4 document the Client is under the care of a physician licensed by the State of California and trained in
 5 obstetrics and/or gynecology.

6 1. Within fourteen (14) calendar days from the date the medical director confirmed the
 7 pregnancy, the primary counselor shall update the Client's treatment plan in accordance with Title 9,
 8 Section 10305. The nature of prenatal support reflected in subsequent updated treatment plans shall
 9 include at least the following services:

10 a. periodic face-to-face consultation at least monthly with the medical director or
 11 Physician Extender designated by the medical director;

12 b. drug/alcohol screens at least once each calendar week in accordance with collection
 13 procedures in Title 9, Section 10310.

14 c. prenatal instruction conducted by the medical director or licensed health personnel
 15 designated by the medical director, including topics as listed in Title 9, Section 10360.

16 2. Any refusals to access on-site prenatal care or referrals for such, shall be documented in the
 17 Client's file and have the Client acknowledge in writing said refusals for these treatment services.

18 3. Within fourteen (14) calendar days after the date of birth and/or termination of the
 19 pregnancy, the medical director shall document in the Client's file the following:

20 a. the hospital's or attending physician's summary of the delivery and treatment outcome
 21 for the Client and child; or

22 b. Evidence that a request for information was made, but no response was received.

23 4. Within fourteen (14) calendar days of the date of birth and/or termination of the pregnancy,
 24 the primary counselor shall update the Client's treatment plan. The nature of pediatric care and child
 25 immunization shall be reflected in subsequent updated treatment plans until the child is at least three (3)
 26 years of age, should the Client remain enrolled.

27 M. CONTINUATION OF TREATMENT – CONTRACTOR shall provide updated justification for
 28 treatment for Clients who have been on methadone maintenance for a period of one (1) year, and
 29 provide this justification annually thereafter as per Title 9, Section 10410. Justification shall be provided
 30 by the Medical Director or program physician and noted in Client's file. Without said justification the
 31 medical director or program physician shall discontinue Client's maintenance services.

32 N. PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES AND OUTCOMES – CONTRACTOR shall meet the
 33 following performance Objectives and Outcomes:

34 1. Achieve a goal of twenty percent (20%) or fewer of all unduplicated Clients who test
 35 positive for illicit drugs after an enrollment of ninety (90) calendar days.

36 //

37 2. Achieve a goal of retaining at least seventy percent (70%) of Clients who are enrolled each

1 month. Retention rates will be based on the number of Clients who either remain in treatment or
2 successfully complete treatment within the month.

3 3. Achieve a goal of at least seventy percent (70%) of unduplicated Clients who after an
4 enrollment of ninety (90) calendar days self-report being able to lead a productive lifestyle. A
5 productive lifestyle includes employment, being enrolled in school, becoming a caretaker, or community
6 volunteer.

7 4. Adhere to the National Standards for Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services in
8 Health and Health Care and respond to each standard as directed by HCA.

9 O. MEETINGS – CONTRACTOR’s Executive Director and Chief Financial Officer or designees
10 shall participate in monthly meetings facilitated by ADMINISTRATOR related to the provision of
11 services pursuant to this Contract. Active participation in regular SUD Quality Improvement (QI)
12 Coordinator’s meetings organized by the Authority and Quality Improvement Services (AQIS) Quality
13 Management program is required for at least one dedicated program QI coordinator/professional.

14 P. CULTURAL COMPETENCY – CONTRACTOR shall provide culturally competent services.
15 CONTRACTOR shall make its best effort to provide services pursuant to this Contract in a manner that
16 is culturally and linguistically appropriate for the population(s) served. CONTRACTOR must ensure
17 that their policies, procedures, and practices are consistent with the principles outlined and are
18 embedded in the organizational structure, as well as being upheld in day-to-day operations.
19 CONTRACTOR shall maintain documentation of such efforts which may include, but not be limited to:
20 records of participation in COUNTY-sponsored or other applicable training; recruitment and hiring
21 policies and procedures; copies of literature in multiple languages and formats, as appropriate; and
22 descriptions of measures taken to enhance accessibility for, and sensitivity to, individuals who are
23 physically challenged. CONTRACTOR shall refer to Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services
24 (CLAS) adapted by DHCS to develop culturally informed services.

25 Q. CONTRACTOR shall include bilingual/bicultural services to meet the needs of threshold
26 languages as determined by COUNTY. Language translation services must be available for Clients and
27 their involved family members, as needed. Whenever possible, bilingual/bicultural staff should be
28 retained. Any clinical vacancies occurring at a time when bilingual and bicultural composition of the
29 clinical staffing does not meet the above requirement must be filled with bilingual and bicultural staff
30 unless ADMINISTRATOR consents, in advance and in writing, to the filling of those positions with
31 non-bilingual staff. Salary savings resulting from such vacant positions may not be used to cover costs
32 other than salaries and employees benefits unless otherwise authorized, in advance and in writing, by
33 ADMINISTRATOR.

34 R. POSTINGS – CONTRACTOR shall post the following in a prominent place within each
35 contracted facility:

- 36 1. State Licensure and Certification
- 37 2. Business License

- 1 3. Conditional Use Permit (if applicable)
- 2 4. Fire clearance
- 3 5. Client rights
- 4 6. Grievance procedures and form
- 5 7. Availability of translation services at no cost
- 6 8. Employee Code of Conduct
- 7 9. Evacuation floor plan
- 8 10. Equal Employment Opportunity notices
- 9 11. Name, address, telephone number for fire department, crisis program, local law
10 enforcement, and ambulance service.
- 11 12. List of resources within Orange County which shall include medical, dental, mental health,
12 public health, social services and where to apply for determination of eligibility for Federal, State, or
13 County entitlement programs.
- 14 13. Information on self-help meetings. AA, NA, and non-12 step meetings shall be included.
- 15 S. Program shall utilize protocols developed and supported by the Medical Director. These
16 protocols shall provide procedures should a Client's condition deteriorate and appear to need medical
17 intervention.
- 18 T. NO PROSELYTIZING POLICY – CONTRACTOR shall not conduct any proselytizing
19 activities, regardless of funding sources, with respect to any person who has been referred to
20 CONTRACTOR by COUNTY under the terms of this Contract. Further, CONTRACTOR agrees that
21 the funds provided hereunder shall not be used to promote, directly or indirectly, any religion, religious
22 creed or cult, denomination or sectarian institution, or religious belief.
- 23 U. AUTHORITY – CONTRACTOR shall recognize the authority of Orange County Probation
24 Department (OCPD) as officers of the court and shall extend cooperation to OCPD within the
25 constraints of CONTRACTOR's program.
- 26 V. NON-SMOKING POLICY – CONTRACTOR shall establish a written non-smoking policy,
27 which shall be reviewed and approved by ADMINISTRATOR. At a minimum, the non-smoking policy
28 shall specify the facilities are "smoke free" and Clients are prohibited from smoking at all times. The
29 policy shall also specify that vaping is prohibited at all times.
- 30 W. OPIOID OVERDOSE EMERGENCY TREATMENT – CONTRACTOR shall have available
31 at minimum two (2) unexpired Naloxone doses for the treatment of known or suspected opioid
32 overdose. At least one (1) staff per shift shall be trained in administering the Naloxone. Naloxone is not
33 a substitute for emergency medical care. CONTRACTOR shall always seek emergency medical
34 assistance in the event of a suspected, potentially life-threatening opioid emergency.
- 35 X. TOKENS – ADMINISTRATOR will provide CONTRACTOR the necessary number of Tokens
36 for appropriate individual staff to access IRIS at no cost to CONTRACTOR.
- 37 1. CONTRACTOR recognizes Tokens are assigned to a specific individual staff member with

- 1 a unique password. Tokens and passwords shall not be shared with anyone.
- 2 2. CONTRACTOR shall maintain an inventory of the Tokens, by serial number, and the staff
3 member to whom each is assigned.
- 4 3. CONTRACTOR shall indicate in the monthly staffing report, the serial number of the
5 Token for each staff member assigned a Token.
- 6 4. CONTRACTOR shall return to ADMINISTRATOR all Tokens under the following
7 conditions:
- 8 a. Token of each staff member who no longer supports this Contract.
9 b. Token of each staff member who no longer requires access to IRIS.
10 c. Token of each staff member who leaves employment of CONTRACTOR.
11 d. Tokens malfunctioning.
12 e. Termination of this Contract.
- 13 5. ADMINISTRATOR will issue tokens for CONTRACTOR's staff members who require
14 access to IRIS upon initial training or as a replacement for malfunctioning Tokens.
- 15 6. CONTRACTOR shall reimburse COUNTY for tokens lost, stolen, or damaged through acts
16 of negligence.
- 17 7. CONTRACTOR shall input all IRIS data following COUNTY procedure and practice. All
18 statistical data used to monitor CONTRACTOR shall be compiled using only COUNTY IRIS reports, if
19 available, and if applicable.
- 20 Y. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all staff are trained and have a clear understanding of
21 CONTRACTOR's administrative and program P&Ps. CONTRACTOR shall provide signature
22 confirmation of its P&P training for each staff member and place in their personnel files.
- 23 Z. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all staff responsible for input into IRIS are to complete IRIS
24 New User Training.
- 25 AA. CONTRACTOR shall conduct Supervisory Review of Client records at minimum upon
26 admission, at thirty (30) calendar day intervals, and upon discharge in accordance with procedures
27 developed by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all chart documentation complies
28 with all federal, state, and local guidelines and standards.
- 29 AB. CONTRACTOR shall provide effective administrative management of the budget, staffing,
30 recording, and reporting portion of this Contract with COUNTY. If administrative responsibilities are
31 delegated to subcontractors, CONTRACTOR must ensure that any subcontractor(s) possess the
32 qualifications and capacity to perform all delegated responsibilities. These responsibilities include, but
33 are not limited, to the following:
- 34 1. Designate the responsible position(s) in your organization for managing the funds allocated
35 to the program;
- 36 2. Maximize the use of the allocated funds;
- 37 3. Ensure timely and accurate reporting of monthly expenditures;

- 1 4. Maintain appropriate staffing levels;
 2 5. Request budget and/or staffing modifications to this Contract;
 3 6. Effectively communicate and monitor the program for its success;
 4 7. Track and report expenditures electronically;
 5 8. Maintain electronic and telephone communication between CONTRACTOR and
 6 ADMINISTRATOR; and,
 7 9. Act quickly to identify and solve problems.

8 AC.CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, within twenty-four (24) hours of
 9 becoming aware of any occurrence of a serious nature, which may expose COUNTY to liability. Such
 10 occurrences shall include, but not be limited to, accidents, injuries, or acts of negligence, or loss or
 11 damage to any COUNTY property in possession of CONTRACTOR.

12 AD. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, within seventy-two (72)
 13 hours, of any significant program changes.

14 AE.CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
 15 Services Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Contract.

16
 17 **VI. STAFFING**

18 A. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all clinical staffing, including those providing direct Client
 19 services, meet the requirements of Title 22, Title 9 of the CCR, and CALAIM DMC-ODS Program
 20 updates as they exist now or may hereafter be amended or changed and all standards of the Department
 21 of Health Care Services.

22 B. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that administrative staffing is sufficient to support the
 23 performance of services pursuant to the Contract.

24 C. Professional staff shall be licensed, registered, certified, or recognized under California scope of
 25 practice statutes. Professional staff shall provide services within their individual scope of practice and
 26 receive supervision required under their scope of practice laws.

27 D. Professional staff shall undergo the HCA credentialing process by the AQIS Managed Care
 28 Support Team (MCST) prior to rendering any Medi-Cal covered services.

29 1. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of the State's established, uniform
 30 credentialing and re-credentialing policy that addresses behavioral and substance use disorders, outlined
 31 in DHCS Information Notice 18-019.

32 2. CONTRACTOR shall follow COUNTY's process for credentialing and re-credentialing of
 33 network providers and shall ensure that all registered, licensed, or certified staff who deliver Medi-Cal
 34 covered services are properly credentialled by COUNTY before delivering any Medi-Cal covered
 35 services.

36 //

37 E. Non-professional staff shall receive appropriate onsite orientation and training prior to

1 performing assigned duties. Non-professional staff shall be supervised by professional and/or
2 administrative staff.

3 F. Professional and Non-professional staff are required to have appropriate experience and any
4 necessary training at the time of hiring.

5 G. Registered and certified SUD counselors shall adhere to all requirements in the CCR, Title 9,
6 Division 4, Chapter 8.

7 H. Substance Use Disorder Staffing levels and qualifications shall meet the requirements of the
8 State Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) Counselor Certification Standards for California for
9 Outpatient Services and CCR, Title 9, Chapter 8. All staff providing treatment services shall be licensed
10 and/or certified in accordance with state requirements, and professional guidelines, as applicable. At
11 least thirty percent (30%) of staff providing counseling (group, individual, case management, and
12 intake) services in all AOD programs shall be licensed or certified pursuant to the requirements of Title
13 9, Division 4, Chapter 8. All other counseling staff shall be registered pursuant to Section 13035(f).

14 I. CONTRACTOR must have a Medical Director who, prior to the delivery of services under this
15 Contract has enrolled with DHCS under applicable state regulations, has been screened in accordance
16 with 42 CFR 455.450(a) as a "limited" categorical risk within a year prior to serving as a Medical
17 Director under this Contract.

18 1. The Medical Director's responsibilities shall, at a minimum, include all of the following:

19 a. Ensure that medical care provided by physicians, registered nurse practitioners, and
20 physician assistants meets the applicable standard of care;

21 b. Ensure that physicians do not delegate their duties to non-physician personnel;

22 c. Develop and implement medical policies and standards for the provider;

23 d. Ensure that physicians, registered nurse practitioners, and physician assistants follow
24 the provider's medical policies and standards;

25 e. Ensure that the medical decisions made by physicians are not influenced by fiscal
26 considerations;

27 f. Ensure that provider's physicians and LPHAs are adequately trained to perform
28 diagnosis of substance use disorders for Clients and determine the medical necessity of treatment for
29 Clients;

30 g. Ensure that provider's physicians are adequately trained to perform other physician
31 duties, as outlined in this section.

32 2. The substance use disorder Medical Director may delegate his/her responsibilities to a
33 physician or Physician Extender consistent with the provider's medical policies and standards and state,
34 federal, and COUNTY rulings. The substance use disorder Medical Director shall remain responsible
35 for ensuring all delegated duties are properly performed.

36 //

37 3. Written roles and responsibilities and a code of conduct for the Medical Director shall be

1 clearly documented, signed and dated by a provider representative and the physician.

2 J. CONTRACTOR must maintain at least one designated Quality Assurance coordinator to track
3 data outcomes and report on ability to meet performance objectives and ensure file compliance with this
4 Contract and the DMC-ODS Implementation Plan.

5 K. CONTRACTOR's certification to participate in the DMC program shall automatically
6 terminate in the event CONTRACTOR or its owners, officers or directors are convicted of Medi-Cal
7 fraud, abuse or malfeasance. For purposes of this section, a conviction shall include a plea of guilty or
8 nolo contendere.

9 L. VOLUNTEERS/INTERNS – CONTRACTOR may augment the above paid staff with
10 volunteers or part-time student interns. Unless waived by ADMINISTRATOR, prior to providing
11 services pursuant to this Contract, interns shall be Master's Candidates in Counseling or Social Work or
12 have a Bachelor's Degree in a related field or be participating in any state recognized counselor
13 certification program. Additionally, volunteers or student interns must be AOD registered or certified.
14 CONTRACTOR shall provide supervision of work by interns consistent with school or licensing Board
15 requirements. CONTRACTOR shall provide supervision to volunteers as specified in the respective job
16 descriptions or work contracts. Volunteer or student intern services may not comprise more than twenty
17 percent (20%) of the services provided, unless approved in advance by ADMINISTRATOR. If utilizing
18 the services of volunteers or student interns, CONTRACTOR shall implement procedures which address
19 the following: recruitment; screening; selection; training and orientation; duties and assignments; scope
20 of practice; supervision; evaluation; and Client confidentiality.

21 M. CONTRACTOR shall develop a policy governing supervision of staff that will be approved by
22 ADMINISTRATOR. That policy will address the training needs and requirements of all staff.

23 N. CONTRACTOR shall provide ongoing supervision throughout all shifts to all staff, albeit paid
24 or unpaid, direct line staff or supervisors/directors, to enhance service quality and program
25 effectiveness. Supervision methods should include debriefings and consultation as needed, individual
26 supervision or one-on-one support, and team meetings. Supervision should be provided by a supervisor
27 who has extensive knowledge regarding substance use disorders.

28 O. STAFF CONDUCT – CONTRACTOR shall establish a written policies and procedures for
29 employees, volunteers, interns, and members of the Board of Directors which shall include, but not be
30 limited to, standards related to the use of drugs and/or alcohol; staff-Client relationships; prohibition of
31 sexual conduct with Clients; prohibition of forging or falsifying documents or drug tests; and real or
32 perceived conflict of interest. Situations that may be perceived as a conflict of interest shall be brought
33 to ADMINISTRATOR's attention prior to the occurrence. Prior to providing any services pursuant to
34 the Contract all employees, volunteers, and interns shall agree in writing to maintain the standards set
35 forth in the said policies and procedures. A copy of said policies and procedures shall be provided to
36 each Client upon admission and shall be posted in writing in a prominent place in the treatment facility.

37 P. STAFF/VOLUNTEER/INTERN SCREENING - CONTRACTOR shall provide pre-

1 employment “live scan” screening of any staff person providing any service pursuant to the Contract.
 2 All new staff, volunteers, and interns shall pass a one-time “live scan” fingerprinting background check
 3 prior to employment. ADMINISTRATOR may change this approval mechanism at their discretion.

4 1. All staff, prior to hiring, shall meet the following requirements:

5 a. No person shall have been convicted of a sex offense for which the person is required
 6 to register as a sex offender under California Penal Code section 290;

7 b. No person shall have been convicted of an arson offense – Violation of Penal Code
 8 sections 451, 451.1, 451.5, 452, 452.1, 453, 454, or 455;

9 c. No person shall have been convicted of any violent felony as defined in Penal Code
 10 section 667.5, which involve doing bodily harm to another person, for which the staff member was
 11 convicted within five years prior to employment;

12 d. No person shall be on parole or probation;

13 e. No person shall have prior employment history of improper conduct, including but not
 14 limited to, forging or falsifying documents or drug tests, sexual assault or sexual harassment, or
 15 inappropriate behavior with staff at another treatment facility.

16 f. No person shall participate in the criminal activities of a criminal street gang and/or
 17 prison gang.

18 Q. STAFF TRAINING - CONTRACTOR shall develop a written plan for staff training. All Staff
 19 training shall be documented and maintained as part of the training plan and shall adhere to
 20 requirements set forth by HCA Authority and Quality Improvement Services Policies and Procedures.

21 1. All personnel shall be trained or shall have experience which provides knowledge of the
 22 skills required in the following areas, as appropriate to the job assigned, and as evidenced by safe and
 23 effective job performance:

24 a. General knowledge of alcohol and/or drug abuse and alcoholism and the principles of
 25 recovery;

26 b. Analysis of illicit drug use, the meaning of the analysis results, and procedures to be
 27 followed by CONTRACTOR to alleviate continued use;

28 c. Housekeeping and sanitation principles;

29 d. Principles of communicable disease prevention and control;

30 e. Recognition of early signs of illness and the need for professional assistance;

31 f. Availability of community services and resources;

32 g. Recognition of individuals under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.

33 2. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that within thirty (30) calendar days of hire and on an annual
 34 basis, all program staff including administrator, volunteers, and interns shall complete:

35 a. Annual County Compliance Training;

36 b. A minimum of one (1) hour of training in cultural competence.

37 3. In addition to the above, CONTRACTOR shall ensure that staff complete training as

1 follows:

2 a. Professional staff (Licensed Professionals of the Healing Arts), including Medical
3 Directors, shall receive a minimum of five (5) hours of continuing education related to substance use
4 disorders annually.

5 b. All providers, including volunteers and interns, providing DMC-ODS services are
6 required to be trained and complete at least once prior to providing services, the following two (2)
7 training modules:

8 i. American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Multidimensional Assessment
9 (sometimes referred to as ASAM-A or ASAM I).

10 ii. Assessment to Service Planning and Level of Care (sometimes referred to as ASAM-
11 B or ASAM II).

12 iii. This requirement applies to all physicians and Medical Directors regardless of their
13 role in the program and may only be waived for physicians/Medical Directors who are Board Certified
14 with an Addiction sub-specialty.

15 c. All providers, including Medical Director, and administrators must receive training on
16 DMC-ODS requirements at least annually. These requirements will be contained in the COUNTY-
17 developed Annual Provider Training. All providers and administrators must receive training on DMC-
18 ODS requirements at least annually. These requirements will be contained in the COUNTY developed
19 Annual Provider Training.

20 d. All clinical staff, on-site Quality Management staff, and all supervisors must complete
21 DMC-ODS/SUD documentation training within ninety (90) calendar days of hire; however, compliant
22 documentation is required from the onset of services;

23 e. All staff providing clinical services must complete annual training in the two minimum
24 EBPs utilized at the program. Motivational Interviewing must be taken at least once and will count as
25 one EBP for the year. CONTRACTOR may choose other EBP courses after;

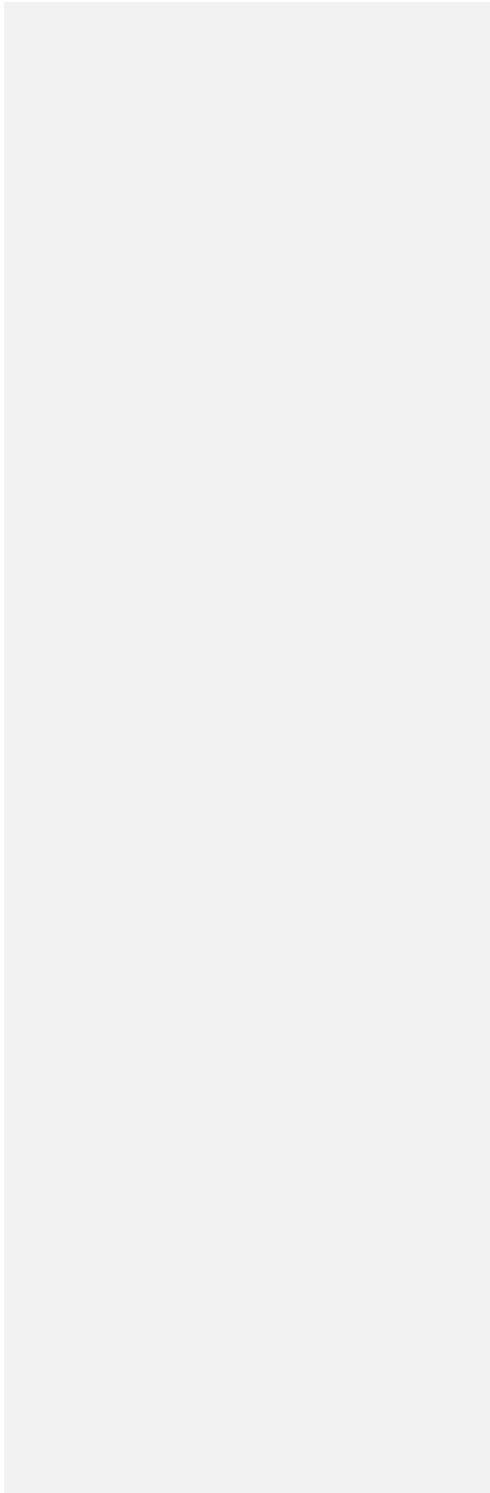
26 f. All staff providing on-site services must complete training on Naloxone
27 Administration;

28 g. Additional trainings as required by ADMINISTRATOR.

29 R. PERSONNEL FILES – CONTRACTOR shall maintain personnel files and ensure continued
30 compliance with required credentials and trainings for each staff person, including management and
31 other administrative positions, subcontractors, and volunteers/interns, both direct and indirect to this
32 Contract, which shall include, but not be limited to:

- 33 1. Application for employment and/or resume;
- 34 2. Signed employment confirmation statement/duty statement;
- 35 3. Job description;
- 36 4. Salary schedule and salary adjustment information;
- 37 5. Performance evaluations;

- 1 6. Health records/status as required by the provider, AOD Certification or Title 9;
- 2 7. Other personnel actions (e.g., commendations, discipline, status change, employment
- 3 incidents and/or injuries);
- 4 8. Training documentation relevant to substance use disorders and treatment;
- 5 9. Current registration, certification, intern status, or licensure;
- 6 10. Proof of continuing education required by licensing or certifying agency and program;
- 7 11. CONTRACTOR's Code of Conduct; and
- 8 12. For registered, certified, and licensed staff, a copy of the certifying/licensing body's code of
- 9 conduct;
- 10 13. All personnel files shall be complete and made readily accessible to ADMINISTRATOR
- 11 for purposes of audits and investigations or any other reason deemed necessary by ADMINISTRATOR.
- 12 S. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
- 13 Staffing Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Contract.

10 **I. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE CONTRACT**

11 A. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND RECITALS

12 1. The parties agree that the terms used, but not otherwise defined in the Common Terms and
13 Definitions Paragraph of Exhibit A to this Contract or in Subparagraph B. below, shall have the same
14 meaning given to such terms under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and their implementing regulations at
15 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164 (“the HIPAA regulations”) as they may exist now or be hereafter amended.
16

17 2. The parties agree that a business associate relationship under HIPAA, the HITECH Act,
18 and the HIPAA regulations between the CONTRACTOR and COUNTY arises to the extent that
19 CONTRACTOR performs, or delegates to subcontractor to perform, functions or activities on behalf of
20 COUNTY pursuant to, and as set forth in this Contract that are described in the definition of “Business
21 Associate” in 45 CFR § 160.103.

22 3. The COUNTY wishes to disclose to CONTRACTOR certain information pursuant to the
23 terms of this Contract, some of which may constitute PHI, as defined below in Subparagraph B.10, to be
24 used or disclosed in the course of providing services and activities pursuant to, and as set forth in this
25 Contract.

26 4. The parties intend to protect the privacy and provide for the security of PHI that may be
27 created, received, maintained, transmitted, used, or disclosed pursuant to this Contract in compliance
28 with the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH
29 Act, and the HIPAA regulations as they may exist now or be hereafter amended.

30 5. The parties understand and acknowledge that HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA
31 regulations do not pre-empt any state statutes, rules, or regulations that are not otherwise pre-empted by
32 other Federal law(s) and impose more stringent requirements with respect to privacy of PHI.

33 6. The parties understand that the HIPAA Privacy and Security rules, as defined below in
34 Subparagraphs B.9 and B.14, apply to the CONTRACTOR in the same manner as they apply to the
35 covered entity (COUNTY). CONTRACTOR agrees therefore to be in compliance at all times with the
36 terms of this Business Associate Contract, as it exists now or be hereafter updated with notice to
37 CONTRACTOR and the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of the

1 Privacy and the Security rules, as they may exist now or be hereafter amended, with respect to PHI and
 2 electronic PHI created, received, maintained, transmitted, used, or disclosed pursuant to this Contract.

3 B. DEFINITIONS

4 1. "Administrative Safeguards" are administrative actions, and policies and procedures, to
 5 manage the selection, development, implementation, and maintenance of security measures to protect
 6 electronic PHI and to manage the conduct of CONTRACTOR's workforce in relation to the protection
 7 of that information.

8 2. "Breach" means the acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted
 9 under the HIPAA Privacy Rule which compromises the security or privacy of the PHI.

10 a. Breach excludes:

11 1) Any unintentional acquisition, access, or use of PHI by a workforce member or
 12 person acting under the authority of CONTRACTOR or COUNTY, if such acquisition, access, or use
 13 was made in good faith and within the scope of authority and does not result in further use or disclosure
 14 in a manner not permitted under the Privacy Rule.

15 2) Any inadvertent disclosure by a person who is authorized to access PHI at
 16 CONTRACTOR to another person authorized to access PHI at the CONTRACTOR, or organized health
 17 care arrangement in which COUNTY participates, and the information received as a result of such
 18 disclosure is not further used or disclosed in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

19 3) A disclosure of PHI where CONTRACTOR or COUNTY has a good faith belief
 20 that an unauthorized person to whom the disclosure was made would not reasonably have been able to
 21 retain such information.

22 b. Except as provided in Subparagraph a. of this definition, an acquisition, access, use, or
 23 disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule is presumed to be a breach
 24 unless CONTRACTOR demonstrates that there is a low probability that the PHI has been compromised
 25 based on a risk assessment of at least the following factors:

26 1) The nature and extent of the PHI involved, including the types of identifiers and the
 27 likelihood of re-identification;

28 2) The unauthorized person who used the PHI or to whom the disclosure was made;

29 3) Whether the PHI was actually acquired or viewed; and

30 4) The extent to which the risk to the PHI has been mitigated.

31 3. "Data Aggregation" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy
 32 Rule in 45 CFR § 164.501.

33 4. "DRS" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in
 34 45 CFR § 164.501.

35 5. "Disclosure" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in
 36 45 CFR § 160.103.

37 //

1 6. "Health Care Operations" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA
2 Privacy Rule in 45 CFR § 164.501.

3 7. "Individual" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in
4 45 CFR § 160.103 and shall include a person who qualifies as a personal representative in accordance
5 with 45 CFR § 164.502(g).

6 8. "Physical Safeguards" are physical measures, policies, and procedures to protect
7 CONTRACTOR's electronic information systems and related buildings and equipment, from natural
8 and environmental hazards, and unauthorized intrusion.

9 9. "The HIPAA Privacy Rule" shall mean the Standards for Privacy of Individually
10 Identifiable Health Information at 45 CFR Part 160 and Part 164, Subparts A and E.

11 10. "PHI" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in
12 45 CFR § 160.103.

13 11. "Required by Law" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy
14 Rule in 45 CFR § 164.103.

15 12. "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services or
16 his or her designee.

17 13. "Security Incident" means attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure,
18 modification, or destruction of information or interference with system operations in an information
19 system. "Security incident" does not include trivial incidents that occur on a daily basis, such as scans,
20 "pings", or unsuccessful attempts to penetrate computer networks or servers maintained by
21 CONTRACTOR.

22 14. "The HIPAA Security Rule" shall mean the Security Standards for the Protection of
23 electronic PHI at 45 CFR Part 160, Part 162, and Part 164, Subparts A and C.

24 15. "Subcontractor" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in
25 45 CFR § 160.103.

26 16. "Technical safeguards" means the technology and the policy and procedures for its use that
27 protect electronic PHI and control access to it.

28 17. "Unsecured PHI" or "PHI that is unsecured" means PHI that is not rendered unusable,
29 unreadable, or indecipherable to unauthorized individuals through the use of a technology or
30 methodology specified by the Secretary of Health and Human Services in the guidance issued on the
31 HHS Web site.

32 18. "Use" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in
33 45 CFR § 160.103.

34 C. OBLIGATIONS AND ACTIVITIES OF CONTRACTOR AS BUSINESS ASSOCIATE:

35 1. CONTRACTOR agrees not to use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to
36 CONTRACTOR other than as permitted or required by this Business Associate Contract or as required
37 by law.

1 2. CONTRACTOR agrees to use appropriate safeguards, as provided for in this Business
2 Associate Contract and this Contract, to prevent use or disclosure of PHI COUNTY discloses to
3 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
4 other than as provided for by this Business Associate Contract.

5 3. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with the HIPAA Security Rule at Subpart C of
6 45 CFR Part 164 with respect to ePHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR
7 creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY.

8 4. CONTRACTOR agrees to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is
9 known to CONTRACTOR of a Use or Disclosure of PHI by CONTRACTOR in violation of the
10 requirements of this Business Associate Contract.

11 5. CONTRACTOR agrees to report to COUNTY immediately any Use or Disclosure of PHI
12 not provided for by this Business Associate Contract of which CONTRACTOR becomes aware.
13 CONTRACTOR must report Breaches of Unsecured PHI in accordance with Subparagraph E. below
14 and as required by 45 CFR § 164.410.

15 6. CONTRACTOR agrees to ensure that any Subcontractor that create, receive, maintain, or
16 transmit PHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree to the same restrictions and conditions that apply
17 through this Business Associate Contract to CONTRACTOR with respect to such information.

18 7. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide access, within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of a
19 written request by COUNTY, to PHI in a DRS, to COUNTY or, as directed by COUNTY, to an
20 Individual in order to meet the requirements under 45 CFR § 164.524. If CONTRACTOR maintains an
21 EHR with PHI, and an individual requests a copy of such information in an electronic format,
22 CONTRACTOR shall provide such information in an electronic format.

23 8. CONTRACTOR agrees to make any amendment(s) to PHI in a DRS that COUNTY directs
24 or agrees to pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.526 at the request of COUNTY or an Individual, within thirty
25 (30) calendar days of receipt of said request by COUNTY. CONTRACTOR agrees to notify COUNTY
26 in writing no later than ten (10) calendar days after said amendment is completed.

27 9. CONTRACTOR agrees to make internal practices, books, and records, including P&Ps,
28 relating to the use and disclosure of PHI received from, or created or received by CONTRACTOR on
29 behalf of, COUNTY available to COUNTY and the Secretary in a time and manner as determined by
30 COUNTY or as designated by the Secretary for purposes of the Secretary determining COUNTY's
31 compliance with the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

32 10. CONTRACTOR agrees to document any Disclosures of PHI COUNTY discloses to
33 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY,
34 and to make information related to such Disclosures available as would be required for COUNTY to
35 respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45
36 CFR § 164.528.

37 //

1 11. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide COUNTY or an Individual, as directed by COUNTY, in
2 a time and manner to be determined by COUNTY, that information collected in accordance with the
3 Contract, in order to permit COUNTY to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of
4 Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528.

5 12. CONTRACTOR agrees that to the extent CONTRACTOR carries out COUNTY's
6 obligation under the HIPAA Privacy and/or Security rules CONTRACTOR will comply with the
7 requirements of 45 CFR Part 164 that apply to COUNTY in the performance of such obligation.

8 13. If CONTRACTOR receives Social Security data from COUNTY provided to COUNTY by
9 a state agency, upon request by COUNTY, CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY with a list of all
10 employees, subcontractor, and agents who have access to the Social Security data, including employees,
11 agents, subcontractor, and agents of its subcontractor.

12 14. CONTRACTOR will notify COUNTY if CONTRACTOR is named as a defendant in a
13 criminal proceeding for a violation of HIPAA. COUNTY may terminate this Contract, if
14 CONTRACTOR is found guilty of a criminal violation in connection with HIPAA. COUNTY may
15 terminate this Contract, if a finding or stipulation that CONTRACTOR has violated any standard or
16 requirement of the privacy or security provisions of HIPAA, or other security or privacy laws are made
17 in any administrative or civil proceeding in which CONTRACTOR is a party or has been joined.
18 COUNTY will consider the nature and seriousness of the violation in deciding whether or not to
19 terminate this Contract.

20 15. CONTRACTOR shall make itself and any subcontractor, employees or agents assisting
21 CONTRACTOR in the performance of its obligations under this Contract, available to COUNTY at no
22 cost to COUNTY to testify as witnesses, or otherwise, in the event of litigation or administrative
23 proceedings being commenced against COUNTY, its directors, officers or employees based upon
24 claimed violation of HIPAA, the HIPAA regulations or other laws relating to security and privacy,
25 which involves inactions or actions by CONTRACTOR, except where CONTRACTOR or its
26 subcontractor, employee, or agent is a named adverse party.

27 16. The Parties acknowledge that federal and state laws relating to electronic data security and
28 privacy are rapidly evolving and that amendment of this Business Associate Contract may be required to
29 provide for procedures to ensure compliance with such developments. The Parties specifically agree to
30 take such action as is necessary to implement the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH
31 Act, the HIPAA regulations and other applicable laws relating to the security or privacy of PHI. Upon
32 COUNTY's request, CONTRACTOR agrees to promptly enter into negotiations with COUNTY
33 concerning an amendment to this Business Associate Contract embodying written assurances consistent
34 with the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations or other
35 applicable laws. COUNTY may terminate this Contract upon thirty (30) days written notice in the event:

36 a. CONTRACTOR does not promptly enter into negotiations to amend this Business
37 Associate Contract when requested by COUNTY pursuant to this Subparagraph C.; or

1 b. CONTRACTOR does not enter into an amendment providing assurances regarding the
2 safeguarding of PHI that COUNTY deems are necessary to satisfy the standards and requirements of
3 HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations.

4 17. CONTRACTOR shall work with COUNTY upon notification by CONTRACTOR to
5 COUNTY of a Breach to properly determine if any Breach exclusions exist as defined in Subparagraph
6 B.2.a. above.

7 D. SECURITY RULE

8 1. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.306 and establish
9 and maintain appropriate Administrative, Physical and Technical Safeguards in accordance with
10 45 CFR § 164.308, § 164.310, and § 164.312, with respect to electronic PHI COUNTY discloses to
11 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY.
12 CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and security program that
13 includes Administrative, Physical, and Technical Safeguards appropriate to the size and complexity of
14 CONTRACTOR's operations and the nature and scope of its activities.

15 2. CONTRACTOR shall implement reasonable and appropriate policies and procedures to
16 comply with the standards, implementation specifications and other requirements of
17 45 CFR Part 164, Subpart C, in compliance with 45 CFR § 164.316. CONTRACTOR will provide
18 COUNTY with its current and updated policies upon request.

19 3. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the continuous security of all computerized data systems
20 containing electronic PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives,
21 maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall protect paper documents
22 containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives,
23 maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. These steps shall include, at a minimum:

24 a. Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed under
25 Subparagraph E., below;

26 b. Achieving and maintaining compliance with the HIPAA Security Rule, as necessary in
27 conducting operations on behalf of COUNTY;

28 c. Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and scope
29 of security established by the OMB in OMB Circular No. A-130, Appendix III - Security of Federal
30 Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for automated information systems in
31 Federal agencies;

32 4. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that any subcontractor that create, receive, maintain, or
33 transmit ePHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree through a contract with CONTRACTOR to the same
34 restrictions and requirements contained in this Subparagraph D. of this Business Associate Contract.

35 5. CONTRACTOR shall report to COUNTY immediately any Security Incident of which it
36 becomes aware. CONTRACTOR shall report Breaches of Unsecured PHI in accordance with
37 Subparagraph E. below and as required by 45 CFR § 164.410.

1 6. CONTRACTOR shall designate a Security Officer to oversee its data security program who
2 shall be responsible for carrying out the requirements of this paragraph and for communicating on
3 security matters with COUNTY.

4 E. DATA SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

5 1. Personal Controls

6 a. Employee Training. All workforce members who assist in the performance of functions
7 or activities on behalf of COUNTY in connection with Contract, or access or disclose PHI COUNTY
8 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
9 COUNTY, must complete information privacy and security training, at least annually, at
10 CONTRACTOR's expense. Each workforce member who receives information privacy and security
11 training must sign a certification, indicating the member's name and the date on which the training was
12 completed. These certifications must be retained for a period of six (6) years following the termination
13 of Contract.

14 b. Employee Discipline. Appropriate sanctions must be applied against workforce
15 members who fail to comply with any provisions of CONTRACTOR's privacy P&Ps, including
16 termination of employment where appropriate.

17 c. Confidentiality Statement. All persons that will be working with PHI COUNTY
18 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
19 COUNTY must sign a confidentiality statement that includes, at a minimum, General Use, Security and
20 Privacy Safeguards, Unacceptable Use, and Enforcement Policies. The statement must be signed by the
21 workforce member prior to access to such PHI. The statement must be renewed annually. The
22 CONTRACTOR shall retain each person's written confidentiality statement for COUNTY inspection
23 for a period of six (6) years following the termination of this Contract.

24 d. Background Check. Before a member of the workforce may access PHI COUNTY
25 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
26 COUNTY, a background screening of that worker must be conducted. The screening should be
27 commensurate with the risk and magnitude of harm the employee could cause, with more thorough
28 screening being done for those employees who are authorized to bypass significant technical and
29 operational security controls. The CONTRACTOR shall retain each workforce member's background
30 check documentation for a period of three (3) years.

31 2. Technical Security Controls

32 a. Workstation/Laptop encryption. All workstations and laptops that store PHI COUNTY
33 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
34 COUNTY either directly or temporarily must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which
35 is 128bit or higher, such as AES. The encryption solution must be full disk unless approved by the
36 COUNTY.

37 //

1 b. Server Security. Servers containing unencrypted PHI COUNTY discloses to
2 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
3 must have sufficient administrative, physical, and technical controls in place to protect that data, based
4 upon a risk assessment/system security review.

5 c. Minimum Necessary. Only the minimum necessary amount of PHI COUNTY discloses
6 to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
7 required to perform necessary business functions may be copied, downloaded, or exported.

8 d. Removable media devices. All electronic files that contain PHI COUNTY discloses to
9 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
10 must be encrypted when stored on any removable media or portable device (i.e. USB thumb drives,
11 floppies, CD/DVD, Blackberry, backup tapes etc.). Encryption must be a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm
12 which is 128bit or higher, such as AES. Such PHI shall not be considered "removed from the premises"
13 if it is only being transported from one of CONTRACTOR's locations to another of CONTRACTOR's
14 locations.

15 e. Antivirus software. All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or
16 store PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or
17 transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have installed and actively use comprehensive anti-virus software
18 solution with automatic updates scheduled at least daily.

19 f. Patch Management. All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or
20 store PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or
21 transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have critical security patches applied, with system reboot if
22 necessary. There must be a documented patch management process which determines installation
23 timeframe based on risk assessment and vendor recommendations. At a maximum, all applicable
24 patches must be installed within thirty (30) calendar or business days of vendor release. Applications
25 and systems that cannot be patched due to operational reasons must have compensatory controls
26 implemented to minimize risk, where possible.

27 g. User IDs and Password Controls. All users must be issued a unique user name for
28 accessing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains,
29 or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. Username must be promptly disabled, deleted, or the password
30 changed upon the transfer or termination of an employee with knowledge of the password, at maximum
31 within twenty-four (24) hours. Passwords are not to be shared. Passwords must be at least eight
32 characters and must be a non-dictionary word. Passwords must not be stored in readable format on the
33 computer. Passwords must be changed every ninety (90) calendar or business days, preferably every
34 sixty (60) calendar or business days. Passwords must be changed if revealed or compromised.
35 Passwords must be composed of characters from at least three (3) of the following four (4) groups from
36 the standard keyboard:

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1 1) Upper case letters (A-Z)

2 2) Lower case letters (a-z)

3 3) Arabic numerals (0-9)

4 4) Non-alphanumeric characters (punctuation symbols)

5 h. Data Destruction. When no longer needed, all PHI COUNTY discloses to
6 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
7 must be wiped using the Gutmann or US DoD 5220.22-M (7 Pass) standard, or by degaussing. Media
8 may also be physically destroyed in accordance with NIST Special Publication 800-88. Other methods
9 require prior written permission by COUNTY.

10 i. System Timeout. The system providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to
11 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
12 must provide an automatic timeout, requiring re-authentication of the user session after no more than
13 twenty (20) minutes of inactivity.

14 j. Warning Banners. All systems providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to
15 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
16 must display a warning banner stating that data is confidential, systems are logged, and system use is for
17 business purposes only by authorized users. User must be directed to log off the system if they do not
18 agree with these requirements.

19 k. System Logging. The system must maintain an automated audit trail which can identify
20 the user or system process which initiates a request for PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
21 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY, or which alters such
22 PHI. The audit trail must be date and time stamped, must log both successful and failed accesses, must
23 be read only, and must be restricted to authorized users. If such PHI is stored in a database, database
24 logging functionality must be enabled. Audit trail data must be archived for at least three (3) years after
25 occurrence.

26 l. Access Controls. The system providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to
27 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
28 must use role based access controls for all user authentications, enforcing the principle of least privilege.

29 m. Transmission encryption. All data transmissions of PHI COUNTY discloses to
30 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
31 outside the secure internal network must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which is
32 128bit or higher, such as AES. Encryption can be end to end at the network level, or the data files
33 containing PHI can be encrypted. This requirement pertains to any type of PHI in motion such as
34 website access, file transfer, and E-Mail.

35 n. Intrusion Detection. All systems involved in accessing, holding, transporting, and
36 protecting PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains,

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1 or transmits on behalf of COUNTY that are accessible via the Internet must be protected by a
2 comprehensive intrusion detection and prevention solution.

3 3. Audit Controls

4 a. System Security Review. CONTRACTOR must ensure audit control mechanisms that
5 record and examine system activity are in place. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY
6 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
7 COUNTY must have at least an annual system risk assessment/security review which provides
8 assurance that administrative, physical, and technical controls are functioning effectively and providing
9 adequate levels of protection. Reviews should include vulnerability scanning tools.

10 b. Log Reviews. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to
11 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
12 must have a routine procedure in place to review system logs for unauthorized access.

13 c. Change Control. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to
14 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
15 must have a documented change control procedure that ensures separation of duties and protects the
16 confidentiality, integrity and availability of data.

17 4. Business Continuity/Disaster Recovery Control

18 a. Emergency Mode Operation Plan. CONTRACTOR must establish a documented plan
19 to enable continuation of critical business processes and protection of the security of PHI COUNTY
20 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
21 COUNTY kept in an electronic format in the event of an emergency. Emergency means any
22 circumstance or situation that causes normal computer operations to become unavailable for use in
23 performing the work required under this Contract for more than twenty four (24) hours.

24 b. Data Backup Plan. CONTRACTOR must have established documented procedures to
25 backup such PHI to maintain retrievable exact copies of the PHI. The plan must include a regular
26 schedule for making backups, storing backup offsite, an inventory of backup media, and an estimate of
27 the amount of time needed to restore DHCS PHI or PI should it be lost. At a minimum, the schedule
28 must be a weekly full backup and monthly offsite storage of DHCS data. BCP for CONTRACTOR and
29 COUNTY (e.g. the application owner) must merge with the DRP.

30 5. Paper Document Controls

31 a. Supervision of Data. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR
32 creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY in paper form shall not be left
33 unattended at any time, unless it is locked in a file cabinet, file room, desk or office. Unattended means
34 that information is not being observed by an employee authorized to access the information. Such PHI
35 in paper form shall not be left unattended at any time in vehicles or planes and shall not be checked in
36 baggage on commercial airplanes.

37 //

1 b. Escorting Visitors. Visitors to areas where PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR
 2 or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY is contained shall
 3 be escorted and such PHI shall be kept out of sight while visitors are in the area.

4 c. Confidential Destruction. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
 5 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must be disposed of
 6 through confidential means, such as cross cut shredding and pulverizing.

7 d. Removal of Data. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR
 8 creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must not be removed from the premises
 9 of the CONTRACTOR except with express written permission of COUNTY.

10 e. Faxing. Faxes containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
 11 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY shall not be left
 12 unattended and fax machines shall be in secure areas. Faxes shall contain a confidentiality statement
 13 notifying persons receiving faxes in error to destroy them. Fax numbers shall be verified with the
 14 intended recipient before sending the fax.

15 f. Mailing. Mailings containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
 16 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY shall be sealed and
 17 secured from damage or inappropriate viewing of PHI to the extent possible. Mailings which include
 18 five hundred (500) or more individually identifiable records containing PHI COUNTY discloses to
 19 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY in
 20 a single package shall be sent using a tracked mailing method which includes verification of delivery
 21 and receipt, unless the prior written permission of COUNTY to use another method is obtained.

22 F. BREACH DISCOVERY AND NOTIFICATION

23 1. Following the discovery of a Breach of Unsecured PHI, CONTRACTOR shall notify
 24 COUNTY of such Breach, however both parties agree to a delay in the notification if so advised by a
 25 law enforcement official pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.412.

26 a. A Breach shall be treated as discovered by CONTRACTOR as of the first day on which
 27 such Breach is known to CONTRACTOR or, by exercising reasonable diligence, would have been
 28 known to CONTRACTOR.

29 b. CONTRACTOR shall be deemed to have knowledge of a Breach, if the Breach is
 30 known, or by exercising reasonable diligence would have known, to any person who is an employee,
 31 officer, or other agent of CONTRACTOR, as determined by federal common law of agency.

32 2. CONTRACTOR shall provide the notification of the Breach immediately to the COUNTY
 33 Privacy Officer. CONTRACTOR's notification may be oral, but shall be followed by written
 34 notification within twenty four (24) hours of the oral notification.

35 3. CONTRACTOR's notification shall include, to the extent possible:

36 a. The identification of each Individual whose Unsecured PHI has been, or is reasonably
 37 believed by CONTRACTOR to have been, accessed, acquired, used, or disclosed during the Breach;

1 b. Any other information that COUNTY is required to include in the notification to
 2 Individual under 45 CFR §164.404 (c) at the time CONTRACTOR is required to notify COUNTY or
 3 promptly thereafter as this information becomes available, even after the regulatory sixty (60) day
 4 period set forth in 45 CFR § 164.410 (b) has elapsed, including:

5 1) A brief description of what happened, including the date of the Breach and the date
 6 of the discovery of the Breach, if known;

7 2) A description of the types of Unsecured PHI that were involved in the Breach (such
 8 as whether full name, social security number, date of birth, home address, account number, diagnosis,
 9 disability code, or other types of information were involved);

10 3) Any steps Individuals should take to protect themselves from potential harm
 11 resulting from the Breach;

12 4) A brief description of what CONTRACTOR is doing to investigate the Breach, to
 13 mitigate harm to Individuals, and to protect against any future Breaches; and

14 5) Contact procedures for Individuals to ask questions or learn additional information,
 15 which shall include a toll-free telephone number, an e-mail address, Web site, or postal address.

16 4. COUNTY may require CONTRACTOR to provide notice to the Individual as required in
 17 45 CFR § 164.404, if it is reasonable to do so under the circumstances, at the sole discretion of the
 18 COUNTY.

19 5. In the event that CONTRACTOR is responsible for a Breach of Unsecured PHI in violation
 20 of the HIPAA Privacy Rule, CONTRACTOR shall have the burden of demonstrating that
 21 CONTRACTOR made all notifications to COUNTY consistent with this Subparagraph F. and as
 22 required by the Breach notification regulations, or, in the alternative, that the acquisition, access, use, or
 23 disclosure of PHI did not constitute a Breach.

24 6. CONTRACTOR shall maintain documentation of all required notifications of a Breach or
 25 its risk assessment under 45 CFR § 164.402 to demonstrate that a Breach did not occur.

26 7. CONTRACTOR shall provide to COUNTY all specific and pertinent information about the
 27 Breach, including the information listed in Section E.3.b.(1)-(5) above, if not yet provided, to permit
 28 COUNTY to meet its notification obligations under Subpart D of 45 CFR Part 164 as soon as
 29 practicable, but in no event later than fifteen (15) calendar days after CONTRACTOR's initial report of
 30 the Breach to COUNTY pursuant to Subparagraph F.2. above.

31 8. CONTRACTOR shall continue to provide all additional pertinent information about the
 32 Breach to COUNTY as it may become available, in reporting increments of five (5) business days after
 33 the last report to COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall also respond in good faith to any reasonable
 34 requests for further information, or follow-up information after report to COUNTY, when such request
 35 is made by COUNTY.

36 9. If the Breach is the fault of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR shall bear all expense or
 37 other costs associated with the Breach and shall reimburse COUNTY for all expenses COUNTY incurs

1 in addressing the Breach and consequences thereof, including costs of investigation, notification,
2 remediation, documentation or other costs associated with addressing the Breach.

3 G. PERMITTED USES AND DISCLOSURES BY CONTRACTOR

4 1. CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR
5 as necessary to perform functions, activities, or services for, or on behalf of, COUNTY as specified in
6 this Contract, provided that such use or Disclosure would not violate the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done
7 by COUNTY except for the specific Uses and Disclosures set forth below.

8 a. CONTRACTOR may use PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary,
9 for the proper management and administration of CONTRACTOR.

10 b. CONTRACTOR may disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR for the
11 proper management and administration of CONTRACTOR or to carry out the legal responsibilities of
12 CONTRACTOR, if:

13 1) The Disclosure is required by law; or

14 2) CONTRACTOR obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the PHI
15 is disclosed that it will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for
16 the purposes for which it was disclosed to the person and the person immediately notifies
17 CONTRACTOR of any instance of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has
18 been breached.

19 c. CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to
20 CONTRACTOR to provide Data Aggregation services relating to the Health Care Operations of
21 CONTRACTOR.

22 2. CONTRACTOR may use PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary, to
23 carry out legal responsibilities of CONTRACTOR.

24 3. CONTRACTOR may use and disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR
25 consistent with the minimum necessary policies and procedures of COUNTY.

26 4. CONTRACTOR may use or disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR as
27 required by law.

28 H. PROHIBITED USES AND DISCLOSURES

29 1. CONTRACTOR shall not disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
30 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY about an individual to
31 a health plan for payment or health care operations purposes if the PHI pertains solely to a health care
32 item or service for which the health care provider involved has been paid out of pocket in full and the
33 individual requests such restriction, in accordance with 42 USC § 17935(a) and 45 CFR § 164.522(a).

34 2. CONTRACTOR shall not directly or indirectly receive remuneration in exchange for PHI
35 COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on
36 behalf of COUNTY, except with the prior written consent of COUNTY and as permitted by
37 42 USC § 17935(d)(2).

1 I. OBLIGATIONS OF COUNTY

2 1. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any limitation(s) in COUNTY's notice of
3 privacy practices in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.520, to the extent that such limitation may affect
4 CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

5 2. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any changes in, or revocation of, the permission
6 by an Individual to use or disclose his or her PHI, to the extent that such changes may affect
7 CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

8 3. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any restriction to the Use or Disclosure of PHI
9 that COUNTY has agreed to in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.522, to the extent that such restriction
10 may affect CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

11 4. COUNTY shall not request CONTRACTOR to use or disclose PHI in any manner that
12 would not be permissible under the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done by COUNTY.

13 J. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE TERMINATION

14 1. Upon COUNTY's knowledge of a material Breach or violation by CONTRACTOR of the
15 requirements of this Business Associate Contract, COUNTY shall:

16 a. Provide an opportunity for CONTRACTOR to cure the material Breach or end the
17 violation within thirty (30) business days; or

18 b. Immediately terminate this Contract, if CONTRACTOR is unwilling or unable to cure
19 the material Breach or end the violation within thirty (30) days, provided termination of this Contract is
20 feasible.

21 2. Upon termination of this Contract, CONTRACTOR shall either destroy or return to
22 COUNTY all PHI CONTRACTOR received from COUNTY or CONTRACTOR created, maintained,
23 or received on behalf of COUNTY in conformity with the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

24 a. This provision shall apply to all PHI that is in the possession of Subcontractor or agents
25 of CONTRACTOR.

26 b. CONTRACTOR shall retain no copies of the PHI.

27 c. In the event that CONTRACTOR determines that returning or destroying the PHI is not
28 feasible, CONTRACTOR shall provide to COUNTY notification of the conditions that make return or
29 destruction infeasible. Upon determination by COUNTY that return or destruction of PHI is infeasible,
30 CONTRACTOR shall extend the protections of this Business Associate Contract to such PHI and limit
31 further Uses and Disclosures of such PHI to those purposes that make the return or destruction
32 infeasible, for as long as CONTRACTOR maintains such PHI.

33 3. The obligations of this Business Associate Contract shall survive the termination of this
34 Contract.

11 **I. PERSONAL INFORMATION PRIVACY AND SECURITY CONTRACT**

12 Any reference to statutory, regulatory, or contractual language herein shall be to such language as
13 in effect or as amended.

14 A. DEFINITIONS

15 1. "Breach" shall have the meaning given to such term under the IEA and CMPPA. It shall
16 include a "PII loss" as that term is defined in the CMPPA.

17 2. "Breach of the security of the system" shall have the meaning given to such term under the
18 CIPA, CCC § 1798.29(d).

19 3. "CMPPA Agreement" means the CMPPA Agreement between SSA and CHHS.

20 4. "DHCS PI" shall mean PI, as defined below, accessed in a database maintained by the
21 COUNTY or DHCS, received by CONTRACTOR from the COUNTY or DHCS or acquired or created
22 by CONTRACTOR in connection with performing the functions, activities and services specified in
23 this Contract on behalf of the COUNTY.

24 5. "IEA" shall mean the IEA currently in effect between SSA and DHCS.

25 6. "Notice-triggering PI" shall mean the PI identified in CCC § 1798.29(e) whose
26 unauthorized access may trigger notification requirements under CCC § 1709.29. For purposes of this
27 provision, identity shall include, but not be limited to, name, identifying number, symbol, or other
28 identifying particular assigned to the individual, such as a finger or voice print, a photograph or a
29 biometric identifier. Notice-triggering PI includes PI in electronic, paper or any other medium.

30 7. "PII" shall have the meaning given to such term in the IEA and CMPPA.

31 8. "PI" shall have the meaning given to such term in CCC § 1798.3(a).

32 9. "Required by law" means a mandate contained in law that compels an entity to make a use
33 or disclosure of PI or PII that is enforceable in a court of law. This includes, but is not limited to, court
34 orders and court-ordered warrants, subpoenas or summons issued by a court, grand jury, a
35 governmental or tribal inspector general, or an administrative body authorized to require the
36 production of information, and a civil or an authorized investigative demand. It also includes Medicare
37 conditions of participation with respect to health care providers participating in the program, and

1 statutes or regulations that require the production of information, including statutes or regulations that
2 require such information if payment is sought under a government program providing public benefits.

3 10. "Security Incident" means the attempted or successful unauthorized access, use,
4 disclosure, modification, or destruction of PI, or confidential data utilized in complying with this
5 Contract; or interference with system operations in an information system that processes, maintains or
6 stores PI.

7 B. TERMS OF CONTRACT

8 1. Permitted Uses and Disclosures of DHCS PI and PII by CONTRACTOR. Except as
9 otherwise indicated in this Exhibit, CONTRACTOR may use or disclose DHCS PI only to perform
10 functions, activities, or services for or on behalf of the COUNTY pursuant to the terms of this Contract
11 provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the CIPA if done by the COUNTY.

12 2. Responsibilities of CONTRACTOR

13 CONTRACTOR agrees:

14 a. Nondisclosure. Not to use or disclose DHCS PI or PII other than as permitted or
15 required by this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract or as required by applicable state
16 and federal law.

17 b. Safeguards. To implement appropriate and reasonable administrative, technical, and
18 physical safeguards to protect the security, confidentiality and integrity of DHCS PI and PII, to protect
19 against anticipated threats or hazards to the security or integrity of DHCS PI and PII, and to prevent
20 use or disclosure of DHCS PI or PII other than as provided for by this Personal Information Privacy
21 and Security Contract. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and
22 security program that include administrative, technical and physical safeguards appropriate to the size
23 and complexity of CONTRACTOR's operations and the nature and scope of its activities, which
24 incorporate the requirements of Subparagraph c., below. CONTRACTOR will provide COUNTY with
25 its current policies upon request.

26 c. Security. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the continuous security of all computerized
27 data systems containing DHCS PI and PII. CONTRACTOR shall protect paper documents containing
28 DHCS PI and PII. These steps shall include, at a minimum:

29 1) Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed in
30 Subparagraph E. of the Business Associate Contract, Exhibit B to this Contract; and

31 2) Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and
32 scope of security established by the OMB in OMB Circular No. A-130, Appendix III-Security of
33 Federal Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for automated information
34 systems in Federal agencies.

35 3) If the data obtained by CONTRACTOR from COUNTY includes PII,
36 CONTRACTOR shall also comply with the substantive privacy and security requirements in the
37 CMPPA Agreement between SSA and CHHS and in the Agreement between SSA and DHCS, known

1 as the IEA. The specific sections of the IEA with substantive privacy and security requirements to be
2 complied with are sections E, F, and G, and in Attachment 4 to the IEA, Electronic Information
3 Exchange Security Requirements, Guidelines and Procedures for Federal, State and Local Agencies
4 Exchanging Electronic Information with SSA. CONTRACTOR also agrees to ensure that any of
5 CONTRACTOR's agents or subcontractor, to whom CONTRACTOR provides DHCS PII agree to the
6 same requirements for privacy and security safeguards for confidential data that apply to
7 CONTRACTOR with respect to such information.

8 d. Mitigation of Harmful Effects. To mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful
9 effect that is known to CONTRACTOR of a use or disclosure of DHCS PI or PII by CONTRACTOR
10 or its subcontractor in violation of this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract.

11 e. CONTRACTOR's Agents and Subcontractor. To impose the same restrictions and
12 conditions set forth in this Personal Information and Security Contract on any subcontractor or other
13 agents with whom CONTRACTOR subcontracts any activities under this Contract that involve the
14 disclosure of DHCS PI or PII to such subcontractor or other agents.

15 f. Availability of Information. To make DHCS PI and PII available to the DHCS and/or
16 COUNTY for purposes of oversight, inspection, amendment, and response to requests for records,
17 injunctions, judgments, and orders for production of DHCS PI and PII. If CONTRACTOR receives
18 DHCS PII, upon request by COUNTY and/or DHCS, CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY and/or
19 DHCS with a list of all employees, CONTRACTOR and agents who have access to DHCS PII,
20 including employees, CONTRACTOR and agents of its subcontractor and agents.

21 g. Cooperation with COUNTY. With respect to DHCS PI, to cooperate with and assist
22 the COUNTY to the extent necessary to ensure the DHCS's compliance with the applicable terms of
23 the CIPA including, but not limited to, accounting of disclosures of DHCS PI, correction of errors in
24 DHCS PI, production of DHCS PI, disclosure of a security Breach involving DHCS PI and notice of
25 such Breach to the affected individual(s).

26 h. Breaches and Security Incidents. During the term of this Contract, CONTRACTOR
27 agrees to implement reasonable systems for the discovery of any Breach of unsecured DHCS PI and
28 PII or security incident. CONTRACTOR agrees to give notification of any Breach of unsecured DHCS
29 PI and PII or security incident in accordance with Subparagraph F. of the Business Associate Contract,
30 Exhibit B to this Contract.

31 i. Designation of Individual Responsible for Security. CONTRACTOR shall designate
32 an individual, (e.g., Security Officer), to oversee its data security program who shall be responsible for
33 carrying out the requirements of this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract and for
34 communicating on security matters with the COUNTY.

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
