~~**WHEREAS**, on March 2, 2020, the Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution No. 2020-11 ratifying the local health emergency declared by the County’s Health Officer; and~~

~~**WHEREAS**, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a State of Emergency to exist in the State of California as a result of the COVID-19 emergency and outbreak; and~~

~~**WHEREAS**, on March 12, 2020, the Governor of the State of California issued Executive Order N-25-20, ordering all California residents to heed any orders and guidance of State and local public health officials, including but not limited to imposition of social distancing measures, to control the spread of COVID-19; and~~

~~**WHEREAS**, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States issued a Proclamation on Declaring a National Emergency Concerning the COVID-19 Outbreak; and~~

~~**WHEREAS**, on March 22, 2020, the President of United States declared a major disaster exists in the State of California and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by the COVID-19 pandemic; and~~

~~**WHEREAS**, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has issued the Public Assistance Program and Policy Guide, Version 4 (Guide) that provides guidance on the availability of federal funding to states and local governments during emergencies pursuant to Section 502 of the Robert T. This Amendment (“Amendment No. 3”) to Contract No. MA-042-19010161 for Behavioral Health Outpatient Services for Children and Youth is made and entered into on July 1, 2021 (“Effective Date”) between Western Youth Services (“Contractor”), with a place of business at 23461 South Pointe Drive, Suite 220, Laguna Hills, CA 92653, and the County of Orange, a political subdivision of the State of California (“County”), through its Health Care Agency, with a place of business at 405 W. 5th Street, Suite 600, Santa Ana, CA 92701. Contractor and County may sometimes be referred to individually as “Party” or collectively as “Parties.”

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Parties executed Contract No. MA-042-19010161 (“Contract”) for Behavioral Health Outpatient Services for Children and Youth, effective July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021, in an amount not to exceed \$30,847,371, renewable for two additional one-year terms; and

WHEREAS, the Parties executed Amendment No. 1 to exercise a contingency contract cost increase, for a revised cumulative contract total amount not to exceed \$31,844,487, and to amend Exhibit A of the Contract to modify budget line items, staffing and units of service; and

WHEREAS, the Parties executed Amendment No. 2 to amend the Contract to include Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provisions for Covid-19 related needs, and to add Exhibit D to the Contract, for the term of July 1, 2020 through December 30, 2020, to allow FEMA invoicing for Covid-19 related expenditures; and

WHEREAS, the Parties now desire to enter into this Amendment No. 3 to amend Paragraph VI., Paragraph XXIX., and Exhibit A of the Contract; to add Paragraph XLI. and Paragraph XLII. to the Contract; and to renew the Contract for one year for County to continue receiving and Contractor to continue providing the services set forth in the Contract.

II. ALTERATION OF TERMS

A. This Agreement, together with Exhibits A, B, and C attached hereto and incorporated herein, fully express the complete understanding of COUNTY and CONTRACTOR with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

B. Unless otherwise expressly stated in this Agreement, no addition to, or alteration of the terms of this Agreement or any Exhibits, whether written or verbal, made by the parties, their officers, employees or agents shall be valid unless made in the form of a written amendment to this Agreement, which has been formally approved and executed by both parties.

III. ASSIGNMENT OF DEBTS

Unless this Agreement is followed without interruption by another Agreement between the parties hereto for the same services and substantially the same scope, at the termination of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall assign to COUNTY any debts owing to CONTRACTOR by or on behalf of persons receiving services pursuant to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify by mail each of these persons, specifying the date of assignment, the County of Orange as assignee, and the address to which payments are to be sent. Payments received by CONTRACTOR from or on behalf of said persons, shall be immediately given to COUNTY.

IV. COMPLIANCE

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2 A. COMPLIANCE PROGRAM - ADMINISTRATOR has established a Compliance Program for
3 the purpose of ensuring adherence to all rules and regulations related to federal and state health care
4 programs.

5 1. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide CONTRACTOR with a copy of the policies and
6 procedures relating to ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and access to
7 General Compliance and Annual Provider Trainings.

8 2. CONTRACTOR has the option to provide ADMINISTRATOR with proof of its own
9 Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and any Compliance related policies and procedures.
10 CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and any related policies and procedures shall
11 be verified by ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Department to ensure they include all required
12 elements by ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer as described in this Paragraph IV
13 (COMPLIANCE). These elements include:

- 14 a. Designation of a Compliance Officer and/or compliance staff.
- 15 b. Written standards, policies and/or procedures.
- 16 c. Compliance related training and/or education program and proof of completion.
- 17 d. Communication methods for reporting concerns to the Compliance Officer.
- 18 e. Methodology for conducting internal monitoring and auditing.
- 19 f. Methodology for detecting and correcting offenses.
- 20 g. Methodology/Procedure for enforcing disciplinary standards.

21 3. If CONTRACTOR does not provide proof of its own Compliance program to
22 ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall acknowledge to comply with ADMINISTRATOR's
23 Compliance Program and Code of Conduct, the CONTRACTOR shall submit to the
24 ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days of execution of this Agreement a signed
25 acknowledgement that CONTRACTOR shall comply with ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program
26 and Code of Conduct.

27 4. If CONTRACTOR elects to have its own Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and any
28 Compliance related policies and procedures review by ADMINISTRATOR, then CONTRACTOR shall
29 submit a copy of its compliance Program, code of Conduct and all relevant policies and procedures to
30 ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days of execution of this Agreement.
31 ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer, or designee, shall review said documents within a
32 reasonable time, which shall not exceed forty-five (45) calendar days, and determine if
33 CONTRACTOR's proposed compliance program and code of conduct contain all required elements to
34 the ADMINISTRATOR's satisfaction as consistent with the HCA's Compliance Program and Code of
35 Conduct. ADMINISTRATOR shall inform CONTRACTOR of any missing required elements and
36 CONTRACTOR shall revise its compliance program and code of conduct to meet
37 ADMINISTRATOR's required elements within thirty (30) calendar days after ADMINISTRATOR's

1 Compliance Officer's determination and resubmit the same for review by the ADMINISTRATOR.

2 5. Upon written confirmation from ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer that the
3 CONTRACTOR's compliance program, code of conduct and any Compliance related policies and
4 procedures contain all required elements, CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Covered Individuals
5 relative to this Agreement are made aware of CONTRACTOR's compliance program, code of conduct,
6 related policies and procedures and contact information for the ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance
7 Program.

8 B. SANCTION SCREENING – CONTRACTOR shall screen all Covered Individuals employed or
9 retained to provide services related to this Agreement semi-annually to ensure that they are not
10 designated as Ineligible Persons, as pursuant to this Agreement. Screening shall be conducted against
11 the General Services Administration's Excluded Parties List System or System for Award Management,
12 the Health and Human Services/Office of Inspector General List of Excluded Individuals/Entities, the
13 California Medi-Cal Suspended and Ineligible Provider List, and the Social Security Administration
14 Death Master File and/or any other list or system as identified by the ADMINISTRATOR.

15 1. For purposes of this Paragraph IV (COMPLIANCE), Covered Individuals includes all
16 employees, interns, volunteers, contractors, subcontractors, agents, and other persons who provide
17 health care items or services or who perform billing or coding functions on behalf of
18 ADMINISTRATOR. Notwithstanding the above, this term does not include part-time or per-diem
19 employees, contractors, subcontractors, agents, and other persons who are not reasonably expected to
20 work more than one hundred sixty (160) hours per year; except that any such individuals shall become
21 Covered Individuals at the point when they work more than one hundred sixty (160) hours during the
22 calendar year. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Covered Individuals relative to this Agreement are
23 made aware of ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and related policies and
24 procedures (or CONTRACTOR's own compliance program, code of conduct and related policies and
25 procedures if CONTRACTOR has elected to use its own).

26 2. An Ineligible Person shall be any individual or entity who:
27 a. is currently excluded, suspended, debarred or otherwise ineligible to participate in
28 federal and state health care programs; or

29 b. has been convicted of a criminal offense related to the provision of health care items or
30 services and has not been reinstated in the federal and state health care programs after a period of
31 exclusion, suspension, debarment, or ineligibility.

32 3. CONTRACTOR shall screen prospective Covered Individuals prior to hire or engagement.
33 CONTRACTOR shall not hire or engage any Ineligible Person to provide services relative to this
34 Agreement.

35 4. CONTRACTOR shall screen all current Covered Individuals and subcontractors semi-
36 annually to ensure that they have not become Ineligible Persons. CONTRACTOR shall also request that
37 its subcontractors use their best efforts to verify that they are eligible to participate in all federal and

1 State of California health programs and have not been excluded or debarred from participation in any
 2 federal or state health care programs, and to further represent to CONTRACTOR that they do not have
 3 any Ineligible Person in their employ or under contract.

4 5. Covered Individuals shall be required to disclose to CONTRACTOR immediately any
 5 debarment, exclusion or other event that makes the Covered Individual an Ineligible Person.
 6 CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately if a Covered Individual providing
 7 services directly relative to this Agreement becomes debarred, excluded or otherwise becomes an
 8 Ineligible Person.

9 6. CONTRACTOR acknowledges that Ineligible Persons are precluded from providing
 10 federal and state funded health care services by contract with COUNTY in the event that they are
 11 currently sanctioned or excluded by a federal or state law enforcement regulatory or licensing agency.
 12 If CONTRACTOR becomes aware that a Covered Individual has become an Ineligible Person,
 13 CONTRACTOR shall remove such individual from responsibility for, or involvement with, COUNTY
 14 business operations related to this Agreement.

15 7. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately if a Covered Individual or
 16 entity is currently excluded, suspended or debarred, or is identified as such after being sanction
 17 screened. Such individual or entity shall be immediately removed from participating in any activity
 18 associated with this Agreement. ADMINISTRATOR will determine appropriate repayment from, or
 19 sanction(s) to CONTRACTOR for services provided by ineligible person or individual.
 20 CONTRACTOR shall promptly return any overpayments within forty-five (45) business days after the
 21 overpayment is verified by ADMINISTRATOR.

22 C. GENERAL COMPLIANCE TRAINING – ADMINISTRATOR shall make General
 23 Compliance Training available to Covered Individuals.

24 1. CONTRACTORS that have acknowledged to comply with ADMINISTRATOR's
 25 Compliance Program shall use its best efforts to encourage completion by all Covered Individuals;
 26 provided, however, that at a minimum CONTRACTOR shall assign at least one (1) designated
 27 representative to complete the General Compliance Training when offered.

28 2. Such training will be made available to Covered Individuals within thirty (30) calendar
 29 days of employment or engagement.

30 3. Such training will be made available to each Covered Individual annually.

31 4. ADMINISTRATOR will track training completion while CONTRACTOR shall provide
 32 copies of training certification upon request.

33 5. Each Covered Individual attending a group training shall certify, in writing, attendance at
 34 compliance training. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide instruction on group training completion while
 35 CONTRACTOR shall retain the training certifications. Upon written request by ADMINISTRATOR,
 36 CONTRACTOR shall provide copies of the certifications.

37 D. SPECIALIZED PROVIDER TRAINING – ADMINISTRATOR shall make Specialized

1 Provider Training, where appropriate, available to Covered Individuals.

2 1. CONTRACTOR shall ensure completion of Specialized Provider Training by all Covered
3 Individuals relative to this Agreement. This includes compliance with federal and state health care
4 program regulations and procedures or instructions otherwise communicated by regulatory agencies
5 including the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services or their agents.

6 2. Such training will be made available to Covered Individuals within thirty (30) calendar
7 days of employment or engagement.

8 3. Such training will be made available to each Covered Individual annually.

9 4. ADMINISTRATOR will track online completion of training while CONTRACTOR shall
10 provide copies of the certifications upon request.

11 5. Each Covered Individual attending a group training shall certify, in writing, attendance at
12 compliance training. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide instructions on completing the training in a
13 group setting while CONTRACTOR shall retain the certifications. Upon written request by
14 ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall provide copies of the certifications.

15 E. MEDICAL BILLING, CODING, AND DOCUMENTATION COMPLIANCE STANDARDS

16 1. CONTRACTOR shall take reasonable precaution to ensure that the coding of health care
17 claims, billings and/or invoices for same are prepared and submitted in an accurate and timely manner
18 and are consistent with federal, state and county laws and regulations. This includes compliance with
19 Federal and state health care program regulations and procedures or instructions otherwise
20 communicated by regulatory agencies including the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services or
21 their agents.

22 2. CONTRACTOR shall not submit any false, fraudulent, inaccurate and/or fictitious claims
23 for payment or reimbursement of any kind.

24 3. CONTRACTOR shall bill only for those eligible services actually rendered which are also
25 fully documented. When such services are coded, CONTRACTOR shall use proper billing codes which
26 accurately describes the services provided and must ensure compliance with all billing and
27 documentation requirements.

28 4. CONTRACTOR shall act promptly to investigate and correct any problems or errors in
29 coding of claims and billing, if and when, any such problems or errors are identified.

30 5. CONTRACTOR shall promptly return any overpayments within forty-five (45) business
31 days after the overpayment is verified by the ADMINISTRATOR.

32 F. Failure to comply with the obligations stated in this Paragraph IV (COMPLIANCE) shall
33 constitute a breach of the Agreement on the part of CONTRACTOR and ground for COUNTY to
34 terminate the Agreement. Unless the circumstances require a sooner period of cure, CONTRACTOR
35 shall have thirty (30) calendar days from the date of the written notice of default to cure any defaults
36 grounded on this Paragraph IV (COMPLIANCE) prior to ADMINISTRATOR's right to terminate this
37 Agreement on the basis of such default.

V. CONFIDENTIALITY

A. CONTRACTOR shall maintain the confidentiality of all records, including billings and any audio and/or video recordings, in accordance with all applicable federal, state and county codes and regulations, as they now exist or may hereafter be amended or changed.

1. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that all persons served pursuant to this Agreement are clients of the Orange County Mental Health services system, and therefore it may be necessary for authorized staff of ADMINISTRATOR to audit client files, or to exchange information regarding specific clients with COUNTY or other providers of related services contracting with COUNTY.

2. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that it shall be responsible for obtaining written consents for the release of information from all persons served by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement. Such consents shall be obtained by CONTRACTOR in accordance with CCC, Division 1, Part 2.6, relating to confidentiality of medical information.

3. In the event of a collaborative service agreement between Mental Health services providers, CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that it is responsible for obtaining releases of information, from the collaborative agency, for clients receiving services through the collaborative agreement.

B. Prior to providing any services pursuant to this Agreement, all members of the Board of Directors or its designee or authorized agent, employees, consultants, subcontractors, volunteers and interns of the CONTRACTOR shall agree, in writing, with CONTRACTOR to maintain the confidentiality of any and all information and records which may be obtained in the course of providing such services. This Agreement shall specify that it is effective irrespective of all subsequent resignations or terminations of CONTRACTOR members of the Board of Directors or its designee or authorized agent, employees, consultants, subcontractors, volunteers and interns.

C. CONTRACTOR shall have in effect a system to protect patient records from inappropriate disclosure in connection with activity funded under this Agreement. This system shall include provisions for employee education on the confidentiality requirements, and the fact that disciplinary action may occur upon inappropriate disclosure. CONTRACTOR agrees to implement administrative, physical, and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of all confidential information that it creates, receives, maintains or transmits. CONTRACTOR shall provide ADMINISTRATOR with information concerning such safeguards.

D. CONTRACTOR agrees to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known to CONTRACTOR, or its subcontractors or agents in violation of the applicable state and federal regulations regarding confidentiality.

E. CONTRACTOR shall monitor compliance with the above provisions on confidentiality and security, and shall include them in all subcontracts.

F. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR within twenty-four (24) hours during a work week, of any suspected or actual breach of its computer system.

VI. COST REPORT

~~— A. CONTRACTOR shall submit separate individual and/or consolidated Cost Reports for Period One, Period Two, and Period Three, or for a portion thereof, to COUNTY no later than sixty (60) calendar days following the period for which they are prepared or termination of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall prepare the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report in accordance with all applicable federal, state and COUNTY requirements, GAAP and the Special Provisions Paragraph of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall allocate direct and indirect costs to and between programs, cost centers, services, and funding sources in accordance with such requirements and consistent with prudent business practice, which costs and allocations shall be supported by source documentation maintained by CONTRACTOR, and available at any time to ADMINISTRATOR upon reasonable notice. In the event CONTRACTOR has multiple Agreements for mental health services that are administered by HCA, consolidation of the individual Cost Reports into a single consolidated Cost Report may be required, as stipulated by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall submit a consolidated Cost Report to COUNTY no later than five (5) business days following approval by ADMINISTRATOR of all individual Cost Reports to be incorporated into a consolidated Cost Report.~~

A. CONTRACTOR shall submit separate individual and/or consolidated Cost Reports for Period One, Period Two, Period Three and Period Four, or for a portion thereof, to COUNTY no later than sixty (60) calendar days following the period for which they are prepared or termination of this Contract. CONTRACTOR shall prepare the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report in accordance with all applicable federal, state and COUNTY requirements, GAAP and the Special Provisions Paragraph of this Contract. CONTRACTOR shall allocate direct and indirect costs to and between programs, cost centers, services, and funding sources in accordance with such requirements and consistent with prudent business practice, which costs and allocations shall be supported by source documentation maintained by CONTRACTOR, and available at any time to ADMINISTRATOR upon reasonable notice. In the event CONTRACTOR has multiple Contracts for mental health services that are administered by HCA, consolidation of the individual Cost Reports into a single consolidated Cost Report may be required, as stipulated by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall submit a consolidated Cost Report to COUNTY no later than five (5) business days following approval by ADMINSTRATOR of all individual Cost Reports to be incorporated into a consolidated Cost Report.

1. If CONTRACTOR fails to submit an accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report within the time period specified above, ADMINISTRATOR shall have sole discretion to impose one or both of the following:

a. CONTRACTOR may be assessed a late penalty of five hundred dollars (\$500) for each business day after the above specified due date that the accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report is not submitted. Imposition of the late penalty shall be at the sole discretion of the ADMINISTRATOR. The late penalty shall be assessed separately on each outstanding individual

1 and/or consolidated Cost Report due COUNTY by CONTRACTOR.

2 b. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any or all payments due CONTRACTOR
3 pursuant to any or all agreements between COUNTY and CONTRACTOR until such time that the
4 accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report is delivered to ADMINISTRATOR.

5 2. CONTRACTOR may request, in advance and in writing, an extension of the due date of the
6 individual and/or consolidated Cost Report setting forth good cause for justification of the request.
7 Approval of such requests shall be at the sole discretion of ADMINISTRATOR and shall not be
8 unreasonably denied.

9 3. In the event that CONTRACTOR does not submit an accurate and complete individual
10 and/or consolidated Cost Report within one hundred and eighty (180) calendar days following the
11 termination of this Agreement, and CONTRACTOR has not entered into a subsequent or new
12 agreement for any other services with COUNTY, then all amounts paid to CONTRACTOR by
13 COUNTY during the term of the Agreement shall be immediately reimbursed to COUNTY.

14 B. The individual and/or consolidated individual and/or consolidated Cost Report prepared for
15 each period shall be the final financial and statistical report submitted by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY,
16 and shall serve as the basis for final settlement to CONTRACTOR for that period. CONTRACTOR
17 shall document that costs are reasonable and allowable and directly or indirectly related to the services
18 to be provided hereunder. The individual and/or consolidated Cost Report shall be the final financial
19 record for subsequent audits, if any.

20 C. Final settlement shall be based upon the actual and reimbursable costs for services hereunder,
21 less applicable revenues and any late penalty, not to exceed COUNTY's Maximum Obligation as set
22 forth in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall not claim
23 expenditures to COUNTY which are not reimbursable pursuant to applicable federal, state and
24 COUNTY laws, regulations and requirements. Any payment made by COUNTY to CONTRACTOR,
25 which is subsequently determined to have been for an unreimbursable expenditure or service, shall be
26 repaid by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY in cash, or other authorized form of payment, within thirty (30)
27 calendar days of submission of the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report or COUNTY may elect
28 to reduce any amount owed CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the reimbursement due
29 COUNTY.

30 D. Unless approved by ADMINISTRATOR, costs that exceed the Statewide Maximum Allowance
31 (SMA) rates per Medi-Cal Unit of Services, as determined by the DHCS, shall be unreimbursable to
32 CONTRACTOR.

33 E. In the event that CONTRACTOR is authorized to retain unanticipated revenues as described in
34 the Budget Paragraph of Exhibit A to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall specify in the individual
35 and/or consolidated Cost Report the services rendered with such revenues.

36 F. All individual and/or consolidated Cost Reports shall contain the following attestation, which
37 may be typed directly on or attached to the Cost Report:

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"I HEREBY CERTIFY that I have executed the accompanying Cost Report and supporting documentation prepared by _____ for the cost report period beginning _____ and ending _____ and that, to the best of my knowledge and belief, costs reimbursed through this Agreement are reasonable and allowable and directly or indirectly related to the services provided and that this Cost Report is a true, correct, and complete statement from the books and records of (provider name) in accordance with applicable instructions, except as noted. I also hereby certify that I have the authority to execute the accompanying Cost Report.

VII. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION CERTIFICATION

A. CONTRACTOR certifies that it and its principals:

1. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, and declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded by any federal department or agency.

2. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state, or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of federal or state antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property.

3. Are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a federal, state, or local governmental entity with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in Subparagraph A.2. above.

4. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Agreement had one or more public transactions (federal, state, or local) terminated for cause or default.

5. Shall not knowingly enter into any lower tier covered transaction with a person who is proposed for debarment under federal regulations (i.e., 48 CFR Part 9, Subpart 9.4), debarred, suspended, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in such transaction unless authorized by the State of California.

6. Shall include without modification, the clause titled "Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility, and Voluntary Exclusion Lower Tier Covered Transaction," (i.e., transactions with sub-grantees and/or contractors) and in all solicitations for lower tier covered transactions in accordance with 2 CFR Part 376.

1 B. The terms and definitions of this paragraph have the meanings set out in the Definitions and
2 Coverage sections of the rules implementing 51 F.R. 6370.

4 **VIII. DELEGATION, ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTS**

5 A. CONTRACTOR may not delegate the obligations hereunder, either in whole or in part, without
6 prior written consent of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification of
7 CONTRACTOR's intent to delegate the obligations hereunder, either in whole or part, to
8 ADMINISTRATOR not less than sixty (60) calendar days prior to the effective date of the delegation.
9 Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of this paragraph shall be void.

10 B. CONTRACTOR may not assign the rights hereunder, either in whole or in part, without the
11 prior written consent of COUNTY.

12 1. If CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit organization, any change from a nonprofit corporation to
13 any other corporate structure of CONTRACTOR, including a change in more than fifty percent (50%)
14 of the composition of the Board of Directors within a two (2) month period of time, shall be deemed an
15 assignment for purposes of this paragraph, unless CONTRACTOR is transitioning from a community
16 clinic/health center to a Federally Qualified Health Center and has been so designated by the Federal
17 Government. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

18 2. If CONTRACTOR is a for-profit organization, any change in the business structure,
19 including but not limited to, the sale or transfer of more than ten percent (10%) of the assets or stocks of
20 CONTRACTOR, change to another corporate structure, including a change to a sole proprietorship, or a
21 change in fifty percent (50%) or more of Board of Directors or any governing body of CONTRACTOR
22 at one time shall be deemed an assignment pursuant to this paragraph. Any attempted assignment or
23 delegation in derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

24 3. If CONTRACTOR is a governmental organization, any change to another structure,
25 including a change in more than fifty percent (50%) of the composition of its governing body (i.e. Board
26 of Supervisors, City Council, School Board) within a two (2) month period of time, shall be deemed an
27 assignment for purposes of this paragraph. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of
28 this subparagraph shall be void.

29 4. Whether CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit, for-profit, or a governmental organization,
30 CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification of CONTRACTOR's intent to assign the obligations
31 hereunder, either in whole or part, to ADMINISTRATOR not less than sixty (60) calendar days prior to
32 the effective date of the assignment.

33 5. Whether CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit, for-profit, or a governmental organization,
34 CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification within thirty (30) calendar days to
35 ADMINISTRATOR when there is change of less than fifty percent (50%) of Board of Directors or any
36 governing body of CONTRACTOR at one time.

37 C. CONTRACTOR's obligations undertaken pursuant to this Agreement may be carried out by

1 means of subcontracts, provided such subcontracts are approved in advance, in writing by
 2 ADMINISTRATOR, meet the requirements of this Agreement as they relate to the service or activity
 3 under subcontract, and include any provisions that ADMINISTRATOR may require.

4 1. After approval of a subcontract, ADMINISTRATOR may revoke the approval of a
 5 subcontract upon five (5) calendar days' written notice to CONTRACTOR if the subcontract
 6 subsequently fails to meet the requirements of this Agreement or any provisions that
 7 ADMINISTRATOR has required.

8 2. No subcontract shall terminate or alter the responsibilities of CONTRACTOR to COUNTY
 9 pursuant to this Agreement.

10 3. ADMINISTRATOR may disallow, from payments otherwise due CONTRACTOR,
 11 amounts claimed for subcontracts not approved in accordance with this paragraph.

12 4. This provision shall not be applicable to service agreements usually and customarily
 13 entered into by CONTRACTOR to obtain or arrange for supplies, technical support, and professional
 14 services provided by consultants.

15 16 **IX. EMPLOYEE ELIGIBILITY VERIFICATION**

17 CONTRACTOR warrants that it shall fully comply with all federal and state statutes and
 18 regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and to ensure that employees, subcontractors,
 19 and consultants performing work under this Agreement meet the citizenship or alien status requirements
 20 set forth in federal statutes and regulations. CONTRACTOR shall obtain, from all employees,
 21 subcontractors, and consultants performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of
 22 employment eligibility status required by federal or state statutes and regulations including, but not
 23 limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 USC §1324 et seq., as they currently
 24 exist and as they may be hereafter amended. CONTRACTOR shall retain all such documentation for all
 25 covered employees, subcontractors, and consultants for the period prescribed by the law.

26 27 **X. EQUIPMENT**

28 A. Unless otherwise specified in writing by ADMINISTRATOR, Equipment is defined as all
 29 property of a Relatively Permanent nature with significant value, purchased in whole or in part by
 30 ADMINISTRATOR to assist in performing the services described in this Agreement. "Relatively
 31 Permanent" is defined as having a useful life of one year or longer. Equipment which costs \$5,000 or
 32 over, including freight charges, sales taxes, and other taxes, and installation costs are defined as Capital
 33 Assets. Equipment which costs between \$600 and \$5,000, including freight charges, sales taxes and
 34 other taxes, and installation costs, or electronic equipment that costs less than \$600 but may contained
 35 PHI or PII, are defined as Controlled Equipment. Controlled Equipment includes, but is not limited to
 36 phones, tablets, audio/visual equipment, computer equipment, and lab equipment. The cost of
 37 Equipment purchased, in whole or in part, with funds paid pursuant to this Agreement shall be

1 depreciated according to GAAP.

2 B. CONTRACTOR shall obtain ADMINISTRATOR's prior written approval to purchase any
3 Equipment with funds paid pursuant to this Agreement. Upon delivery of Equipment, CONTRACTOR
4 shall forward to ADMINISTRATOR, copies of the purchase order, receipt, and other supporting
5 documentation, which includes delivery date, unit price, tax, shipping and serial numbers.
6 CONTRACTOR shall request an applicable asset tag for said Equipment and shall include each
7 purchased asset in an Equipment inventory.

8 C. Upon ADMINISTRATOR's prior written approval, CONTRACTOR may expense to
9 COUNTY the cost of the approved Equipment purchased by CONTRACTOR. To "expense," in
10 relation to Equipment, means to charge the proportionate cost of Equipment in the fiscal year in which it
11 is purchased. Title of expensed Equipment shall be vested with COUNTY.

12 D. CONTRACTOR shall maintain an inventory of all Equipment purchased in whole or in part
13 with funds paid through this Agreement, including date of purchase, purchase price, serial number,
14 model and type of Equipment. Such inventory shall be available for review by ADMINISTRATOR,
15 and shall include the original purchase date and price, useful life, and balance of depreciated Equipment
16 cost, if any.

17 E. CONTRACTOR shall cooperate with ADMINISTRATOR in conducting periodic physical
18 inventories of all Equipment. Upon demand by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall return any
19 or all Equipment to COUNTY.

20 F. CONTRACTOR must report any loss or theft of Equipment in accordance with the procedure
21 approved by ADMINISTRATOR and the Notices Paragraph of this Agreement. In addition,
22 CONTRACTOR must complete and submit to ADMINISTRATOR a notification form when items of
23 Equipment are moved from one location to another or returned to COUNTY as surplus.

24 G. Unless this Agreement is followed without interruption by another agreement between the
25 parties for substantially the same type and scope of services, at the termination of this Agreement for
26 any cause, CONTRACTOR shall return to COUNTY all Equipment purchased with funds paid through
27 this Agreement.

28 H. CONTRACTOR shall maintain and administer a sound business program for ensuring the
29 proper use, maintenance, repair, protection, insurance, and preservation of COUNTY Equipment.
30

31 **XI. FACILITIES, PAYMENTS AND SERVICES**

32 A. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide the services, staffing, facilities, and supplies in accordance
33 with this Agreement. COUNTY shall compensate, and authorize, when applicable, said services.
34 CONTRACTOR shall operate continuously throughout the term of this Agreement with at least the
35 minimum number and type of staff which meet applicable federal and state requirements, and which are
36 necessary for the provision of the services hereunder.

37 //

1 B. In the event that CONTRACTOR is unable to provide the services, staffing, facilities, or
 2 supplies as required, ADMINISTRATOR may, at its sole discretion, reduce the Maximum Obligation
 3 for the appropriate Period as well as the Total Maximum Obligation. The reduction to the Maximum
 4 Obligation for the appropriate Period as well as the Total Maximum Obligation shall be in an amount
 5 proportionate to the number of days in which CONTRACTOR was determined to be unable to provide
 6 services, staffing, facilities or supplies.

7 8 **XII. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE**

9 A. CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by COUNTY,
 10 and hold COUNTY, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents and those special
 11 districts and agencies for which COUNTY's Board of Supervisors acts as the governing Board
 12 ("COUNTY INDEMNITEES") harmless from any claims, demands or liability of any kind or nature,
 13 including but not limited to personal injury or property damage, arising from or related to the services,
 14 products or other performance provided by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement. If judgment is
 15 entered against CONTRACTOR and COUNTY by a court of competent jurisdiction because of the
 16 concurrent active negligence of COUNTY or COUNTY INDEMNITEES, CONTRACTOR and
 17 COUNTY agree that liability will be apportioned as determined by the court. Neither party shall request
 18 a jury apportionment.

19 B. Prior to the provision of services under this Agreement, CONTRACTOR agrees to purchase all
 20 required insurance at CONTRACTOR's expense and to submit to COUNTY the COI, including all
 21 endorsements required herein, necessary to satisfy COUNTY that the insurance provisions of this
 22 Agreement have been complied with and to maintain such insurance coverage with COUNTY during
 23 the entire term of this Agreement. In addition, all subcontractors performing work on behalf of
 24 CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement shall obtain insurance subject to the same terms and
 25 conditions as set forth herein for CONTRACTOR.

26 C. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all subcontractors performing work on behalf of
 27 CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement shall be covered under CONTRACTOR's insurance as an
 28 Additional Insured or maintain insurance subject to the same terms and conditions as set forth herein for
 29 CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall not allow subcontractors to work if subcontractors have less
 30 than the level of coverage required by COUNTY from CONTRACTOR under this Agreement. It is the
 31 obligation of CONTRACTOR to provide notice of the insurance requirements to every subcontractor
 32 and to receive proof of insurance prior to allowing any subcontractor to begin work. Such proof of
 33 insurance must be maintained by CONTRACTOR through the entirety of this Agreement for inspection
 34 by COUNTY representative(s) at any reasonable time.

35 D. All SIRs and deductibles shall be clearly stated on the COI. If no SIRs or deductibles apply,
 36 indicate this on the COI with a zero (0) by the appropriate line of coverage. Any SIR or deductible in an
 37 amount in excess of \$25,000 (\$5,000 for automobile liability), shall specifically be approved by the

1 CEO/Office of Risk Management upon review of CONTRACTOR's current audited financial report. If
 2 CONTRACTOR's SIR is approved, CONTRACTOR, in addition to, and without limitation of, any
 3 other indemnity provision(s) in this Agreement, agrees to all of the following:

4 1. In addition to the duty to indemnify and hold the COUNTY harmless against any and all
 5 liability, claim, demand or suit resulting from CONTRACTOR's, its agents, employee's or
 6 subcontractor's performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall defend the COUNTY at its sole
 7 cost and expense with counsel approved by Board of Supervisors against same; and

8 2. CONTRACTOR's duty to defend, as stated above, shall be absolute and irrespective of any
 9 duty to indemnify or hold harmless; and

10 3. The provisions of California Civil Code Section 2860 shall apply to any and all actions to
 11 which the duty to defend stated above applies, and the CONTRACTOR's SIR provision shall be
 12 interpreted as though the CONTRACTOR was an insurer and the COUNTY was the insured.

13 E. If CONTRACTOR fails to maintain insurance as required in this Paragraph XII
 14 (INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE) for the full term of this Agreement, such failure shall
 15 constitute a breach of CONTRACTOR's obligation hereunder and ground for COUNTY to terminate
 16 this Agreement.

17 F. QUALIFIED INSURER

18 1. The policy or policies of insurance must be issued by an insurer with a minimum rating of
 19 A- (Secure A.M. Best's Rating) and VIII (Financial Size Category as determined by the most current
 20 edition of the Best's Key Rating Guide/Property-Casualty/United States or ambest.com). It is preferred,
 21 but not mandatory, that the insurer be licensed to do business in the state of California (California
 22 Admitted Carrier).

23 2. If the insurance carrier does not have an A.M. Best Rating of A-/VIII, the CEO/Office of
 24 Risk Management retains the right to approve or reject a carrier after a review of the company's
 25 performance and financial ratings.

26 G. The policy or policies of insurance maintained by CONTRACTOR shall provide the minimum
 27 limits and coverage as set forth below:

9 H. REQUIRED COVERAGE FORMS

10 1. The Commercial General Liability coverage shall be written on ISO form CG 00 01, or a
11 substitute form providing liability coverage at least as broad.

12 2. The Business Automobile Liability coverage shall be written on ISO form CA 00 01,
13 CA 00 05, CA 00 12, CA 00 20, or a substitute form providing coverage at least as broad.

14 I. REQUIRED ENDORSEMENTS

15 1. The Commercial General Liability policy shall contain the following endorsements, which
16 shall accompany the COI:

17 a. An Additional Insured endorsement using ISO form CG 20 26 04 13 or a form at least
18 as broad naming the County of Orange, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, and
19 agents as Additional Insureds, or provide blanket coverage, which will state **AS REQUIRED BY**
20 **WRITTEN AGREEMENT.**

21 b. A primary non-contributing endorsement using ISO form CG 20 01 04 13, or a form at
22 least as broad evidencing that the CONTRACTOR's insurance is primary and any insurance or self-
23 insurance maintained by the County of Orange shall be excess and non-contributing.

24 2. The Network Security and Privacy Liability policy shall contain the following
25 endorsements which shall accompany the Certificate of Insurance:

26 a. An Additional Insured endorsement naming the County of Orange, its elected and
27 appointed officials, officers, agents and employees as Additional Insureds for its vicarious liability.

28 b. A primary and non-contributing endorsement evidencing that the Contractor's
29 insurance is primary and any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the County of Orange shall be
30 excess and non-contributing.

31 J. All insurance policies required by this Agreement shall waive all rights of subrogation against
32 the County of Orange, its elected and appointed officials, officers, agents and employees when acting
33 within the scope of their appointment or employment.

34 K. The Workers' Compensation policy shall contain a waiver of subrogation endorsement waiving
35 all rights of subrogation against the County of Orange, its elected and appointed officials, officers,
36 agents and employees, or provide blanket coverage, which will state **AS REQUIRED BY WRITTEN**
37 **AGREEMENT.**

1 L. CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY in writing within thirty (30) days of any policy
 2 cancellation and within ten (10) days for non-payment of premium and provide a copy of the
 3 cancellation notice to COUNTY. Failure to provide written notice of cancellation shall constitute a
 4 breach of CONTRACTOR's obligation hereunder and ground for COUNTY to terminate this
 5 Agreement.

6 M. If CONTRACTOR's Professional Liability and Network Security & Privacy Liability are
 7 "Claims Made" policy(ies), CONTRACTOR shall agree to maintain coverage for two (2) years
 8 following the completion of the Agreement.

9 N. The Commercial General Liability policy shall contain a "severability of interests" clause also
 10 known as a "separation of insureds" clause (standard in the ISO CG 0001 policy).

11 O. COUNTY expressly retains the right to require CONTRACTOR to increase or decrease
 12 insurance of any of the above insurance types throughout the term of this Agreement. Any increase or
 13 decrease in insurance will be as deemed by County of Orange Risk Manager as appropriate to
 14 adequately protect COUNTY.

15 P. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR in writing of changes in the insurance requirements. If
 16 CONTRACTOR does not deposit copies of acceptable COIs and endorsements with COUNTY
 17 incorporating such changes within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of such notice, such failure shall
 18 constitute a breach of CONTRACTOR's obligation hereunder and ground for termination of this
 19 Agreement by COUNTY.

20 Q. The procuring of such required policy or policies of insurance shall not be construed to limit
 21 CONTRACTOR's liability hereunder nor to fulfill the indemnification provisions and requirements of
 22 this Agreement, nor act in any way to reduce the policy coverage and limits available from the insurer.

23 R. SUBMISSION OF INSURANCE DOCUMENTS

24 1. The COI and endorsements shall be provided to COUNTY as follows:
 25 a. Prior to the start date of this Agreement.
 26 b. No later than the expiration date for each policy.
 27 c. Within thirty (30) calendar days upon receipt of written notice by COUNTY regarding
 28 changes to any of the insurance types as set forth in Subparagraph G, above.

29 2. The COI and endorsements shall be provided to the COUNTY at the address as specified in
 30 the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement.

31 3. If CONTRACTOR fails to submit the COI and endorsements that meet the insurance
 32 provisions stipulated in this Agreement by the above specified due dates, ADMINISTRATOR shall
 33 have sole discretion to impose one or both of the following:

34 a. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any or all payments due CONTRACTOR
 35 pursuant to any and all Agreements between COUNTY and CONTRACTOR until such time that the
 36 required COI and endorsements that meet the insurance provisions stipulated in this Agreement are
 37 submitted to ADMINISTRATOR.

1 reimbursement due COUNTY.

2 D. CONTRACTOR shall retain a licensed certified public accountant, who will prepare an annual
3 Single Audit as required by 31 USC 7501 – 7507, as well as its implementing regulations under 2 CFR
4 Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal
5 Awards. CONTRACTOR shall forward the Single Audit to ADMINISTRATOR within fourteen (14)
6 calendar days of receipt.

7 E. CONTRACTOR shall forward to ADMINISTRATOR a copy of any audit report within
8 fourteen (14) calendar days of receipt. Such audit shall include, but not be limited to, management,
9 financial, programmatic or any other type of audit of CONTRACTOR's operations, whether or not the
10 cost of such operation or audit is reimbursed in whole or in part through this Agreement.

11 **XIV. LICENSES AND LAWS**

12 A. CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees, affiliates, and subcontractors shall, throughout
13 the term of this Agreement, maintain all necessary licenses, permits, approvals, certificates,
14 accreditations, waivers, and exemptions necessary for the provision of the services hereunder and
15 required by the laws, regulations and requirements of the United States, the State of California,
16 COUNTY, and all other applicable governmental agencies. CONTRACTOR shall notify
17 ADMINISTRATOR immediately and in writing of its inability to obtain or maintain, irrespective of the
18 pendency of any hearings or appeals, permits, licenses, approvals, certificates, accreditations, waivers
19 and exemptions. Said inability shall be cause for termination of this Agreement.

20 **B. ENFORCEMENT OF CHILD SUPPORT OBLIGATIONS**

21 1. CONTRACTOR certifies it is in full compliance with all applicable federal and State
22 reporting requirements regarding its employees and with all lawfully served Wage and Earnings
23 Assignment Orders and Notices of Assignments and will continue to be in compliance throughout the
24 term of the Agreement with the County of Orange. Failure to comply shall constitute a material breach
25 of the Agreement and failure to cure such breach within sixty (60) calendar days of notice from the
26 COUNTY shall constitute grounds for termination of the Agreement.

27 2. CONTRACTOR agrees to furnish to ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days
28 of the award of this Agreement:

29 a. In the case of an individual contractor, his/her name, date of birth, social security
30 number, and residence address;

31 b. In the case of a contractor doing business in a form other than as an individual, the
32 name, date of birth, social security number, and residence address of each individual who owns an
33 interest of ten percent (10%) or more in the contracting entity;

34 3. It is expressly understood that this data will be transmitted to governmental agencies
35 charged with the establishment and enforcement of child support orders, or as permitted by federal
36 and/or state statute.

1 C. CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable governmental laws, regulations, and
 2 requirements as they exist now or may be hereafter amended or changed. These laws, regulations, and
 3 requirements shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

2 D. CONTRACTOR shall at all times be capable and authorized by the State of California to
3 provide treatment and bill for services provided to Medi-Cal eligible clients while working under the
4 terms of this Agreement.

5 E. CONTRACTOR shall make every reasonable effort to obtain appropriate licenses and/or
6 waivers to provide Medi-Cal billable treatment services at school or other sites requested by
7 ADMINISTRATOR.

8
9 **XV. LITERATURE, ADVERTISEMENTS, AND SOCIAL MEDIA**

10 A. Any written information or literature, including educational or promotional materials,
11 distributed by CONTRACTOR to any person or organization for purposes directly or indirectly related
12 to this Agreement must be approved at least thirty (30) days in advance and in writing by
13 ADMINISTRATOR before distribution. For the purposes of this Agreement, distribution of written
14 materials shall include, but not be limited to, pamphlets, brochures, flyers, newspaper or magazine ads,
15 and electronic media such as the Internet.

16 B. Any advertisement through radio, television broadcast, or the Internet, for educational or
17 promotional purposes, made by CONTRACTOR for purposes directly or indirectly related to this
18 Agreement must be approved in advance at least thirty (30) days and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR.

19 C. If CONTRACTOR uses social media (such as Facebook, Twitter, YouTube or other publicly
20 available social media sites) in support of the services described within this Agreement,
21 CONTRACTOR shall develop social media policies and procedures and have them available to
22 ADMINISTRATOR upon reasonable notice. CONTRACTOR shall inform ADMINISTRATOR of all
23 forms of social media used to either directly or indirectly support the services described within this
24 Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall comply with COUNTY Social Media Use Policy and Procedures as
25 they pertain to any social media developed in support of the services described within this Agreement.
26 CONTRACTOR shall also include any required funding statement information on social media when
27 required by ADMINISTRATOR.

28 D. Any information as described in Subparagraphs A. and B. above shall not imply endorsement
29 by COUNTY, unless ADMINISTRATOR consents thereto in writing.

30
31 **XVI. MAXIMUM OBLIGATION**

32 A. The Total Maximum Obligation of COUNTY for services provided in accordance with this
33 Agreement, and the separate Maximum Obligations for each period under this Agreement, are as
34 specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement, except as allowed for in
35 Subparagraph B. below.

36 B. ADMINISTRATOR may amend the Maximum Obligation by an amount not to exceed ten
37 percent (10%) of the original amount of the first year of funding for this Agreement.

1 **XVII. MINIMUM WAGE LAWS**

2 A. Pursuant to the United States of America Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended, and
3 State of California Labor Code, §1178.5, CONTRACTOR shall pay no less than the greater of the
4 federal or California Minimum Wage to all its employees that directly or indirectly provide services
5 pursuant to this Agreement, in any manner whatsoever. CONTRACTOR shall require and verify that
6 all its contractors or other persons providing services pursuant to this Agreement on behalf of
7 CONTRACTOR also pay their employees no less than the greater of the federal or California Minimum
8 Wage.

9 B. CONTRACTOR shall comply and verify that its contractors comply with all other federal and
10 State of California laws for minimum wage, overtime pay, record keeping, and child labor standards
11 pursuant to providing services pursuant to this Agreement.

12 C. Notwithstanding the minimum wage requirements provided for in this clause, CONTRACTOR,
13 where applicable, shall comply with the prevailing wage and related requirements, as provided for in
14 accordance with the provisions of Article 2 of Chapter 1, Part 7, Division 2 of the Labor Code of the
15 State of California (§§1770, et seq.), as it now exists or may hereafter be amended.

16
17 **XVIII. NONDISCRIMINATION**

18 A. EMPLOYMENT

19 1. During the term of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall not
20 unlawfully discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of his/her race,
21 religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition,
22 genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual
23 orientation, or military and veteran status. Additionally, during the term of this Agreement,
24 CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall require in its subcontracts that subcontractors shall
25 not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of his/her race,
26 religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition,
27 genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual
28 orientation, or military and veteran status.

29 2. CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall not discriminate against employees or
30 applicants for employment in the areas of employment, promotion, demotion or transfer; recruitment or
31 recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rate of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection
32 for training, including apprenticeship.

33 3. CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate between employees with spouses and employees
34 with domestic partners, or discriminate between domestic partners and spouses of those employees, in
35 the provision of benefits.

36 4. CONTRACTOR shall post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for
37 employment, notices from ADMINISTRATOR and/or the United States Equal Employment

1 Opportunity Commission setting forth the provisions of the Equal Opportunity clause.

2 5. All solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of
3 CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor shall state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration
4 for employment without regard to race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical
5 disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender
6 identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status. Such requirements
7 shall be deemed fulfilled by use of the term EOE.

8 6. Each labor union or representative of workers with which CONTRACTOR and/or
9 subcontractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding must post a
10 notice advising the labor union or workers' representative of the commitments under this
11 Nondiscrimination Paragraph and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to
12 employees and applicants for employment.

13 B. SERVICES, BENEFITS AND FACILITIES – CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor shall not
14 discriminate in the provision of services, the allocation of benefits, or in the accommodation in facilities
15 on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental
16 disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender
17 expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status in accordance with Title IX of the
18 Education Amendments of 1972 as they relate to 20 USC §1681 - §1688; Title VI of the Civil Rights
19 Act of 1964 (42 USC §2000d); the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 USC §6101); Title 9, Division
20 4, Chapter 6, Article 1 (§10800, et seq.) of the California Code of Regulations; and Title II of the
21 Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act of 2008, 42 USC 2000ff, et seq. as applicable, and all other
22 pertinent rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, and as otherwise provided by state law and
23 regulations, as all may now exist or be hereafter amended or changed. For the purpose of this
24 Nondiscrimination paragraph, Discrimination includes, but is not limited to the following based on one
25 or more of the factors identified above:

- 26 1. Denying a client or potential client any service, benefit, or accommodation.
- 27 2. Providing any service or benefit to a client which is different or is provided in a different
28 manner or at a different time from that provided to other clients.
- 29 3. Restricting a client in any way in the enjoyment of any advantage or privilege enjoyed by
30 others receiving any service or benefit.
- 31 4. Treating a client differently from others in satisfying any admission requirement or
32 condition, or eligibility requirement or condition, which individuals must meet in order to be provided
33 any service or benefit.
- 34 5. Assignment of times or places for the provision of services.

35 C. COMPLAINT PROCESS – CONTRACTOR shall establish procedures for advising all clients
36 through a written statement that CONTRACTOR's and/or subcontractor's clients may file all
37 complaints alleging discrimination in the delivery of services with CONTRACTOR, subcontractor, and

1 ADMINISTRATOR or COUNTY's Patient Rights Office.

2 1. Whenever possible, problems shall be resolved informally and at the point of service.
3 CONTRACTOR shall establish an internal informal problem resolution process for clients not able to
4 resolve such problems at the point of service. Clients may initiate a grievance or complaint directly with
5 CONTRACTOR either orally or in writing.

6 a. COUNTY shall establish a formal resolution and grievance process in the event
7 informal processes do not yield a resolution.

8 b. Throughout the problem resolution and grievance process, client rights shall be
9 maintained, including access to the Patients' Rights Office at any point in the process. Clients shall be
10 informed of their right to access the Patients' Rights Office at any time.

11 2. Within the time limits procedurally imposed, the complainant shall be notified in writing as
12 to the findings regarding the alleged complaint and, if not satisfied with the decision, may file an appeal.

13 D. PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES – CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor agree to comply
14 with the provisions of §504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, (29 USC 794 et seq., as
15 implemented in 45 CFR 84.1 et seq.), and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 as amended (42
16 USC 12101 et seq.; as implemented in 29 CFR 1630), as applicable, pertaining to the prohibition of
17 discrimination against qualified persons with disabilities in all programs or activities; and if applicable,
18 as implemented in Title 45, CFR, §84.1 et seq., as they exist now or may be hereafter amended together
19 with succeeding legislation.

20 E. RETALIATION – Neither CONTRACTOR nor subcontractor, nor its employees or agents shall
21 intimidate, coerce or take adverse action against any person for the purpose of interfering with rights
22 secured by federal or state laws, or because such person has filed a complaint, certified, assisted or
23 otherwise participated in an investigation, proceeding, hearing or any other activity undertaken to
24 enforce rights secured by federal or state law.

25 F. In the event of non-compliance with this paragraph or as otherwise provided by federal and
26 state law, this Agreement may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and
27 CONTRACTOR or subcontractor may be declared ineligible for further contracts involving federal,
28 state or county funds.

30 **XIX. NOTICES**

31 A. Unless otherwise specified, all notices, claims, correspondence, reports and/or statements
32 authorized or required by this Agreement shall be effective:

33 1. When written and deposited in the United States mail, first class postage prepaid and
34 addressed as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement or as otherwise directed
35 by ADMINISTRATOR;

36 2. When faxed, transmission confirmed;

37 3. When sent by Email; or

1 4. When accepted by U.S. Postal Service Express Mail, Federal Express, United Parcel
2 Service, or any other expedited delivery service.

3 B. Termination Notices shall be addressed as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of
4 this Agreement or as otherwise directed by ADMINISTRATOR and shall be effective when faxed,
5 transmission confirmed, or when accepted by U.S. Postal Service Express Mail, Federal Express, United
6 Parcel Service, or any other expedited delivery service.

7 C. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, within twenty-four (24) hours of
8 becoming aware of any occurrence of a serious nature, which may expose COUNTY to liability. Such
9 occurrences shall include, but not be limited to, accidents, injuries, or acts of negligence, or loss or
10 damage to any COUNTY property in possession of CONTRACTOR.

11 D. For purposes of this Agreement, any notice to be provided by COUNTY may be given by
12 ADMINISTRATOR.

13 **XX. NOTIFICATION OF DEATH**

14 A. Upon becoming aware of the death of any person served pursuant to this Agreement,
15 CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify ADMINISTRATOR.

16 B. All Notifications of Death provided to ADMINISTRATOR by CONTRACTOR shall contain
17 the name of the deceased, the date and time of death, the nature and circumstances of the death, and the
18 name(s) of CONTRACTOR's officers or employees with knowledge of the incident.

19 1. TELEPHONE NOTIFICATION – CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR by
20 telephone immediately upon becoming aware of the death due to non-terminal illness of any person
21 served pursuant to this Agreement; provided, however, weekends and holidays shall not be included for
22 purposes of computing the time within which to give telephone notice and, notwithstanding the time
23 limit herein specified, notice need only be given during normal business hours.

24 2. WRITTEN NOTIFICATION

25 a. NON-TERMINAL ILLNESS – CONTRACTOR shall hand deliver, fax, and/or send
26 via encrypted email to ADMINISTRATOR a written report within sixteen (16) hours after becoming
27 aware of the death due to non-terminal illness of any person served pursuant to this Agreement.

28 b. TERMINAL ILLNESS – CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR by written
29 report hand delivered, faxed, sent via encrypted email, and/or postmarked and sent via U.S. Mail within
30 forty-eight (48) hours of becoming aware of the death due to terminal illness of any person served
31 pursuant to this Agreement.

32 C. If there are any questions regarding the cause of death of any person served pursuant to this
33 Agreement who was diagnosed with a terminal illness, or if there are any unusual circumstances related
34 to the death, CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify ADMINISTRATOR in accordance with this
35 Notification of Death Paragraph.

36 //

1 **XXI. NOTIFICATION OF PUBLIC EVENTS AND MEETINGS**

2 A. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR of any public event or meeting funded in
3 whole or in part by the COUNTY, except for those events or meetings that are intended solely to serve
4 clients or occur in the normal course of business.

5 B. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR at least thirty (30) business days in advance
6 of any applicable public event or meeting. The notification must include the date, time, duration,
7 location and purpose of the public event or meeting. Any promotional materials or event related flyers
8 must be approved by ADMINISTRATOR prior to distribution.

9
10 **XXII. RECORDS MANAGEMENT AND MAINTENANCE**

11 A. CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees and subcontractors shall, throughout the term
12 of this Agreement, prepare, maintain and manage records appropriate to the services provided and in
13 accordance with this Agreement and all applicable requirements.

14 B. CONTRACTOR shall implement and maintain administrative, technical and physical
15 safeguards to ensure the privacy of PHI and prevent the intentional or unintentional use or disclosure of
16 PHI in violation of the HIPAA, federal and state regulations and/or CHPP. CONTRACTOR shall
17 mitigate to the extent practicable, the known harmful effect of any use or disclosure of PHI made in
18 violation of federal or state regulations and/or COUNTY policies.

19 C. CONTRACTOR's participant, client, and/or patient records shall be maintained in a secure
20 manner. CONTRACTOR shall maintain participant, client, and/or patient records and must establish
21 and implement written record management procedures.

22 D. CONTRACTOR shall retain all financial records for a minimum of seven (7) years from the
23 commencement of the contract, unless a longer period is required due to legal proceedings such as
24 litigations and/or settlement of claims.

25 E. CONTRACTOR shall make records pertaining to the costs of services, participant fees, charges,
26 billings, and revenues available at one (1) location within the limits of the County of Orange.

27 F. CONTRACTOR shall ensure all HIPAA (DRS) requirements are met. HIPAA requires that
28 clients, participants and/or patients be provided the right to access or receive a copy of their DRS and/or

30 maintained by or for a covered entity that is:

24 **XXXVIII. DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY (DHS) SEAL, LOGO, AND** 25 **FLAGS**

26 The Contractor shall not use the DHS seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of
27 DHS agency officials without specific FEMA pre-approval.

28 **XXXIX. COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL LAW, REGULATIONS, AND EXECUTIVE** 29 **ORDERS**

30 This is an acknowledgement that FEMA financial assistance will be used to fund all or a portion of the
31 contract. The Contractor will comply with all applicable Federal law, regulations, executive orders,
32 FEMA policies, procedures, and directives.

33 **XL. NO OBLIGATION BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT**

1 The Federal Government is not a party to this contract and is not subject to any obligations or liabilities
 2 to the non-Federal entity, Contractor, or any other party pertaining to any matter resulting from the
 3 contract.

 5 **XLII. PROGRAM FRAUD AND FALSE OR FRAUDULENT STATEMENTS OR**

11 The Contractor shall retain a licensed certified public accountant, who will prepare an annual Single
 12 Audit as required by 31 USC 7501 – 7507, as well as its implementing regulations under 2 CFR Part
 13 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal
 14 Awards. CONTRACTOR shall forward the Single Audit to ADMINISTRATOR within fourteen (14)

1 a written statement signed by an authorized representative indicating that the demand is made in good
2 faith, that the supporting data are accurate and complete, and that the amount requested accurately
3 reflects the Contract adjustment for which CONTRACTOR believes COUNTY is liable.

4 B. Pending the final resolution of any dispute arising under, related to, or involving this Contract,
5 CONTRACTOR agrees to proceed diligently with the performance of services secured via this Contract,
6 including the delivery of goods and/or provision of services. CONTRACTOR's failure to proceed
7 diligently shall be considered a material breach of this Contract.

8 C. Any final decision of COUNTY shall be expressly identified as such, shall be in writing, and
9 shall be signed by a COUNTY Deputy Purchasing Agent or designee. If COUNTY fails to render a
10 decision within ninety (90) calendar days after receipt of CONTRACTOR's demand, it shall be deemed
11 a final decision adverse to CONTRACTOR's contentions.

12 D. This Contract has been negotiated and executed in the State of California and shall be governed
13 by and construed under the laws of the State of California. In the event of any legal action to enforce or
14 interpret this Contract, the sole and exclusive venue shall be a court of competent jurisdiction located in
15 Orange County, California, and the Parties hereto agree to and do hereby submit to the jurisdiction of
16 such court, notwithstanding Code of Civil Procedure Section 394. Furthermore, the Parties specifically
17 agree to waive any and all rights to request that an action be transferred for adjudication to another
18 county.

10 **I. COMMON TERMS AND DEFINITIONS**

11 A. The parties agree to the following terms and definitions, and to those terms and definitions
 12 which, for convenience, are set forth elsewhere in the Agreement.

13 1. Active and Ongoing Case Load means documentation, by CONTRACTOR, for completion
 14 of entry and evaluation services provided to Clients into COUNTY’s IRIS Documentation also includes
 15 level, frequency, and duration of services received by Clients, and these services must be consistent with
 16 Clients’ level of impairments as well as treatment goals. In addition, services are to be individualized
 17 and solution-focused, using evidenced-based practices.

18 2. Administrative Support means individual(s) who is/are responsible for providing a broad
 19 range of office support to program and management staff that includes: answering and directing phone
 20 calls, writing correspondences, entering data in spreadsheets, preparing invoices for payment,
 21 maintaining tracking reports and files, and working on special projects, as assigned.

22 3. Admission means documentation, by CONTRACTOR, for completion of entry and
 23 evaluation services provided to Clients into IRIS.

24 4. Care Coordinator means an individual with a Bachelor’s degree in human services or
 25 related field who will be responsible for developing and leading the Family Team and guiding the
 26 evolution of a POC for a Client.

27 5. Client means any individual, referred or enrolled, for services under the Agreement who is
 28 living with mental, emotional, or behavioral disorders.

29 6. Crisis Intervention means a service, lasting less than twenty-four (24) hours that is provided
 30 to or on the behalf of a Client for a condition that requires more timely response than a regularly
 31 scheduled visit. Service activities may include, but are not limited to: assessment, individual therapy,
 32 collateral therapy, family therapy, case management, and psychiatric evaluation.

33 7. Data Collection System means software used for the collection, tracking, and reporting of
 34 outcomes data for Clients enrolled in the FSP programs.

35 8. DSH means the time, measured in hours and portions of hours, that a clinician spends
 36 providing services to Clients or significant others on behalf of Clients. DSH credit, both billable and
 37 //

1 non-billable minutes, is obtained by providing mental health, case management, medication support, and
2 crisis intervention services to Clients open in IRIS.

3 9. Face-to-Face Contact means, as it pertains to a FSP, a direct encounter between
4 CONTRACTOR's staff and Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s). This does not include contact by phone,
5 email, etc. For the purpose of completing an Encounter Document, Face-to-Face Contact means a direct
6 encounter between staff and Client(s), regardless if another individual(s) is/are present or not.

7 10. Family Team means a group formed to meet the needs of a FSP eligible Client through
8 whatever means possible, and this team includes a program staff, the eligible Client, the Client's family
9 members, and other support individual(s) the family agrees to include on the team.

10 11. FSP means a program model described in COUNTY's MHSA plan that has been approved
11 by the State. The MHSA plan describes how COUNTY will utilize MHSA funds to develop and
12 implement treatment plans for mental health Clients through FSPs. A FSP is an evidence-based and
13 strength-based model with the focus on the individual rather than the disease.

14 12. Group Home is a facility for housing youth and is licensed by Community Care Licensing
15 under the provisions of CCR, Title 22, Division 6, et seq.

16 13. Head of Service means an individual ultimately responsible for overseeing the program and
17 is required to be licensed as a mental health professional.

18 14. Individual Services and Support Funds (Flexible Funds) means funds used to provide
19 Clients and/or their families with immediate assistance, as deemed necessary, for the treatment of their
20 mental illness and improve their overall quality of life. Flexible Funds are generally categorized as
21 housing, Client transportation, food, clothing, medical, and miscellaneous expenditures that are
22 individualized and appropriate to support Clients' mental health treatment activities.

23 15. Intake means the initial meeting between a Client and CONTRACTOR's staff, and includes
24 an evaluation of the Client to determine if the Client meets program criteria and is willing to seek
25 services.

26 16. IRIS means the COUNTY's database system that collects Clients' information such as
27 registration, scheduled appointments, laboratory information system, invoice and reporting capabilities,
28 compliance with regulatory requirements, electronic medical records, and other relevant applications.

29 17. LCSW means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 14 of the
30 California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license
31 must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the
32 individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

33 18. LMFT means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 13 of the
34 California Business and Professions Code, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 14 of the California
35 Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be
36 current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has
37 at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

1 19. LPCC means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 13 of the
 2 California Business and Professions Code, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 16 of the California
 3 Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical service to Clients. The license must be current
 4 and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least
 5 one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

6 20. LPT means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 10 of the California
 7 Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be
 8 current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has
 9 at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

10 21. Licensed Psychologist means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter
 11 6.6 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The
 12 license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that
 13 the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

14 22. LVN means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 6.5 of the
 15 California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license
 16 must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the
 17 individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

18 23. Medical Necessity means diagnosis, impairment, and intervention related criteria as defined
 19 in the COUNTY's MHP under Medical Necessity for Medi-Cal reimbursed Specialty Mental Health
 20 Services.

21 24. Mental Health Services means an individual or a group therapy and intervention being
 22 provided to Clients that is designed to reduce mental disability and restores or improves daily
 23 functioning. These Mental Health Services must be consistent with goals of learning and development,
 24 as well as independent living and enhanced self-sufficiency. In addition, these services cannot be
 25 provided as a component of adult residential services, crisis residential treatment services, crisis
 26 intervention, crisis stabilization, day rehabilitation, or day treatment intensive. Service activities may
 27 include, but are not limited to: assessment, plan development, rehabilitation, and collateral. Also,
 28 Mental Health Services may be either Face-to-Face Contact, or by telephone with Clients or significant
 29 support individuals, and services may be provided anywhere in the community.

30 a. Assessment means a service activity, which may include a clinical analysis of the
 31 history and current status of a Client's mental, emotional, behavioral disorder, and relevant cultural
 32 issues. The Assessment also needs to include history of services being provided, diagnosis, and use of
 33 testing procedures.

34 b. Collateral means significant support individual(s) in a Client's life and is/are used to
 35 define services provided to the Client with the intent of improving or maintaining the mental health
 36 status of the Client. The Client may or may not be present for this service activity.

37 //

1 c. Co-Occurring can refer dual diagnoses of different conditions occurring within the
2 same individuals. In this case, it refers to clients who have substance use disorders as well as mental
3 health disorders. See DD Integrated Treatment Model as well.

4 d. DD Integrated Treatment Model means a program that uses a stage-wise treatment
5 model and is non-confrontational, follows behavioral principles, considers interactions between mental
6 illness and substance abuse, and has gradual expectations of abstinence. Mental illness and substance
7 abuse research has strongly indicated that a Client with co-occurring disorder needs treatment for both
8 problems to recover fully and focusing on one does not ensure the other will go away. Dual diagnosis
9 services integrate assistance for each condition by helping Clients recover from mental illness and
10 substance abuse in one setting and at the same time.

11 e. ICC Service means assessment, plan development, and intensive case management
12 services, to all Medi-Cal eligible children and youth, including foster youth that qualify under the
13 Pathways to Wellbeing (formerly Katie A.) Subclass. These services must address the child/youth's
14 mental health need(s) through the coordination of care with providers not primarily associated with
15 mental health services such as the Social Services Agency, Probation Department, schools, and other
16 community child service providers (although the client, collateral and mental health providers may also
17 be present).

18 f. IHBS Service means intensive, individualized and strength-based interventions, with all
19 Medi-Cal eligible children and youth, including those that qualify under the Pathways to Wellbeing
20 (formerly Katie A.) Subclass to assist the child/youth and his/her significant support persons to develop
21 skills to achieve the goals and objectives of the child/youth's treatment plan. IHBS only includes
22 Individual Rehabilitation and Collateral services. Mental Health Services other than Individual
23 Rehabilitation and Collateral will be claimed separately from IHBS.

24 g. Medication Support Services means services provided by licensed physicians,
25 registered nurses, or other qualified medical staff, which include: prescribing, administering, dispensing
26 and monitoring of psychiatric medications or biologicals that are necessary to alleviate symptoms of
27 mental illness. These services also include evaluation and documentation of the clinical justification
28 and effectiveness of medication, dosage, side effects, compliance, and response to medication. In
29 addition, the licensed physicians, registered nurses, or other qualified medical staff must obtain
30 informed consent from Clients prior to providing medication education and plan development related to
31 the delivery of these services and/or assessment to Clients.

32 h. Rehabilitation Service means an activity which includes assistance to improving,
33 maintaining, or restoring a Client's or group of Clients' functional skills, daily living skills, social and
34 leisure skill, grooming and personal hygiene skills, meal preparation skills, support resources and/or
35 medication education.

36 i. TCM means services that assist a Client to access needed medical, educational, social,
37 prevocational, vocational, rehabilitative, or other community services. These service activities may

1 include, but are not limited to: communicating and coordinating services through referral; monitoring
 2 service delivery to ensure Clients' access to service and the service delivery system; and tracking of
 3 Clients' progress and plan development.

4 j. TBS means one-on-one behavioral interventions with a Client, which is designed to
 5 reduce or eliminate targeted behaviors as identified in the Client's treatment plan. Collateral services are
 6 also provided to parent(s)/guardian(s) as part of TBS. Clients must be Medi-Cal eligible and meet TBS
 7 class membership and service need requirements. Documentation in the medical record must support
 8 Medical Necessity for these intensive services. Cases in which Clients are receiving more than twenty
 9 (20) hours per week of TBS or those who are expected to receive more than four months (120 days) of
 10 TBS must be approved by ADMINISTRATOR. ADMINISTRATOR has to approve individuals that
 11 are delivering these intervention services to ensure they are qualified to deliver these services.

12 k. Therapy means a therapeutic intervention that focuses primarily on symptom reduction
 13 as a means to improve functional impairments. Therapy may be delivered to a Client or a group of
 14 Clients, which may include family therapy with Client being present.

15 l. MHSA means the State of California law that provides funding for expanded
 16 community mental health services. It is also known as "Proposition 63."

17 m. Mental Health Worker means an individual who has obtained a Bachelor's degree in a
 18 mental health field or has a high school diploma along with two (2) years of experience delivering
 19 services in a mental health field.

20 n. Mentoring Services means a service that provides support to Clients by building a
 21 structured and trusting relationship over a prolonged period of time between a Client and a mentor. The
 22 mentor is a peer or older individual who provides one-to-one contact and support in the following areas
 23 to assist Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s): consistent support, guidance, and coaching in life skills;
 24 concrete help and/or other relationship-building activities to the Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s); and
 25 linking the Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s) to other services within the COUNTY and contract operated
 26 programs.

27 25. NPI means the standard unique health identifier that was adopted by the Secretary of HHS
 28 under HIPAA of 1996 for health care providers. All HIPAA covered healthcare providers, individuals,
 29 and organizations must obtain an NPI for use to identify themselves in HIPAA standard transactions.
 30 The NPI is assigned for life.

31 26. NOA-A means a Medi-Cal requirement that informs the beneficiary that she/he is not
 32 entitled to any specialty mental health service. The COUNTY has expanded the requirement for an
 33 NOA-A to all beneficiaries requesting an assessment for services and found not to meet the Medical
 34 Necessity criteria for specialty mental health services.

35 27. NPP means a document that notifies Clients of uses and disclosures of PHI. The NPP may
 36 be made by, or on behalf of, the health plan or health care provider as set forth in the of 1996 HIPAA.

37 //

1 28. Nurse Practitioner means a medical professional with an advanced degree in nursing that
2 performs a variety of duties in care settings focused around a nursing model.

3 29. Outcomes Analyst/Data Mining Analyst means an individual who ensures that an FSP
4 program maintains a focus on program outcomes. This individual will be responsible for reviewing
5 outcome data, analyzing data, and developing strategies for gathering new data from Client's
6 perspective to improve FSP's understanding of Client's needs and desires towards furthering their
7 Recovery. This individual will also provide feedback to the program and work collaboratively with the
8 employment specialist, education specialist, benefits specialist, and other staff in the program to
9 strategize and improve outcomes in service delivery. In addition, this position will be responsible for
10 attending all data and outcome related meetings and ensuring that the FSP is being proactive in all data
11 collection requirements and changes at the local and state levels.

12 30. Outreach means linking potential Clients to appropriate mental health services within the
13 community. Outreach activities will include educating the community about the services offered and
14 requirements for participation in the programs. Such activities may result in the CONTRACTOR
15 developing referral sources for Clients from various programs being offered within the community.

16 31. PBM Company means a company contracted by the COUNTY that manages the medication
17 benefits for Clients that are qualified for medication benefits.

18 32. POC means a written plan, including by reference any Juvenile Court order(s), developed
19 and signed by the Family Team that includes the following elements:

- 20 a. A statement of an overall goal or vision for the Client and Client's family.
21 b. The strengths of the Client and Client's family.
22 c. The needs, as defined by specific life areas that must be met to achieve the goal(s) of
23 the Client and Client's family.
24 d. Prevention and intervention Safety Plans.
25 e. The type, frequency, and duration of intervention strategies.
26 f. Financial responsibility for the components of the POC.
27 g. Desired outcomes.

28 33. Pre-Licensed Psychologist means an individual who has a Ph.D. or Psy.D. in Clinical
29 Psychology and is registered with the Board of Psychology as a Registered Psychologist or
30 Psychological Assistant, while acquiring hours for licensing and providing services under a waiver in
31 accordance with WIC section 575.2. The waiver may not exceed five (5) years.

32 34. Pre-Licensed Therapist means an individual who has a Master's Degree in social work or
33 MFT, PCC and is registered with the BBS as an associate clinical social worker, PCC intern, or MFT
34 intern, while acquiring hours for licensing. Registration is subject to regulations adopted by BBS.

35 35. Program Director means an individual who is responsible for all aspects of administration
36 and clinical operations of the mental health program, including development and adherence to the
37 annual budget. This individual will also be responsible for the following: hiring, development and

1 performance management of professional and support staff, and ensuring mental health treatment
2 services are provided in concert with local and state rules and regulations.

3 36. PHI means individually identifiable health information usually transmitted through
4 electronic media. PHI can be maintained in any medium as defined in the regulations, or for an entity
5 such as a health plan, transmitted or maintained in any other medium. It is created or received by a
6 covered entity and is related to the past, present, or future physical or mental health or condition of an
7 individual, provision of health care to an individual, or the past, present, or future payment for health
8 care provided to an individual.

9 37. Psychiatrist means an individual who meets the minimum professional and licensure
10 requirements set forth in Title 9, CCR, Section 623, and, preferably, has at least one (1) year of
11 experience treating children and TAY.

12 38. Psychology Student or Psychology Intern means an individual who is in school pursuing a
13 Ph.D. or Psy.D. in Clinical Psychology, and may or may not meet the criteria for a DHCS Waiver in
14 order to provide services in accordance with DHCS Information Letter No. 10-03. The waiver may not
15 exceed (5) years.

16 39. QIC means a committee that meets quarterly to review one percent (1%) of all “high-risk”
17 Medi-Cal Clients in order to monitor and evaluate the quality and appropriateness of services provided.
18 At a minimum, the committee is comprised of one (1) ADMINISTRATOR, one (1) clinician, and one
19 (1) physician who are not involved in the clinical care of the cases.

20 40. Referral means effectively linking Clients to other services within the community and
21 documenting follow-up provided within five (5) business days to assure that Clients have made contact
22 with the referred service(s).

23 41. RN means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 6 of the California
24 Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be
25 current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has
26 at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

27 42. Student Intern means student(s) currently enrolled in an accredited graduate or
28 undergraduate program and is/are accumulating supervised work experience hours as part of field work,
29 internship, or practicum requirements. Acceptable programs include all programs that assist students in
30 meeting the educational requirements to be a Licensed MFT, a Licensed CSW, a Licensed Clinical
31 Psychologist, a Licensed PCC, or to obtain a Bachelor’s degree. Individuals with graduate degrees and
32 have two (2) years of full-time experience in a mental health setting, either post-degree or as part of the
33 program leading to the graduate degree, are not considered as students.

34 43. Supervisory Review means ongoing clinical case reviews in accordance with procedures
35 developed by the COUNTY to determine the appropriateness of the diagnosis and treatment plan for
36 Clients, as well as to monitor compliance to the minimum ADMINISTRATOR and Medi-Cal charting
37 standards. Supervisory review is conducted by the program/clinic director or designee.

1 44. Token means the security device which allows an end-user to access the
2 ADMINISTRATOR's computer based IRIS.

3 45. UMDAP means the method used for determining the annual Client liability for mental
4 health services received from the COUNTY's mental health system and is set by the State of California.

5 46. Wellness Coordinator means an individual who specializes in assisting Clients with access
6 to a myriad of health care needs, nutrition resources, and other community supports. This individual
7 will be responsible for documenting the services required, as well as communicating the needs of
8 Clients to the Family Team.

9 47. Wraparound Orange County means the wraparound program administered by COUNTY's
10 SSA and is available to children and TAY who are returning from or being considered for placement in
11 group homes.

12 B. CONTRACTOR AND ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
13 Common Terms and Definitions Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

14 **II. BUDGET**

33 B. CONTRACTOR agrees that the amount of the State match is dependent upon, and shall at no
34 time be greater than, the amount of Federal Medi-Cal actually generated by CONTRACTOR, unless
35 authorized by ADMINISTRATOR.

36 C. The total cost of services provided for in the Agreement are based upon projected revenue
37

1 generation and shall be reimbursed by Federal Medi-Cal, State, and COUNTY revenues.
 2 CONTRACTOR agrees that if actual Federal Medi-Cal and State reimbursement, based upon the
 3 completed DHCS Cost Report for each Fiscal Year is less than budgeted, the Maximum Obligation shall
 4 be adjusted down by the amount of under generated Federal Medi-Cal and/or State revenue. Contractor
 5 further agrees that State MHSA (Mental Health Services Act)/Prop 63 revenues shall be used to cover
 6 the cost of services, in accordance with State MHSA funding requirements, to Medi-Cal Clients and
 7 shall not exceed the amounts specified in Subparagraph II.A. of this Exhibit A to the Agreement, unless
 8 authorized, in writing, by the ADMINISTRATOR.

9 D. In the event CONTRACTOR collects fees and insurance, including Medicare, for services
 10 provided pursuant to the Agreement, CONTRACTOR may make written application to
 11 ADMINISTRATOR to retain such revenues; provided, however, the application must specify that the
 12 fees and insurance shall be utilized exclusively to provide mental health services. ADMINISTRATOR
 13 may, at its sole discretion, approve any such retention of revenues. Approval by ADMINISTRATOR
 14 shall be in writing to CONTRACTOR and shall specify the amount of said revenues to be retained and
 15 the quantity of services to be provided by CONTRACTOR.

16 E. BUDGET/STAFFING MODIFICATIONS - CONTRACTOR shall make written application to
 17 ADMINISTRATOR, in advance, to shift funds between budgeted line items, for the purpose of meeting
 18 specific program needs or for providing continuity of care to its members, by utilizing a Budget/Staffing
 19 Modification Request form provided by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall submit a properly
 20 completed Budget/Staffing Modification Request to ADMINISTRATOR for consideration, in advance,
 21 which shall include a justification narrative specifying the purpose of the request, the amount of said
 22 funds to be shifted, and the sustaining impact of the shift as may be applicable to the current contract
 23 period and/or future contract periods. CONTRACTOR shall obtain written approval of any
 24 Budget/Staffing Modification Request(s) from ADMINISTRATOR prior to implementation by
 25 CONTRACTOR. Failure of CONTRACTOR to obtain written approval from ADMINISTRATOR for
 26 any proposed Budget/Staffing Modification Request(s) may result in disallowance of those costs.

27 F. FINANCIAL RECORDS - CONTRACTOR shall prepare and maintain accurate and complete
 28 financial records of its cost and operating expenses. Such records will reflect the actual cost of the type
 29 of service for which payment is claimed. Any apportionment of or distribution of costs, including
 30 indirect costs, to or between programs or cost centers of CONTRACTOR shall be documented, and will
 31 be made in accordance with GAAP and Medicare regulations. The Client eligibility determination and
 32 fee charged to and collected from Clients, together with a record of all invoices rendered and revenues
 33 received from any source, on behalf of Clients treated pursuant to the Agreement, must be reflected in
 34 CONTRACTOR's financial records.

35 G. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the

III. PAYMENTS

COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR monthly, in arrears, the provisional amounts of \$830,944 per month for period one, \$869,835 for period two and \$925,066 per month for period three as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of the Agreement. All payments are interim payments only, and subject to Final Settlement in accordance with the Cost Report Paragraph of the Agreement for which CONTRACTOR shall be reimbursed for the actual cost of providing the services hereunder; provided, however, the total of such payments does not exceed COUNTY's Maximum Obligation as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of the Agreement and, provided further, CONTRACTOR's costs are reimbursable pursuant to COUNTY, state, and federal regulations. ADMINISTRATOR may, at its discretion, pay supplemental invoices for any month for which the provisional amount specified above has not been fully paid.~~

A. COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR monthly, in arrears, at the provisional amount per month of \$830,944 for Period One, \$869,835 for Period Two, \$925,066 for Period Three, and \$959,275 for Period Four. All payments are interim payments only, and subject to final settlement in accordance with the Cost Report Paragraph of the Contract for which CONTRACTOR shall be reimbursed for the actual cost of providing the services, which may include Indirect Administrative Costs, as identified in Subparagraph II.A. of this Exhibit A to the Contract; provided, however, the total of such payments does not exceed the Amount not to Exceed for each period as stated in the Referenced Contract Provisions of the Contract and, provided further, CONTRACTOR's costs are reimbursable pursuant to COUNTY, state, and/or federal regulations. ADMINISTRATOR may, at its discretion, pay supplemental invoices for any month for which the provisional amount specified above has not been fully paid.

1. In support of the monthly invoice, CONTRACTOR shall submit an Expenditure and Revenue Report as specified in the Reports Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement. ADMINISTRATOR shall use the Expenditure and Revenue Report to determine payment to CONTRACTOR as specified in Subparagraphs III.A.2. and III.A.3. below.

2. If, at any time, CONTRACTOR'S Expenditure and Revenue Reports indicate that the provisional amount payment exceeds the actual cost of providing services, ADMINISTRATOR may reduce COUNTY payments to CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the difference between the year-to-date provisional amount payments to CONTRACTOR and the year-to-date actual cost incurred by CONTRACTOR.

3. If, at any time, CONTRACTOR's Expenditure and Revenue Reports indicate that the provisional amount payments are less than the actual cost of providing services, ADMINISTRATOR may authorize an increase in the provisional amount payment to CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the difference between the year-to-date provisional amount payments to CONTRACTOR and the year-to-date actual cost incurred by CONTRACTOR.

B. CONTRACTOR's invoice shall be on a form approved or supplied by COUNTY and provide

1 such information as is required by ADMINISTRATOR. Invoices are due the tenth (10th) calendar day
 2 of the month. Invoices received after the due date may not be paid within the same month. Payments to
 3 CONTRACTOR should be released by COUNTY no later than thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of
 4 the correctly completed invoice form.

5 C. All invoices to COUNTY shall be supported, at CONTRACTOR's facility, by source
 6 documentation including, but not limited to, ledgers, journals, time sheets, invoices, bank statements,
 7 cancelled checks, receipts, receiving records, and records of services provided.

8 D. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any payment if CONTRACTOR fails to comply
 9 with any provision of the Agreement.

10 E. COUNTY shall not reimburse CONTRACTOR for services provided beyond the expiration
 11 and/or termination of the Agreement, except as may otherwise be provided under the Agreement, or
 12 specifically agreed upon in a subsequent Agreement.

13 F. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
 14 Payments Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

15 **IV. REPORTS**

16 A. CONTRACTOR shall maintain records and make statistical reports as required by
 17 ADMINISTRATOR and the DHCS on forms provided by either agency.

18 B. FISCAL

19 1. Expenditure and Revenue Report. CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly Expenditure and
 20 Revenue Reports to ADMINISTRATOR. These reports will be on a form provided by
 21 ADMINISTRATOR and will report year-to-date actual costs and revenues for CONTRACTOR's
 22 program described in the Services Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement. Such reports will also
 23 include actual productivity as defined by ADMINISTRATOR.

24 2. Year-End Projections. In conjunction with the Expenditure and Revenue Report,
 25 CONTRACTOR shall provide monthly year-end projections that shall include year-to-date actual costs
 26 and revenues and anticipated year-end actual costs and revenues for CONTRACTOR's program
 27 described in the Services Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

28 3. The Expenditure and Revenue and Year-End Projection report shall be received by
 29 ADMINISTRATOR no later than the twentieth (20th) day following the end of the month being
 30 reported.

31 C. STAFFING – CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly Staffing Reports to ADMINISTRATOR.
 32 These reports shall be on a form provided by ADMINISTRATOR and shall, at a minimum, report
 33 overall FTEs of the positions stipulated in the Staffing Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement,
 34 and staff hours worked by position. The reports will be received by ADMINISTRATOR no later than
 35 twenty (20) calendar days following the end of the month being reported.

36 D. PROGRAMMATIC – Throughout the term of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall submit
 37

1 monthly programmatic reports to ADMINISTRATOR, which shall be received by ADMINISTRATOR
2 no later than twenty (20) calendar days following the end of the month being reported. Programmatic
3 reports shall be in a format(s) approved by ADMINISTRATOR and shall include a description of
4 CONTRACTOR's progress in implementing the provisions of the Agreement, number of active cases,
5 number of Client's admitted/discharged, details of outreach activities and their results, any pertinent
6 facts or interim findings, staff changes, status of licenses and/or certifications, changes in population
7 served and reasons for any such changes. CONTRACTOR shall be prepared to present and discuss their
8 programmatic reports at their monthly scheduled meetings with ADMINISTRATOR and shall state
9 whether or not it is progressing satisfactorily in achieving all the terms of the Agreement, and if not,
10 shall specify what steps are being taken to achieve satisfactory progress.

11 E. ADDITIONAL REPORTS – Upon ADMINISTRATOR's request, CONTRACTOR shall make
12 such additional reports as required by ADMINISTRATOR concerning CONTRACTOR's activities as
13 they affect the services hereunder. ADMINISTRATOR shall be specific as to the nature of information
14 requested and allow up to thirty (30) calendar days for CONTRACTOR to respond.

15 F. CONTRACTOR must request in writing any extensions to the due date of the monthly required
16 report. If an extension is approved by ADMINISTRATOR, the total extension will not exceed more
17 than five (5) calendar days.

18 G. CONTRACTOR agrees to enter psychometrics into COUNTY's EHR system as requested by
19 ADMINISTRATOR. Said psychometrics are for the COUNTY's analytical uses only, and shall not be
20 relied upon by CONTRACTOR to make clinical decisions. CONTRACTOR agrees to hold COUNTY
21 harmless, and indemnify pursuant to Section XII, from any claims that arise from non-COUNTY use of
22 said psychometrics.

23 H. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
24 Reports Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

26 **V. SERVICES**

27 **A. FACILITIES**

28 1. CONTRACTOR shall maintain a minimum of four (4) fully licensed and appropriate
29 facilities for the provision of Behavioral Health Outpatient Services for Children and Youth which
30 meet(s) the minimum requirements for Medi-Cal eligibility at the following location(s) or any other
31 location(s) approved by ADMINISTRATOR, as specified below:

3 2. CONTRACTOR shall also make an effort to provide services in community-based facilities
 4 such as school sites when appropriate for more effective provision of services to the Client.

5 3. CONTRACTOR shall maintain regularly scheduled service hours, five (5) days a week
 6 throughout the year and maintain the capability to provide services during after-school hours on
 7 weekdays until 8:00 p.m., and on weekends, if necessary, in order to accommodate Clients unable to
 8 participate during regular business hours.

9 a. CONTRACTOR's administrative staff holiday schedule shall be consistent with
 10 COUNTY's holiday schedule unless otherwise approved, in advance and in writing, by
 11 ADMINISTRATOR.

12 b. CONTRACTOR shall provide twenty-four (24) hour crisis intervention services and
 13 provide a plan for twenty-four (24) hour psychiatric emergency services to minors which includes
 14 informing Clients and their families whom to contact for emergency services when the
 15 CONTRACTOR's facility is closed.

16 4. Upon COUNTY's certification of the provider's existing site, the CONTRACTOR shall be
 17 responsible for making any necessary changes to meet Medi-Cal site standards.

18 B. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH OUTPATIENT SERVICES

19 1. CONTRACTOR shall provide outpatient mental health services primarily to COUNTY
 20 Medi-Cal eligible Clients up to the age of twenty-one (21) years old.

21 2. CONTRACTOR shall conduct outreach to develop and maintain CONTRACTOR's own
 22 referral sources to ensure sufficient caseloads to meet contractual obligations.

23 3. CONTRACTOR shall provide medically necessary services to Medi-Cal eligible, special
 24 population Clients that may include, but not be limited to, preschool children, wards and dependents of
 25 the courts, dually diagnosed children, group home and foster children, and TAY. Services shall be
 26 provided at a level and frequency and duration that is consistent with each Client's level of dysfunction
 27 and treatment goals, and consistent with individualized, solution-focused, evidenced-based practices.
 28 The population to whom services are to be provided shall include, but may not be limited to:

29 a. Children who are acutely or chronically and seriously mentally ill, and for whom
 30 hospitalization or other out-of-home placement is imminent without immediate intervention.

31 b. Children who are severely emotionally ill but not in an emergency situation who,
 32 without appropriate treatment, will deteriorate and later require more intensive and costly treatment, and
 33 possibly face removal from their homes.

34 c. Families whose children can be diverted from the regular mental health care system
 35 through parent education and consultation services.

36 d. Children at risk for psychiatric hospitalization.

37 e. Children who are having difficulty in school, or are at risk of being placed in special

1 education.

2 f. Children who are in special education.

3 g. Minors of all ages who are in group home placement and who meet the COUNTY's
4 admission criteria under the Medi-Cal Outpatient Consolidation Plan.

5 h. Foster children of all ages and underserved Clients whose mental health problems are
6 causing them impaired functioning in different life domains.

7 i. Similar children who may be referred by a CalOPTIMA primary care provider.

8 4. In the situation where a Medi-Cal Client no longer meets Medi-Cal eligibility as verified by
9 the State Medi-Cal website or Medi-Cal Eligibility Data System (MEDS), CONTRACTOR, upon
10 reasonable discovery of this situation, shall discharge the Client from IRIS and refer the Client to
11 appropriate services in the community. If necessary, CONTRACTOR can request, in writing, approval
12 from ADMINISTRATOR to continue to provide services for a specified amount of time/sessions as
13 determined appropriate by ADMINISTRATOR while linking the Client to other appropriate services.

14 ~~5. CONTRACTOR shall offer clinical intervention within five (5) business days of Client's~~
15 ~~referral for services. A sufficient amount of treatment services shall be provided during evening hours~~
16 ~~in order to accommodate Clients and their parents not able to participate during regular day-time hours.~~
17 ~~Treatment services shall include, but may not be limited to:~~

18
19 5. CONTRACTOR shall offer all Medi-Cal beneficiaries with an initial request for routine
20 outpatient services an appointment within 10 business days. Initial intake services shall be provided
21 during evening hours if necessary in order to accommodate Clients and their parents not able to
22 participate during regular day-time hours. Services shall include, but may not be limited to:

23 a. Performing clinical and psycho-diagnostic assessment using DSM-5/ICD-10 CM
24 diagnosis, to include clinical consideration of each fundamental need: physical, psychological,
25 maturational, developmental, familial, educational, social, environmental and recreational. Additional
26 examinations, tests and evaluations may be conducted as clinically indicated. Findings of the
27 examinations and evaluations shall be documented in the Client record and signed by CONTRACTOR's
28 appropriate and responsible staff.

29 b. Obtaining valid consents from parents or courts for treatment.

30 c. Developing a written treatment plan for each Client that shall be based on the
31 assessment and diagnosis of that Client. The treatment plan shall delineate and justify all specific
32 treatment modes and therapeutic modalities to be used, and shall be developed in accordance with
33 ADMINISTRATOR standards, and utilize a full range of appropriate psychiatric and psychological
34 treatment modes and modalities. All treatment/service plans, coordination plans, and assessment
35 documents shall be developed within sixty (60) calendar days from the first planned Face-to-Face
36 Contact with an individual Client and/or significant support person(s). Such plans shall identify specific
37 treatment modes, milestones for the individual Client, obstacles/symptoms, and efforts of significant

1 support person(s) and program staff on behalf of the Client. All treatment/service plans shall include
2 observable and measurable Client milestones.

3 d. Use of individual therapy, brief intensive services, and short and long-term group
4 therapy modalities including psycho-educational, cognitive behavioral and child management therapy
5 techniques. CONTRACTOR shall develop and implement group therapy modalities for conditions that,
6 according to established research, would particularly show improvement when treated in this manner.

7 e. Collateral services, including support or educational services to a Client's adult
8 caregivers to help them in their parenting role. Services shall be provided to adult caregivers when it is
9 determined that it is in the best interest in treating the minor Client, and CONTRACTOR shall promote
10 active participation of Client's family. CONTRACTOR shall refer the adult caregiver(s) to an
11 appropriate adult mental health provider for medication and/or mental health services to address the
12 adult caregiver's DSM-5/ICD-10 CM mental disorder.

13 f. Providing other mental health services which may include, but not be limited to, family
14 therapy, crisis intervention, treatment planning, discharge planning, case management, linkage, and
15 consultation.

16 g. Medication support services, including a system of medication quality review, which
17 shall be provided by well trained, experienced psychiatrists knowledgeable in the use of medication to
18 improve the functioning and enhance the self-esteem of children. Medication used solely for psychiatric
19 purposes, and no other purposes, shall be prescribed for all Clients for whom it is clinically indicated.
20 CONTRACTOR shall ensure that the following are adhered to:

21 1) Established plan for maximizing use of physician time.

22 2) CONTRACTOR shall use COUNTY's formulary and prescribing practices.

23 3) Prescriptions may be filled at any pharmacy with which the COUNTY's PBM has
24 a contract; provided that CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for noting the Medi-Cal number on
25 prescriptions for Medi-Cal Clients.

26 4) CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY, in writing, with the name, license
27 number, and Drug Enforcement Agency number of any physician who will be prescribing medications,
28 prior to the physician's start date. Failure to so notify COUNTY may result in CONTRACTOR being
29 liable for the cost of the medication.

30 5) CONTRACTOR shall order such laboratory tests as are necessary and appropriate
31 to monitor psychotropic medications and shall be responsible for the cost of such tests.

32 h. In coordination and integration with COUNTY's CYBH substance abuse counselors,
33 providing or causing to be provided, all necessary substance abuse treatment services for Clients who
34 are dually diagnosed with a concurrent substance abuse problem in addition to their mental illness, when
35 appropriate.

36 i. Providing advocacy services on behalf of the Clients including intervening for the
37 Clients with social services, probation and health departments, justice system, etc., as well as attending

1 Individual Education Program meetings when requested by COUNTY.

2 j. Providing additional services, through a wide range of service options, which may
3 include, but not be limited to, in-classroom consultation and visits to other facilities, including, but not
4 limited to, Juvenile Hall, schools, Orangewood Children and Family Center, contractor clinics, and
5 COUNTY operated clinics to provide treatment, assessment, and consultation.

6 6. CONTRACTOR shall identify Clients who may be eligible to receive TBS. If
7 CONTRACTOR is certified to provide TBS, CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY of the starting and
8 ending of each TBS case and CONTRACTOR is responsible for ensuring each and every TBS case
9 meets medical necessity and TBS eligibility requirements. The DHCS Annual Compliance Review
10 protocol section titled "Therapeutic Behavioral Services" (Section L) should be used to ensure
11 appropriate provision of TBS. If CONTRACTOR is not certified to provide TBS, CONTRACTOR shall
12 refer said Clients to COUNTY for referral to a TBS contractor agency. TBS services shall only be
13 provided through agencies certified to provide TBS.

14 7. CONTRACTOR shall identify Clients who may be eligible to receive intensive mental
15 health services as members of the Pathways to Wellbeing (Katie A.) Subclass. Contractor will use the
16 "Medi-Cal Manual for Intensive Coordination (ICC), Intensive Home Based Services (IHBS), &
17 Therapeutic Foster Care for Medi-Cal Beneficiaries" to determine eligibility, provide services, and
18 guide documentation of these services. CONTRACTOR will coordinate with COUNTY on all aspects
19 of mental health services provided to CLIENTS of the Pathways to Wellbeing (Katie A.) Subclass.

20 8. CONTRACTOR shall accept referrals from and make referrals to the various MHSA
21 programs, as appropriate. CONTRACTOR shall coordinate referrals with other existing mental health
22 services and wraparound services, to ensure that Clients and their families are given access to the most
23 appropriate level and type of service. Other services may include Wraparound Orange County; MHSA
24 FSP programs for children, TAY, or adults; and other COUNTY mental health services.

25 9. CONTRACTOR shall participate in any clinical case review and implement any
26 recommendations made by COUNTY to improve Client care.

27 10. CONTRACTOR shall conduct Supervisory Review at sixty (60) calendar day and six (6)
28 month intervals, in accordance with procedures developed by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR
29 shall conduct reviews of open cases, or previously opened with another provider based on the
30 CONTRACTOR'S own established timelines, but have up to sixty (60) days to conduct such reviews.
31 CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all chart documentation complies with all federal, state, and local
32 guidelines and standards.

33 C. CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITIES

34 1. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all staff are trained and have a clear understanding of
35 CONTRACTOR's administrative and program P&Ps. CONTRACTOR shall provide signature
36 confirmation of its P&P training for each staff member and place in their personnel files.

37 2. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all newly hired staff complete the COUNTY's New

1 Provider Training, existing staff complete the COUNTY's Annual Provider Training, and staff
2 responsible for input into IRIS complete the IRIS New User Training.

3 3. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that Annual Compliance Training is completed as set forth in
4 Subparagraph C. of the Compliance Paragraph of the Agreement.

5 4. CONTRACTOR shall agree to adopt and comply with the written Quality Improvement
6 Implementation Plan and procedures provided by ADMINISTRATOR which describe the requirements
7 for quality improvement, supervisory review, and medication monitoring.

8 5. CONTRACTOR shall agree to adopt and comply with the documentation standards as per
9 ADMINISTRATOR's Standards of Care practices; P&P's, New Provider Training, Annual Provider
10 Training; DHCS State Contract; Title IX; the State EPSDT Documentation Manual; the State EPSDT
11 TBS Documentation Manual; Medi-Cal Manual for Intensive Care Coordination (ICC), Intensive Home
12 Based Services (IHBS) & Therapeutic Foster Care (TFC) for Medi-Cal Beneficiaries, and the EPSDT
13 TBS Coordination of Care Best Practices Manual as provided by ADMINISTRATOR, which describe,
14 but are not limited to, the requirements for Medi-Cal and ADMINISTRATOR charting standards; and
15 any state regulatory requirements.

16 6. CONTRACTOR shall regularly review their charting, IRIS data input, and invoice systems
17 to ensure compliance with COUNTY and State P&Ps and establish mechanisms to prevent inaccurate
18 claim submissions.

19 7. CONTRACTOR shall maintain on file at the facility minutes and records of all quality
20 improvement meetings and processes. Such records and minutes shall also be subject to regular review
21 by ADMINISTRATOR in the manner specified in the Quality Improvement Implementation Plan and
22 ADMINISTRATOR's P&Ps.

23 8. CONTRACTOR shall attend:

24 a. Case conferences, as requested by ADMINISTRATOR to address any aspect of clinical
25 care.

26 b. Monthly meetings with ADMINISTRATOR to discuss contractual and other issues
27 related to, but not limited to compliance with P&Ps, statistics and clinical services.

28 c. Clinical staff training for individuals by ADMINISTRATOR. Such training shall be
29 conducted by CONTRACTOR and/or ADMINISTRATOR.

30 d. Quarterly QIC meetings.

31 9. CONTRACTOR shall allow ADMINISTRATOR to attend, and if necessary conduct, QIC
32 and medication monitoring meetings.

33 10. GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY - CONTRACTOR shall establish a Good Neighbor Policy,
34 which shall be reviewed and approved by ADMINISTRATOR. The policy shall include, but not be
35 limited to, staff training to deal with neighbor complaints, staff contact information available to
36 neighboring residents and complaint procedures. CONTRACTOR shall also contact city management
37 in each city where Client services are provided to inform them of the nature of the services provided

1 under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall work collaboratively with city management to resolve any
2 concerns regarding community relations.

3 D. PERFORMANCE OUTCOMES

4 1. CONTRACTOR shall complete Performance Outcome Measures as required by State
5 and/or COUNTY.

6 2. ADMINISTRATOR shall develop and provide CONTRACTOR with performance outcome
7 measure guidelines for the purpose of evaluating the impact and/or contribution of CONTRACTOR's
8 services on the well-being of COUNTY residents being served under the terms of the Agreement. The
9 expected outcomes for the Monitoring Plan are to enable Clients to adaptively function at a higher and
10 more appropriate level and to provide a quantifiable and repeatable measure to assess overall program
11 effectiveness.

12 3. CONTRACTOR shall cooperate in data collection in order to develop baseline figures for
13 future evaluation and report performance in terms of Client satisfaction, length of stay, and duration of
14 services.

15 E. TOKENS – ADMINISTRATOR shall provide CONTRACTOR the necessary number of
16 Tokens for appropriate individual staff to access IRIS at no cost to the CONTRACTOR.

17 1. CONTRACTOR recognizes Tokens are assigned to a specific individual staff member with
18 a unique password. Tokens and passwords will not be shared with anyone.

19 2. CONTRACTOR shall maintain an inventory of the Tokens, by serial number and the staff
20 member to whom each is assigned.

21 3. CONTRACTOR shall indicate in the monthly staffing report, the serial number of the
22 Token for each staff member assigned a Token.

23 4. CONTRACTOR shall return to ADMINISTRATOR all Tokens under the following
24 conditions:

- 25 a. Token of each staff member who no longer supports the Agreement;
- 26 b. Token of each staff member who no longer requires access to IRIS;
- 27 c. Token of each staff member who leaves employment of CONTRACTOR; or
- 28 d. Token is malfunctioning;
- 29 e. Termination of the Agreement.

30 5. ADMINISTRATOR shall issue Tokens for CONTRACTOR's staff members who require
31 access to IRIS upon initial training or as a replacement for malfunctioning Tokens.

32 6. CONTRACTOR shall reimburse the COUNTY for Tokens lost, stolen, or damaged through
33 acts of negligence.

34 7. CONTRACTOR shall input all IRIS data following COUNTY procedure and practice. All
35 statistical data used to monitor CONTRACTOR shall be compiled using only COUNTY IRIS reports, if
36 available, and if applicable.

37 F. CONTRACTOR shall obtain a NPI.

1 1. All HIPAA covered healthcare providers, individuals and organizations must obtain a NPI
2 for use to identify themselves in HIPAA standard transactions.

3 2. CONTRACTOR, including each employee that provides services under the Agreement,
4 will obtain a NPI upon commencement of the Agreement or prior to providing services under the
5 Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall report to ADMINISTRATOR, on a form approved or supplied by
6 ADMINISTRATOR, all NPI as soon as they are available.

7 G. CONTRACTOR shall provide the NPP for the COUNTY, as the MHP, at the time of the first
8 service provided under the Agreement to individuals who are covered by Medi-Cal and have not
9 previously received services at a COUNTY operated clinic. CONTRACTOR shall also provide, upon
10 request, the NPP for the COUNTY, as the MHP, to any individual who received services under the
11 Agreement.

12 H. CONTRACTOR shall not conduct any proselytizing activities, regardless of funding sources,
13 with respect to any individual(s) who have been referred to CONTRACTOR by COUNTY under the
14 terms of the Agreement. Further, CONTRACTOR agrees that the funds provided hereunder will not be
15 used to promote, directly or indirectly, any religion, religious creed or cult, denomination or sectarian
16 institution, or religious belief.

17 I. CONTRACTOR shall not engage in, or permit any of its employees or subcontractors, to
18 conduct research activity on COUNTY Clients without obtaining prior written authorization from
19 ADMINISTRATOR.

20 J. CONTRACTOR shall provide effective Administrative management of the budget, staffing,
21 recording, and reporting portion of the Agreement with the COUNTY. If administrative responsibilities
22 are delegated to subcontractors, CONTRACTOR must ensure that any subcontractor(s) possess the
23 qualifications and capacity to perform all delegated responsibilities. These responsibilities include, but
24 are not limited, to the following:

25 1. Designate the responsible position(s) in your organization for managing the funds allocated
26 to the program;

27 2. Maximize the use of the allocated funds;

28 3. Ensure timely and accurate reporting of monthly expenditures;

29 4. Maintain appropriate staffing levels;

30 5. Request budget and/or staffing modifications to the Agreement;

31 6. Effectively communicate and monitor the program for its success;

32 7. Track and report expenditures electronically;

33 8. Maintain electronic and telephone communication between CONTRACTOR and
34 ADMINISTRATOR; and

35 9. Act quickly to identify and solve problems.

36 K. CONTRACTOR shall document all adverse incidents affecting the physical and/or emotional
37 welfare of Clients, including but not limited to serious physical harm to self or others, serious

1 destruction of property, developments, etc., and which may raise liability issues with COUNTY.
 2 CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY within twenty-four (24) hours of any such serious adverse
 3 incident.

4 L. CONTRACTOR shall advise ADMINISTRATOR of any special incidents, conditions, or issues
 5 that adversely affect the quality or accessibility of Client-related services provided by, or under contract
 6 with, the COUNTY as identified in the ADMINISTRATOR's P&Ps.

7 M. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the
 8 Services Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

6 B. CONTRACTOR shall have as Head of Service a licensed mental health professional, in
7 conformance to one of the following staff categories: Psychiatrist, Licensed Psychologist, LCSW,
8 LPCC, Licensed MFT, RN, LVN, or LPT.

9 C. CONTRACTOR shall include bilingual/bicultural services to meet the needs of threshold
10 languages as determined by COUNTY. Whenever possible, bilingual/bicultural staff should be retained.
11 Any clinical vacancies occurring at a time when bilingual and bicultural composition of the clinical
12 staffing does not meet the above requirement must be filled with bilingual and bicultural staff unless
13 ADMINISTRATOR consents, in advance and in writing, to the filling of those positions with non-
14 bilingual staff. Salary savings resulting from such vacant positions may not be used to cover costs other

 17 State and Federal regulatory requirements.

18 L. CONTRACTOR shall provide ongoing supervision throughout all shifts to all staff, albeit paid

 20 effectiveness. Supervision methods should include debriefings and consultation as needed, individual
 21 supervision or one-on-one support, and team meetings. Supervision should be provided by a supervisor

VII. PATIENT'S RIGHTS

A. CONTRACTOR shall post the current California Department of Mental Health Patients' Rights poster as well as the Orange County HCA Mental Health Plan Grievance and Appeals poster in locations readily available to Clients and staff and have Grievance and Appeal forms in the threshold languages and envelopes readily accessible to Clients to take without having to request it on the unit.

B. In addition to those processes provided by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall have an internal grievance processes approved by ADMINISTRATOR, to which the beneficiary shall have access.

1. CONTRACTOR's grievance processes shall incorporate COUNTY's grievance, patients' rights, and/or utilization management guidelines and procedures. The patient has the right to utilize either or both grievance process simultaneously in order to resolve their dissatisfaction.

2. Title IX Rights Advocacy. This process may be initiated by a Client who registers a statutory rights violation or a denial or abuse complaint with the County Patients' Rights Office. The Patients' Rights office shall investigate the complaint, and Title IX grievance procedures shall apply, which involve ADMINISTRATOR'S Director of Behavioral Health Care and the State Patients' Rights Office.

C. The Parties agree that Clients have recourse to initiate an expression of dissatisfaction to CONTRACTOR, appeal to the County Patients' Rights Office, file a grievance, and file a Title IX complaint. The Patients' Advocate shall advise and assist the Client, investigate the cause of the grievance, and attempt to resolve the matter.

D. No provision of this Contract shall be construed as to replacing or conflicting with the duties of County Patients' Rights Office pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code Section 5500.

10 **I. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE CONTRACT**

11 **A. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND RECITALS**

12 1. The parties agree that the terms used, but not otherwise defined in the Common Terms and
 13 Definitions Paragraph of Exhibit A to the Agreement or in Subparagraph B below, shall have the same
 14 meaning given to such terms under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and their implementing regulations at 45
 15 CFR Parts 160 and 164 (“the HIPAA regulations”) as they may exist now or be hereafter amended.

16 2. The parties agree that a business associate relationship under HIPAA, the HITECH Act,
 17 and the HIPAA regulations between the CONTRACTOR and COUNTY arises to the extent that
 18 CONTRACTOR performs, or delegates to subcontractors to perform, functions or activities on behalf of
 19 COUNTY pursuant to, and as set forth in, the Agreement that are described in the definition of
 20 “Business Associate” in 45 CFR § 160.103.

21 3. The COUNTY wishes to disclose to CONTRACTOR certain information pursuant to the
 22 terms of the Agreement, some of which may constitute PHI, as defined below in Subparagraph B.10, to
 23 be used or disclosed in the course of providing services and activities pursuant to, and as set forth, in the
 24 Agreement.

25 4. The parties intend to protect the privacy and provide for the security of PHI that may be
 26 created, received, maintained, transmitted, used, or disclosed pursuant to the Agreement in compliance
 27 with the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH
 28 Act, and the HIPAA regulations as they may exist now or be hereafter amended.

29 5. The parties understand and acknowledge that HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA
 30 regulations do not pre-empt any state statutes, rules, or regulations that are not otherwise pre-empted by
 31 other Federal law(s) and impose more stringent requirements with respect to privacy of PHI.

32 6. The parties understand that the HIPAA Privacy and Security rules, as defined below in
 33 Subparagraphs B.9 and B.14, apply to the CONTRACTOR in the same manner as they apply to the
 34 covered entity (COUNTY). CONTRACTOR agrees therefore to be in compliance at all times with the
 35 terms of this Business Associate Contract, as it exists now or be hereafter updated with notice to
 36 CONTRACTOR, and the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of the
 37

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1 Privacy and the Security rules, as they may exist now or be hereafter amended, with respect to PHI and
2 electronic PHI created, received, maintained, transmitted, used, or disclosed pursuant to the Agreement.

3 B. DEFINITIONS

4 1. "Administrative Safeguards" are administrative actions, and P&Ps, to manage the selection,
5 development, implementation, and maintenance of security measures to protect ePHI and to manage the
6 conduct of CONTRACTOR's workforce in relation to the protection of that information.

7 2. "Breach" means the acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted
8 under the HIPAA Privacy Rule which compromises the security or privacy of the PHI.

9 a. Breach excludes:

10 1) Any unintentional acquisition, access, or use of PHI by a workforce member or
11 person acting under the authority of CONTRACTOR or COUNTY, if such acquisition, access, or use
12 was made in good faith and within the scope of authority and does not result in further use or disclosure
13 in a manner not permitted under the Privacy Rule.

14 2) Any inadvertent disclosure by a person who is authorized to access PHI at
15 CONTRACTOR to another person authorized to access PHI at the CONTRACTOR, or organized health
16 care arrangement in which COUNTY participates, and the information received as a result of such
17 disclosure is not further used or disclosed in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

18 3) A disclosure of PHI where CONTRACTOR or COUNTY has a good faith belief
19 that an unauthorized person to whom the disclosure was made would not reasonably have been able to
20 retain such information.

21 b. Except as provided in Subparagraph a. of this definition, an acquisition, access, use, or
22 disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule is presumed to be a breach
23 unless CONTRACTOR demonstrates that there is a low probability that the PHI has been compromised
24 based on a risk assessment of at least the following factors:

25 1) The nature and extent of the PHI involved, including the types of identifiers and the
26 likelihood of re-identification;

27 2) The unauthorized person who used the PHI or to whom the disclosure was made;

28 3) Whether the PHI was actually acquired or viewed; and

29 4) The extent to which the risk to the PHI has been mitigated.

30 3. "Data Aggregation" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy
31 Rule in 45 CFR § 164.501.

32 4. "DRS" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in 45
33 CFR § 164.501.

34 5. "Disclosure" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in 45
35 CFR § 160.103.

36 6. "Health Care Operations" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA
37 Privacy Rule in 45 CFR § 164.501.

1 7. "Individual" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in
2 45 CFR § 160.103 and shall include a person who qualifies as a personal representative in accordance
3 with 45 CFR § 164.502(g).

4 8. "Physical Safeguards" are physical measures, policies, and procedures to protect
5 CONTRACTOR's electronic information systems and related buildings and equipment, from natural
6 and environmental hazards, and unauthorized intrusion.

7 9. "The HIPAA Privacy Rule" shall mean the Standards for Privacy of Individually
8 Identifiable Health Information at 45 CFR Part 160 and Part 164, Subparts A and E.

9 10. "PHI" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in 45 CFR §
10 160.103.

11 11. "Required by Law" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy
12 Rule in 45 CFR § 164.103.

13 12. "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of the Department of HHS or his or her designee.

14 13. "Security Incident" means attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure,
15 modification, or destruction of information or interference with system operations in an information
16 system. "Security incident" does not include trivial incidents that occur on a daily basis, such as scans,
17 "pings", or unsuccessful attempts to penetrate computer networks or servers maintained by
18 CONTRACTOR.

19 14. "The HIPAA Security Rule" shall mean the Security Standards for the Protection of ePHI at
20 45 CFR Part 160, Part 162, and Part 164, Subparts A and C.

21 15. "Subcontractor" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in
22 45 CFR § 160.103.

23 16. "Technical safeguards" means the technology and the P&Ps for its use that protect
24 electronic PHI and control access to it.

25 17. "Unsecured PHI" or "PHI that is unsecured" means PHI that is not rendered unusable,
26 unreadable, or indecipherable to unauthorized individuals through the use of a technology or
27 methodology specified by the Secretary of HHS in the guidance issued on the HHS Web site.

28 18. "Use" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in 45 CFR §
29 160.103.

30 C. OBLIGATIONS AND ACTIVITIES OF CONTRACTOR AS BUSINESS ASSOCIATE

31 1. CONTRACTOR agrees not to use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to
32 CONTRACTOR other than as permitted or required by this Business Associate Contract or as required
33 by law.

34 2. CONTRACTOR agrees to use appropriate safeguards, as provided for in this Business
35 Associate Contract and the Agreement, to prevent use or disclosure of PHI COUNTY discloses to
36 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
37 other than as provided for by this Business Associate Contract.

1 3. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with the HIPAA Security Rule at Subpart C of 45 CFR
2 Part 164 with respect to ePHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates,
3 receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY.

4 4. CONTRACTOR agrees to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is
5 known to CONTRACTOR of a Use or Disclosure of PHI by CONTRACTOR in violation of the
6 requirements of this Business Associate Contract.

7 5. CONTRACTOR agrees to report to COUNTY immediately any Use or Disclosure of PHI
8 not provided for by this Business Associate Contract of which CONTRACTOR becomes aware.
9 CONTRACTOR must report Breaches of Unsecured PHI in accordance with Subparagraph E below and
10 as required by 45 CFR § 164.410.

11 6. CONTRACTOR agrees to ensure that any Subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or
12 transmit PHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree to the same restrictions and conditions that apply
13 through this Business Associate Contract to CONTRACTOR with respect to such information.

14 7. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide access, within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of a
15 written request by COUNTY, to PHI in a DRS, to COUNTY or, as directed by COUNTY, to an
16 Individual in order to meet the requirements under 45 CFR § 164.524. If CONTRACTOR maintains an
17 EHR with PHI, and an individual requests a copy of such information in an electronic format,
18 CONTRACTOR shall provide such information in an electronic format.

19 8. CONTRACTOR agrees to make any amendment(s) to PHI in a DRS that COUNTY directs
20 or agrees to pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.526 at the request of COUNTY or an Individual, within thirty
21 (30) calendar days of receipt of said request by COUNTY. CONTRACTOR agrees to notify COUNTY
22 in writing no later than ten (10) calendar days after said amendment is completed.

23 9. CONTRACTOR agrees to make internal practices, books, and records, including P&Ps,
24 relating to the use and disclosure of PHI received from, or created or received by CONTRACTOR on
25 behalf of, COUNTY available to COUNTY and the Secretary in a time and manner as determined by
26 COUNTY or as designated by the Secretary for purposes of the Secretary determining COUNTY's
27 compliance with the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

28 10. CONTRACTOR agrees to document any Disclosures of PHI COUNTY discloses to
29 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY,
30 and to make information related to such Disclosures available as would be required for COUNTY to
31 respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45
32 CFR § 164.528.

33 11. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide COUNTY or an Individual, as directed by COUNTY, in
34 a time and manner to be determined by COUNTY, that information collected in accordance with the
35 Agreement, in order to permit COUNTY to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of
36 Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528.

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1 12. CONTRACTOR agrees that to the extent CONTRACTOR carries out COUNTY's
2 obligation under the HIPAA Privacy and/or Security rules CONTRACTOR will comply with the
3 requirements of 45 CFR Part 164 that apply to COUNTY in the performance of such obligation.

4 13. If CONTRACTOR receives Social Security data from COUNTY provided to COUNTY by
5 a state agency, upon request by COUNTY, CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY with a list of all
6 employees, subcontractors, and agents who have access to the Social Security data, including
7 employees, agents, subcontractors, and agents of its subcontractors.

8 14. CONTRACTOR will notify COUNTY if CONTRACTOR is named as a defendant in a
9 criminal proceeding for a violation of HIPAA. COUNTY may terminate the Agreement, if
10 CONTRACTOR is found guilty of a criminal violation in connection with HIPAA. COUNTY may
11 terminate the Agreement, if a finding or stipulation that CONTRACTOR has violated any standard or
12 requirement of the privacy or security provisions of HIPAA, or other security or privacy laws are made
13 in any administrative or civil proceeding in which CONTRACTOR is a party or has been joined.
14 COUNTY will consider the nature and seriousness of the violation in deciding whether or not to
15 terminate the Agreement.

16 15. CONTRACTOR shall make itself and any subcontractors, employees or agents assisting
17 CONTRACTOR in the performance of its obligations under the Agreement, available to COUNTY at
18 no cost to COUNTY to testify as witnesses, or otherwise, in the event of litigation or administrative
19 proceedings being commenced against COUNTY, its directors, officers or employees based upon
20 claimed violation of HIPAA, the HIPAA regulations or other laws relating to security and privacy,
21 which involves inactions or actions by CONTRACTOR, except where CONTRACTOR or its
22 subcontractor, employee, or agent is a named adverse party.

23 16. The Parties acknowledge that federal and state laws relating to electronic data security and
24 privacy are rapidly evolving and that amendment of this Business Associate Contract may be required to
25 provide for procedures to ensure compliance with such developments. The Parties specifically agree to
26 take such action as is necessary to implement the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH
27 Act, the HIPAA regulations and other applicable laws relating to the security or privacy of PHI. Upon
28 COUNTY's request, CONTRACTOR agrees to promptly enter into negotiations with COUNTY
29 concerning an amendment to this Business Associate Contract embodying written assurances consistent
30 with the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations or other
31 applicable laws. COUNTY may terminate the Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice in the
32 event:

33 a. CONTRACTOR does not promptly enter into negotiations to amend this Business
34 Associate Contract when requested by COUNTY pursuant to this Subparagraph C; or

35 b. CONTRACTOR does not enter into an amendment providing assurances regarding the
36 safeguarding of PHI that COUNTY deems are necessary to satisfy the standards and requirements of
37 HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations.

1 17. CONTRACTOR shall work with COUNTY upon notification by CONTRACTOR to
2 COUNTY of a Breach to properly determine if any Breach exclusions exist as defined in Subparagraph
3 B.2.a above.

4 D. SECURITY RULE

5 1. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.306 and establish
6 and maintain appropriate Administrative, Physical and Technical Safeguards in accordance with 45 CFR
7 § 164.308, § 164.310, and § 164.312, with respect to electronic PHI COUNTY discloses to
8 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY.
9 CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and security program that
10 includes Administrative, Physical, and Technical Safeguards appropriate to the size and complexity of
11 CONTRACTOR's operations and the nature and scope of its activities.

12 2. CONTRACTOR shall implement reasonable and appropriate P&Ps to comply with the
13 standards, implementation specifications and other requirements of 45 CFR Part 164, Subpart C, in
14 compliance with 45 CFR § 164.316. CONTRACTOR will provide COUNTY with its current and
15 updated policies upon request.

16 3. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the continuous security of all computerized data systems
17 containing ePHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives,
18 maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall protect paper documents
19 containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives,
20 maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. These steps shall include, at a minimum:

21 a. Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed under Subparagraph
22 E., below;

23 b. Achieving and maintaining compliance with the HIPAA Security Rule, as necessary in
24 conducting operations on behalf of COUNTY;

25 c. Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and scope
26 of security established by the OMB in OMB Circular No. A-130, Appendix III - Security of Federal
27 Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for automated information systems in
28 Federal agencies;

29 4. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that any subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or
30 transmit ePHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree through a contract with CONTRACTOR to the same
31 restrictions and requirements contained in this Subparagraph D of this Business Associate Contract.

32 5. CONTRACTOR shall report to COUNTY immediately any Security Incident of which it
33 becomes aware. CONTRACTOR shall report Breaches of Unsecured PHI in accordance with
34 Subparagraph E below and as required by 45 CFR § 164.410.

35 6. CONTRACTOR shall designate a Security Officer to oversee its data security program who
36 shall be responsible for carrying out the requirements of this paragraph and for communicating on
37 security matters with COUNTY.

1 E. DATA SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

2 1. Personal Controls

3 a. Employee Training. All workforce members who assist in the performance of
4 functions or activities on behalf of COUNTY in connection with Agreement, or access or disclose PHI
5 COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on
6 behalf of COUNTY, must complete information privacy and security training, at least annually, at
7 CONTRACTOR's expense. Each workforce member who receives information privacy and security
8 training must sign a certification, indicating the member's name and the date on which the training was
9 completed. These certifications must be retained for a period of six (6) years following the termination
10 of Agreement.

11 b. Employee Discipline. Appropriate sanctions must be applied against workforce
12 members who fail to comply with any provisions of CONTRACTOR's privacy P&Ps, including
13 termination of employment where appropriate.

14 c. Confidentiality Statement. All persons that will be working with PHI COUNTY
15 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
16 COUNTY must sign a confidentiality statement that includes, at a minimum, General Use, Security and
17 Privacy Safeguards, Unacceptable Use, and Enforcement Policies. The statement must be signed by the
18 workforce member prior to access to such PHI. The statement must be renewed annually. The
19 CONTRACTOR shall retain each person's written confidentiality statement for COUNTY inspection
20 for a period of six (6) years following the termination of the Agreement.

21 d. Background Check. Before a member of the workforce may access PHI COUNTY
22 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
23 COUNTY, a background screening of that worker must be conducted. The screening should be
24 commensurate with the risk and magnitude of harm the employee could cause, with more thorough
25 screening being done for those employees who are authorized to bypass significant technical and
26 operational security controls. CONTRACTOR shall retain each workforce member's background check
27 documentation for a period of three (3) years.

28 2. Technical Security Controls

29 a. Workstation/Laptop encryption. All workstations and laptops that store PHI COUNTY
30 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
31 COUNTY either directly or temporarily must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which
32 is 128bit or higher, such as AES. The encryption solution must be full disk unless approved by the
33 COUNTY.

34 b. Server Security. Servers containing unencrypted PHI COUNTY discloses to
35 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
36 must have sufficient administrative, physical, and technical controls in place to protect that data, based
37 upon a risk assessment/system security review.

1 c. Minimum Necessary. Only the minimum necessary amount of PHI COUNTY discloses
2 to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
3 required to perform necessary business functions may be copied, downloaded, or exported.

4 d. Removable media devices. All electronic files that contain PHI COUNTY discloses to
5 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
6 must be encrypted when stored on any removable media or portable device (i.e. USB thumb drives,
7 floppies, CD/DVD, Blackberry, backup tapes etc.). Encryption must be a FIPS 140-2 certified
8 algorithm which is 128bit or higher, such as AES. Such PHI shall not be considered “removed from the
9 premises” if it is only being transported from one of CONTRACTOR’s locations to another of
10 CONTRACTOR’s locations.

11 e. Antivirus software. All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or
12 store PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or
13 transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have installed and actively use comprehensive anti-virus software
14 solution with automatic updates scheduled at least daily.

15 f. Patch Management. All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or
16 store PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or
17 transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have critical security patches applied, with system reboot if
18 necessary. There must be a documented patch management process which determines installation
19 timeframe based on risk assessment and vendor recommendations. At a maximum, all applicable
20 patches must be installed within thirty (30) days of vendor release. Applications and systems that
21 cannot be patched due to operational reasons must have compensatory controls implemented to
22 minimize risk, where possible.

23 g. User IDs and Password Controls. All users must be issued a unique user name for
24 accessing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains,
25 or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. Username must be promptly disabled, deleted, or the password
26 changed upon the transfer or termination of an employee with knowledge of the password, at maximum
27 within twenty-four (24) hours. Passwords are not to be shared. Passwords must be at least eight
28 characters and must be a non-dictionary word. Passwords must not be stored in readable format on the
29 computer. Passwords must be changed every ninety (90) days, preferably every sixty (60) days.
30 Passwords must be changed if revealed or compromised. Passwords must be composed of characters
31 from at least three (3) of the following four (4) groups from the standard keyboard:

- 32 1) Upper case letters (A-Z)
- 33 2) Lower case letters (a-z)
- 34 3) Arabic numerals (0-9)
- 35 4) Non-alphanumeric characters (punctuation symbols)

36 h. Data Destruction. When no longer needed, all PHI COUNTY discloses to
37 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY

1 must be wiped using the Gutmann or US DoD 5220.22-M (7 Pass) standard, or by degaussing. Media
 2 may also be physically destroyed in accordance with NIST Special Publication 800-88. Other methods
 3 require prior written permission by COUNTY.

4 i. System Timeout. The system providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to
 5 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
 6 must provide an automatic timeout, requiring re-authentication of the user session after no more than
 7 twenty (20) minutes of inactivity.

8 j. Warning Banners. All systems providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to
 9 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
 10 must display a warning banner stating that data is confidential, systems are logged, and system use is for
 11 business purposes only by authorized users. User must be directed to log off the system if they do not
 12 agree with these requirements.

13 k. System Logging. The system must maintain an automated audit trail which can
 14 identify the user or system process which initiates a request for PHI COUNTY discloses to
 15 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY,
 16 or which alters such PHI. The audit trail must be date and time stamped, must log both successful and
 17 failed accesses, must be read only, and must be restricted to authorized users. If such PHI is stored in a
 18 database, database logging functionality must be enabled. Audit trail data must be archived for at least
 19 three (3) years after occurrence.

20 l. Access Controls. The system providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to
 21 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
 22 must use role based access controls for all user authentications, enforcing the principle of least privilege.

23 m. Transmission encryption. All data transmissions of PHI COUNTY discloses to
 24 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
 25 outside the secure internal network must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which is
 26 128bit or higher, such as AES. Encryption can be end to end at the network level, or the data files
 27 containing PHI can be encrypted. This requirement pertains to any type of PHI in motion such as
 28 website access, file transfer, and E-Mail.

29 n. Intrusion Detection. All systems involved in accessing, holding, transporting, and
 30 protecting PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains,
 31 or transmits on behalf of COUNTY that are accessible via the Internet must be protected by a
 32 comprehensive intrusion detection and prevention solution.

33 3. Audit Controls

34 a. System Security Review. CONTRACTOR must ensure audit control mechanisms that
 35 record and examine system activity are in place. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY
 36 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
 37 COUNTY must have at least an annual system risk assessment/security review which provides

1 assurance that administrative, physical, and technical controls are functioning effectively and providing
2 adequate levels of protection. Reviews should include vulnerability scanning tools.

3 b. Log Reviews. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to
4 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
5 must have a routine procedure in place to review system logs for unauthorized access.

6 c. Change Control. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to
7 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY
8 must have a documented change control procedure that ensures separation of duties and protects the
9 confidentiality, integrity and availability of data.

10 4. Business Continuity/Disaster Recovery Control

11 a. Emergency Mode Operation Plan. CONTRACTOR must establish a documented plan
12 to enable continuation of critical business processes and protection of the security of PHI COUNTY
13 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
14 COUNTY kept in an electronic format in the event of an emergency. Emergency means any
15 circumstance or situation that causes normal computer operations to become unavailable for use in
16 performing the work required under this Agreement for more than twenty-four (24) hours.

17 b. Data Backup Plan. CONTRACTOR must have established documented procedures to
18 backup such PHI to maintain retrievable exact copies of the PHI. The plan must include a regular
19 schedule for making backups, storing backup offsite, an inventory of backup media, and an estimate of
20 the amount of time needed to restore DHCS PHI or PI should it be lost. At a minimum, the schedule
21 must be a weekly full backup and monthly offsite storage of DHCS data. BCP for CONTRACTOR and
22 COUNTY (e.g. the application owner) must merge with the DRP.

23 5. Paper Document Controls

24 a. Supervision of Data. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR
25 creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY in paper form shall not be left
26 unattended at any time, unless it is locked in a file cabinet, file room, desk or office. Unattended means
27 that information is not being observed by an employee authorized to access the information. Such PHI
28 in paper form shall not be left unattended at any time in vehicles or planes and shall not be checked in
29 baggage on commercial airplanes.

30 b. Escorting Visitors. Visitors to areas where PHI COUNTY discloses to
31 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY is
32 contained shall be escorted and such PHI shall be kept out of sight while visitors are in the area.

33 c. Confidential Destruction. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
34 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must be disposed of
35 through confidential means, such as cross cut shredding and pulverizing.

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1 d. Removal of Data. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR
2 creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must not be removed from the premises
3 of the CONTRACTOR except with express written permission of COUNTY.

4 e. Faxing. Faxes containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
5 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY shall not be left
6 unattended and fax machines shall be in secure areas. Faxes shall contain a confidentiality statement
7 notifying persons receiving faxes in error to destroy them. Fax numbers shall be verified with the
8 intended recipient before sending the fax.

9 f. Mailing. Mailings containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
10 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY shall be sealed and
11 secured from damage or inappropriate viewing of PHI to the extent possible. Mailings which include
12 five hundred (500) or more individually identifiable records containing PHI COUNTY discloses to
13 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY in
14 a single package shall be sent using a tracked mailing method which includes verification of delivery
15 and receipt, unless the prior written permission of COUNTY to use another method is obtained.

16 F. BREACH DISCOVERY AND NOTIFICATION

17 1. Following the discovery of a Breach of Unsecured PHI, CONTRACTOR shall notify
18 COUNTY of such Breach, however both parties agree to a delay in the notification if so advised by a
19 law enforcement official pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.412.

20 a. A Breach shall be treated as discovered by CONTRACTOR as of the first day on which
21 such Breach is known to CONTRACTOR or, by exercising reasonable diligence, would have been
22 known to CONTRACTOR.

23 b. CONTRACTOR shall be deemed to have knowledge of a Breach, if the Breach is
24 known, or by exercising reasonable diligence would have known, to any person who is an employee,
25 officer, or other agent of CONTRACTOR, as determined by federal common law of agency.

26 2. CONTRACTOR shall provide the notification of the Breach immediately to the COUNTY
27 Privacy Officer. CONTRACTOR's notification may be oral, but shall be followed by written
28 notification within twenty-four (24) hours of the oral notification.

29 3. CONTRACTOR's notification shall include, to the extent possible:

30 a. The identification of each Individual whose Unsecured PHI has been, or is reasonably
31 believed by CONTRACTOR to have been, accessed, acquired, used, or disclosed during the Breach;

32 b. Any other information that COUNTY is required to include in the notification to
33 Individual under 45 CFR §164.404 (c) at the time CONTRACTOR is required to notify COUNTY or
34 promptly thereafter as this information becomes available, even after the regulatory sixty (60) day
35 period set forth in 45 CFR § 164.410 (b) has elapsed, including:

36 1) A brief description of what happened, including the date of the Breach and the date
37 of the discovery of the Breach, if known;

1 2) A description of the types of Unsecured PHI that were involved in the Breach (such
2 as whether full name, social security number, date of birth, home address, account number, diagnosis,
3 disability code, or other types of information were involved);

4 3) Any steps Individuals should take to protect themselves from potential harm
5 resulting from the Breach;

6 4) A brief description of what CONTRACTOR is doing to investigate the Breach, to
7 mitigate harm to Individuals, and to protect against any future Breaches; and

8 5) Contact procedures for Individuals to ask questions or learn additional information,
9 which shall include a toll-free telephone number, an e-mail address, Web site, or postal address.

10 4. COUNTY may require CONTRACTOR to provide notice to the Individual as required in
11 45 CFR § 164.404, if it is reasonable to do so under the circumstances, at the sole discretion of the
12 COUNTY.

13 5. In the event that CONTRACTOR is responsible for a Breach of Unsecured PHI in violation
14 of the HIPAA Privacy Rule, CONTRACTOR shall have the burden of demonstrating that
15 CONTRACTOR made all notifications to COUNTY consistent with this Subparagraph F and as
16 required by the Breach notification regulations, or, in the alternative, that the acquisition, access, use, or
17 disclosure of PHI did not constitute a Breach.

18 6. CONTRACTOR shall maintain documentation of all required notifications of a Breach or
19 its risk assessment under 45 CFR § 164.402 to demonstrate that a Breach did not occur.

20 7. CONTRACTOR shall provide to COUNTY all specific and pertinent information about the
21 Breach, including the information listed in Section E.3.b.(1)-(5) above, if not yet provided, to permit
22 COUNTY to meet its notification obligations under Subpart D of 45 CFR Part 164 as soon as
23 practicable, but in no event later than fifteen (15) calendar days after CONTRACTOR's initial report of
24 the Breach to COUNTY pursuant to Subparagraph F.2. above.

25 8. CONTRACTOR shall continue to provide all additional pertinent information about the
26 Breach to COUNTY as it may become available, in reporting increments of five (5) business days after
27 the last report to COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall also respond in good faith to any reasonable
28 requests for further information, or follow-up information after report to COUNTY, when such request
29 is made by COUNTY.

30 9. If the Breach is the fault of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR shall bear all expense or
31 other costs associated with the Breach and shall reimburse COUNTY for all expenses COUNTY incurs
32 in addressing the Breach and consequences thereof, including costs of investigation, notification,
33 remediation, documentation or other costs associated with addressing the Breach.

34 G. PERMITTED USES AND DISCLOSURES BY CONTRACTOR

35 1. CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR
36 as necessary to perform functions, activities, or services for, or on behalf of, COUNTY as specified in
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1 the Agreement, provided that such use or Disclosure would not violate the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done
2 by COUNTY except for the specific Uses and Disclosures set forth below.

3 a. CONTRACTOR may use PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary,
4 for the proper management and administration of CONTRACTOR.

5 b. CONTRACTOR may disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR for the
6 proper management and administration of CONTRACTOR or to carry out the legal responsibilities of
7 CONTRACTOR, if:

8 1) The Disclosure is required by law; or

9 2) CONTRACTOR obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the PHI
10 is disclosed that it will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for
11 the purposes for which it was disclosed to the person and the person immediately notifies
12 CONTRACTOR of any instance of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has
13 been breached.

14 c. CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to
15 CONTRACTOR to provide Data Aggregation services relating to the Health Care Operations of
16 CONTRACTOR.

17 2. CONTRACTOR may use PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary, to
18 carry out legal responsibilities of CONTRACTOR.

19 3. CONTRACTOR may use and disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR
20 consistent with the minimum necessary P&Ps of COUNTY.

21 4. CONTRACTOR may use or disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR as
22 required by law.

23 H. PROHIBITED USES AND DISCLOSURES

24 1. CONTRACTOR shall not disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or
25 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY about an individual to
26 a health plan for payment or health care operations purposes if the PHI pertains solely to a health care
27 item or service for which the health care provider involved has been paid out of pocket in full and the
28 individual requests such restriction, in accordance with 42 USC § 17935(a) and 45 CFR § 164.522(a).

29 2. CONTRACTOR shall not directly or indirectly receive remuneration in exchange for PHI
30 COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on
31 behalf of COUNTY, except with the prior written consent of COUNTY and as permitted by 42 USC §
32 17935(d)(2).

33 I. OBLIGATIONS OF COUNTY

34 1. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any limitation(s) in COUNTY's notice of
35 privacy practices in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.520, to the extent that such limitation may affect
36 CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

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1 2. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any changes in, or revocation of, the permission
2 by an Individual to use or disclose his or her PHI, to the extent that such changes may affect
3 CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

4 3. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any restriction to the Use or Disclosure of PHI
5 that COUNTY has agreed to in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.522, to the extent that such restriction
6 may affect CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

7 4. COUNTY shall not request CONTRACTOR to use or disclose PHI in any manner that
8 would not be permissible under the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done by COUNTY.

9 J. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE TERMINATION

10 1. Upon COUNTY's knowledge of a material Breach or violation by CONTRACTOR of the
11 requirements of this Business Associate Contract, COUNTY shall:

12 a. Provide an opportunity for CONTRACTOR to cure the material Breach or end the
13 violation within thirty (30) business days; or

14 b. Immediately terminate the Agreement, if CONTRACTOR is unwilling or unable to
15 cure the material Breach or end the violation within thirty (30) days, provided termination of the
16 Agreement is feasible.

17 2. Upon termination of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall either destroy or return to
18 COUNTY all PHI CONTRACTOR received from COUNTY or CONTRACTOR created, maintained,
19 or received on behalf of COUNTY in conformity with the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

20 a. This provision shall apply to all PHI that is in the possession of Subcontractors or
21 agents of CONTRACTOR.

22 b. CONTRACTOR shall retain no copies of the PHI.

23 c. In the event that CONTRACTOR determines that returning or destroying the PHI is not
24 feasible, CONTRACTOR shall provide to COUNTY notification of the conditions that make return or
25 destruction infeasible. Upon determination by COUNTY that return or destruction of PHI is infeasible,
26 CONTRACTOR shall extend the protections of this Business Associate Contract to such PHI and limit
27 further Uses and Disclosures of such PHI to those purposes that make the return or destruction
28 infeasible, for as long as CONTRACTOR maintains such PHI.

29 3. The obligations of this Business Associate Contract shall survive the termination of the
30 Agreement.

 10 **I. PERSONAL INFORMATION PRIVACY AND SECURITY CONTRACT**

11 Any reference to statutory, regulatory, or contractual language herein shall be to such language as in
 12 effect or as amended.

13 A. DEFINITIONS

14 1. "Breach" shall have the meaning given to such term under the IEA and CMPPA. It shall
 15 include a "PII loss" as that term is defined in the CMPPA.

16 2. "Breach of the security of the system" shall have the meaning given to such term under the
 17 CIPA, CCC § 1798.29(d).

18 3. "CMPPA Agreement" means the CMPPA Agreement between the SSA and CHHS.

19 4. "DHCS PI" shall mean PI, as defined below, accessed in a database maintained by the
 20 COUNTY or DHCS, received by CONTRACTOR from the COUNTY or DHCS or acquired or created
 21 by CONTRACTOR in connection with performing the functions, activities and services specified in the
 22 Agreement on behalf of the COUNTY.

23 5. "IEA" shall mean the IEA currently in effect between the SSA and DHCS.

24 6. "Notice-triggering PI" shall mean the PI identified in CCC § 1798.29(e) whose
 25 unauthorized access may trigger notification requirements under CCC § 1709.29. For purposes of this
 26 provision, identity shall include, but not be limited to, name, identifying number, symbol, or other
 27 identifying particular assigned to the individual, such as a finger or voice print, a photograph or a
 28 biometric identifier. Notice-triggering PI includes PI in electronic, paper or any other medium.

29 7. "PII" shall have the meaning given to such term in the IEA and CMPPA.

30 8. "PI" shall have the meaning given to such term in CCC § 1798.3(a).

31 9. "Required by law" means a mandate contained in law that compels an entity to make a use
 32 or disclosure of PI or PII that is enforceable in a court of law. This includes, but is not limited to, court
 33 orders and court-ordered warrants, subpoenas or summons issued by a court, grand jury, a governmental
 34 or tribal inspector general, or an administrative body authorized to require the production of
 35 information, and a civil or an authorized investigative demand. It also includes Medicare conditions of
 36 participation with respect to health care providers participating in the program, and statutes or

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1 regulations that require the production of information, including statutes or regulations that require such
2 information if payment is sought under a government program providing public benefits.

3 10. "Security Incident" means the attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure,
4 modification, or destruction of PI, or confidential data utilized in complying with this Agreement; or
5 interference with system operations in an information system that processes, maintains or stores PI.

6 B. TERMS OF AGREEMENT

7 1. Permitted Uses and Disclosures of DHCS PI and PII by CONTRACTOR. Except as
8 otherwise indicated in this Exhibit, CONTRACTOR may use or disclose DHCS PI only to perform
9 functions, activities, or services for or on behalf of the COUNTY pursuant to the terms of the
10 Agreement provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the CIPA if done by the COUNTY.

11 2. Responsibilities of CONTRACTOR

12 CONTRACTOR agrees:

13 a. Nondisclosure. Not to use or disclose DHCS PI or PII other than as permitted or
14 required by this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract or as required by applicable state
15 and federal law.

16 b. Safeguards. To implement appropriate and reasonable administrative, technical, and
17 physical safeguards to protect the security, confidentiality and integrity of DHCS PI and PII, to protect
18 against anticipated threats or hazards to the security or integrity of DHCS PI and PII, and to prevent use
19 or disclosure of DHCS PI or PII other than as provided for by this Personal Information Privacy and
20 Security Contract. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and
21 security program that include administrative, technical and physical safeguards appropriate to the size
22 and complexity of CONTRACTOR's operations and the nature and scope of its activities, which
23 incorporate the requirements of Subparagraph c. below. CONTRACTOR will provide COUNTY with
24 its current policies upon request.

25 c. Security. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the continuous security of all computerized data
26 systems containing DHCS PI and PII. CONTRACTOR shall protect paper documents containing
27 DHCS PI and PII. These steps shall include, at a minimum:

28 1) Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed in Subparagraph
29 E. of the Business Associate Contract, Exhibit B to the Agreement; and

30 2) Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and
31 scope of security established by the OMB in OMB Circular No. A-130, Appendix III-Security of
32 Federal Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for automated information systems
33 in Federal agencies.

34 3) If the data obtained by CONTRACTOR from COUNTY includes PII,
35 CONTRACTOR shall also comply with the substantive privacy and security requirements in the
36 CMPPA Agreement between the SSA and the CHHS and in the Agreement between the SSA and
37 DHCS, known as the IEA. The specific sections of the IEA with substantive privacy and security

1 requirements to be complied with are sections E, F, and G, and in Attachment 4 to the IEA, Electronic
2 Information Exchange Security Requirements, Guidelines and Procedures for Federal, State and Local
3 Agencies Exchanging Electronic Information with the SSA. CONTRACTOR also agrees to ensure that
4 any of CONTRACTOR's agents or subcontractors, to whom CONTRACTOR provides DHCS PII agree
5 to the same requirements for privacy and security safeguards for confidential data that apply to
6 CONTRACTOR with respect to such information.

7 d. Mitigation of Harmful Effects. To mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect
8 that is known to CONTRACTOR of a use or disclosure of DHCS PI or PII by CONTRACTOR or its
9 subcontractors in violation of this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract.

10 e. CONTRACTOR's Agents and Subcontractors. To impose the same restrictions and
11 conditions set forth in this Personal Information and Security Contract on any subcontractors or other
12 agents with whom CONTRACTOR subcontracts any activities under the Agreement that involve the
13 disclosure of DHCS PI or PII to such subcontractors or other agents.

14 f. Availability of Information. To make DHCS PI and PII available to the DHCS and/or
15 COUNTY for purposes of oversight, inspection, amendment, and response to requests for records,
16 injunctions, judgments, and orders for production of DHCS PI and PII. If CONTRACTOR receives
17 DHCS PII, upon request by COUNTY and/or DHCS, CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY and/or
18 DHCS with a list of all employees, contractors and agents who have access to DHCS PII, including
19 employees, contractors and agents of its subcontractors and agents.

20 g. Cooperation with COUNTY. With respect to DHCS PI, to cooperate with and assist the
21 COUNTY to the extent necessary to ensure the DHCS's compliance with the applicable terms of the
22 CIPA including, but not limited to, accounting of disclosures of DHCS PI, correction of errors in DHCS
23 PI, production of DHCS PI, disclosure of a security Breach involving DHCS PI and notice of such
24 Breach to the affected individual(s).

25 h. Breaches and Security Incidents. During the term of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR
26 agrees to implement reasonable systems for the discovery of any Breach of unsecured DHCS PI and PII
27 or security incident. CONTRACTOR agrees to give notification of any Breach of unsecured DHCS PI
28 and PII or security incident in accordance with Subparagraph F, of the Business Associate Contract,
29 Exhibit B to the Agreement.

30 i. Designation of Individual Responsible for Security. CONTRACTOR shall designate an
31 individual, (e.g., Security Officer), to oversee its data security program who shall be responsible for
32 carrying out the requirements of this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract and for
33 communicating on security matters with the COUNTY.
