 8 This Amendment (“Amendment No. 1”) to Contract No. MA-042-18011851 for Children and  
 9 Transitional Age Youth Full Service Partnership/Wraparound Services for Co-Occurring Disorders is  
 10 made and entered into on July 1, 2020 (“Effective Date”) between Children’s Hospital of Orange County  
 11 dba CHOC Children’s (“Contractor”), with a place of business at 1201 West La Veta Ave., Orange, CA  
 12 92868, and the County of Orange, a political subdivision of the State of California (“County”), through  
 13 its Health Care Agency, with a place of business at 405 W. 5th St., Ste. 600, Santa Ana, CA 92701.  
 14 Contractor and County may sometimes be referred to individually as “Party” or collectively as “Parties”.

 16 RECITALS

17  
 18 WHEREAS, the Parties executed Contract No. MA-042-18011851 (“Contract”) for Children and  
 19 Transitional Age Youth Full Service Partnership/Wraparound Services for Co-Occurring Disorders,  
 20 effective May 1, 2018 through June 30, 2020, in an amount not to exceed \$5,652,581, renewable for two  
 21 additional one-year terms ; and

22 WHEREAS, the Parties now desire to enter into this Amendment No. 1 to amend Paragraph IV. of  
 23 the Contract, to amend Exhibit A of the Contract, and to renew the Contract for one year for County to  
 24 continue receiving and Contractor to continue providing the services set forth in the Contract.

25 NOW THEREFORE, Contractor and County agree to amend the Contract as follows:

4 **II. ALTERATION OF TERMS**

5 A. This Agreement, together with Exhibits A, B, and C attached hereto and incorporated herein,  
6 fully express the complete understanding of COUNTY and CONTRACTOR with respect to the subject  
7 matter of this Agreement.

8 B. Unless otherwise expressly stated in this Agreement, no addition to, or alteration of the terms of  
9 this Agreement or any Exhibits, whether written or verbal, made by the parties, their officers, employees  
10 or agents shall be valid unless made in the form of a written amendment to this Agreement, which has  
11 been formally approved and executed by both parties.

12  
13 **III. ASSIGNMENT OF DEBTS**

14 Unless this Agreement is followed without interruption by another Agreement between the parties  
15 hereto for the same services and substantially the same scope, at the termination of this Agreement,  
16 CONTRACTOR shall assign to COUNTY any debts owing to CONTRACTOR by or on behalf of  
17 persons receiving services pursuant to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify by  
18 mail each of these persons, specifying the date of assignment, the County of Orange as assignee, and the  
19 address to which payments are to be sent. Payments received by CONTRACTOR from or on behalf of  
20 said persons, shall be immediately given to COUNTY.

21  
22 **IV. COMPLIANCE**

23 A. COMPLIANCE PROGRAM - ADMINISTRATOR has established a Compliance Program for  
24 the purpose of ensuring adherence to all rules and regulations related to federal and state health care  
25 programs.

26 1. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide CONTRACTOR with a copy of the policies and  
27 procedures relating to ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and access to  
28 General Compliance and Annual Provider Trainings.

29 2. CONTRACTOR has the option to provide ADMINISTRATOR with proof of its own  
30 Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and any Compliance related policies and procedures.  
31 CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and any related policies and procedures shall  
32 be verified by ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Department to ensure they include all required  
33 elements by ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer as described in this Paragraph IV  
34 (COMPLIANCE). These elements include:

- 35 a. Designation of a Compliance Officer and/or compliance staff.  
36 b. Written standards, policies and/or procedures.  
37 c. Compliance related training and/or education program and proof of completion.

- d. Communication methods for reporting concerns to the Compliance Officer.
- e. Methodology for conducting internal monitoring and auditing.
- f. Methodology for detecting and correcting offenses.
- g. Methodology/Procedure for enforcing disciplinary standards.

3. If CONTRACTOR does not provide proof of its own Compliance program to ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall acknowledge to comply with ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct, the CONTRACTOR shall submit to the ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days of execution of this Agreement a signed acknowledgement that CONTRACTOR shall comply with ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct.

4. If CONTRACTOR elects to have its own Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and any Compliance related policies and procedures review by ADMINISTRATOR, then CONTRACTOR shall submit a copy of its compliance Program, code of Conduct and all relevant policies and procedures to ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days of execution of this Agreement. ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer, or designee, shall review said documents within a reasonable time, which shall not exceed forty five (45) calendar days, and determine if CONTRACTOR's proposed compliance program and code of conduct contain all required elements to the ADMINISTRATOR's satisfaction as consistent with the HCA's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct. ADMINISTRATOR shall inform CONTRACTOR of any missing required elements and CONTRACTOR shall revise its compliance program and code of conduct to meet ADMINISTRATOR's required elements within thirty (30) calendar days after ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer's determination and resubmit the same for review by the ADMINISTRATOR.

5. Upon written confirmation from ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer that the CONTRACTOR's compliance program, code of conduct and any Compliance related policies and procedures contain all required elements, CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Covered Individuals relative to this Agreement are made aware of CONTRACTOR's compliance program, code of conduct, related policies and procedures and contact information for the ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program.

B. SANCTION SCREENING – CONTRACTOR shall screen all Covered Individuals employed or retained to provide services related to this ~~Agreement semi-annually~~ Contract monthly to ensure that they are not designated as Ineligible Persons, as pursuant to this ~~Agreement~~ Contract. Screening shall be conducted against the General Services Administration's Excluded Parties List System or System for Award Management, the Health and Human Services/Office of Inspector General List of Excluded Individuals/Entities, and the California Medi-Cal Suspended and Ineligible Provider List, ~~and~~ the Social Security ~~Administration~~ Administration's Death Master File at date of employment, and/or any other list or system as identified by ~~the~~ ADMINISTRATOR.

1           1. For purposes of this Paragraph IV (COMPLIANCE), Covered Individuals includes all  
2 employees, interns, volunteers, contractors, subcontractors, agents, and other persons who provide  
3 health care items or services or who perform billing or coding functions on behalf of  
4 ADMINISTRATOR. Notwithstanding the above, this term does not include part-time or per-diem  
5 employees, contractors, subcontractors, agents, and other persons who are not reasonably expected to  
6 work more than one hundred sixty (160) hours per year; except that any such individuals shall become  
7 Covered Individuals at the point when they work more than one hundred sixty (160) hours during the  
8 calendar year. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Covered Individuals relative to this Agreement are  
9 made aware of ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and related policies and  
10 procedures (or CONTRACTOR's own compliance program, code of conduct and related policies and  
11 procedures if CONTRACTOR has elected to use its own).

12           2. An Ineligible Person shall be any individual or entity who:

13           a. is currently excluded, suspended, debarred or otherwise ineligible to participate in  
14 federal and state health care programs; or

15           b. has been convicted of a criminal offense related to the provision of health care items or  
16 services and has not been reinstated in the federal and state health care programs after a period of  
17 exclusion, suspension, debarment, or ineligibility.

18           3. CONTRACTOR shall screen prospective Covered Individuals prior to hire or engagement.  
19 CONTRACTOR shall not hire or engage any Ineligible Person to provide services relative to this  
20 Agreement.

21           4. CONTRACTOR shall screen all current Covered Individuals and subcontractors semi-  
22 annually to ensure that they have not become Ineligible Persons. CONTRACTOR shall also request that  
23 its subcontractors use their best efforts to verify that they are eligible to participate in all federal and  
24 State of California health programs and have not been excluded or debarred from participation in any  
25 federal or state health care programs, and to further represent to CONTRACTOR that they do not have  
26 any Ineligible Person in their employ or under contract.

27           5. Covered Individuals shall be required to disclose to CONTRACTOR immediately any  
28 debarment, exclusion or other event that makes the Covered Individual an Ineligible Person.  
29 CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately if a Covered Individual providing  
30 services directly relative to this Agreement becomes debarred, excluded or otherwise becomes an  
31 Ineligible Person.

32           6. CONTRACTOR acknowledges that Ineligible Persons are precluded from providing  
33 federal and state funded health care services by contract with COUNTY in the event that they are  
34 currently sanctioned or excluded by a federal or state law enforcement regulatory or licensing agency.  
35 If CONTRACTOR becomes aware that a Covered Individual has become an Ineligible Person,  
36 CONTRACTOR shall remove such individual from responsibility for, or involvement with, COUNTY  
37 business operations related to this Agreement.

1 7. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately if a Covered Individual or  
2 entity is currently excluded, suspended or debarred, or is identified as such after being sanction  
3 screened. Such individual or entity shall be immediately removed from participating in any activity  
4 associated with this Agreement. ADMINISTRATOR will determine appropriate repayment from, or  
5 sanction(s) to CONTRACTOR for services provided by ineligible person or individual.  
6 CONTRACTOR shall promptly return any overpayments within forty-five (45) business days after the  
7 overpayment is verified by ADMINISTRATOR.

8 C. GENERAL COMPLIANCE TRAINING – ADMINISTRATOR shall make General  
9 Compliance Training available to Covered Individuals.

10 1. CONTRACTORS that have acknowledged to comply with ADMINISTRATOR's  
11 Compliance Program shall use its best efforts to encourage completion by all Covered Individuals;  
12 provided, however, that at a minimum CONTRACTOR shall assign at least one (1) designated  
13 representative to complete the General Compliance Training when offered.

14 2. Such training will be made available to Covered Individuals within thirty (30) calendar  
15 days of employment or engagement.

16 3. Such training will be made available to each Covered Individual annually.

17 4. ADMINISTRATOR will track training completion while CONTRACTOR shall provide  
18 copies of training certification upon request.

19 5. Each Covered Individual attending a group training shall certify, in writing, attendance at  
20 compliance training. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide instruction on group training completion while  
21 CONTRACTOR shall retain the training certifications. Upon written request by ADMINISTRATOR,  
22 CONTRACTOR shall provide copies of the certifications.

23 D. SPECIALIZED PROVIDER TRAINING – ADMINISTRATOR shall make Specialized  
24 Provider Training, where appropriate, available to Covered Individuals.

25 1. CONTRACTOR shall ensure completion of Specialized Provider Training by all Covered  
26 Individuals relative to this Agreement. This includes compliance with federal and state health care  
27 program regulations and procedures or instructions otherwise communicated by regulatory agencies  
28 including the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services or their agents.

29 2. Such training will be made available to Covered Individuals within thirty (30) calendar  
30 days of employment or engagement.

31 3. Such training will be made available to each Covered Individual annually.

32 4. ADMINISTRATOR will track online completion of training while CONTRACTOR shall  
33 provide copies of the certifications upon request.

34 5. Each Covered Individual attending a group training shall certify, in writing, attendance at  
35 compliance training. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide instructions on completing the training in a  
36 group setting while CONTRACTOR shall retain the certifications. Upon written request by  
37 ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall provide copies of the certifications.

1 E. MEDICAL BILLING, CODING, AND DOCUMENTATION COMPLIANCE STANDARDS

2 1. CONTRACTOR shall take reasonable precaution to ensure that the coding of health care  
3 claims, billings and/or invoices for same are prepared and submitted in an accurate and timely manner  
4 and are consistent with federal, state and county laws and regulations. This includes compliance with  
5 Federal and state health care program regulations and procedures or instructions otherwise  
6 communicated by regulatory agencies including the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services or  
7 their agents.

8 2. CONTRACTOR shall not submit any false, fraudulent, inaccurate and/or fictitious claims  
9 for payment or reimbursement of any kind.

10 3. CONTRACTOR shall bill only for those eligible services actually rendered which are also  
11 fully documented. When such services are coded, CONTRACTOR shall use proper billing codes which  
12 accurately describes the services provided and must ensure compliance with all billing and  
13 documentation requirements.

14 4. CONTRACTOR shall act promptly to investigate and correct any problems or errors in  
15 coding of claims and billing, if and when, any such problems or errors are identified.

16 5. CONTRACTOR shall promptly return any overpayments within sixty (60) business days  
17 after the overpayment is verified by the ADMINISTRATOR.

18 F. Failure to comply with the obligations stated in this Paragraph IV (COMPLIANCE) shall  
19 constitute a breach of the Agreement on the part of CONTRACTOR and ground for COUNTY to  
20 terminate the Agreement. Unless the circumstances require a sooner period of cure, CONTRACTOR  
21 shall have thirty (30) calendar days from the date of the written notice of default to cure any defaults  
22 grounded on this Paragraph IV (COMPLIANCE) prior to ADMINISTRATOR's right to terminate this  
23 Agreement on the basis of such default.

24  
25 **V. CONFIDENTIALITY**

26 A. CONTRACTOR shall maintain the confidentiality of all records, including billings and any  
27 audio and/or video recordings, in accordance with all applicable federal, state and county codes and  
28 regulations, as they now exist or may hereafter be amended or changed.

29 1. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that all persons served pursuant to this  
30 Agreement are clients of the Orange County Mental Health services system, and therefore it may be  
31 necessary for authorized staff of ADMINISTRATOR to audit client files, or to exchange information  
32 regarding specific clients with COUNTY or other providers of related services contracting with  
33 COUNTY.

34 2. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that it shall be responsible for obtaining written  
35 consents for the release of information from all persons served by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this  
36 Agreement. Such consents shall be obtained by CONTRACTOR in accordance with CCC, Division 1,  
37 Part 2.6, relating to confidentiality of medical information.

1           3. In the event of a collaborative service agreement between Mental Health services providers,  
2 CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that it is responsible for obtaining releases of information,  
3 from the collaborative agency, for clients receiving services through the collaborative agreement.

4           B. Prior to providing any services pursuant to this Agreement, all members of the Board of  
5 Directors or its designee or authorized agent, employees, consultants, subcontractors, volunteers and  
6 interns of the CONTRACTOR shall agree, in writing, with CONTRACTOR to maintain the  
7 confidentiality of any and all information and records which may be obtained in the course of providing  
8 such services. This Agreement shall specify that it is effective irrespective of all subsequent  
9 resignations or terminations of CONTRACTOR members of the Board of Directors or its designee or  
10 authorized agent, employees, consultants, subcontractors, volunteers and interns.

11           C. CONTRACTOR shall have in effect a system to protect patient records from inappropriate  
12 disclosure in connection with activity funded under this Agreement. This system shall include  
13 provisions for employee education on the confidentiality requirements, and the fact that disciplinary  
14 action may occur upon inappropriate disclosure. CONTRACTOR agrees to implement administrative,  
15 physical, and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect the confidentiality,  
16 integrity, and availability of all confidential information that it creates, receives, maintains or transmits.  
17 CONTRACTOR shall provide ADMINISTRATOR with information concerning such safeguards.

18           D. CONTRACTOR agrees to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known  
19 to CONTRACTOR, or its subcontractors or agents in violation of the applicable state and federal  
20 regulations regarding confidentiality.

21           E. CONTRACTOR shall monitor compliance with the above provisions on confidentiality and  
22 security, and shall include them in all subcontracts.

23           F. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR within twenty-four (24) hours during a work  
24 week of any actual breach, as defined under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA Regulations,  
25 involving COUNTY Client information in CONTRACTOR's possession, in any medium, that  
26 CONTRACTOR becomes aware of, through exercise of reasonable care, and is legally required to  
27 report in accordance with applicable State and/or Federal breach notification laws. The aforementioned  
28 COUNTY Client information is solely related to the services rendered by CONTRACTOR pursuant to  
29 this Agreement.

CONTRACTOR shall prepare the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report in accordance with all applicable federal, state and COUNTY requirements, GAAP and the Special Provisions Paragraph of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall allocate direct and indirect costs to and between programs, cost centers, services, and funding sources in accordance with such requirements and consistent with prudent business practice, which costs and allocations shall be supported by source documentation maintained by CONTRACTOR, and available at any time to ADMINISTRATOR upon reasonable notice. In the event CONTRACTOR has multiple Agreements for mental health services that are administered by HCA, consolidation of the individual Cost Reports into a single consolidated Cost Report may be required, as stipulated by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall submit the consolidated Cost Report to COUNTY no later than five (5) business days following approval by ADMINSTRATOR of all individual Cost Reports to be incorporated into a consolidated Cost Report.

If CONTRACTOR fails to submit an accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report within the time period specified above, ADMINISTRATOR may withhold outstanding payments in an amount no greater than \$5,000 limited only to payments due to CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement until such time that the accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report is delivered to ADMINISTRATOR.

2. CONTRACTOR may request, in advance and in writing, an extension of the due date of the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report setting forth good cause for justification of the request. Approval of such requests shall be at the sole discretion of ADMINISTRATOR and shall not be unreasonably denied.

B. The individual and/or consolidated Cost Report prepared for each period shall be the final financial and statistical report submitted by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY, and shall serve as the basis for final settlement to CONTRACTOR for that period. CONTRACTOR shall document that costs are reasonable and allowable and directly or indirectly related to the services to be provided hereunder. The individual and/or consolidated Cost Report shall be the final financial record for subsequent audits, if any.

C. Final settlement shall be based upon the actual and reimbursable costs for services hereunder, less applicable revenues and any late penalty, not to exceed COUNTY's Maximum Obligation as set forth in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall not claim expenditures to COUNTY which are not reimbursable pursuant to applicable federal, state and COUNTY laws, regulations and requirements. Any payment made by COUNTY to CONTRACTOR, which is subsequently determined to have been for an unreimbursable expenditure or service, shall be repaid by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY in cash, or other authorized form of payment, within thirty (30) calendar days of submission of the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report or COUNTY may elect to reduce any amount owed CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the reimbursement due COUNTY.

D. Unless approved by ADMINISTRATOR, costs that exceed the Statewide Maximum Allowance (SMA) rates per Medi-Cal Unit of Services, as determined by the DHCS, shall be unreimbursable to CONTRACTOR.

E. In the event that CONTRACTOR is authorized to retain unanticipated revenues as described in the Budget Paragraph of Exhibit A to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall specify in the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report the services rendered with such revenues.

F. All individual and/or consolidated Cost Reports shall contain the following attestation, which may be typed directly on or attached to the Cost Report:

**VII. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION CERTIFICATION**

A. CONTRACTOR certifies that it and its principals:

1. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, and declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded by any federal department or agency.



1           2. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Agreement been convicted of or had a  
2 civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with  
3 obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state, or local) transaction or contract

29           B. CONTRACTOR may not assign the rights hereunder, either in whole or in part, without the  
30 prior written consent of COUNTY.

31           1. If CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit organization, any change from a nonprofit corporation to  
32 any other corporate structure of CONTRACTOR, including a change in more than fifty percent (50%)  
33 of the composition of the Board of Directors within a two (2) month period of time, shall be deemed an  
34 assignment for purposes of this paragraph, unless CONTRACTOR is transitioning from a community  
35 clinic/health center to a Federally Qualified Health Center and has been so designated by the Federal  
36 Government. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

1 2. If CONTRACTOR is a for-profit organization, any change in the business structure,  
2 including but not limited to, the sale or transfer of more than ten percent (10%) of the assets or stocks of  
3 CONTRACTOR, change to another corporate structure, including a change to a sole proprietorship, or a  
4 change in fifty percent (50%) or more of Board of Directors or any governing body of CONTRACTOR  
5 at one time shall be deemed an assignment pursuant to this paragraph. Any attempted assignment or  
6 delegation in derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

7 3. If CONTRACTOR is a governmental organization, any change to another structure,  
8 including a change in more than fifty percent (50%) of the composition of its governing body (i.e. Board  
9 of Supervisors, City Council, School Board) within a two (2) month period of time, shall be deemed an  
10 assignment for purposes of this paragraph. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of  
11 this subparagraph shall be void.

12 4. Whether CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit, for-profit, or a governmental organization,  
13 CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification of CONTRACTOR’s intent to assign the obligations  
14 hereunder, either in whole or part, to ADMINISTRATOR not less than sixty (60) calendar days prior to  
15 the effective date of the assignment.

16 5. Whether CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit, for-profit, or a governmental organization,  
17 CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification within thirty (30) calendar days to  
18 ADMINISTRATOR when there is change of less than fifty percent (50%) of Board of Directors or any  
19 governing body of CONTRACTOR at one time.

20 C. CONTRACTOR’s obligations undertaken pursuant to this Agreement may be carried out by  
21 means of subcontracts, provided such subcontracts meet the requirements of this Agreement as they  
22 relate to the service or activity under subcontract, and include any provisions that ADMINISTRATOR  
23 may require.

24 1. After approval of a subcontract, ADMINISTRATOR may revoke the approval of a  
25 subcontract upon five (5) calendar days’ written notice to CONTRACTOR if the subcontract  
26 subsequently fails to meet the requirements of this Agreement or any provisions that  
27 ADMINISTRATOR has required.

28 2. No subcontract shall terminate or alter the responsibilities of CONTRACTOR to COUNTY  
29 pursuant to this Agreement.

30 3. ADMINISTRATOR may disallow, from payments otherwise due CONTRACTOR,  
31 amounts claimed for subcontracts not approved in accordance with this paragraph.

32 4. This provision shall not be applicable to service agreements usually and customarily  
33 entered into by CONTRACTOR to obtain or arrange for supplies, technical support, and professional  
34 services provided by consultants.

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1 **IX. EMPLOYEE ELIGIBILITY VERIFICATION**

2 CONTRACTOR warrants that it shall fully comply with all federal and state statutes and  
3 regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and to ensure that employees, subcontractors,  
4 and consultants performing work under this Agreement meet the citizenship or alien status requirements  
5 set forth in federal statutes and regulations. CONTRACTOR shall obtain, from all employees,  
6 subcontractors, and consultants performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of  
7 employment eligibility status required by federal or state statutes and regulations including, but not  
8 limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 USC §1324 et seq., as they currently  
9 exist and as they may be hereafter amended. CONTRACTOR shall retain all such documentation for all  
10 covered employees, subcontractors, and consultants for the period prescribed by the law.

12 **X. EQUIPMENT**

13 A. Unless otherwise specified in writing by ADMINISTRATOR, Equipment is defined as all  
14 property of a Relatively Permanent nature with significant value, purchased in whole or in part by  
15 ADMINISTRATOR to assist in performing the services described in this Agreement. “Relatively  
16 Permanent” is defined as having a useful life of one year or longer. Equipment which costs \$5,000 or  
17 over, including freight charges, sales taxes, and other taxes, and installation costs are defined as Capital  
18 Assets. Equipment which costs between \$600 and \$5,000, including freight charges, sales taxes and  
19 other taxes, and installation costs, or electronic equipment that costs less than \$600 but may contained  
20 PHI or PII, are defined as Controlled Equipment. Controlled Equipment includes, but is not limited to  
21 phones, tablets, audio/visual equipment, computer equipment, and lab equipment. The cost of  
22 Equipment purchased, in whole or in part, with funds paid pursuant to this Agreement shall be  
23 depreciated according to GAAP.

24 B. CONTRACTOR shall obtain ADMINISTRATOR’s prior written approval to purchase any  
25 Equipment with funds paid pursuant to this Agreement. Upon delivery of Equipment, CONTRACTOR  
26 shall forward to ADMINISTRATOR, copies of the purchase order, receipt, and other supporting  
27 documentation, which includes delivery date, unit price, tax, shipping and serial numbers.  
28 CONTRACTOR shall request an applicable asset tag for said Equipment and shall include each  
29 purchased asset in an Equipment inventory.

30 C. Upon ADMINISTRATOR’s prior written approval, CONTRACTOR may expense to  
31 COUNTY the cost of the approved Equipment purchased by CONTRACTOR. To “expense,” in  
32 relation to Equipment, means to charge the proportionate cost of Equipment in the fiscal year in which it  
33 is purchased. Title of expensed Equipment shall be vested with COUNTY.

34 D. CONTRACTOR shall maintain an inventory of all Equipment purchased in whole or in part  
35 with funds paid through this Agreement, including date of purchase, purchase price, serial number,  
36 model and type of Equipment. Such inventory shall be available for review by ADMINISTRATOR,  
37 //

1 and shall include the original purchase date and price, useful life, and balance of depreciated Equipment  
2 cost, if any.

3 E. CONTRACTOR shall cooperate with ADMINISTRATOR in conducting periodic physical  
4 inventories of all Equipment. Upon demand by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall return any  
5 or all Equipment to COUNTY.

6 F. CONTRACTOR must report any loss or theft of Equipment in accordance with the procedure  
7 approved by ADMINISTRATOR and the Notices Paragraph of this Agreement. In addition,  
8 CONTRACTOR must complete and submit to ADMINISTRATOR a notification form when items of  
9 Equipment are moved from one location to another or returned to COUNTY as surplus.

10 G. Unless this Agreement is followed without interruption by another agreement between the  
11 parties for substantially the same type and scope of services, at the termination of this Agreement for  
12 any cause, CONTRACTOR shall return to COUNTY all Equipment purchased with funds paid through  
13 this Agreement.

14 H. CONTRACTOR shall maintain and administer a sound business program for ensuring the  
15 proper use, maintenance, repair, protection, insurance, and preservation of COUNTY Equipment.

#### 16 17 **XI. FACILITIES, PAYMENTS AND SERVICES**

18 A. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide the services, staffing, facilities, and supplies in accordance  
19 with this Agreement. COUNTY shall compensate, and authorize, when applicable, said services.  
20 CONTRACTOR shall operate continuously throughout the term of this Agreement with at least the  
21 minimum number and type of staff which meet applicable federal and state requirements, and which are  
22 necessary for the provision of the services hereunder.

23 B. In the event that CONTRACTOR is unable to provide the services, staffing, facilities, or  
24 supplies as required, ADMINISTRATOR may, at its sole discretion, reduce the Maximum Obligation  
25 for the appropriate Period as well as the Total Maximum Obligation. The reduction to the Maximum  
26 Obligation for the appropriate Period as well as the Total Maximum Obligation shall be in an amount  
27 proportionate to the number of days in which CONTRACTOR was determined to be unable to provide  
28 services, staffing, facilities or supplies.

#### 29 30 **XII. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE**

31 A. CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by COUNTY,  
32 and hold COUNTY, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents and those special  
33 districts and agencies for which COUNTY's Board of Supervisors acts as the governing Board  
34 ("COUNTY INDEMNITEES") harmless from any claims, demands or liability of any kind or nature,  
35 including but not limited to personal injury or property damage, arising from or related to the services,  
36 products or other performance provided by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement. If judgment is  
37 entered against CONTRACTOR and COUNTY by a court of competent jurisdiction because of the

1 concurrent active negligence of COUNTY or COUNTY INDEMNITEES, CONTRACTOR and  
2 COUNTY agree that liability will be apportioned as determined by the court. Neither party shall request  
3 a jury apportionment.

4 B. Prior to the provision of services under this Agreement, CONTRACTOR agrees to purchase all  
5 required insurance at CONTRACTOR's expense and to submit to COUNTY the COI, including all  
6 endorsements required herein, necessary to satisfy COUNTY that the insurance provisions of this  
7 Agreement have been complied with and to maintain such insurance coverage with COUNTY during  
8 the entire term of this Agreement. In addition, all subcontractors performing work on behalf of  
9 CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement shall obtain insurance subject to the same terms and  
10 conditions as set forth herein for CONTRACTOR.

11 C. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all subcontractors performing work on behalf of  
12 CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement shall be covered under CONTRACTOR's insurance as an  
13 Additional Insured or maintain insurance subject to the same terms and conditions as set forth herein for  
14 CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall not allow subcontractors to work if subcontractors have less  
15 than the level of coverage required by COUNTY from CONTRACTOR under this Agreement. It is the  
16 obligation of CONTRACTOR to provide notice of the insurance requirements to every subcontractor  
17 and to receive proof of insurance prior to allowing any subcontractor to begin work. Such proof of  
18 insurance must be maintained by CONTRACTOR through the entirety of this Agreement for inspection  
19 by COUNTY representative(s) at any reasonable time.

20 D. All SIRs and deductibles shall be clearly stated on the COI. If no SIRs or deductibles apply,  
21 indicate this on the COI with a zero (0) by the appropriate line of coverage. Any SIR or deductible in an  
22 amount in excess of \$50,000 (\$5,000 for automobile liability), shall specifically be approved by the  
23 CEO/Office of Risk Management upon review of CONTRACTOR's current audited financial report. If  
24 CONTRACTOR's SIR is approved, CONTRACTOR, in addition to, and without limitation of, any  
25 other indemnity provision(s) in this Agreement, agrees to all of the following:

26 1. In addition to the duty to indemnify and hold the COUNTY harmless against any and all  
27 liability, claim, demand or suit resulting from CONTRACTOR's, its agents, employee's or  
28 subcontractor's performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall defend the COUNTY at its sole  
29 cost and expense with counsel approved by Board of Supervisors against same; and

30 2. CONTRACTOR's duty to defend, as stated above, shall be absolute and irrespective of any  
31 duty to indemnify or hold harmless; and

32 3. The provisions of California Civil Code Section 2860 shall apply to any and all actions to  
33 which the duty to defend stated above applies, and the CONTRACTOR's SIR provision shall be  
34 interpreted as though the CONTRACTOR was an insurer and the COUNTY was the insured.

35 E. If CONTRACTOR fails to maintain insurance as required in this Paragraph XII  
36 (INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE) for the full term of this Agreement, such failure shall

37 //

1 constitute a breach of CONTRACTOR's obligation hereunder and ground for COUNTY to terminate  
2 this Agreement.

3 F. QUALIFIED INSURER

4 1. The policy or policies of insurance must be issued by an insurer with a minimum rating of  
5 A- (Secure A.M. Best's Rating) and VIII (Financial Size Category as determined by the most current  
6 edition of the Best's Key Rating Guide/Property-Casualty/United States or ambest.com). It is preferred,  
7 but not mandatory, that the insurer be licensed to do business in the state of California (California  
8 Admitted Carrier).

9 2. If the insurance carrier does not have an A.M. Best Rating of A-/VIII, the CEO/Office of  
10 Risk Management retains the right to approve or reject a carrier after a review of the company's  
11 performance and financial ratings.

12 G. The policy or policies of insurance maintained by CONTRACTOR shall provide the minimum  
13 limits and coverage as set forth below:

1 I. REQUIRED ENDORSEMENTS

2 1. The Commercial General Liability policy shall contain the following endorsements, which  
3 shall accompany the COI:

4 a. An Additional Insured endorsement using ISO form CG 20 26 04 13 or a form at least  
5 as broad naming the County of Orange, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, and  
6 agents as Additional Insureds, or provide blanket coverage, which will state AS REQUIRED BY  
7 WRITTEN AGREEMENT.

8 b. A primary non-contributing endorsement using ISO form CG 20 01 04 13, or a form at  
9 least as broad evidencing that the CONTRACTOR's insurance is primary and any insurance or self-  
10 insurance maintained by the County of Orange shall be excess and non-contributing.

11 2. The Network Security and Privacy Liability policy shall contain the following  
12 endorsements which shall accompany the Certificate of Insurance:

13 a. An Additional Insured endorsement naming the County of Orange, its elected and  
14 appointed officials, officers, agents and employees as Additional Insureds for its vicarious liability.

15 b. A primary and non-contributing endorsement evidencing that the Contractor's

18 J. All insurance policies required by this Agreement shall waive all rights of subrogation against

21 K. The Workers' Compensation policy shall contain a waiver of subrogation endorsement waiving  
22 all rights of subrogation against the County of Orange, its elected and appointed officials, officers,  
23 agents and employees, or provide blanket coverage, which will state AS REQUIRED BY WRITTEN  
24 AGREEMENT.

25 L. CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY in writing within thirty (30) days of any policy  
26 cancellation and within ten (10) days for non-payment of premium and provide a copy of the  
27 cancellation notice to COUNTY. Failure to provide written notice of cancellation shall constitute a  
28 breach of CONTRACTOR's obligation hereunder and ground for COUNTY to terminate this  
29 Agreement.

30 M. If CONTRACTOR's Professional Liability and Network Security & Privacy Liability are  
31 "Claims Made" policy(ies), CONTRACTOR shall agree to maintain coverage for two (2) years  
32 following the completion of the Agreement.

33 N. The Commercial General Liability policy shall contain a "severability of interests" clause also  
34 known as a "separation of insureds" clause (standard in the ISO CG 0001 policy).

35 O. COUNTY expressly retains the right to require CONTRACTOR to increase or decrease  
36 insurance of any of the above insurance types throughout the term of this Agreement. Any increase or  
37 //

1 decrease in insurance will be as deemed by County of Orange Risk Manager as appropriate to  
2 adequately protect COUNTY.

3 P. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR in writing of changes in the insurance requirements. If  
4 CONTRACTOR does not deposit copies of acceptable COIs and endorsements with COUNTY  
5 incorporating such changes within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of such notice, such failure shall  
6 constitute a breach of CONTRACTOR's obligation hereunder and ground for termination of this  
7 Agreement by COUNTY.

8 Q. The procuring of such required policy or policies of insurance shall not be construed to limit  
9 CONTRACTOR's liability hereunder nor to fulfill the indemnification provisions and requirements of  
10 this Agreement, nor act in any way to reduce the policy coverage and limits available from the insurer.

11 R. SUBMISSION OF INSURANCE DOCUMENTS

12 1. The COI and endorsements shall be provided to COUNTY as follows:  
13 a. Prior to the start date of this Agreement.  
14 b. No later than the expiration date for each policy.  
15 c. Within thirty (30) calendar days upon receipt of written notice by COUNTY regarding  
16 changes to any of the insurance types as set forth in Subparagraph G, above.

17 2. The COI and endorsements shall be provided to the COUNTY at the address as specified in  
18 the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement.

19 3. If CONTRACTOR fails to submit the COI and endorsements that meet the insurance  
20 provisions stipulated in this Agreement by the above specified due dates, ADMINISTRATOR shall  
21 have sole discretion to impose one or both of the following:

22 a. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any or all outstanding payments due to  
23 CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement until such time that the required COI and endorsements  
24 that meet the insurance provisions stipulated in this Agreement are submitted to ADMINISTRATOR.

25 4. In no cases shall assurances by CONTRACTOR, its employees, agents, including any  
26 insurance agent, be construed as adequate evidence of insurance. COUNTY will only accept valid COIs  
27 and endorsements, or in the interim, an insurance binder as adequate evidence of insurance coverage.  
28

29 **XIII. INSPECTIONS AND AUDITS**

30 A. ADMINISTRATOR, any authorized representative of COUNTY, any authorized representative  
31 of the State of California, the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services,  
32 the Comptroller General of the United States, or any other of their authorized representatives, shall have  
33 access to any books, documents, and records, including but not limited to, financial statements, general  
34 ledgers, relevant accounting systems, medical and client records, of CONTRACTOR that are directly  
35 pertinent to this Agreement, for the purpose of responding to a beneficiary complaint or conducting an  
36 audit, review, evaluation, or examination, or making transcripts during the periods of retention set forth  
37 in the Records Management and Maintenance Paragraph of this Agreement. Such persons may at all



1 reasonable times inspect or otherwise evaluate the services provided pursuant to this Agreement, and the  
2 premises in which they are provided.

3 B. CONTRACTOR shall actively participate and cooperate with any person specified in  
4 Subparagraph A. above in any evaluation or monitoring of the services provided pursuant to this  
5 Agreement, and shall provide the above-mentioned persons adequate office space to conduct such  
6 evaluation or monitoring.

7 C. AUDIT RESPONSE

8 1. Following an audit report, in the event of non-compliance with applicable laws and  
9 regulations governing funds provided through this Agreement, COUNTY may terminate this Agreement  
10 as provided for in the Termination Paragraph or direct CONTRACTOR to immediately implement  
11 appropriate corrective action. A plan of corrective action shall be submitted to ADMINISTRATOR in  
12 writing within thirty (30) calendar days after receiving notice from ADMINISTRATOR.

13 2. If the audit reveals that money is payable from one party to the other, that is, reimbursement  
14 by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY, or payment of sums due from COUNTY to CONTRACTOR, said  
15 funds shall be due and payable from one party to the other within sixty (60) calendar days of receipt of  
16 the audit results. If reimbursement is due from CONTRACTOR to COUNTY, and such reimbursement  
17 is not received within said sixty (60) calendar days, COUNTY may, in addition to any other remedies  
18 provided by law, reduce any amount owed CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the  
19 reimbursement due COUNTY.

20 D. CONTRACTOR shall retain a licensed certified public accountant, who will prepare an annual  
21 Single Audit as required by 31 USC 7501 – 7507, as well as its implementing regulations under 2 CFR  
22 Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal  
23 Awards. CONTRACTOR shall forward the Single Audit to ADMINISTRATOR within fourteen (14)  
24 calendar days of receipt.

25 E. CONTRACTOR shall forward to ADMINISTRATOR a copy of any audit report within  
26 fourteen (14) calendar days of receipt. Such audit shall include, but not be limited to, management,  
27 financial, programmatic or any other type of audit of CONTRACTOR's operations, whether or not the  
28 cost of such operation or audit is reimbursed in whole or in part through this Agreement.

29  
30 **XIV. LICENSES AND LAWS**

31 A. CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees, affiliates, and subcontractors shall, throughout  
32 the term of this Agreement, maintain all necessary licenses, permits, approvals, certificates,  
33 accreditations, waivers, and exemptions necessary for the provision of the services hereunder and  
34 required by the laws, regulations and requirements of the United States, the State of California,  
35 COUNTY, and all other applicable governmental agencies. CONTRACTOR shall notify  
36 ADMINISTRATOR immediately and in writing of its inability to obtain or maintain, irrespective of the  
37 //

1 pendency of any hearings or appeals, permits, licenses, approvals, certificates, accreditations, waivers  
2 and exemptions. Said inability shall be cause for termination of this Agreement.

### 3 B. ENFORCEMENT OF CHILD SUPPORT OBLIGATIONS

4 1. CONTRACTOR certifies it is in full compliance with all applicable federal and State  
5 reporting requirements regarding its employees and with all lawfully served Wage and Earnings  
6 Assignment Orders and Notices of Assignments and will continue to be in compliance throughout the  
7 term of the Agreement with the County of Orange. Failure to comply shall constitute a material breach  
8 of the Agreement and failure to cure such breach within sixty (60) calendar days of notice from the  
9 COUNTY shall constitute grounds for termination of the Agreement.

10 2. CONTRACTOR agrees to furnish to ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days  
11 of the award of this Agreement:

12 a. In the case of an individual CONTRACTOR, his/her name, date of birth, social security  
13 number, and residence address;

14 b. In the case of CONTRACTOR doing business in a form other than as an individual,  
15 the name, date of birth, social security number, and residence address of each individual who owns an  
16 interest of ten percent (10%) or more in the contracting entity;

17 3. It is expressly understood that this data will be transmitted to governmental agencies  
18 charged with the establishment and enforcement of child support orders, or as permitted by federal  
19 and/or state statute.

20 C. CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable governmental laws, regulations, and  
21 requirements as they exist now or may be hereafter amended or changed. These laws, regulations, and  
22 requirements shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

21 D. CONTRACTOR shall at all times be capable and authorized by the State of California to  
 22 provide treatment and bill for services provided to Medi-Cal eligible clients while working under the  
 23 terms of this Agreement.

24 E. CONTRACTOR shall make every reasonable effort to obtain appropriate licenses and/or  
 25 waivers to provide Medi-Cal billable treatment services at school or other sites requested by  
 26 ADMINISTRATOR.

## 27 **XV. LITERATURE, ADVERTISEMENTS, AND SOCIAL MEDIA**

29 A. COUNTY owns all rights to the name, logos, and symbols of COUNTY. The use and/or  
 30 reproduction of COUNTY's name, logos, or symbols for any purpose, including commercial  
 31 advertisement, promotional purposes, announcements, displays, or press releases, without COUNTY's  
 32 prior written consent is expressly prohibited.

33 B. CONTRACTOR may develop and publish information related to County patients or the specific  
 34 services provided under this Agreement to County patients where all of the following conditions are  
 35 satisfied:

36 1. Unless directed otherwise by ADMINISTRATOR, the information includes a statement  
 37 that the program, wholly or in part, is funded through COUNTY, State and Federal government funds;

1            2. The information does not give the appearance that the COUNTY, its officers, employees, or  
2 agencies endorse:

3            a. any commercial product or service; and,

4            b. any product or service provided by CONTRACTOR, unless approved in writing by  
5 ADMINISTRATOR; and,

6            4. If CONTRACTOR uses social media (such as Facebook, Twitter, YouTube or other  
7 publicly available social media sites) to publish information related to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR  
8 shall develop social media policies and procedures and have them available to ADMINISTRATOR.  
9 CONTRACTOR shall comply with COUNTY Social Media Use Policy and Procedures as they pertain  
10 to any social media developed in support of the services described within this Agreement. The policy is  
11 available on the Internet at <http://www.ocgov.com/gov/ceo/cio/govpolicies>.

12  
13            **XVI. MAXIMUM OBLIGATION**

14            A. The Total Maximum Obligation of COUNTY for services provided in accordance with this  
15 Agreement, and the separate Maximum Obligations for each period under this Agreement, are as  
16 specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement, except as allowed for in  
17 Subparagraph B. below.

18            B. ADMINISTRATOR may amend the Maximum Obligation by an amount not to exceed ten  
19 percent (10%) of the original amount of the first year of funding for this Agreement.

20  
21            **XVII. MINIMUM WAGE LAWS**

22            A. Pursuant to the United States of America Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended, and  
23 State of California Labor Code, §1178.5, CONTRACTOR shall pay no less than the greater of the  
24 federal or California Minimum Wage to all its employees that directly or indirectly provide services  
25 pursuant to this Agreement, in any manner whatsoever. CONTRACTOR shall require and verify that  
26 all its contractors or other persons providing services pursuant to this Agreement on behalf of  
27 CONTRACTOR also pay their employees no less than the greater of the federal or California Minimum  
28 Wage.

29            B. CONTRACTOR shall comply and verify that its contractors comply with all other federal and  
30 State of California laws for minimum wage, overtime pay, record keeping, and child labor standards  
31 pursuant to providing services pursuant to this Agreement.

32            C. Notwithstanding the minimum wage requirements provided for in this clause, CONTRACTOR,  
33 where applicable, shall comply with the prevailing wage and related requirements, as provided for in  
34 accordance with the provisions of Article 2 of Chapter 1, Part 7, Division 2 of the Labor Code of the  
35 State of California (§§1770, et seq.), as it now exists or may hereafter be amended.

**XVIII. NONDISCRIMINATION****A. EMPLOYMENT**

1  
2  
3 1. During the term of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall not  
4 unlawfully discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of his/her race,  
5 religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition,  
6 genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual  
7 orientation, or military and veteran status. Additionally, during the term of this Agreement,  
8 CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall require in its subcontracts that subcontractors shall  
9 not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of his/her race,  
10 religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition,  
11 genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual  
12 orientation, or military and veteran status.

13 2. CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall not discriminate against employees or  
14 applicants for employment in the areas of employment, promotion, demotion or transfer; recruitment or  
15 recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rate of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection  
16 for training, including apprenticeship.

17 3. CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate between employees with spouses and employees  
18 with domestic partners, or discriminate between domestic partners and spouses of those employees, in  
19 the provision of benefits.

20 4. CONTRACTOR shall post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for  
21 employment, notices from ADMINISTRATOR and/or the United States Equal Employment  
22 Opportunity Commission setting forth the provisions of the Equal Opportunity clause.

23 5. All solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of  
24 CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor shall state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration  
25 for employment without regard to race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical  
26 disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender  
27 identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status. Such requirements  
28 shall be deemed fulfilled by use of the term EOE.

29 6. Each labor union or representative of workers with which CONTRACTOR and/or  
30 subcontractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding must post a  
31 notice advising the labor union or workers' representative of the commitments under this  
32 Nondiscrimination Paragraph and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to  
33 employees and applicants for employment.

34 **B. SERVICES, BENEFITS AND FACILITIES** – CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor shall not  
35 discriminate in the provision of services, the allocation of benefits, or in the accommodation in facilities  
36 on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental  
37 disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender

1 expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status in accordance with Title IX of the  
 2 Education Amendments of 1972 as they relate to 20 USC §1681 - §1688; Title VI of the Civil Rights  
 3 Act of 1964 (42 USC §2000d); the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 USC §6101); Title 9, Division  
 4 4, Chapter 6, Article 1 (§10800, et seq.) of the California Code of Regulations; and Title II of the  
 5 Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act of 2008, 42 USC 2000ff, et seq. as applicable, and all other  
 6 pertinent rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, and as otherwise provided by state law and  
 7 regulations, as all may now exist or be hereafter amended or changed. For the purpose of this  
 8 Nondiscrimination paragraph, Discrimination includes, but is not limited to the following based on one  
 9 or more of the factors identified above:

- 10 1. Denying a client or potential client any service, benefit, or accommodation.
- 11 2. Providing any service or benefit to a client which is different or is provided in a different  
 12 manner or at a different time from that provided to other clients.
- 13 3. Restricting a client in any way in the enjoyment of any advantage or privilege enjoyed by  
 14 others receiving any service or benefit.
- 15 4. Treating a client differently from others in satisfying any admission requirement or  
 16 condition, or eligibility requirement or condition, which individuals must meet in order to be provided  
 17 any service or benefit.
- 18 5. Assignment of times or places for the provision of services.

19 C. COMPLAINT PROCESS – CONTRACTOR shall establish procedures for advising all clients  
 20 through a written statement that CONTRACTOR’s and/or subcontractor’s clients may file all  
 21 complaints alleging discrimination in the delivery of services with CONTRACTOR, subcontractor, and  
 22 ADMINISTRATOR or COUNTY’s Patient Rights Office.

23 1. Whenever possible, problems shall be resolved informally and at the point of service.  
 24 CONTRACTOR shall establish an internal informal problem resolution process for clients not able to  
 25 resolve such problems at the point of service. Clients may initiate a grievance or complaint directly with  
 26 CONTRACTOR either orally or in writing.

27 a. COUNTY shall establish a formal resolution and grievance process in the event  
 28 informal processes do not yield a resolution.

29 b. Throughout the problem resolution and grievance process, client rights shall be  
 30 maintained, including access to the Patients’ Rights Office at any point in the process. Clients shall be  
 31 informed of their right to access the Patients’ Rights Office at any time.

32 2. Within the time limits procedurally imposed, the complainant shall be notified in writing as  
 33 to the findings regarding the alleged complaint and, if not satisfied with the decision, may file an appeal.

34 D. PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES – CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor agree to comply  
 35 with the provisions of §504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, (29 USC 794 et seq., as  
 36 implemented in 45 CFR 84.1 et seq.), and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 as amended (42  
 37 USC 12101 et seq.; as implemented in 29 CFR 1630), as applicable, pertaining to the prohibition of

1 discrimination against qualified persons with disabilities in all programs or activities; and if applicable,  
 2 as implemented in Title 45, CFR, §84.1 et seq., as they exist now or may be hereafter amended together  
 3 with succeeding legislation.

4 E. RETALIATION – Neither CONTRACTOR nor subcontractor, nor its employees or agents shall  
 5 intimidate, coerce or take adverse action against any person for the purpose of interfering with rights  
 6 secured by federal or state laws, or because such person has filed a complaint, certified, assisted or  
 7 otherwise participated in an investigation, proceeding, hearing or any other activity undertaken to  
 8 enforce rights secured by federal or state law.

9 F. In the event of non-compliance with this paragraph or as otherwise provided by federal and  
 10 state law, this Agreement may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and  
 11 CONTRACTOR or subcontractor may be declared ineligible for further contracts involving federal,  
 12 state or county funds.

### 13 **XIX. NOTICES**

14 A. Unless otherwise specified, all notices, claims, correspondence, reports and/or statements  
 15 authorized or required by this Agreement shall be effective:

16 1. When written and deposited in the United States mail, first class postage prepaid and  
 17 addressed as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement or as otherwise directed  
 18 by ADMINISTRATOR;

19 2. When faxed, transmission confirmed;

20 3. When sent by Email; or

21 4. When accepted by U.S. Postal Service Express Mail, Federal Express, United Parcel  
 22 Service, or any other expedited delivery service.

23 B. Termination Notices shall be addressed as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of  
 24 this Agreement or as otherwise directed by ADMINISTRATOR and shall be effective when faxed,  
 25 transmission confirmed, or when accepted by U.S. Postal Service Express Mail, Federal Express, United  
 26 Parcel Service, or any other expedited delivery service.

27 C. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, within twenty-four (24) hours of  
 28 becoming aware of any occurrence of a serious nature, which may expose COUNTY to liability. Such  
 29 occurrences shall include, but not be limited to, accidents, injuries, or acts of negligence, or loss or  
 30 damage to any COUNTY property in possession of CONTRACTOR.

31 D. For purposes of this Agreement, any notice to be provided by COUNTY may be given by  
 32 ADMINISTRATOR.

### 33 **XX. NOTIFICATION OF DEATH**

34 A. Upon becoming aware of the death of any person served pursuant to this Agreement,  
 35 CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify ADMINISTRATOR.  
 36  
 37

1 B. All Notifications of Death provided to ADMINISTRATOR by CONTRACTOR shall contain  
 2 the name of the deceased, the date and time of death, the nature and circumstances of the death, and the  
 3 name(s) of CONTRACTOR's officers or employees with knowledge of the incident.

4 1. TELEPHONE NOTIFICATION – CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR by  
 5 telephone immediately upon becoming aware of the death due to non-terminal illness of any person  
 6 served pursuant to this Agreement; provided, however, weekends and holidays shall not be included for  
 7 purposes of computing the time within which to give telephone notice and, notwithstanding the time  
 8 limit herein specified, notice need only be given during normal business hours.

9 2. WRITTEN NOTIFICATION

10 a. NON-TERMINAL ILLNESS – CONTRACTOR shall hand deliver, fax, and/or send  
 11 via encrypted email to ADMINISTRATOR a written report within sixteen (16) hours after becoming  
 12 aware of the death due to non-terminal illness of any person served pursuant to this Agreement.

13 b. TERMINAL ILLNESS – CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR by written  
 14 report hand delivered, faxed, sent via encrypted email, and/or postmarked and sent via U.S. Mail within  
 15 forty-eight (48) hours of becoming aware of the death due to terminal illness of any person served  
 16 pursuant to this Agreement.

17 C. If there are any questions regarding the cause of death of any person served pursuant to this  
 18 Agreement who was diagnosed with a terminal illness, or if there are any unusual circumstances related  
 19 to the death, CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify ADMINISTRATOR in accordance with this  
 20 Notification of Death Paragraph.

21  
 22 **XXI. NOTIFICATION OF PUBLIC EVENTS AND MEETINGS**

23 A. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR of any public event or meeting funded in  
 24 whole or in part by the COUNTY, except for those events or meetings that are intended solely to serve  
 25 clients or occur in the normal course of business.

26 B. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR at least thirty (30) business days in advance  
 27 of any applicable public event or meeting. The notification must include the date, time, duration,  
 28 location and purpose of the public event or meeting. Any promotional materials or event related flyers  
 29 must be approved by ADMINISTRATOR prior to distribution.

30  
 31 **XXII. RECORDS MANAGEMENT AND MAINTENANCE**

32 A. CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees and subcontractors shall, throughout the term  
 33 of this Agreement, prepare, maintain and manage records appropriate to the services provided and in  
 34 accordance with this Agreement and all applicable requirements.

35 B. CONTRACTOR shall implement and maintain administrative, technical and physical  
 36 safeguards to ensure the privacy of PHI and prevent the intentional or unintentional use or disclosure of  
 37 PHI in violation of the HIPAA, federal and state regulations and/or CHPP. CONTRACTOR shall



1 mitigate to the extent practicable, the known harmful effect of any use or disclosure of PHI made in  
2 violation of federal or state regulations and/or COUNTY policies.

3 C. CONTRACTOR's participant, client, and/or patient records shall be maintained in a secure  
4 manner. CONTRACTOR shall maintain participant, client, and/or patient records and must establish  
5 and implement written record management procedures.

6 D. CONTRACTOR shall retain all financial records for a minimum of seven (7) years from the  
7 commencement of the contract, unless a longer period is required due to legal proceedings such as  
8 litigations and/or settlement of claims.

9 E. CONTRACTOR shall make records pertaining to the costs of services, participant fees, charges,  
10 billings, and revenues available at one (1) location within the limits of the County of Orange.

11 F. CONTRACTOR shall ensure all HIPAA (DRS) requirements are met. HIPAA requires that  
12 clients, participants and/or patients be provided the right to access or receive a copy of their DRS and/or  
13 request addendum to their records. Title 45 CFR §164.501, defines DRS as a group of records  
14 maintained by or for a covered entity that is:

15 1. The medical records and billing records about individuals maintained by or for a covered  
16 health care provider;

17 2. The enrollment, payment, claims adjudication, and case or medical management record  
18 systems maintained by or for a health plan; or

19 3. Used, in whole or in part, by or for the covered entity to make decisions about individuals.

20 G. CONTRACTOR may retain client, and/or patient documentation electronically in accordance  
21 with the terms of this Agreement and common business practices. If documentation is retained  
22 electronically, CONTRACTOR shall, in the event of an audit or site visit:

23 1. Have documents readily available within forty-eight (48) hour notice of a scheduled audit  
24 or site visit.

25 2. Provide auditor or other authorized individuals access to documents via a computer  
26 terminal.

27 3. Provide auditor or other authorized individuals a hardcopy printout of documents, if  
28 requested.

29 H. CONTRACTOR shall ensure compliance with requirements pertaining to the privacy and  
30 security of PII and/or PHI. CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY immediately by telephone call plus  
31 email or fax upon the discovery of a Breach of unsecured PHI and/or PII.

32 I. CONTRACTOR may be required to pay any costs associated with a Breach of privacy and/or  
33 security of PII and/or PHI, including but not limited to the costs of notification. CONTRACTOR shall  
34 pay any and all such costs arising out of a Breach of privacy and/or security of PII and/or PHI.

35 J. CONTRACTOR shall retain all client and/or patient medical records for seven (7) years  
36 following discharge of the client and/or patient, with the exception of non-emancipated minors for  
37 //

1 whom records must be kept for at least one (1) year after such minors have reached the age of eighteen  
2 (18) years, or for seven (7) years after the last date of service, whichever is longer.

### 4 **XXIII. RESEARCH AND PUBLICATION**

5 CONTRACTOR shall not utilize information and/or data received from COUNTY, or arising out  
6 of, or developed, as a result of this Agreement for the purpose of personal or professional research, or  
7 for publication.

### 9 **XXIV. REVENUE**

10 A. CLIENT FEES – CONTRACTOR shall charge, unless waived by ADMINISTRATOR, a fee to  
11 clients to whom billable services, other than those amounts reimbursed by Medicare, Medi-Cal or other  
12 third party health plans, are provided pursuant to this Agreement, their estates and responsible relatives,  
13 according to their ability to pay as determined by the State Department of Health Care Services’  
14 “Uniform Method of Determining Ability to Pay” (UMDAP) procedure or by any other payment  
15 procedure as approved in advance, and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR; and in accordance with Title  
16 9 of the California Code of Regulations. Such fee shall not exceed the actual cost of services provided.  
17 No client shall be denied services because of an inability to pay.

18 B. THIRD-PARTY REVENUE – CONTRACTOR shall make every reasonable effort to obtain all  
19 available third-party reimbursement for which persons served pursuant to this Agreement may be  
20 eligible. Charges to insurance carriers shall be on the basis of CONTRACTOR’s usual and customary  
21 charges.

22 C. PROCEDURES – CONTRACTOR shall maintain internal financial controls which adequately  
23 ensure proper billing and collection procedures. CONTRACTOR’s procedures shall specifically  
24 provide for the identification of delinquent accounts and methods for pursuing such accounts.  
25 CONTRACTOR shall provide ADMINISTRATOR, monthly, a written report specifying the current  
26 status of fees which are billed, collected, transferred to a collection agency, or deemed by  
27 CONTRACTOR to be uncollectible.

28 D. OTHER REVENUES – CONTRACTOR shall charge for services, supplies, or facility use by  
29 persons other than individuals or groups eligible for services pursuant to this Agreement.

### 31 **XXV. SEVERABILITY**

32 If a court of competent jurisdiction declares any provision of this Agreement or application thereof  
33 to any person or circumstances to be invalid or if any provision of this Agreement contravenes any  
34 federal, state or county statute, ordinance, or regulation, the remaining provisions of this Agreement or  
35 the application thereof shall remain valid, and the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain  
36 in full force and effect, and to that extent the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

**XXVI. SPECIAL PROVISIONS**

A. CONTRACTOR shall not use the funds provided by means of this Agreement for the following purposes:

- 1. Making cash payments to intended recipients of services through this Agreement.
- 2. Lobbying any governmental agency or official. CONTRACTOR shall file all certifications and reports in compliance with this requirement pursuant to Title 31, USC, §1352 (e.g., limitation on use of appropriated funds to influence certain federal contracting and financial transactions).
- 3. Fundraising.
- 4. Purchase of gifts, meals, entertainment, awards, or other personal expenses for CONTRACTOR’s staff, volunteers, or members of the Board of Directors or governing body.
- 5. Reimbursement of CONTRACTOR’s members of the Board of Directors or governing body for expenses or services.
- 6. Making personal loans to CONTRACTOR’s staff, volunteers, interns, consultants, subcontractors, and members of the Board of Directors or governing body, or its designee or authorized agent, or making salary advances or giving bonuses to CONTRACTOR’s staff.
- 7. Paying an individual salary or compensation for services at a rate in excess of the current Level I of the Executive Salary Schedule as published by the OPM. The OPM Executive Salary Schedule may be found at [www.opm.gov](http://www.opm.gov).
- 8. Severance pay for separating employees.
- 9. Paying rent and/or lease costs for a facility prior to the facility meeting all required building codes and obtaining all necessary building permits for any associated construction.
- 10. Supplanting current funding for existing services.

B. Unless otherwise specified in advance and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall not use the funds provided by means of this Agreement for the following purposes:

- 1. Funding travel or training (excluding mileage or parking).
- 2. Making phone calls outside of the local area unless documented to be directly for the purpose of client care.
- 3. Payment for grant writing, consultants, certified public accounting, or legal services.
- 4. Purchase of artwork or other items that are for decorative purposes and do not directly contribute to the quality of services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.
- 5. Purchasing or improving land, including constructing or permanently improving any building or facility, except for tenant improvements.
- 6. Providing inpatient hospital services or purchasing major medical equipment.
- 7. Satisfying any expenditure of non-federal funds as a condition for the receipt of federal funds (matching).

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**XXVII. STATUS OF CONTRACTOR**

CONTRACTOR is, and shall at all times be deemed to be, an independent contractor and shall be wholly responsible for the manner in which it performs the services required of it by the terms of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR is entirely responsible for compensating staff, subcontractors, and consultants employed by CONTRACTOR. This Agreement shall not be construed as creating the relationship of employer and employee, or principal and agent, between COUNTY and CONTRACTOR or any of CONTRACTOR's employees, agents, consultants, or subcontractors. CONTRACTOR assumes exclusively the responsibility for the acts of its employees, agents, consultants, or subcontractors as they relate to the services to be provided during the course and scope of their employment. CONTRACTOR, its agents, employees, consultants, or subcontractors, shall not be entitled to any rights or privileges of COUNTY's employees and shall not be considered in any manner to be COUNTY's employees.

**XXVIII. TERM**

A. The term of this Agreement shall commence as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement or the execution date, whichever is later. This Agreement shall terminate as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement unless otherwise sooner terminated as provided in this Agreement; provided, however, CONTRACTOR shall be obligated to perform such duties as would normally extend beyond this term, including but not limited to, obligations with respect to confidentiality, indemnification, audits, reporting and accounting.

B. Any administrative duty or obligation to be performed pursuant to this Agreement on a weekend or holiday may be performed on the next regular business day.

**XXIX. TERMINATION**

A. Either party may terminate this Agreement, without cause, upon ninety (90) calendar days' written notice given the other party.

B. Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, COUNTY may terminate this Agreement upon five (5) calendar days' written notice if CONTRACTOR fails to perform any of the terms of this Agreement. At ADMINISTRATOR's sole discretion, CONTRACTOR may be allowed up to thirty (30) calendar days for corrective action.

C. COUNTY may terminate this Agreement immediately, upon written notice, on the occurrence of any of the following events:

1. The loss by CONTRACTOR of legal capacity.
2. Cessation of services.
3. The delegation or assignment of CONTRACTOR's services, operation or administration to another entity without the prior written consent of COUNTY.

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1 4. The neglect by any physician or licensed person employed or contracted by  
 2 CONTRACTOR of any duty required pursuant to this Agreement; unless CONTRACTOR promptly  
 3 removes such physician or licensed person from serving persons treated or assisted pursuant to this  
 4 Agreement.

5 5. The loss of accreditation or any license required by the Licenses and Laws Paragraph of  
 6 this Agreement.

7 6. The continued incapacity of any physician or licensed person to perform duties required  
 8 pursuant to this Agreement.

9 7. Unethical conduct or malpractice by any physician or licensed person providing services  
 10 pursuant to this Agreement; provided, however, COUNTY may waive this option if CONTRACTOR  
 11 removes such physician or licensed person from serving persons treated or assisted pursuant to this  
 12 Agreement.

#### 13 D. CONTINGENT FUNDING

14 1. Any obligation of COUNTY under this Agreement is contingent upon the following:

15 a. The continued availability of federal, state and county funds for reimbursement of  
 16 COUNTY's expenditures, and

17 b. Inclusion of sufficient funding for the services hereunder in the applicable budget(s)  
 18 approved by the Board of Supervisors.

19 2. In the event such funding is subsequently reduced or terminated, COUNTY may suspend,  
 20 terminate or renegotiate this Agreement upon thirty (30) calendar days' written notice given  
 21 CONTRACTOR. If COUNTY elects to renegotiate this Agreement due to reduced or terminated  
 22 funding, CONTRACTOR shall not be obligated to accept the renegotiated terms.

23 E. In the event this Agreement is suspended or terminated prior to the completion of the term as  
 24 specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement, ADMINISTRATOR may, at its sole  
 25 discretion, reduce the Maximum Obligation of this Agreement in an amount consistent with the reduced  
 26 term of the Agreement.

27 F. In the event this Agreement is terminated by either party pursuant to Subparagraphs B., C. or D.  
 28 above, CONTRACTOR shall do the following:

29 1. Comply with termination instructions provided by ADMINISTRATOR in a manner which  
 30 is consistent with recognized standards of quality care and prudent business practice.

31 2. Obtain immediate clarification from ADMINISTRATOR of any unsettled issues of contract  
 32 performance during the remaining contract term.

33 3. Until the date of termination, continue to provide the same level of service required by this  
 34 Agreement.

35 4. If clients are to be transferred to another facility for services, furnish ADMINISTRATOR,  
 36 upon request, all client information and records deemed necessary by ADMINISTRATOR to affect an  
 37 orderly transfer.

1 5. Assist ADMINISTRATOR in effecting the transfer of clients in a manner consistent with  
2 client's best interests.

3 6. If records are to be transferred to COUNTY, pack and label such records in accordance  
4 with directions provided by ADMINISTRATOR.

5 7. Return to COUNTY, in the manner indicated by ADMINISTRATOR, any equipment and  
6 supplies purchased with funds provided by COUNTY.

7 8. To the extent services are terminated, cancel outstanding commitments covering the  
8 procurement of materials, supplies, equipment, and miscellaneous items, as well as outstanding  
9 commitments which relate to personal services. With respect to these canceled commitments,  
10 CONTRACTOR shall submit a written plan for settlement of all outstanding liabilities and all claims  
11 arising out of such cancellation of commitment which shall be subject to written approval of  
12 ADMINISTRATOR.

13 9. Provide written notice of termination of services to each client being served under this  
14 Agreement, within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of termination notice. A copy of the notice of  
15 termination of services must also be provided to ADMINISTRATOR within the fifteen (15) calendar  
16 day period.

17 G. The rights and remedies of COUNTY provided in this Termination Paragraph shall not be  
18 exclusive, and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this Agreement.

19  
20 **XXX. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY**

21 Neither party hereto intends that this Agreement shall create rights hereunder in third parties  
22 including, but not limited to, any subcontractors or any clients provided services pursuant to this  
23 Agreement.

24  
25 **XXXI. WAIVER OF DEFAULT OR BREACH**

26 Waiver by COUNTY of any default by CONTRACTOR shall not be considered a waiver of any  
27 subsequent default. Waiver by COUNTY of any breach by CONTRACTOR of any provision of this  
28 Agreement shall not be considered a waiver of any subsequent breach. Waiver by COUNTY of any  
29 default or any breach by CONTRACTOR shall not be considered a modification of the terms of this  
30 Agreement.

**I. COMMON TERMS AND DEFINITIONS**

A. The parties agree to the following terms and definitions, and to those terms and definitions which, for convenience, are set forth elsewhere in the Agreement.

1. Admission means documentation, by CONTRACTOR, for completion of entry and evaluation services provided to Clients into IRIS.

2. Client means any individual, referred or enrolled, for services under the Agreement who is living with mental, emotional, or behavioral disorders.

3. Crisis Intervention means a service, lasting less than twenty-four (24) hours that is provided to or on the behalf of a Client for a condition that requires more timely response than a regularly scheduled visit. Service activities may include, but are not limited to: assessment, individual therapy, collateral therapy, family therapy, case management, and psychiatric evaluation.

4. Data Collection System means the collection of State mandated data used for the tracking and reporting of outcome data for Clients enrolled in FSP/W programs.

a. 3 M's means the Quarterly Assessment Form being completed for each Client every three months in the approved Data Collection System. It tracks changes in education, sources of financial support, legal issues/designations, health status, substance abuse, and any other fields set forth by the State and/or the County. Must be completed not more than 14 days prior to or 30 days after the due date.

b. Data Certification means reviewing outcome data mandated by the state and COUNTY for accuracy and signing a Certification of Accuracy of Data form indicating that the data is accurate.

c. Key Event Tracking (KET) means the tracking of a Client's service movement and changes in the approved Data Collection System. A KET must be completed following the DCR business rules and entered accurately each time the CONTRACTOR is reporting a change from previous Client status in certain categories. The categories include: administrative status, residential status (including incarcerations and hospitalizations), employment, education, benefits acquisition, legal status, emergency interventions and any other fields set forth by the State or County.



1 d. Partnership Assessment Form (PAF) means the baseline Assessment for each Client (as  
2 defined by the State and/or County) that must be completed in full and entered into the DCR system  
3 within thirty (30) days of the Client's enrollment date. All DCR business rules regarding transferring  
4 and re-enrolling clients must be followed and verified prior to entering a PAF in the system.

5 5. Diagnosis means identifying the nature of a Client's disorder. When formulating the  
6 Diagnosis of Client, CONTRACTOR shall use the diagnostic codes as specified in the most current  
7 edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM) published by the American  
8 Psychiatric Association. DSM diagnoses will be recorded on all IRIS documents, as appropriate.

9 6. Direct Service Hour (DSH) means the time, measured in hours and portions of hours, that a  
10 clinician spends providing services to Clients or others on behalf of Clients. DSH credit, both billable  
11 and non-billable minutes, is obtained by providing mental health, case management, medication support,  
12 and crisis intervention services to Clients open in IRIS.

13 7. Early Periodic Screening Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) means the State of  
14 California's implementation of the Federal child health component of Medicaid program which provides  
15 physical, mental, and developmental health services for children and young adults.

16 8. Education Coordinator means an individual who is responsible for providing assistance and  
17 support with educational and vocational services as well as developing resources for those Clients that  
18 wish to further their education or training.

19 9. Employment Coordinator means an individual who provides pre-employment training, job  
20 orientation, and site training to Clients. This individual is also responsible for assisting Clients with job  
21 application procedures; teaching social, grooming and dress-for-success personal hygiene skills to  
22 Clients; and coaching Clients on how to maintain employment. This individual will develop  
23 employment resources that match the needs of the program's Clients. In addition, the Employment  
24 Coordinator may provide on-the-job mentoring and will work closely with the hiring companies and  
25 Clients.

26 10. Engagement means the process where a trusting relationship between CONTRACTOR's  
27 staff and Client is developed over a short period of time, so CONTRACTOR and Client can develop a  
28 plan to link the Client to appropriate services within the community. Engagement of the Client is the  
29 objective of a successful outreach.

30 11. Face-to-Face Contact means, as it pertains to a FSP/W, a direct encounter between  
31 CONTRACTOR's staff and Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s). This does not include contact by phone,  
32 email, etc. For the purpose of completing an Encounter Document, Face-to-Face Contact means a direct  
33 encounter between staff and Client(s), regardless if another individual(s) is/are present or not.

34 12. Family Team means a group formed to meet the needs of a FSP/W eligible Client through  
35 whatever means possible, and this team includes a program staff, the eligible Client, the Client's family  
36 members, and other support individual(s) the family agrees to include on the team.

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1           13. Full Service Partnership/Wraparound (FSP/W) means a program model described in  
2 COUNTY's MHSA plan that has been approved by the state. The MHSA plan describes how  
3 COUNTY will use MHSA funds to develop and implement treatment plans for mental health Clients  
4 through FSP/Ws. A FSP/W is an evidence-based and strength-based model with the focus on the  
5 individual rather than the disease. It is culturally competent in-home, intensive, mental health care  
6 coordination services that will address family needs across all life domains of the Client.

7           14. Group Home means a facility for housing youth and is licensed by Community Care  
8 Licensing under the provisions of CCR, Title 22, Division 6, et seq.

9           15. Head of Service means an individual ultimately responsible for overseeing the program and  
10 is required to be licensed as a mental health professional.

11           16. Housing Coordinator means an individual who provides assistance to Clients/families to  
12 have the most stable housing appropriate to their functioning levels and life circumstances. This may  
13 range from emergency motel placement to avoid homelessness, transitional housing that will provide  
14 stability and skills that would lead to more permanent housing. This individual may also assist in  
15 moving to greater independence by creating flex fund usage plans where the Client/family pays a greater  
16 percentage of housing cost per month so that housing costs become independent sustainable.

17           17. Individual Services and Support Funds (Flexible Funds) means funds used to provide  
18 Clients and/or their families with immediate assistance, as deemed necessary, for the treatment of their  
19 mental illness and improve their overall quality of life. Flexible Funds are generally categorized as  
20 housing, transportation, food, clothing, medical, and miscellaneous expenditures that are individualized  
21 and appropriate to support Clients' mental health treatment activities.

22           18. Integrated Records Information System (IRIS) means the ADMINISTRATOR's database  
23 system that collects Clients' information such as registration, scheduled appointments, laboratory  
24 information system, invoice and reporting capabilities, compliance with regulatory requirements,  
25 electronic medical records, and other relevant applications.

26           19. Katie A. Subclass means the lawsuit, Katie A. et al. v. Bonta et al., a class action lawsuit  
27 filed in Federal District Court concerning the availability of intensive mental health services to children  
28 in California who are either in foster care or at imminent risk of coming into care, created this Subclass.

29           20. Licensed Clinical Social Worker (LCSW) means a licensed individual, pursuant to the  
30 provisions of Chapter 14 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical  
31 services to Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked.  
32 Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

33           21. Licensed Marriage Family Therapist (MFT) means a licensed individual, pursuant to the  
34 provisions of Chapter 13 of the California Business and Professions Code, pursuant to the provisions of  
35 Chapter 14 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to  
36 Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is  
37 preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

1           22. Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor (LPCC) means a licensed individual, pursuant to  
2 the provisions of Chapter 13 of the California Business and Professions Code, pursuant to the provisions  
3 of Chapter 16 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical service to  
4 Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is  
5 preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

6           23. Licensed Psychiatric Technician (LPT) means a licensed individual, pursuant to the  
7 provisions of Chapter 10 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical  
8 services to Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked.  
9 Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

10           24. Licensed Psychologist means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter  
11 6.6 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The  
12 license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that  
13 the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

14           25. Licensed Vocational Nurse (LVN) means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions  
15 of Chapter 6.5 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to  
16 Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is  
17 preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

18           26. Live Scan means an inkless, electronic fingerprint which is transmitted directly to the  
19 Department of Justice (DOJ) for the completion of a criminal record check, typically required of  
20 employees who have direct contact with Clients.

21           27. Medi-Cal means the State of California's implementation of the federal Medicaid health  
22 care program which pays for a variety of medical services for children and adults who meet eligibility  
23 criteria.

24           28. Medical Necessity means diagnosis, impairment, and intervention related criteria as defined  
25 in the COUNTY's MHP under Medical Necessity for Medi-Cal reimbursed Specialty Mental Health  
26 Services.

27           29. Mental Health Services means an individual or a group therapy and intervention being  
28 provided to Clients that is designed to reduce mental disability and restores or improves daily  
29 functioning. These Mental Health Services must be consistent with goals of learning and development,  
30 as well as independent living and enhanced self-sufficiency. In addition, these services cannot be  
31 provided as a component of adult residential services, crisis residential treatment services, crisis  
32 intervention, crisis stabilization, day rehabilitation, or day treatment intensive. Service activities may  
33 include, but are not limited to: assessment, plan development, rehabilitation, and collateral. Also,  
34 Mental Health Services may be either Face-to-Face Contact, or by telephone with Clients or significant  
35 support individuals, and services may be provided anywhere in the community.

36           a. Assessment means a service activity, which may include a clinical analysis of the  
37 history and current status of a Client's mental, emotional, behavioral disorder, and relevant cultural

1 issues. The Assessment also needs to include history of services being provided, diagnosis, and use of  
2 testing procedures.

3 b. Collateral means significant support individual(s) in a Client's life and is/are used to  
4 define services provided to the Client with the intent of improving or maintaining the mental health  
5 status of the Client. The Client may or may not be present for this service activity.

6 c. Intensive Care Coordination (ICC) means a medically necessary service provided to  
7 Medi-Cal beneficiaries under the EPSDT benefit. ICC includes assessment, care planning and  
8 coordination of services across child services systems and providers, including intensive services for  
9 children/youth who meet the Katie A. Subclass criteria.

10 d. Intensive Home-Based Services (IHBS) means a medically necessary service provided  
11 to Medi-Cal beneficiaries under the EPSDT benefit. IHBS are individualized, strength-based mental  
12 health treatment interventions designed to ameliorate mental health conditions that interfere with a  
13 client's functioning. IHBS are provided only in conjunction with ICC and are recommended by the  
14 Child and Family Team. IHBS is also provided to the Katie A. Subclass population.

15 e. Medication Support Services means services provided by licensed physicians,  
16 registered nurses, or other qualified medical staff, which include: prescribing, administering, dispensing  
17 and monitoring of psychiatric medications or biologicals that are necessary to alleviate symptoms of  
18 mental illness. These services also include evaluation and documentation of the clinical justification  
19 and effectiveness of medication, dosage, side effects, compliance, and response to medication. In  
20 addition, the licensed physicians, registered nurses, or other qualified medical staff must obtain  
21 informed consent from Clients prior to providing medication education and plan development related to  
22 the delivery of these services and/or Assessment to Clients.

23 f. Rehabilitation Service means an activity which includes assistance to improving,  
24 maintaining, or restoring a Client's or group of Clients' functional skills, daily living skills, social and  
25 leisure skill, grooming and personal hygiene skills, meal preparation skills, support resources and/or  
26 medication education.

27 g. Substance Use treatment means a program that uses a stage-wise treatment model and  
28 is non-confrontational, follows behavioral principles, considers interactions between mental illness and  
29 substance abuse, and has gradual expectations of abstinence. Mental illness and substance abuse  
30 research has strongly indicated that a Client with a disorder needs treatment for both problems to  
31 recover fully. Focusing on one does not ensure the other will go away. Substance use services integrate  
32 assistance for each condition by helping Clients recover from mental illness and substance abuse in one  
33 setting and at the same time.

34 h. Therapeutic Behavioral Services (TBS) means one-on-one behavioral interventions  
35 with a Client, which is designed to reduce or eliminate targeted behaviors as identified in the Client's  
36 treatment plan. Collateral services are also provided to parent(s)/guardian(s) as part of TBS. Clients  
37 must be Medi-Cal eligible and meet TBS class membership and service need requirements.

1 Documentation in the medical record must support Medical Necessity for these intensive services.  
 2 Cases in which Clients are receiving more than twenty (20) hours per week of TBS or those who are  
 3 expected to receive more than four months (120 days) of TBS must be approved by  
 4 ADMINISTRATOR. ADMINISTRATOR has to approve individuals that are delivering these  
 5 intervention services to ensure they are qualified to deliver these services.

6 i. Targeted Case Management (TCM) means services that assist a Client to access needed  
 7 medical, educational, social, prevocational, vocational, rehabilitative, or other community services.  
 8 These service activities may include, but are not limited to: communicating and coordinating services  
 9 through referral; monitoring service delivery to ensure Clients' access to service and the service delivery  
 10 system; and tracking of Clients' progress and plan development. Treatment Foster Care (TFC) also  
 11 known as Therapeutic Foster Care, consists of intensive and highly coordinated mental health and  
 12 support services provided to a foster parent or caregiver in which the foster parent/caregiver becomes an  
 13 integral part of the child's treatment team.

14 j. Therapy means a therapeutic intervention that focuses primarily on symptom reduction  
 15 as a means to improve functional impairments. Therapy may be delivered to a Client or a group of  
 16 Clients, which may include family Therapy with Client being present.

17 30. The Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) is a voter-approved initiative to develop a  
 18 comprehensive approach to providing community-based mental health services and supports for  
 19 California residents. It is also known as "Proposition 63."

20 31. Mentoring Services means a service that provides support to Clients by building a  
 21 structured and trusting relationship over a prolonged period of time between a Client and a mentor. The  
 22 mentor is a peer or older individual who provides one-to-one contact and support in the following areas  
 23 to assist Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s): consistent support, guidance, and coaching in life skills;  
 24 concrete help and/or other relationship-building activities to the Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s); and  
 25 linking the Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s) to other services within the COUNTY.

26 32. National Provider Identifier (NPI) means the standard unique health identifier that was  
 27 adopted by the Secretary of HHS Services under HIPAA for health care providers. All HIPAA covered  
 28 healthcare providers, individuals, and organizations must obtain an NPI for use to identify themselves in  
 29 HIPAA standard transactions. The NPI is assigned for life.

30 33. Notice of Action-A (NOA-A) means a Medi-Cal requirement that informs the beneficiary  
 31 that she/he is not entitled to any specialty mental health service. The COUNTY has expanded the  
 32 requirement for an NOA-A to all beneficiaries requesting an Assessment for services and found not to  
 33 meet the Medical Necessity criteria for specialty Mental Health Services.

34 34. Notice of Privacy Practices (NPP) means a document that notifies Clients of uses and  
 35 disclosures of PHI. The NPP may be made by, or on behalf of, the health plan or health care provider as  
 36 set forth in HIPAA.

37 //

1           35. Outcomes Analyst/Data Mining Analyst means an individual who ensures that an FSP  
 2 program maintains a focus on program outcomes. This individual will be responsible for reviewing  
 3 outcome data, analyzing data, and developing strategies for gathering new data from Client's  
 4 perspective to improve FSP's understanding of Client's needs and desires towards furthering their  
 5 Recovery. This individual will also provide feedback to the program and work collaboratively with the  
 6 employment specialist, education specialist, benefits specialist, and other staff in the program to  
 7 strategize and improve outcomes in service delivery. In addition, this position will be responsible for  
 8 attending all data and outcome related meetings and ensuring that the FSP is being proactive in all data  
 9 collection requirements and changes at the local and state levels.

10           36. Outreach means linking potential Clients to appropriate mental health services within the  
 11 community. Outreach activities will include educating the community about the services offered and  
 12 requirements for participation in the programs. Such activities may result in the CONTRACTOR  
 13 developing referral sources for Clients from various programs being offered within the community.

14           37. Personal Services Coordinator (PSC) means an individual with a Bachelor's Degree in  
 15 Human Services or related field. It is preferred that the individual has at least two years of related  
 16 experience with Mental Health Services, or three years' experience as a Client in a similar program who  
 17 has graduated to self-sufficiency. A PSC leads the implementation of a service plan covering an entire  
 18 range of needs for the Client and/or Client's family to promote success, safety, and permanence in the  
 19 home, school, workforce, and community and lead Clients to self-sufficiency.

20           38. Plan of Care (POC) means a written plan, including by reference any juvenile court  
 21 order(s), developed and signed by the Family Team that includes the following elements:

- 22           a. A statement of an overall goal or vision for the Client and Client's family.
- 23           b. The strengths of the Client and Client's family.
- 24           c. The needs, as defined by specific life areas that must be met to achieve the goal(s) of  
 25 the Client and Client's family.
- 26           d. Prevention and intervention safety plans.
- 27           e. The type, frequency, and duration of intervention strategies.
- 28           f. Financial responsibility for the components of the POC.
- 29           g. Desired outcomes.

30           39. Program Director means an individual who is responsible for all aspects of administration  
 31 and clinical operations of the mental health program, including development and adherence to the  
 32 annual budget. This individual will also be responsible for the following: hiring, development and  
 33 performance management of professional and support staff, and ensuring mental health treatment  
 34 services are provided in concert with COUNTY and state rules and regulations.

35           40. Protected Health Information (PHI) means individually identifiable health information  
 36 usually transmitted through electronic media. PHI can be maintained in any medium as defined in the  
 37 regulations, or for an entity such as a health plan, transmitted or maintained in any other medium. It is

1 created or received by a covered entity and is related to the past, present, or future physical or mental  
2 health or condition of an individual, provision of health care to an individual, or the past, present, or  
3 future payment for health care provided to an individual.

4 41. Psychiatrist means an individual who meets the minimum professional and licensure  
5 requirements set forth in Title 9, CCR, Section 623, and, preferably, has at least one (1) year of  
6 experience treating children and TAY.

7 42. Quality Improvement Committee (QIC) means a committee that meets quarterly to review  
8 one percent (1%) of all “high-risk” Medi-Cal Clients in order to monitor and evaluate the quality and  
9 appropriateness of services provided. At a minimum, the committee is comprised of one (1)  
10 ADMINISTRATOR, one (1) clinician, and one (1) physician who are not involved in the clinical care of  
11 the cases.

12 43. Referral means effectively linking Clients to other services within the community and  
13 documenting follow-up provided within five (5) business days to assure that Clients have made contact  
14 with the referred service(s).

15 44. Registered Nurse (RN) means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 6  
16 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The  
17 license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that  
18 the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

19 45. Seriously Emotionally Disturbed (SED) means children or adolescents minors under the  
20 age of 18 years who have a mental disorder as identified in the most recent edition of the Diagnostic and  
21 Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, other than a primary substance use disorder or developmental  
22 disorder, which results in behavior inappropriate to the child’s age according to expected developmental  
23 norms. W&I 5600.3.

24 46. Serious Mental Impairment (SMI) means an adult with a mental disorder that is severe in  
25 degree and persistent in duration, which may cause behavioral functioning which interferes substantially  
26 with the primary activities of daily living, and which may result in an inability to maintain stable  
27 adjustment and independent functioning without treatment, support, and rehabilitation for a long or  
28 indefinite period of time. W&I 5600.3.

29 47. Student Intern means student(s) currently enrolled in an accredited graduate or  
30 undergraduate program and is/are accumulating supervised work experience hours as part of field work,  
31 internship, or practicum requirements. Acceptable programs include all programs that assist students in  
32 meeting the educational requirements to be a Licensed MFT, a LCSW, a Licensed Clinical Psychologist,  
33 a Licensed PCC, or to obtain a Bachelor’s degree. Individuals with graduate degrees and have two (2)  
34 years of full-time experience in a mental health setting, either post-degree or as part of the program  
35 leading to the graduate degree, are not considered as students.

36 48. Token means the security device which allows an end-user to access the  
37 ADMINISTRATOR’s computer based IRIS.

1 49. UMDAP means the method used for determining the annual client liability for mental  
2 health services received from the COUNTY mental health system and is set by the State of California.

3 50. WOC means the wraparound program administered by the COUNTY SSA and is available  
4 to children and transitional age youth who are returning from or being considered for placement in group  
5 homes.

6 B. CONTRACTOR AND ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the  
7 Common Terms and Condition Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

10 A. COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR in accordance with the Payments Paragraph ~~of~~in this  
11 Exhibit A to the ~~Agreement~~Contract and the following ~~budget~~budgets, which ~~is~~are set forth for  
12 informational purposes only and may be adjusted by mutual agreement, in writing, by  
13 ADMINISTRATOR and CONTRACTOR.

B. CONTRACTOR agrees the total cost of services provided for in the Agreement are based upon projected revenue generation and shall be reimbursed by federal Medi-Cal and COUNTY MHSA revenues. CONTRACTOR agrees that if actual federal Medi-Cal reimbursement, based upon the completed Cost Report, as specified in the Cost Report Paragraph of the Agreement, for each Fiscal Year is less than budgeted, the Maximum Obligation may, at ADMINISTRATOR's sole discretion, be adjusted down by the amount of under generated federal Medi-Cal revenue. CONTRACTOR further

1 agrees that MHSAs revenue shall be used to cover the cost of non-Medi-Cal Clients and/or non-Medi-Cal  
2 billable services and shall not exceed the amounts specified in the Budget Paragraph of this Exhibit A to  
3 the Agreement, unless authorized, in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR.

4 C. In the event CONTRACTOR collects fees and insurance, including Medicare, for services  
5 provided pursuant to the Agreement, CONTRACTOR may make written application to  
6 ADMINISTRATOR to retain such revenues; provided, however, the application must specify that the  
7 fees and insurance shall be utilized exclusively to provide Mental Health Services. ADMINISTRATOR  
8 may, at its sole discretion, approve any such retention of revenues. Approval by ADMINISTRATOR  
9 shall be in writing to CONTRACTOR and shall specify the amount of said revenues to be retained and

11 D. BUDGET/STAFFING MODIFICATIONS - CONTRACTOR may request to shift funds

13 continuity of care to its members, by utilizing a Budget/Staffing Modification Request form provided by  
14 ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall submit a properly completed Budget/Staffing Modification  
15 Request to ADMINISTRATOR for consideration, in advance, which shall include a justification  
16 narrative specifying the purpose of the request, the amount of said funds to be shifted, and the sustaining  
17 impact of the shift as may be applicable to the current contract period and/or future contract periods.  
18 CONTRACTOR shall obtain written approval of any Budget/Staffing Modification Request(s) from  
19 ADMINISTRATOR prior to implementation by CONTRACTOR. Failure of CONTRACTOR to obtain  
20 written approval from ADMINISTRATOR for any proposed Budget/Staffing Modification Request(s)  
21 may result in disallowance of those costs.

22 E. FINANCIAL RECORDS – CONTRACTOR shall prepare and maintain accurate and complete  
23 financial records of its cost and operating expenses. Such records will reflect the actual cost of the type  
24 of service for which payment is claimed. Any apportionment of or distribution of costs, including  
25 indirect costs, to or between programs or cost centers of CONTRACTOR shall be documented, and will  
26 be made in accordance with GAAP.

27 F. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the  
28 Budget Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

ADMINISTRATOR may, at its discretion, pay supplemental invoices for any month for which the provisional amount specified above has not been fully paid.~~

A. COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR monthly, in arrears, the provisional amounts of \$186,184 per month for Period One, \$230,409 for Period Two, \$209,609 for Period Three, and \$209,608 for Period Four, as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of the Agreement. All payments are interim payments only, and subject to final settlement in accordance with the Cost Report Paragraph of the Agreement for which CONTRACTOR shall be reimbursed for the actual cost of providing the services, provided, however, the total of such payments does not exceed the COUNTY's Maximum Obligation as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of the Agreement and, provided further, CONTRACTOR's costs are reimbursable pursuant to COUNTY, state, and/or federal regulations. ADMINISTRATOR may, at its discretion, pay supplemental invoices for any month for which the provisional amount specified above has not been fully paid.

1. In support of the monthly invoice, CONTRACTOR shall submit an Expenditure and Revenue Report as specified in the Reports Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement. ADMINISTRATOR shall use the Expenditure and Revenue Report to determine payment to CONTRACTOR as specified in Subparagraphs III.A.2. and III.A.3. below.

2. If, at any time, CONTRACTOR'S Expenditure and Revenue Reports indicate that the provisional amount payment exceeds the actual cost of providing services, ADMINISTRATOR may reduce COUNTY payments to CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the difference between the year-to-date provisional amount payments to CONTRACTOR and the year-to-date actual cost incurred by CONTRACTOR.

3. If, at any time, CONTRACTOR's Expenditure and Revenue Reports indicate that the provisional amount payments are less than the actual cost of providing services, ADMINISTRATOR may authorize an increase in the provisional amount payment to CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the difference between the year-to-date provisional amount payments to CONTRACTOR and the year-to-date actual cost incurred by CONTRACTOR.

B. CONTRACTOR's invoice shall be on a form approved or supplied by COUNTY and provide such information as is required by ADMINISTRATOR. Invoices are due the tenth (10th) calendar day of the month. Invoices received after the due date may not be paid within the same month. Payments to CONTRACTOR should be released by COUNTY no later than thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of the correctly completed invoice form.

C. All invoices to COUNTY shall be supported, at CONTRACTOR's facility, by source documentation including, but not limited to, ledgers, journals, time sheets, invoices, bank statements, cancelled checks, receipts, receiving records, and records of services provided.

1 D. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any payment if CONTRACTOR fails to comply  
2 with any provision of the Agreement.

3 E. COUNTY shall not reimburse CONTRACTOR for services provided beyond the expiration  
4 and/or termination of the Agreement, except as may otherwise be provided under the Agreement, or  
5 specifically agreed upon in a subsequent Agreement.

6 F. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the  
7 Payments Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

#### 8 9 **IV. REPORTS**

10 A. CONTRACTOR shall maintain records and make statistical reports as required by  
11 ADMINISTRATOR and the DHCS on forms provided by either agency.

#### 12 **B. FISCAL**

13 1. CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly Expenditure and Revenue Reports to  
14 ADMINISTRATOR. These reports shall be on a form acceptable to, or provided by,  
15 ADMINISTRATOR and shall report actual costs and revenues for CONTRACTOR's program described  
16 in the Services Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement. Any changes, modifications, or  
17 deviations to any approved budget line item must be approved in advance and in writing by  
18 ADMINISTRATOR and annotated on the monthly Expenditure and Revenue Report, or said cost  
19 deviations may be subject to disallowance. Such reports shall be received by ADMINISTRATOR no  
20 later than twenty (20) calendar days following the end of the month being reported.

21 2. CONTRACTOR shall submit Year-End Projection Reports to ADMINISTRATOR. These  
22 reports shall be on a form acceptable to, or provided by, ADMINISTRATOR and shall report  
23 anticipated year-end actual costs and revenues for CONTRACTOR's program described in the Services  
24 Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement. Such reports shall include actual monthly costs and  
25 revenue to date and anticipated monthly costs and revenue to the end of the fiscal year, and shall include  
26 a projection narrative justifying the year-end projections. Year-End Projection Reports shall be  
27 submitted in conjunction with the Monthly Expenditure and Revenue Reports.

28 C. STAFFING – CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly Staffing Reports to ADMINISTRATOR.  
29 These reports shall be on a form provided by ADMINISTRATOR and shall, at a minimum, report  
30 overall FTEs of the positions stipulated in the Staffing Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement,  
31 and staff hours worked by position. The reports will be received by ADMINISTRATOR no later than  
32 twenty (20) calendar days following the end of the month being reported.

33 D. PROGRAMMATIC – Throughout the term of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall submit  
34 monthly programmatic reports to ADMINISTRATOR, which shall be received by ADMINISTRATOR  
35 no later than twenty (20) calendar days following the end of the month being reported. Programmatic  
36 reports shall be in a format(s) approved by ADMINISTRATOR and shall include but not limited to,  
37 descriptions of any performance objectives, outcomes, and or interim findings as directed by

1 ADMINISTRATOR. DCR data files shall be submitted to the ADMINISTRATOR in an XML format  
 2 that has successfully passed individual and batch tests for submission to the State. CONTRACTOR  
 3 shall be prepared to present and discuss the programmatic reports at the monthly meetings with  
 4 ADMINISTRATOR, to include whether or not CONTRACTOR is progressing satisfactorily and if not,  
 5 specify what steps are being taken to achieve satisfactory progress.

6 E. ADDITIONAL REPORTS – Upon ADMINISTRATOR’s request, CONTRACTOR shall make  
 7 such additional reports as required by ADMINISTRATOR concerning CONTRACTOR’s activities as  
 8 they affect the services hereunder. ADMINISTRATOR shall be specific as to the nature of information  
 9 requested and allow up to thirty (30) calendar days for CONTRACTOR to respond.

10 F. CONTRACTOR must request in writing any extensions to the due date of the monthly required  
 11 report. If an extension is approved by ADMINISTRATOR, the total extension will not exceed more  
 12 than five (5) calendar days.

13 G. CONTRACTOR agrees to enter psychometrics into COUNTY’s EHR system as requested by  
 14 ADMINISTRATOR. Said psychometrics are for the COUNTY’s analytical uses only, and shall not be  
 15 relied upon by CONTRACTOR to make clinical decisions. CONTRACTOR agrees to hold COUNTY  
 16 harmless, and indemnify pursuant to Section XI, from any claims that arise from non-COUNTY use of  
 17 said psychometrics.

18 H. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the  
 19 Reports Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

## 20 21 **V. SERVICES**

### 22 **A. FACILITIES**

23 1. CONTRACTOR shall maintain a minimum of one (1) fully licensed and appropriate  
 24 facility for the provision of Children and Transitional Age Youth Full Service Partnership/Wraparound  
 25 Services which meets the minimum requirements for Medi-Cal eligibility at the following location or  
 26 any other location(s) approved by ADMINISTRATOR:

 28 1201 West La Veta Ave.  
 29 Orange, CA 92868  
 30

31 2. CONTRACTOR shall maintain regularly scheduled service hours, Monday through Friday  
 32 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. throughout the year, and maintain the capability to provide services in the evening  
 33 hours until 8:00 p.m. and on weekends in order to accommodate Clients unable to participate during  
 34 regular business hours.

35 a. CONTRACTOR’s administrative staff holiday schedule shall be consistent with  
 36 COUNTY’s holiday schedule unless otherwise approved, in advance and in writing, by  
 37 ADMINISTRATOR.

1 b. CONTRACTOR shall provide Clients and/or their family members with twenty-four  
 2 (24) hour a day, seven (7) day a week, three hundred sixty five (365) day a year access to their assigned  
 3 case manager or designee acceptable to ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall also develop with  
 4 each Client and/or Client's family a plan for Crisis Intervention services which includes whom to  
 5 contact for emergency services.

6 3. Upon ADMINISTRATOR's certification of the provider's existing site, the  
 7 CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for making any necessary changes to meet and maintain Medi-Cal  
 8 site standards.

9 B. FULL SERVICE PARTNERSHIP/WRAPAROUND SERVICES

10 1. CONTRACTOR shall assess potential Clients meeting the following criteria unless written  
 11 exception is granted by ADMINISTRATOR:

12 a. Individuals under the age of eighteen (18) years of age (until eighteenth [18th]  
 13 birthday);

14 b. Individuals eighteen (18) through twenty-five (25) years of age (until twenty-sixth  
 15 [26th] birthday) who are legally residing in COUNTY and otherwise eligible for public services under  
 16 federal and state law;

17 c. Displaying behaviors or a history indicative of SED/SMI as defined by the WIC  
 18 Section 5600.3; and

19 d. In one of the following target groups:

20 1) homeless;

21 2) unserved or underserved because of linguistic or cultural isolation;

22 3) with a history of multiple psychiatric hospitalizations;

23 4) experiencing their first psychotic episode;

24 5) uninsured;

25 6) exiting the Social Service or Probation systems;

26 7) with special needs particularly chronic illnesses and the sequelae of acute illness or  
 27 injury and/or Co-Occurring disorders; or

28 8) children of parent(s)/guardian(s) with serious mental illness.

29 2. CONTRACTOR shall coordinate Referrals with other existing wraparound and Mental  
 30 Health Services to ensure that all Clients and/or their families are given access to the most appropriate  
 31 level and type of services. Other services may include WOC, MHSA FSP/W programs for children  
 32 and/or adults, and other COUNTY Mental Health Services.

33 3. CONTRACTOR shall provide supportive services for all persons referred but not admitted  
 34 to the FSP/W until those persons can be engaged in alternative services. Referrals to alternate services,  
 35 and the supported services provided until Engagement, will be reviewed and approved by  
 36 ADMINISTRATOR.

37 //

1           4. CONTRACTOR shall provide a FSP/W program that is evidence-based and strength-based,  
 2 with the focus on the individual rather than the disease. The ideal client to staff ratio will be in the range  
 3 of ten (10) to one (1), ensuring relationship building and intense service delivery. CONTRACTOR shall  
 4 provide a FSP/W program that will provide community based, in-home, intensive, mental health case  
 5 management services addressing family needs across all life domains of the Client and where the Client  
 6 will be a full partner in the development and implementation of their treatment plan. In the program, a  
 7 case manager or PSC and the client/family will form a service team which will identify strengths, needs  
 8 and resources, including additional people to be added to the team. The team will develop a service plan  
 9 for each enrollee within thirty (30) calendar days of enrollment. The implementation of the service plan  
 10 will be the responsibility of the team using a “whatever-it-takes” approach to promote success, safety  
 11 and permanence in the home, school, and community. The plan will cover the entire range of needs for  
 12 the Client and/or their family: housing, employment and medical, etc. in addition to Mental Health  
 13 Services. The services are focused on resiliency and harm reduction to encourage the highest level of  
 14 client empowerment and independence achievable. These services include but are not limited to the  
 15 following:

- 16           a. Twenty-four (24)-hours per day, seven (7) days per week Crisis management;
- 17           b. Housing Resources/Referrals and support;
- 18           c. Intensive case management;
- 19           d. Community-based Wraparound Services;
- 20           e. Vocational and Educational services;
- 21           f. Job Coaching/Developing;
- 22           g. Employment support/services;
- 23           h. Money management/Representative Payee support;
- 24           i. Flexible Fund account for immediate needs;
- 25           j. Transportation;
- 26           k. Illness education and self-management;
- 27           l. Medication Support;
- 28           m. Co-occurring Services and care coordination with medical providers;
- 29           n. Linkage to financial benefits/entitlements;
- 30           o. Family and Peer Support; and
- 31           p. Supportive socialization and meaningful community roles.

32           5. The team will be responsible for identifying ways of addressing needs through linkage to  
 33 existing services in the community and will also have limited access to additional funding to address  
 34 other needed services or support as necessary. The CONTRACTOR shall offer a “whatever it takes”  
 35 approach to engage SED/SMI clients, including those who are dually diagnosed, in a partnership to  
 36 achieve the individual’s wellness and resiliency goals. Services shall be non-coercive and focused on  
 37 engaging people in the field. The goal of the program is to assist the client’s progress through pre-

1 determined quality of life outcome domains (housing, decreased jail, decreased hospitalization,  
2 increased education involvement, increased employment opportunities and retention, linkage to medical  
3 providers, etc.) and become more independent and self-sufficient as the client progresses to a lower  
4 level of care or out of the “intensive case management need” category.

5 6. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that every Client is engaged in mental health treatment  
6 appropriate to his/her Diagnosis and level of distress. Therapists, Psychiatrist, and others providing  
7 treatment will be included on the FSP/W team unless otherwise approved in writing by  
8 ADMINISTRATOR.

9 7. CONTRACTOR shall collect and input all data about characteristics and progress of the  
10 Clients into a Data Collection System or other database as mandated by the state and/or  
11 ADMINISTRATOR.

12 8. CONTRACTOR shall confer with ADMINISTRATOR prior to recommending a Client for  
13 discharge. Planning for discharge or transition to an appropriate alternative service shall be initiated at  
14 Admission to the FSP/W and be incorporated into the service plan.

15 9. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain an advisory committee for the FSP/W services,  
16 which shall meet at least monthly to review and comment on the progress of the program. Clients,  
17 former Clients, and/or their family members shall be represented on the committee, as well as relevant  
18 community representatives mutually agreed upon by ADMINISTRATOR and CONTRACTOR.

19 10. CONTRACTOR shall participate in any clinical case review and implement any  
20 recommendations made by ADMINISTRATOR to improve Client care.

21 11. CONTRACTOR shall conduct thirty (30)-day review of open cases, or previously opened  
22 with another provider. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all chart documentation complies with all  
23 federal, state, and local guidelines and standards.

24 12. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all clinical documentation is completed promptly and is  
25 reflected on the Client’s chart within twenty-four (24) hours after the completion of services.

26 13. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all staff complete the COUNTY’s New Provider Training  
27 and Annual Provider Training, and staff responsible for input into IRIS complete IRIS New User  
28 Training.

29 14. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that Annual Compliance Training is completed as set forth in  
30 the Compliance Paragraph of the Agreement.

### 31 C. PERFORMANCE OUTCOMES

32 1. CONTRACTOR shall complete Performance Outcome Measures as required by State  
33 and/or COUNTY.

34 2. ADMINISTRATOR shall develop and provide CONTRACTOR with performance outcome  
35 measure guidelines for the purpose of evaluating the impact and/or contribution of CONTRACTOR’s  
36 services on the well-being of COUNTY residents being served under the terms of the Agreement. The  
37 expected outcomes for the Monitoring Plan are to enable Clients to adaptively function at a higher and



1 more appropriate level and to provide a quantifiable and repeatable measure to assess overall program  
2 effectiveness.

3 3. CONTRACTOR shall cooperate in data collection in order to develop baseline figures for  
4 future evaluation and report performance in terms of Client satisfaction, length of stay, and duration of  
5 services.

#### 6 D. CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITIES

7 1. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all staff are trained and have a clear understanding of  
8 CONTRACTOR's administrative and program P&Ps. CONTRACTOR shall provide signature  
9 confirmation of its P&P training for each staff member and place in their personnel files.

10 2. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all newly hired staff complete the COUNTY's New  
11 Provider Training, existing staff complete the COUNTY's Annual Provider Training, and staff  
12 responsible for input into IRIS complete the IRIS New User Training.

13 3. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that Annual Compliance Training is completed as set forth in  
14 Subparagraph C. of the Compliance Paragraph of the Agreement.

15 4. CONTRACTOR shall agree to adopt and comply with the written Quality Improvement  
16 Implementation Plan and procedures provided by ADMINISTRATOR which describe the requirements  
17 for quality improvement, supervisory review, and medication monitoring.

18 5. CONTRACTOR shall agree to adopt and comply with the documentation standards as per  
19 ADMINISTRATOR's Standards of Care practices; P&P's, New Provider Training, Annual Provider  
20 Training; DHCS State Contract; Title IX; the State EPSDT Documentation Manual; the State EPSDT  
21 TBS Documentation Manual; Medi-Cal Manual for Intensive Care Coordination (ICC), Intensive Home  
22 Based Services (IHBS) & Therapeutic Foster Care (TFC) for Katie A. Subclass Members, and the  
23 EPSDT TBS Coordination of Care Best Practices Manual as provided by ADMINISTRATOR, which  
24 describe, but are not limited to, the requirements for Medi-Cal and ADMINISTRATOR charting  
25 standards; and any state regulatory requirements.

26 6. CONTRACTOR shall regularly review their charting, IRIS data input, and invoice systems  
27 to ensure compliance with COUNTY and State P&Ps and establish mechanisms to prevent inaccurate  
28 claim submissions.

29 7. CONTRACTOR shall maintain on file at the facility minutes and records of all quality  
30 improvement meetings and processes. Such records and minutes shall also be subject to regular review  
31 by ADMINISTRATOR in the manner specified in the Quality Improvement Implementation Plan and  
32 ADMINISTRATOR's P&Ps.

33 8. CONTRACTOR shall attend:

34 a. Case conferences, as requested by ADMINISTRATOR to address any aspect of clinical  
35 care.

36 b. Monthly meetings with ADMINISTRATOR to discuss contractual and other issues  
37 related to, but not limited to compliance with P&Ps, statistics and clinical services.

1 c. Clinical staff training for individuals by ADMINISTRATOR. Such training shall be  
2 conducted by CONTRACTOR and/or ADMINISTRATOR.

3 d. Quarterly QIC meetings.

4 9. CONTRACTOR shall allow ADMINISTRATOR to attend, and if necessary conduct, QIC  
5 and medication monitoring meetings.

6 E. TOKENS – ADMINISTRATOR shall provide CONTRACTOR the necessary number of  
7 Tokens for appropriate individual staff to access IRIS at no cost to the CONTRACTOR.

8 1. CONTRACTOR recognizes Tokens are assigned to a specific individual staff member with  
9 a unique password. Tokens and passwords will not be shared with anyone.

10 2. CONTRACTOR shall maintain an inventory of the Tokens, by serial number and the staff  
11 member to whom each is assigned.

12 3. CONTRACTOR shall indicate in the monthly staffing report, the serial number of the  
13 Token for each staff member assigned a Token.

14 4. CONTRACTOR shall return to ADMINISTRATOR all Tokens under the following  
15 conditions:

- 16 a. Token of each staff member who no longer supports the Agreement;
- 17 b. Token of each staff member who no longer requires access to IRIS;
- 18 c. Token of each staff member who leaves employment of CONTRACTOR; or
- 19 d. Token is malfunctioning;
- 20 e. Termination of the Agreement.

21 5. ADMINISTRATOR shall issue Tokens for CONTRACTOR's staff members who require  
22 access to IRIS upon initial training or as a replacement for malfunctioning Tokens.

23 6. CONTRACTOR shall reimburse the COUNTY for Tokens lost, stolen, or damaged through  
24 acts of negligence.

25 7. CONTRACTOR shall input all IRIS data following COUNTY procedure and practice. All  
26 statistical data used to monitor CONTRACTOR shall be compiled using only COUNTY IRIS reports, if  
27 available, and if applicable.

28 F. CONTRACTOR shall obtain a NPI.

29 1. All HIPAA covered healthcare providers, individuals and organizations must obtain a NPI  
30 for use to identify themselves in HIPAA standard transactions.

31 2. CONTRACTOR, including each employee that provides services under the Agreement,  
32 will obtain a NPI upon commencement of the Agreement or prior to providing services under the  
33 Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall report to ADMINISTRATOR, on a form approved or supplied by  
34 ADMINISTRATOR, all NPI as soon as they are available.

35 G. CONTRACTOR shall provide the NPP for the COUNTY, as the MHP, at the time of the first  
36 service provided under the Agreement to individuals who are covered by Medi-Cal and have not  
37 previously received services at a COUNTY operated clinic. CONTRACTOR shall also provide, upon

1 request, the NPP for the COUNTY, as the MHP, to any individual who received services under the  
2 Agreement.

3 H. CONTRACTOR shall not conduct any proselytizing activities, regardless of funding sources,  
4 with respect to any individual(s) who have been referred to CONTRACTOR by COUNTY under the  
5 terms of the Agreement. Further, CONTRACTOR agrees that the funds provided hereunder will not be  
6 used to promote, directly or indirectly, any religion, religious creed or cult, denomination or sectarian  
7 institution, or religious belief.

8 I. CONTRACTOR shall not engage in, or permit any of its employees or subcontractors, to  
9 conduct research activity on COUNTY Clients without obtaining prior written authorization from  
10 ADMINISTRATOR.

11 J. CONTRACTOR shall provide effective Administrative management of the budget, staffing,  
12 recording, and reporting portion of the Agreement with the COUNTY. If administrative responsibilities  
13 are delegated to subcontractors, CONTRACTOR must ensure that any subcontractor(s) possess the  
14 qualifications and capacity to perform all delegated responsibilities. These responsibilities include, but  
15 are not limited, to the following:

- 16 1. Designate the responsible position(s) in your organization for managing the funds allocated  
17 to the program;
- 18 2. Maximize the use of the allocated funds;
- 19 3. Ensure timely and accurate reporting of monthly expenditures;
- 20 4. Maintain appropriate staffing levels;
- 21 5. Request budget and/or staffing modifications to the Agreement;
- 22 6. Effectively communicate and monitor the program for its success;
- 23 7. Track and report expenditures electronically;
- 24 8. Maintain electronic and telephone communication between CONTRACTOR and  
25 ADMINISTRATOR; and
- 26 9. Act quickly to identify and solve problems.

27 K. CONTRACTOR shall document all adverse incidents affecting the physical and/or emotional  
28 welfare of Clients, including but not limited to serious physical harm to self or others, serious  
29 destruction of property, developments, etc., and which may raise liability issues with COUNTY.  
30 CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY within twenty-four (24) hours of any such serious adverse  
31 incident.

32 L. CONTRACTOR shall advise ADMINISTRATOR of any special incidents, conditions, or issues  
33 that adversely affect the quality or accessibility of Client-related services provided by, or under contract  
34 with, the COUNTY as identified in the ADMINISTRATOR's P&Ps.

35 M. FLEXIBLE FUNDS

- 36 1. CONTRACTOR shall follow the procedures identified below and as specified by

37 //

1 ADMINISTRATOR, regarding the request for, use, and accounting of Individual Services and Support  
2 funds (Flexible Funds):

3 a. Flexible Funds shall be individualized, appropriate, reasonable, and justified for the  
4 treatment of a Client's mental illness and overall quality of life;

5 b. Flexible Funds may be used when other community resources such as family/friends,  
6 food banks, shelters, charitable organizations, etc. are not available and/or accessible in a timely  
7 manner, or are not appropriate for a Client's situation. Designated CONTRACTOR staff shall assist  
8 Clients in exploring other available resources whenever possible, prior to utilizing Flexible Funds;

9 c. Flexible Funds expenditures for various types of purchases shall be identified as  
10 allowable, unallowable, or require discussion with ADMINISTRATOR;

11 d. Flexible Funds shall not be used for housing Clients that have not been enrolled in  
12 CONTRACTOR's program, unless approved, in advance and in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR;

13 e. Flexible Funds shall not be given in the form of cash to any Client, either enrolled or in  
14 the Outreach and Engagement phase of the CONTRACTOR's program;

15 f. Pre-purchases shall only be for food, transportation, clothing and motels or other  
16 purchases as required and appropriate, and approved in advance and in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR;

17 g. Pre-purchases of food, transportation, and clothing vouchers and/or gift cards shall be  
18 limited to a combined \$5,000 supply on-hand at any given time, and that all voucher and/or gift card  
19 purchases and disbursements shall be tracked and logged by designated CONTRACTOR staff.  
20 Vouchers and/or gift cards shall be limited in monetary value to not more than \$25 each, unless  
21 otherwise approved in advance and in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR.

22 h. Pre-purchases for motels shall be on a case-by-case basis and time-limited in nature,  
23 and only utilized while more appropriate housing is being located. Pre-purchases of motel rooms shall  
24 be tracked and logged upon purchase and disbursement.

25 2. CONTRACTOR's process for documenting and accounting for all Flexible Fund  
26 expenditures, shall include, but not be limited to, retention of comprehensible source documentation  
27 such as receipts, copies of lease/rental agreements for Client housing, general ledgers, and needs shall be  
28 documented in Client's MHP;

29 3. CONTRACTOR shall obtain written authorization from ADMINISTRATOR for individual  
30 purchases made on behalf of a Client and/or Client family member(s) in the amount(s) as determined by  
31 ADMINISTRATOR;

32 a. Gift cards and vouchers for Clients shall be securely stored and documentation of their  
33 disbursement, including end-of-year process accounting for gift cards still in staff possession, shall be  
34 maintained by CONTRACTOR.

35 b. A single Flexible Fund expenditure, in excess of \$1,000, shall not be made without  
36 prior written approval of ADMINISTRATOR. In emergency situations, CONTRACTOR may exceed  
37 the \$1,000 limit, if appropriate and justified, and shall notify ADMINISTRATOR the next business day

1 of such an expense. Said notification shall include total costs and a justification for the expense. Failure  
 2 to notify ADMINISTRATOR within the specified timeframe may result in disallowance of the  
 3 expenditure.

4 4. CONTRACTOR shall designate staff to authorize Flexible Fund expenditures and that the  
 5 mechanism used to ensure this staff has timely access to Flexible Funds is identified;

6 5. CONTRACTOR shall report Flexible Funds expenditure detail monthly, on a form  
 7 provided or approved by ADMINISTRATOR. The Flexible Fund report shall be submitted with  
 8 CONTRACTOR's monthly Expenditure and Revenue Report. The report shall be submitted to  
 9 ADMINISTRATOR no later than the twentieth (20th) day following the end of the month being  
 10 reported. CONTRACTOR must request in writing any extensions to the due date of the monthly report;

11 6. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a P&P regarding Flexible Funds that  
 12 incorporates at a minimum the requirements as specified in Subparagraph C.1., above. CONTRACTOR  
 13 shall submit said P&P to ADMINISTRATOR no later than twenty (20) calendar days from the start of  
 14 the Agreement. If the Flexible Fund P&P has not been approved by ADMINISTRATOR within sixty  
 15 (60) calendar days from the start of the Agreement, any subsequent Flexible Fund expenditures may be  
 16 disallowed by ADMINISTRATOR.

17 N. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the  
 18 Services Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

## 20 VI. STAFFING

21 A. CONTRACTOR shall, at a minimum, provide the following staffing pattern expressed in FTEs  
 22 continuously throughout the term of the AgreementContract. One (1) FTE shall be equal to an average  
 23 of forty (40) hours of work per week to provide behavioralmental health outpatientcrisis services for  
 24 children and youth:

28 B. CONTRACTOR shall have as Head of Service a licensed mental health professional, in  
 29 conformance to one of the following staff categories: Psychiatrist, Licensed Psychologist, LCSW,  
 30 LPCC, Licensed MFT, RN, LVN, or LPT.

31 C. CONTRACTOR shall include bilingual/bicultural services to meet the needs of threshold  
 32 languages as determined by COUNTY. Whenever possible, bilingual/bicultural staff should be retained.  
 33 Any clinical vacancies occurring at a time when bilingual and bicultural composition of the clinical  
 34 staffing does not meet the above requirement must be filled with bilingual and bicultural staff unless  
 35 ADMINISTRATOR consents, in advance and in writing, to the filling of those positions with non-  
 36 bilingual staff. Salary savings resulting from such vacant positions may not be used to cover costs other

3 D. CONTRACTOR shall maintain personnel files for each staff person, including management and

6 documentation of bicultural/bilingual capabilities (if applicable), pay rate and evaluations justifying pay

8 E. CONTRACTOR shall make its best effort to provide services pursuant to the Agreement in a

10 shall maintain documents of such efforts which may include; but not be limited to: records of

14 F. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, no later than seventy-two (72)

16 CONTRACTOR and COUNTY to be in compliance with prevailing standards of practice as well as  
17 State and Federal regulatory requirements.

18 N. CONTRACTOR shall provide ongoing supervision throughout all shifts to all staff, albeit paid  
19 or unpaid, direct line staff or supervisors/directors, to enhance service quality and program  
20 effectiveness. Supervision methods should include debriefings and consultation as needed, individual  
21 supervision or one-on-one support, and team meetings. Supervision should be provided by a supervisor  
22 who has extensive knowledge regarding mental health issues.

32 P. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the

12 **I. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE CONTRACT**

13 A. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND RECITALS

14 1. The parties agree that the terms used, but not otherwise defined in the Common Terms and  
 15 Definitions Paragraph of Exhibit A to the Agreement or in Subparagraph B below, shall have the same  
 16 meaning given to such terms under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and their implementing regulations at  
 17 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164 (“the HIPAA regulations”) as they may exist now or be hereafter amended.

18 2. The parties agree that a business associate relationship under HIPAA, the HITECH Act,  
 19 and the HIPAA regulations between the CONTRACTOR and COUNTY arises if and only to the extent  
 20 that CONTRACTOR performs, or delegates to subcontractors to perform, functions or activities on  
 21 behalf of COUNTY pursuant to, and as set forth in, the Agreement that meet the statutory definition of  
 22 “Business Associate” in 45 CFR § 160.103. It is further understood and agreed that in the absence of a  
 23 Business Associate relationship as defined by HIPAA, between CONTRACTOR and COUNTY, any  
 24 and all terms contained within this Exhibit B shall have no legal force or binding effect. Irrespective of  
 25 the applicability of Exhibit B, CONTRACTOR and COUNTY shall maintain appropriate safeguards to  
 26 protect Protected Health Information in full compliance with all applicable State and Federal privacy  
 27 laws, including, but not limited to HIPAA and the HITECH Act, as is required of both parties in their  
 28 roles as Covered Entities.

29 3. The COUNTY wishes to disclose to CONTRACTOR certain information pursuant to the  
 30 terms of the Agreement, some of which may constitute PHI, as defined below in Subparagraph B.10, to  
 31 be used or disclosed in the course of providing services and activities pursuant to, and as set forth, in the  
 32 Agreement.

33 4. The parties intend to protect the privacy and provide for the security of PHI that may be  
 34 created, received, maintained, transmitted, used, or disclosed pursuant to the Agreement in compliance  
 35 with the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH  
 36 Act, and the HIPAA regulations as they may exist now or be hereafter amended.

37 //

1 5. The parties understand and acknowledge that HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA  
2 regulations do not pre-empt any state statutes, rules, or regulations that are not otherwise pre-empted by  
3 other Federal law(s) and impose more stringent requirements with respect to privacy of PHI.

4 6. The parties understand that the HIPAA Privacy and Security rules, as defined below in  
5 Subparagraphs B.9 and B.14, apply to the CONTRACTOR in the same manner as they apply to the  
6 covered entity (COUNTY). CONTRACTOR agrees therefore to be in compliance at all times with the  
7 terms of this Business Associate Contract, as it exists now or be hereafter updated with notice to  
8 CONTRACTOR, and the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of the  
9 Privacy and the Security rules, as they may exist now or be hereafter amended, with respect to PHI and  
10 electronic PHI created, received, maintained, transmitted, used, or disclosed pursuant to the Agreement.

#### 11 B. DEFINITIONS

12 1. "Administrative Safeguards" are administrative actions, and P&Ps, to manage the selection,  
13 development, implementation, and maintenance of security measures to protect ePHI and to manage the  
14 conduct of CONTRACTOR's workforce in relation to the protection of that information.

15 2. "Breach" means the acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted  
16 under the HIPAA Privacy Rule which compromises the security or privacy of the PHI.

##### 17 a. Breach excludes:

18 1) Any unintentional acquisition, access, or use of PHI by a workforce member or  
19 person acting under the authority of CONTRACTOR or COUNTY, if such acquisition, access, or use  
20 was made in good faith and within the scope of authority and does not result in further use or disclosure  
21 in a manner not permitted under the Privacy Rule.

22 2) Any inadvertent disclosure by a person who is authorized to access PHI at  
23 CONTRACTOR to another person authorized to access PHI at the CONTRACTOR, or organized health  
24 care arrangement in which COUNTY participates, and the information received as a result of such  
25 disclosure is not further used or disclosed in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

26 3) A disclosure of PHI where CONTRACTOR or COUNTY has a good faith belief  
27 that an unauthorized person to whom the disclosure was made would not reasonably have been able to  
28 retain such information.

29 b. Except as provided in Subparagraph a. of this definition, an acquisition, access, use, or  
30 disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule is presumed to be a breach  
31 unless CONTRACTOR demonstrates that there is a low probability that the PHI has been compromised  
32 based on a risk assessment of at least the following factors:

33 1) The nature and extent of the PHI involved, including the types of identifiers and the  
34 likelihood of re-identification;

35 2) The unauthorized person who used the PHI or to whom the disclosure was made;

36 3) Whether the PHI was actually acquired or viewed; and

37 4) The extent to which the risk to the PHI has been mitigated.

1 3. "Data Aggregation" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy  
2 Rule in 45 CFR § 164.501.

3 4. "DRS" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in  
4 45 CFR § 164.501.

5 5. "Disclosure" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in  
6 45 CFR § 160.103.

7 6. "Health Care Operations" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA  
8 Privacy Rule in 45 CFR § 164.501.

9 7. "Individual" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in  
10 45 CFR § 160.103 and shall include a person who qualifies as a personal representative in accordance  
11 with 45 CFR § 164.502(g).

12 8. "Physical Safeguards" are physical measures, policies, and procedures to protect  
13 CONTRACTOR's electronic information systems and related buildings and equipment, from natural  
14 and environmental hazards, and unauthorized intrusion.

15 9. "The HIPAA Privacy Rule" shall mean the Standards for Privacy of Individually  
16 Identifiable Health Information at 45 CFR Part 160 and Part 164, Subparts A and E.

17 10. "PHI" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in  
18 45 CFR § 160.103.

19 11. "Required by Law" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy  
20 Rule in 45 CFR § 164.103.

21 12. "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of the Department of HHS or his or her designee.

22 13. "Security Incident" means attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure,  
23 modification, or destruction of information or interference with system operations in an information  
24 system. "Security incident" does not include trivial incidents that occur on a daily basis, such as scans,  
25 "pings", or unsuccessful attempts to penetrate computer networks or servers maintained by  
26 CONTRACTOR.

27 14. "The HIPAA Security Rule" shall mean the Security Standards for the Protection of ePHI at  
28 45 CFR Part 160, Part 162, and Part 164, Subparts A and C.

29 15. "Subcontractor" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in  
30 45 CFR § 160.103.

31 16. "Technical safeguards" means the technology and the P&Ps for its use that protect  
32 electronic PHI and control access to it.

33 17. "Unsecured PHI" or "PHI that is unsecured" means PHI that is not rendered unusable,  
34 unreadable, or indecipherable to unauthorized individuals through the use of a technology or  
35 methodology specified by the Secretary of HHS in the guidance issued on the HHS Web site.

36 18. "Use" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in 45 CFR §  
37 160.103.

1 C. OBLIGATIONS AND ACTIVITIES OF CONTRACTOR AS BUSINESS ASSOCIATE

2 1. CONTRACTOR agrees not to use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to  
3 CONTRACTOR other than as permitted or required by this Business Associate Contract or as required  
4 by law.

5 2. CONTRACTOR agrees to use appropriate safeguards, as provided for in this Business  
6 Associate Contract and the Agreement, to prevent use or disclosure of PHI COUNTY discloses to  
7 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
8 other than as provided for by this Business Associate Contract.

9 3. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with the HIPAA Security Rule at Subpart C of  
10 45 CFR Part 164 with respect to ePHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR  
11 creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY.

12 4. CONTRACTOR agrees to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is  
13 known to CONTRACTOR of a Use or Disclosure of PHI by CONTRACTOR in violation of the  
14 requirements of this Business Associate Contract.

15 5. CONTRACTOR agrees to report to COUNTY immediately any Use or Disclosure of PHI  
16 not provided for by this Business Associate Contract of which CONTRACTOR becomes aware.  
17 CONTRACTOR must report Breaches of Unsecured PHI in accordance with Subparagraph E below and  
18 as required by 45 CFR § 164.410.

19 6. CONTRACTOR agrees to ensure that any Subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or  
20 transmit PHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree to the same restrictions and conditions that apply  
21 through this Business Associate Contract to CONTRACTOR with respect to such information.

22 7. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide access, within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of a  
23 written request by COUNTY, to PHI in a DRS, to COUNTY or, as directed by COUNTY, to an  
24 Individual in order to meet the requirements under 45 CFR § 164.524. If CONTRACTOR maintains an  
25 EHR with PHI, and an individual requests a copy of such information in an electronic format,  
26 CONTRACTOR shall provide such information in an electronic format.

27 8. CONTRACTOR agrees to make any amendment(s) to PHI in a DRS that COUNTY directs  
28 or agrees to pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.526 at the request of COUNTY or an Individual, within thirty  
29 (30) calendar days of receipt of said request by COUNTY. CONTRACTOR agrees to notify COUNTY  
30 in writing no later than ten (10) calendar days after said amendment is completed.

31 9. CONTRACTOR agrees to make internal practices, books, and records, including P&Ps,  
32 relating to the use and disclosure of PHI received from, or created or received by CONTRACTOR on  
33 behalf of, COUNTY available to COUNTY and the Secretary in a time and manner as determined by  
34 COUNTY or as designated by the Secretary for purposes of the Secretary determining COUNTY's  
35 compliance with the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

36 10. CONTRACTOR agrees to document any Disclosures of PHI COUNTY discloses to  
37 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY,

1 and to make information related to such Disclosures available as would be required for COUNTY to  
2 respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of Disclosures of PHI in accordance with  
3 45 CFR § 164.528.

4 11. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide COUNTY or an Individual, as directed by COUNTY, in  
5 a time and manner to be determined by COUNTY, that information collected in accordance with the  
6 Agreement, in order to permit COUNTY to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of  
7 Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528.

8 12. CONTRACTOR agrees that to the extent CONTRACTOR carries out COUNTY's  
9 obligation under the HIPAA Privacy and/or Security rules CONTRACTOR will comply with the  
10 requirements of 45 CFR Part 164 that apply to COUNTY in the performance of such obligation.

11 13. If CONTRACTOR receives Social Security data from COUNTY provided to COUNTY by  
12 a state agency, upon request by COUNTY, CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY with a list of all  
13 employees, subcontractors, and agents who have access to the Social Security data, including  
14 employees, agents, subcontractors, and agents of its subcontractors.

15 14. CONTRACTOR will notify COUNTY if CONTRACTOR is named as a defendant in a  
16 criminal proceeding for a violation of HIPAA. COUNTY may terminate the Agreement, if  
17 CONTRACTOR is found guilty of a criminal violation in connection with HIPAA. COUNTY may  
18 terminate the Agreement, if a finding or stipulation that CONTRACTOR has violated any standard or  
19 requirement of the privacy or security provisions of HIPAA, or other security or privacy laws are made  
20 in any administrative or civil proceeding in which CONTRACTOR is a party or has been joined.  
21 COUNTY will consider the nature and seriousness of the violation in deciding whether or not to  
22 terminate the Agreement.

23 15. CONTRACTOR shall make itself and any subcontractors, employees or agents assisting  
24 CONTRACTOR in the performance of its obligations under the Agreement, available to COUNTY at  
25 no cost to COUNTY to testify as witnesses, or otherwise, in the event of litigation or administrative  
26 proceedings being commenced against COUNTY, its directors, officers or employees based upon  
27 claimed violation of HIPAA, the HIPAA regulations or other laws relating to security and privacy,  
28 which involves inactions or actions by CONTRACTOR, except where CONTRACTOR or its  
29 subcontractor, employee, or agent is a named adverse party.

30 16. The Parties acknowledge that federal and state laws relating to electronic data security and  
31 privacy are rapidly evolving and that amendment of this Business Associate Contract may be required to  
32 provide for procedures to ensure compliance with such developments. The Parties specifically agree to  
33 take such action as is necessary to implement the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH  
34 Act, the HIPAA regulations and other applicable laws relating to the security or privacy of PHI. Upon  
35 COUNTY's request, CONTRACTOR agrees to promptly enter into negotiations with COUNTY  
36 concerning an amendment to this Business Associate Contract embodying written assurances consistent  
37 with the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations or other

1 applicable laws. COUNTY may terminate the Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice in the  
2 event:

3 a. CONTRACTOR does not promptly enter into negotiations to amend this Business  
4 Associate Contract when requested by COUNTY pursuant to this Subparagraph C; or

5 b. CONTRACTOR does not enter into an amendment providing assurances regarding the  
6 safeguarding of PHI that COUNTY deems are necessary to satisfy the standards and requirements of  
7 HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations.

8 17. CONTRACTOR shall work with COUNTY upon notification by CONTRACTOR to  
9 COUNTY of a Breach to properly determine if any Breach exclusions exist as defined in Subparagraph  
10 B.2.a above.

#### 11 D. SECURITY RULE

12 1. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.306 and establish  
13 and maintain appropriate Administrative, Physical and Technical Safeguards in accordance with  
14 45 CFR § 164.308, § 164.310, and § 164.312, with respect to electronic PHI COUNTY discloses to  
15 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY.  
16 CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and security program that  
17 includes Administrative, Physical, and Technical Safeguards appropriate to the size and complexity of  
18 CONTRACTOR's operations and the nature and scope of its activities.

19 2. CONTRACTOR shall implement reasonable and appropriate P&Ps to comply with the  
20 standards, implementation specifications and other requirements of 45 CFR Part 164, Subpart C, in  
21 compliance with 45 CFR § 164.316. CONTRACTOR will provide COUNTY with its current and  
22 updated policies upon request.

23 3. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the continuous security of all computerized data systems  
24 containing ePHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives,  
25 maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall protect paper documents  
26 containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives,  
27 maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. These steps shall include, at a minimum:

28 a. Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed under Subparagraph  
29 E., below;

30 b. Achieving and maintaining compliance with the HIPAA Security Rule, as necessary in  
31 conducting operations on behalf of COUNTY;

32 c. Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and scope  
33 of security established by the OMB in OMB Circular No. A-130, Appendix III - Security of Federal  
34 Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for automated information systems in  
35 Federal agencies;

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1 4. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that any subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or  
2 transmit ePHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree through a contract with CONTRACTOR to the same  
3 restrictions and requirements contained in this Subparagraph D of this Business Associate Contract.

4 5. CONTRACTOR shall report to COUNTY immediately any Security Incident of which it  
5 becomes aware. CONTRACTOR shall report Breaches of Unsecured PHI in accordance with  
6 Subparagraph E below and as required by 45 CFR § 164.410.

7 6. CONTRACTOR shall designate a Security Officer to oversee its data security program who  
8 shall be responsible for carrying out the requirements of this paragraph and for communicating on  
9 security matters with COUNTY.

#### 10 E. DATA SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

##### 11 1. Personal Controls

12 a. Employee Training. All workforce members who assist in the performance of  
13 functions or activities on behalf of COUNTY in connection with Agreement, or access or disclose PHI  
14 COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on  
15 behalf of COUNTY, must complete information privacy and security training, at least annually, at  
16 CONTRACTOR's expense. Each workforce member who receives information privacy and security  
17 training must sign a certification, indicating the member's name and the date on which the training was  
18 completed. These certifications must be retained for a period of six (6) years following the termination  
19 of Agreement.

20 b. Employee Discipline. Appropriate sanctions must be applied against workforce  
21 members who fail to comply with any provisions of CONTRACTOR's privacy P&Ps, including  
22 termination of employment where appropriate.

23 c. Confidentiality Statement. All persons that will be working with PHI COUNTY  
24 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of  
25 COUNTY must sign a confidentiality statement that includes, at a minimum, General Use, Security and  
26 Privacy Safeguards, Unacceptable Use, and Enforcement Policies. The statement must be signed by the  
27 workforce member prior to access to such PHI. The statement must be renewed annually. The  
28 CONTRACTOR shall retain each person's written confidentiality statement for COUNTY inspection  
29 for a period of six (6) years following the termination of the Agreement.

30 d. Background Check. Before a member of the workforce may access PHI COUNTY  
31 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of  
32 COUNTY, a background screening of that worker must be conducted. The screening should be  
33 commensurate with the risk and magnitude of harm the employee could cause, with more thorough  
34 screening being done for those employees who are authorized to bypass significant technical and  
35 operational security controls. CONTRACTOR shall retain each workforce member's background check  
36 documentation for a period of three (3) years.

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1           2. Technical Security Controls

2           a. Workstation/Laptop encryption. All workstations and laptops that store PHI COUNTY  
3 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of  
4 COUNTY either directly or temporarily must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which  
5 is 128bit or higher, such as AES. The encryption solution must be full disk unless approved by the  
6 COUNTY.

7           b. Server Security. Servers containing unencrypted PHI COUNTY discloses to  
8 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
9 must have sufficient administrative, physical, and technical controls in place to protect that data, based  
10 upon a risk assessment/system security review.

11           c. Minimum Necessary. Only the minimum necessary amount of PHI COUNTY discloses  
12 to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
13 required to perform necessary business functions may be copied, downloaded, or exported.

14           d. Removable media devices. All electronic files that contain PHI COUNTY discloses to  
15 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
16 must be encrypted when stored on any removable media or portable device (i.e. USB thumb drives,  
17 floppies, CD/DVD, Blackberry, backup tapes etc.). Encryption must be a FIPS 140-2 certified  
18 algorithm which is 128bit or higher, such as AES. Such PHI shall not be considered “removed from the  
19 premises” if it is only being transported from one of CONTRACTOR’s locations to another of  
20 CONTRACTOR’s locations.

21           e. Antivirus software. All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or  
22 store PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or  
23 transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have installed and actively use comprehensive anti-virus software  
24 solution with automatic updates scheduled at least daily.

25           f. Patch Management. All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or  
26 store PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or  
27 transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have critical security patches applied, with system reboot if  
28 necessary. There must be a documented patch management process which determines installation  
29 timeframe based on risk assessment and vendor recommendations. At a maximum, all applicable  
30 patches must be installed within thirty (30) days of vendor release. Applications and systems that  
31 cannot be patched due to operational reasons must have compensatory controls implemented to  
32 minimize risk, where possible.

33           g. User IDs and Password Controls. All users must be issued a unique user name for  
34 accessing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains,  
35 or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. Username must be promptly disabled, deleted, or the password  
36 changed upon the transfer or termination of an employee with knowledge of the password, at maximum  
37 within twenty-four (24) hours. Passwords are not to be shared. Passwords must be at least eight

1 characters and must be a non-dictionary word. Passwords must not be stored in readable format on the  
2 computer. Passwords must be changed every ninety (90) days, preferably every sixty (60) days.  
3 Passwords must be changed if revealed or compromised. Passwords must be composed of characters  
4 from at least three (3) of the following four (4) groups from the standard keyboard:

- 5 1) Upper case letters (A-Z)
- 6 2) Lower case letters (a-z)
- 7 3) Arabic numerals (0-9)
- 8 4) Non-alphanumeric characters (punctuation symbols)

9 h. Data Destruction. When no longer needed, all PHI COUNTY discloses to  
10 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
11 must be wiped using the Gutmann or US DoD 5220.22-M (7 Pass) standard, or by degaussing. Media  
12 may also be physically destroyed in accordance with NIST Special Publication 800-88. Other methods  
13 require prior written permission by COUNTY.

14 i. System Timeout. The system providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to  
15 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
16 must provide an automatic timeout, requiring re-authentication of the user session after no more than  
17 twenty (20) minutes of inactivity.

18 j. Warning Banners. All systems providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to  
19 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
20 must display a warning banner stating that data is confidential, systems are logged, and system use is for  
21 business purposes only by authorized users. User must be directed to log off the system if they do not  
22 agree with these requirements.

23 k. System Logging. The system must maintain an automated audit trail which can  
24 identify the user or system process which initiates a request for PHI COUNTY discloses to  
25 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY,  
26 or which alters such PHI. The audit trail must be date and time stamped, must log both successful and  
27 failed accesses, must be read only, and must be restricted to authorized users. If such PHI is stored in a  
28 database, database logging functionality must be enabled. Audit trail data must be archived for at least  
29 three (3) years after occurrence.

30 l. Access Controls. The system providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to  
31 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
32 must use role based access controls for all user authentications, enforcing the principle of least privilege.

33 m. Transmission encryption. All data transmissions of PHI COUNTY discloses to  
34 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
35 outside the secure internal network must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which is  
36 128bit or higher, such as AES. Encryption can be end to end at the network level, or the data files

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1 containing PHI can be encrypted. This requirement pertains to any type of PHI in motion such as  
2 website access, file transfer, and E-Mail.

3 n. Intrusion Detection. All systems involved in accessing, holding, transporting, and  
4 protecting PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains,  
5 or transmits on behalf of COUNTY that are accessible via the Internet must be protected by a  
6 comprehensive intrusion detection and prevention solution.

### 7 3. Audit Controls

8 a. System Security Review. CONTRACTOR must ensure audit control mechanisms that  
9 record and examine system activity are in place. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY  
10 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of  
11 COUNTY must have at least an annual system risk assessment/security review which provides  
12 assurance that administrative, physical, and technical controls are functioning effectively and providing  
13 adequate levels of protection. Reviews should include vulnerability scanning tools.

14 b. Log Reviews. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to  
15 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
16 must have a routine procedure in place to review system logs for unauthorized access.

17 c. Change Control. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to  
18 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY  
19 must have a documented change control procedure that ensures separation of duties and protects the  
20 confidentiality, integrity and availability of data.

### 21 4. Business Continuity/Disaster Recovery Control

22 a. Emergency Mode Operation Plan. CONTRACTOR must establish a documented plan  
23 to enable continuation of critical business processes and protection of the security of PHI COUNTY  
24 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of  
25 COUNTY kept in an electronic format in the event of an emergency. Emergency means any  
26 circumstance or situation that causes normal computer operations to become unavailable for use in  
27 performing the work required under this Agreement for more than twenty four (24) hours.

28 b. Data Backup Plan. CONTRACTOR must have established documented procedures to  
29 backup such PHI to maintain retrievable exact copies of the PHI. The plan must include a regular  
30 schedule for making backups, storing backup offsite, an inventory of backup media, and an estimate of  
31 the amount of time needed to restore DHCS PHI or PI should it be lost. At a minimum, the schedule  
32 must be a weekly full backup and monthly offsite storage of DHCS data. BCP for CONTRACTOR and  
33 COUNTY (e.g. the application owner) must merge with the DRP.

### 34 5. Paper Document Controls

35 a. Supervision of Data. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR  
36 creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY in paper form shall not be left  
37 unattended at any time, unless it is locked in a file cabinet, file room, desk or office. Unattended means

1 that information is not being observed by an employee authorized to access the information. Such PHI  
2 in paper form shall not be left unattended at any time in vehicles or planes and shall not be checked in  
3 baggage on commercial airplanes.

4 b. Escorting Visitors. Visitors to areas where PHI COUNTY discloses to  
5 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY is  
6 contained shall be escorted and such PHI shall be kept out of sight while visitors are in the area.

7 c. Confidential Destruction. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or  
8 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must be disposed of  
9 through confidential means, such as cross cut shredding and pulverizing.

10 d. Removal of Data. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR  
11 creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must not be removed from the premises  
12 of the CONTRACTOR except with express written permission of COUNTY.

13 e. Faxing. Faxes containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or  
14 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY shall not be left  
15 unattended and fax machines shall be in secure areas. Faxes shall contain a confidentiality statement  
16 notifying persons receiving faxes in error to destroy them. Fax numbers shall be verified with the  
17 intended recipient before sending the fax.

18 f. Mailing. Mailings containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or  
19 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY shall be sealed and  
20 secured from damage or inappropriate viewing of PHI to the extent possible. Mailings which include  
21 five hundred (500) or more individually identifiable records containing PHI COUNTY discloses to  
22 CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY in  
23 a single package shall be sent using a tracked mailing method which includes verification of delivery  
24 and receipt, unless the prior written permission of COUNTY to use another method is obtained.

#### 25 F. BREACH DISCOVERY AND NOTIFICATION

26 1. Following the discovery of a Breach of Unsecured PHI, CONTRACTOR shall notify  
27 COUNTY of such Breach, however both parties agree to a delay in the notification if so advised by a  
28 law enforcement official pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.412.

29 a. A Breach shall be treated as discovered by CONTRACTOR as of the first day on which  
30 such Breach is known to CONTRACTOR or, by exercising reasonable diligence, would have been  
31 known to CONTRACTOR.

32 b. CONTRACTOR shall be deemed to have knowledge of a Breach, if the Breach is  
33 known, or by exercising reasonable diligence would have known, to any person who is an employee,  
34 officer, or other agent of CONTRACTOR, as determined by federal common law of agency.

35 2. CONTRACTOR shall provide the notification of the Breach immediately to the COUNTY  
36 Privacy Officer. CONTRACTOR's notification may be oral, but shall be followed by written  
37 notification within twenty four (24) hours of the oral notification.

- 1           3. CONTRACTOR's notification shall include, to the extent possible:
- 2           a. The identification of each Individual whose Unsecured PHI has been, or is reasonably
- 3 believed by CONTRACTOR to have been, accessed, acquired, used, or disclosed during the Breach;
- 4           b. Any other information that COUNTY is required to include in the notification to
- 5 Individual under 45 CFR §164.404 (c) at the time CONTRACTOR is required to notify COUNTY or
- 6 promptly thereafter as this information becomes available, even after the regulatory sixty (60) day
- 7 period set forth in 45 CFR § 164.410 (b) has elapsed, including:
- 8           1) A brief description of what happened, including the date of the Breach and the date
- 9 of the discovery of the Breach, if known;
- 10           2) A description of the types of Unsecured PHI that were involved in the Breach (such
- 11 as whether full name, social security number, date of birth, home address, account number, diagnosis,
- 12 disability code, or other types of information were involved);
- 13           3) Any steps Individuals should take to protect themselves from potential harm
- 14 resulting from the Breach;
- 15           4) A brief description of what CONTRACTOR is doing to investigate the Breach, to
- 16 mitigate harm to Individuals, and to protect against any future Breaches; and
- 17           5) Contact procedures for Individuals to ask questions or learn additional information,
- 18 which shall include a toll-free telephone number, an e-mail address, Web site, or postal address.
- 19           4. COUNTY may require CONTRACTOR to provide notice to the Individual as required in
- 20 45 CFR § 164.404, if it is reasonable to do so under the circumstances, at the sole discretion of the
- 21 COUNTY.
- 22           5. In the event that CONTRACTOR is responsible for a Breach of Unsecured PHI in violation
- 23 of the HIPAA Privacy Rule, CONTRACTOR shall have the burden of demonstrating that
- 24 CONTRACTOR made all notifications to COUNTY consistent with this Subparagraph F and as
- 25 required by the Breach notification regulations, or, in the alternative, that the acquisition, access, use, or
- 26 disclosure of PHI did not constitute a Breach.
- 27           6. CONTRACTOR shall maintain documentation of all required notifications of a Breach or
- 28 its risk assessment under 45 CFR § 164.402 to demonstrate that a Breach did not occur.
- 29           7. CONTRACTOR shall provide to COUNTY all specific and pertinent information about the
- 30 Breach, including the information listed in Section E.3.b.(1)-(5) above, if not yet provided, to permit
- 31 COUNTY to meet its notification obligations under Subpart D of 45 CFR Part 164 as soon as
- 32 practicable, but in no event later than fifteen (15) calendar days after CONTRACTOR's initial report of
- 33 the Breach to COUNTY pursuant to Subparagraph F.2. above.
- 34           8. CONTRACTOR shall continue to provide all additional pertinent information about the
- 35 Breach to COUNTY as it may become available, in reporting increments of five (5) business days after
- 36 the last report to COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall also respond in good faith to any reasonable
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1 requests for further information, or follow-up information after report to COUNTY, when such request  
2 is made by COUNTY.

3 9. If the Breach is the fault of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR shall bear all expense or  
4 other costs associated with the Breach and shall reimburse COUNTY for all expenses COUNTY incurs  
5 in addressing the Breach and consequences thereof, including costs of investigation, notification,  
6 remediation, documentation or other costs associated with addressing the Breach.

7 **G. PERMITTED USES AND DISCLOSURES BY CONTRACTOR**

8 1. CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR  
9 as necessary to perform functions, activities, or services for, or on behalf of, COUNTY as specified in  
10 the Agreement, provided that such use or Disclosure would not violate the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done  
11 by COUNTY except for the specific Uses and Disclosures set forth below.

12 a. CONTRACTOR may use PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary,  
13 for the proper management and administration of CONTRACTOR.

14 b. CONTRACTOR may disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR for the  
15 proper management and administration of CONTRACTOR or to carry out the legal responsibilities of  
16 CONTRACTOR, if:

17 1) The Disclosure is required by law; or

18 2) CONTRACTOR obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the PHI  
19 is disclosed that it will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for  
20 the purposes for which it was disclosed to the person and the person immediately notifies  
21 CONTRACTOR of any instance of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has  
22 been breached.

23 c. CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to  
24 CONTRACTOR to provide Data Aggregation services relating to the Health Care Operations of  
25 CONTRACTOR.

26 2. CONTRACTOR may use PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary, to  
27 carry out legal responsibilities of CONTRACTOR.

28 3. CONTRACTOR may use and disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR  
29 consistent with the minimum necessary P&Ps of COUNTY.

30 4. CONTRACTOR may use or disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR as  
31 required by law.

32 **H. PROHIBITED USES AND DISCLOSURES**

33 1. CONTRACTOR shall not disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or  
34 CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY about an individual to  
35 a health plan for payment or health care operations purposes if the PHI pertains solely to a health care  
36 item or service for which the health care provider involved has been paid out of pocket in full and the  
37 individual requests such restriction, in accordance with 42 USC § 17935(a) and 45 CFR § 164.522(a).

1           2. CONTRACTOR shall not directly or indirectly receive remuneration in exchange for PHI  
2 COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on  
3 behalf of COUNTY, except with the prior written consent of COUNTY and as permitted by  
4 42 USC § 17935(d)(2).

5           I. OBLIGATIONS OF COUNTY

6           1. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any limitation(s) in COUNTY's notice of  
7 privacy practices in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.520, to the extent that such limitation may affect  
8 CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

9           2. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any changes in, or revocation of, the permission  
10 by an Individual to use or disclose his or her PHI, to the extent that such changes may affect  
11 CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

12           3. COUNTY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any restriction to the Use or Disclosure of PHI  
13 that COUNTY has agreed to in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.522, to the extent that such restriction  
14 may affect CONTRACTOR's Use or Disclosure of PHI.

15           4. COUNTY shall not request CONTRACTOR to use or disclose PHI in any manner that  
16 would not be permissible under the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done by COUNTY.

17           J. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE TERMINATION

18           1. Upon COUNTY's knowledge of a material Breach or violation by CONTRACTOR of the  
19 requirements of this Business Associate Contract, COUNTY shall:

20           a. Provide an opportunity for CONTRACTOR to cure the material Breach or end the  
21 violation within thirty (30) business days; or

22           b. Immediately terminate the Agreement, if CONTRACTOR is unwilling or unable to  
23 cure the material Breach or end the violation within thirty (30) days, provided termination of the  
24 Agreement is feasible.

25           2. Upon termination of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall either destroy or return to  
26 COUNTY all PHI CONTRACTOR received from COUNTY or CONTRACTOR created, maintained,  
27 or received on behalf of COUNTY in conformity with the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

28           a. This provision shall apply to all PHI that is in the possession of Subcontractors or  
29 agents of CONTRACTOR.

30           b. CONTRACTOR shall retain no copies of the PHI.

31           c. In the event that CONTRACTOR determines that returning or destroying the PHI is not  
32 feasible, CONTRACTOR shall provide to COUNTY notification of the conditions that make return or  
33 destruction infeasible. Upon determination by COUNTY that return or destruction of PHI is infeasible,  
34 CONTRACTOR shall extend the protections of this Business Associate Contract to such PHI and limit  
35 further Uses and Disclosures of such PHI to those purposes that make the return or destruction  
36 infeasible, for as long as CONTRACTOR maintains such PHI.

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1           3. The obligations of this Business Associate Contract shall survive the termination of the  
2 Agreement.

12 **I. PERSONAL INFORMATION PRIVACY AND SECURITY CONTRACT**

13 Any reference to statutory, regulatory, or contractual language herein shall be to such language as in  
 14 effect or as amended.

15 A. DEFINITIONS

16 1. "Breach" shall have the meaning given to such term under the IEA and CMPPA. It shall  
 17 include a "PII loss" as that term is defined in the CMPPA.

18 2. "Breach of the security of the system" shall have the meaning given to such term under the  
 19 CIPA, CCC § 1798.29(d).

20 3. "CMPPA Agreement" means the CMPPA Agreement between the SSA and CHHS.

21 4. "DHCS PI" shall mean PI, as defined below, accessed in a database maintained by the  
 22 COUNTY or DHCS, received by CONTRACTOR from the COUNTY or DHCS or acquired or created  
 23 by CONTRACTOR in connection with performing the functions, activities and services specified in the  
 24 Agreement on behalf of the COUNTY.

25 5. "IEA" shall mean the IEA currently in effect between the SSA and DHCS.

26 6. "Notice-triggering PI" shall mean the PI identified in CCC § 1798.29(e) whose  
 27 unauthorized access may trigger notification requirements under CCC § 1709.29. For purposes of this  
 28 provision, identity shall include, but not be limited to, name, identifying number, symbol, or other  
 29 identifying particular assigned to the individual, such as a finger or voice print, a photograph or a  
 30 biometric identifier. Notice-triggering PI includes PI in electronic, paper or any other medium.

31 7. "PII" shall have the meaning given to such term in the IEA and CMPPA.

32 8. "PI" shall have the meaning given to such term in CCC § 1798.3(a).

33 9. "Required by law" means a mandate contained in law that compels an entity to make a use  
 34 or disclosure of PI or PII that is enforceable in a court of law. This includes, but is not limited to, court  
 35 orders and court-ordered warrants, subpoenas or summons issued by a court, grand jury, a governmental  
 36 or tribal inspector general, or an administrative body authorized to require the production of  
 37 information, and a civil or an authorized investigative demand. It also includes Medicare conditions of

1 participation with respect to health care providers participating in the program, and statutes or  
 2 regulations that require the production of information, including statutes or regulations that require such  
 3 information if payment is sought under a government program providing public benefits.

4 10. "Security Incident" means the attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure,  
 5 modification, or destruction of PI, or confidential data utilized in complying with this Agreement; or  
 6 interference with system operations in an information system that processes, maintains or stores PI.

#### 7 B. TERMS OF AGREEMENT

8 1. Permitted Uses and Disclosures of DHCS PI and PII by CONTRACTOR. Except as  
 9 otherwise indicated in this Exhibit, CONTRACTOR may use or disclose DHCS PI only to perform  
 10 functions, activities, or services for or on behalf of the COUNTY pursuant to the terms of the  
 11 Agreement provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the CIPA if done by the COUNTY.

#### 12 2. Responsibilities of CONTRACTOR

13 CONTRACTOR agrees:

14 a. Nondisclosure. Not to use or disclose DHCS PI or PII other than as permitted or  
 15 required by this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract or as required by applicable state  
 16 and federal law.

17 b. Safeguards. To implement appropriate and reasonable administrative, technical, and  
 18 physical safeguards to protect the security, confidentiality and integrity of DHCS PI and PII, to protect  
 19 against anticipated threats or hazards to the security or integrity of DHCS PI and PII, and to prevent use  
 20 or disclosure of DHCS PI or PII other than as provided for by this Personal Information Privacy and  
 21 Security Contract. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and  
 22 security program that include administrative, technical and physical safeguards appropriate to the size  
 23 and complexity of CONTRACTOR's operations and the nature and scope of its activities, which  
 24 incorporate the requirements of Subparagraph c. below. CONTRACTOR will provide COUNTY with  
 25 its current policies upon request.

26 c. Security. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the continuous security of all computerized data  
 27 systems containing DHCS PI and PII. CONTRACTOR shall protect paper documents containing  
 28 DHCS PI and PII. These steps shall include, at a minimum:

29 1) Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed in Subparagraph  
 30 E. of the Business Associate Contract, Exhibit B to the Agreement; and

31 2) Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and  
 32 scope of security established by the OMB in OMB Circular No. A-130, Appendix III-Security of  
 33 Federal Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for automated information systems  
 34 in Federal agencies.

35 3) If the data obtained by CONTRACTOR from COUNTY includes PII,  
 36 CONTRACTOR shall also comply with the substantive privacy and security requirements in the  
 37 CMPPA Agreement between the SSA and the CHHS and in the Agreement between the SSA and

1 DHCS, known as the IEA. The specific sections of the IEA with substantive privacy and security  
2 requirements to be complied with are sections E, F, and G, and in Attachment 4 to the IEA, Electronic  
3 Information Exchange Security Requirements, Guidelines and Procedures for Federal, State and Local  
4 Agencies Exchanging Electronic Information with the SSA. CONTRACTOR also agrees to ensure that  
5 any of CONTRACTOR's agents or subcontractors, to whom CONTRACTOR provides DHCS PII agree  
6 to the same requirements for privacy and security safeguards for confidential data that apply to  
7 CONTRACTOR with respect to such information.

8 d. Mitigation of Harmful Effects. To mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect  
9 that is known to CONTRACTOR of a use or disclosure of DHCS PI or PII by CONTRACTOR or its  
10 subcontractors in violation of this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract.

11 e. CONTRACTOR's Agents and Subcontractors. To impose the same restrictions and  
12 conditions set forth in this Personal Information and Security Contract on any subcontractors or other  
13 agents with whom CONTRACTOR subcontracts any activities under the Agreement that involve the  
14 disclosure of DHCS PI or PII to such subcontractors or other agents.

15 f. Availability of Information. To make DHCS PI and PII available to the DHCS and/or  
16 COUNTY for purposes of oversight, inspection, amendment, and response to requests for records,  
17 injunctions, judgments, and orders for production of DHCS PI and PII. If CONTRACTOR receives  
18 DHCS PII, upon request by COUNTY and/or DHCS, CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY and/or  
19 DHCS with a list of all employees, contractors and agents who have access to DHCS PII, including  
20 employees, contractors and agents of its subcontractors and agents.

21 g. Cooperation with COUNTY. With respect to DHCS PI, to cooperate with and assist the  
22 COUNTY to the extent necessary to ensure the DHCS's compliance with the applicable terms of the  
23 CIPA including, but not limited to, accounting of disclosures of DHCS PI, correction of errors in DHCS  
24 PI, production of DHCS PI, disclosure of a security Breach involving DHCS PI and notice of such  
25 Breach to the affected individual(s).

26 h. Breaches and Security Incidents. During the term of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR  
27 agrees to implement reasonable systems for the discovery of any Breach of unsecured DHCS PI and PII  
28 or security incident. CONTRACTOR agrees to give notification of any Breach of unsecured DHCS PI  
29 and PII or security incident in accordance with Subparagraph F, of the Business Associate Contract,  
30 Exhibit B to the Agreement.

31 i. Designation of Individual Responsible for Security. CONTRACTOR shall designate an  
32 individual, (e.g., Security Officer), to oversee its data security program who shall be responsible for  
33 carrying out the requirements of this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract and for  
34 communicating on security matters with the COUNTY.

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
