AGREEMENT FOR PROVISION OF CHILDREN'S FULL-SERVICE PARTNERSHIP/WRAPAROUND SERVICES BETWEEN COUNTY OF ORANGE AND PROVIDENCE COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC JULY 1, 2015 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2016 THIS AGREEMENT entered into this 1st day of July 2015, which date is enumerated for purposes of reference only, is by and between the COUNTY OF ORANGE (COUNTY) and, PATHWAYS COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC, a Delaware Limited Liability Company with a Certificate of Good Standing (for profit corporation), issued by the California Secretary of State as a Foreign Limited Liability Company (CONTRACTOR). This Agreement shall be administered by the County of Orange Health Care Agency (ADMINISTRATOR). WITNESSETH: WHEREAS, COUNTY and PROVIDENCE COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company entered into a certain Agreement for Children's Full-Service Partnership/Wraparound Services with CONTRACTOR for the period July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016; WHEREAS, PROVIDENCE COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC was a subsidiary of PROVIDENCE HUMAN SERVICES, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company; WHEREAS, PROVIDENCE SERVICE CORPORATION, a Delaware corporation, owed all issued and outstanding membership interests of PROVIDENCE HUMAN SERVICES, LLC; WHEREAS, MOLINA HEALTHCARE, Inc., a Delaware corporation, purchased from PROVIDENCE SERVICE CORPORATION all issued and outstanding membership interests of PROVIDENCE HUMAN SERVICES, LLC, on November 3, 2015; WHEREAS, the membership interest purchase agreement between MOLINA HEALTHCARE, Inc. and PROVIDENCE SERVICES CORPORATION did not release PROVIDENCE COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC from performing its obligations under the AGREEMENT;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Paragraph VII. of the AGREEMENT, the sale or transfer of more than ten percent (10%) of the assets of PROVIDENCE COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC constitutes an assignment, thereby requiring the written consent of COUNTY;

WHEREAS, PROVIDENCE COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC, by an amendment to its certificate of formation, filed with the Delaware Secretary of State on November 2, 2015, has changed its name to PATHWAYS COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company;

WHEREAS, PATHWAYS COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC is now obligated to comply with all the terms and conditions of the AGREEMENT, for the entire term of the AGREEMENT; and

WHEREAS, PATHWAYS COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC is agreeable to the rendering of such services on the terms and conditions set forth in the AGREEMENT, attached hereto as Attachment A and incorporated herein by reference;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1.1The COUNTY and PATHWAYS COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC are in concurrence with the above recitals.

2. On the basis of the recitals set forth above, COUNTY hereby grants its written consent pursuant to Paragraph VII of the AGREEMENT.

3. The AGREEMENT is amended by substituting the name "PATHWAYS COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC" for the name "PROVIDENCE COMMUNITY SERVICES, LLC," effective November 3, 2015.

In all other respects, the terms of the underlying Agreement, not specifically changed by this Amendment, shall remain in full force and are incorporated by reference herein.

### II. ALTERATION OF TERMS

A. This Agreement, together with Exhibits A, B, and C attached hereto and incorporated herein, fully expresses the complete understanding of COUNTY and CONTRACTOR with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

B. Unless otherwise expressly stated in this Agreement, no addition to, or alteration of the terms of this Agreement or any Exhibits, whether written or verbal, made by the parties, their officers, employees or agents shall be valid unless made in the form of a written amendment to this Agreement, which has been formally approved and executed by both parties.

## III. ASSIGNMENT OF DEBTS

Unless this Agreement is followed without interruption by another Agreement between the parties hereto for the same services and substantially the same scope, at the termination of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall assign to COUNTY any debts owing to CONTRACTOR by or on behalf of persons receiving services pursuant to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify by mail each of these persons, specifying the date of assignment, the County of Orange as assignee, and the address to which payments are to be sent. Payments received by CONTRACTOR from or on behalf of said persons, shall be immediately given to COUNTY.

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# IV. COMPLIANCE

A. ADMINISTRATOR has established a Compliance Program for the purpose of ensuring adherence to all rules and regulations related to federal and state health care programs.

1. ADMINISTRATOR shall provide CONTRACTOR with a copy of the relevant HCA policies and procedures relating to HCA's Compliance Program, HCA's Code of Conduct and General Compliance Trainings.

2. CONTRACTOR has the option to adhere to HCA's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct or establish its own, provided CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct have been verified to include all required elements by ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer as described in subparagraphs below.

3. If CONTRACTOR elects to adhere to HCA's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct; the CONTRACTOR shall submit to the ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days of award of this Agreement a signed acknowledgement that CONTRACTOR shall comply with HCA's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct.

4. If CONTRACTOR elects to have its own Compliance Program and Code of Conduct then it shall submit a copy of its Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and relevant policies and procedures to ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days of award of this Agreement. ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer shall determine if CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct contains all required elements. CONTRACTOR shall take necessary action to meet said standards or shall be asked to acknowledge and agree to HCA's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct if the CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct if the CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct if the CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct does not contain all required elements.

5. Upon written confirmation from ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Officer that the CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program and Code of Conduct contains all required elements, CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Covered Individuals relative to this Agreement are made aware of CONTRACTOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and related policies and procedures.

6. Failure of CONTRACTOR to submit its Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and relevant policies and procedures shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement. Failure to cure such breach within sixty (60) calendar days of such notice from ADMINISTRATOR shall constitute grounds for termination of this Agreement as to the non-complying party.

B. SANCTION SCREENING – CONTRACTOR shall adhere to all screening policies and procedures and screen all Covered Individuals employed or retained to provide services related to this Agreement to ensure that they are not designated as Ineligible Persons, as pursuant to this Agreement. Screening shall be conducted against the General Services Administration's Excluded Parties List System or System for Award Management, the Health and Human Services/Office of Inspector General List of Excluded Individuals/Entities, and the California Medi-Cal Suspended and Ineligible Provider List and/or any other list or system as identified by the ADMINISTRATOR.

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1. Covered Individuals includes all contractors, subcontractors, agents, and other persons who 1 provide health care items or services or who perform billing or coding functions on behalf of 2 ADMINISTRATOR. Notwithstanding the above, this term does not include part-time or per-diem 3 employees, contractors, subcontractors, agents, and other persons who are not reasonably expected to 4 work more than one hundred sixty (160) hours per year; except that any such individuals shall become 5 Covered Individuals at the point when they work more than one hundred sixty (160) hours during the 6 calendar year. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Covered Individuals relative to this Agreement are 7 made aware of ADMINISTRATOR's Compliance Program, Code of Conduct and related policies and 8 procedures. 9

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2. An Ineligible Person shall be any individual or entity who:

a. is currently excluded, suspended, debarred or otherwise ineligible to participate in federal and state health care programs; or

b. has been convicted of a criminal offense related to the provision of health care items or services and has not been reinstated in the federal and state health care programs after a period of exclusion, suspension, debarment, or ineligibility.

3. CONTRACTOR shall screen prospective Covered Individuals prior to hire or engagement. CONTRACTOR shall not hire or engage any Ineligible Person to provide services relative to this Agreement.

4. CONTRACTOR shall screen all current Covered Individuals and subcontractors semiannually to ensure that they have not become Ineligible Persons. CONTRACTOR shall also request that its subcontractors use their best efforts to verify that they are eligible to participate in all federal and State of California health programs and have not been excluded or debarred from participation in any federal or state health care programs, and to further represent to CONTRACTOR that they do not have any Ineligible Person in their employ or under contract.

5. Covered Individuals shall be required to disclose to CONTRACTOR immediately any debarment, exclusion or other event that makes the Covered Individual an Ineligible Person. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately if a Covered Individual providing services directly relative to this Agreement becomes debarred, excluded or otherwise becomes an Ineligible Person.

6. CONTRACTOR acknowledges that Ineligible Persons are precluded from providing federal and state funded health care services by contract with COUNTY in the event that they are currently sanctioned or excluded by a federal or state law enforcement regulatory or licensing agency. If CONTRACTOR becomes aware that a Covered Individual has become an Ineligible Person, CONTRACTOR shall remove such individual from responsibility for, or involvement with, COUNTY business operations related to this Agreement.

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 7. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately if a Covered Individual or
 37 entity is currently excluded, suspended or debarred, or is identified as such after being sanction screened.

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Such individual or entity shall be immediately removed from participating in any activity associated with
 this Agreement. ADMINISTRATOR will determine appropriate repayment from, or sanction(s) to
 CONTRACTOR for services provided by ineligible person or individual. CONTRACTOR shall
 promptly return any overpayments within forty-five (45) business days after the overpayment is verified
 by ADMINISTRATOR.

C. COMPLIANCE TRAINING – ADMINISTRATOR shall make General Compliance Training and Provider Compliance Training, where appropriate, available to Covered Individuals.

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1. CONTRACTOR shall use its best efforts to encourage completion by Covered Individuals; provided, however, that at a minimum CONTRACTOR shall assign at least one (1) designated representative to complete all Compliance Trainings when offered.

2. Such training will be made available to Covered Individuals within thirty (30) calendar days of employment or engagement.

3. Such training will be made available to each Covered Individual annually.

4. Each Covered Individual attending training shall certify, in writing, attendance at compliance training. CONTRACTOR shall retain the certifications. Upon written request by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall provide copies of the certifications.

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D. MEDICAL BILLING, CODING, AND DOCUMENTATION COMPLIANCE STANDARDS

1. CONTRACTOR shall take reasonable precaution to ensure that the coding of health care claims, billings and/or invoices for same are prepared and submitted in an accurate and timely manner and are consistent with federal, state and county laws and regulations. This includes compliance with federal and state health care program regulations and procedures or instructions otherwise communicated by regulatory agencies including the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services or their agents.

2. CONTRACTOR shall not submit any false, fraudulent, inaccurate and/or fictitious claims for payment or reimbursement of any kind.

3. CONTRACTOR shall bill only for those eligible services actually rendered which are also fully documented. When such services are coded, CONTRACTOR shall use accurate billing codes which accurately describes the services provided and must ensure compliance with all billing and documentation requirements.

4. CONTRACTOR shall act promptly to investigate and correct any problems or errors in coding of claims and billing, if and when, any such problems or errors are identified.

5. CONTRACTOR shall promptly return any overpayments within forty-five (45) business days after the overpayment is verified by the ADMINISTRATOR.

# V. CONFIDENTIALITY

A. CONTRACTOR shall maintain the confidentiality of all records, including billings and any audio and/or video recordings, in accordance with all applicable federal, state and county codes and regulations, as they now exist or may hereafter be amended or changed.

1. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that all persons served pursuant to this Agreement are clients of the Orange County Mental Health services system, and therefore it may be necessary for authorized staff of ADMINISTRATOR to audit client files, or to exchange information regarding specific clients with COUNTY or other providers of related services contracting with COUNTY.

2. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that it shall be responsible for obtaining written consents for the release of information from all persons served by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement. Such consents shall be obtained by CONTRACTOR in accordance with CCC, Division 1, Part 2.6, relating to confidentiality of medical information.

3. In the event of a collaborative service agreement between Mental Health services providers, CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that it is responsible for obtaining releases of information, from the collaborative agency, for clients receiving services through the collaborative agreement.

B. Prior to providing any services pursuant to this Agreement, all members of the Board of Directors or its designee or authorized agent, employees, consultants, subcontractors, volunteers and interns of the CONTRACTOR shall agree, in writing, with CONTRACTOR to maintain the confidentiality of any and all information and records which may be obtained in the course of providing such services. This Agreement shall specify that it is effective irrespective of all subsequent resignations or terminations of CONTRACTOR members of the Board of Directors or its designee or authorized agent, employees, consultants, subcontractors, volunteers and interns.

# VI. COST REPORT

A. CONTRACTOR shall submit a Cost Report to COUNTY no later than sixty (60) calendar days following termination of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall prepare the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report in accordance with all applicable federal, state and COUNTY requirements, GAAP and the Special Provisions Paragraph of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall allocate direct and indirect costs to and between programs, cost centers, services, and funding sources in accordance with such requirements and consistent with prudent business practice, which costs and allocations shall be supported by source documentation maintained by CONTRACTOR, and available at any time to ADMINISTRATOR upon reasonable notice. In the event CONTRACTOR has multiple Agreements for mental health services that are administered by HCA, consolidation of the individual Cost Reports into a single consolidated Cost Report may be required, as stipulated by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall submit a consolidated Cost Report to COUNTY no later than five (5) business days following approval by ADMINSTRATOR of all individual Cost Reports to be incorporated into a consolidated Cost Report.

1. If CONTRACTOR fails to submit an accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report within the time period specified above, ADMINISTRATOR shall have sole discretion to impose one or both of the following:

a. CONTRACTOR may be assessed a late penalty of five hundred dollars (\$500) for each business day after the above specified due date that the accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report is not submitted. Imposition of the late penalty shall be at the sole discretion of the ADMINISTRATOR. The late penalty shall be assessed separately on each outstanding individual and/or consolidated Cost Report due COUNTY by CONTRACTOR.

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b. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any or all payments due CONTRACTOR pursuant to any or all agreements between COUNTY and CONTRACTOR until such time that the accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report is delivered to ADMINISTRATOR.

2. CONTRACTOR may request, in advance and in writing, an extension of the due date of the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report setting forth good cause for justification of the request. Approval of such requests shall be at the sole discretion of ADMINISTRATOR and shall not be unreasonably denied.

3. In the event that CONTRACTOR does not submit an accurate and complete individual and/or consolidated Cost Report within one hundred and eighty (180) calendar days following the termination of this Agreement, and CONTRACTOR has not entered into a subsequent or new agreement for any other services with COUNTY, then all amounts paid to CONTRACTOR by COUNTY during the term of the Agreement shall be immediately reimbursed to COUNTY.

B. The Cost Report shall be the final financial and statistical report submitted by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY, and shall serve as the basis for final settlement to CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall document that costs are reasonable and allowable and directly or indirectly related to the services to be provided hereunder. The individual and/or consolidated Cost Report shall be the final financial record for subsequent audits, if any.

C. Final settlement shall be based upon the actual and reimbursable costs for services hereunder, 23 less applicable revenues and any late penalty, not to exceed COUNTY's Maximum Obligation as set 24 forth in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall not claim 25 expenditures to COUNTY which are not reimbursable pursuant to applicable federal, state and 26 COUNTY laws, regulations and requirements. Any payment made by COUNTY to CONTRACTOR, 27 which is subsequently determined to have been for an unreimbursable expenditure or service, shall be 28 repaid by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY in cash, or other authorized form of payment, within thirty (30) 29 calendar days of submission of the individual and/or consolidated Cost Report or COUNTY may elect to 30 reduce any amount owed CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the reimbursement due 31 COUNTY. 32

D. Unless approved by ADMINISTRATOR, costs that exceed the Statewide Maximum Allowance (SMA) rates per Medi-Cal Unit of Services, as determined by the DHCS, shall be unreimbursable to CONTRACTOR.

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E. In the event that CONTRACTOR is authorized to retain unanticipated revenues as described in the Budget Paragraph of Exhibit A to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall specify in the Cost Report the services rendered with such revenues.

F. All Cost Reports shall contain the following attestation, which may be typed directly on or attached to the Cost Report:

"I HEREBY CERTIFY that I have executed the accompanying Cost Report and supporting documentation prepared by \_\_\_\_\_\_ for the cost report period beginning \_\_\_\_\_\_ and ending \_\_\_\_\_\_ and that, to the best of my knowledge and belief, costs reimbursed through this Agreement are reasonable and allowable and directly or indirectly related to the services provided and that this Cost Report is a true, correct, and complete statement from the books and records of (provider name) in accordance with applicable instructions, except as noted. I also hereby certify that I have the authority to execute the accompanying Cost Report.

# VII. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION CERTIFICATION

A. CONTRACTOR certifies that it and its principals:

1. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded by any federal department or agency.

2. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state, or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of federal or state antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property.

3. Are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a federal, state, or local governmental entity with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in Subparagraph A.2. above.

4. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Agreement had one or more public transactions (federal, state, or local) terminated for cause or default.

5. Shall not knowingly enter into any lower tier covered transaction with a person who is proposed for debarment under federal regulations (i.e., 48 CFR Part 9, Subpart 9.4), debarred, suspended,

declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in such transaction unless authorized by the State of California.

6. Shall include without modification, the clause titled "Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility, and Voluntary Exclusion Lower Tier Covered Transaction," (i.e., transactions with sub-grantees and/or contractors) and in all solicitations for lower tier covered transactions in accordance with 2 CFR Part 376.

B. The terms and definitions of this paragraph have the meanings set out in the Definitions and Coverage sections of the rules implementing 51 F.R. 6370.

# VIII. DELEGATION, ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTS

A. CONTRACTOR may not delegate the obligations hereunder, either in whole or in part, without prior written consent of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification of CONTRACTOR's intent to delegate the obligations hereunder, either in whole or part, to ADMINISTRATOR not less than sixty (60) calendar days prior to the effective date of the delegation. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of this paragraph shall be void.

B. CONTRACTOR may not assign the rights hereunder, either in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of COUNTY.

1. If CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit organization, any change from a nonprofit corporation to any other corporate structure of CONTRACTOR, including a change in more than fifty percent (50%) of the composition of the Board of Directors within a two (2) month period of time, shall be deemed an assignment for purposes of this paragraph, unless CONTRACTOR is transitioning from a community clinic/health center to a Federally Qualified Health Center and has been so designated by the Federal Government. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

2. If CONTRACTOR is a for-profit organization, any change in the business structure, including but not limited to, the sale or transfer of more than ten percent (10%) of the assets or stocks of CONTRACTOR, change to another corporate structure, including a change to a sole proprietorship, or a change in fifty percent (50%) or more of Board of Directors or any governing body of CONTRACTOR at one time shall be deemed an assignment pursuant to this paragraph. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

3. If CONTRACTOR is a governmental organization, any change to another structure, including a change in more than fifty percent (50%) of the composition of its governing body (i.e. Board of Supervisors, City Council, School Board) within a two (2) month period of time, shall be deemed an assignment for purposes of this paragraph. Any attempted assignment or delegation in derogation of this subparagraph shall be void.

4. Whether CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit, for-profit, or a governmental organization, CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification of CONTRACTOR's intent to assign the obligations

hereunder, either in whole or part, to ADMINISTRATOR not less than sixty (60) calendar days prior to
 the effective date of the assignment.

5. Whether CONTRACTOR is a nonprofit, for-profit, or a governmental organization, CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification within thirty (30) calendar days to ADMINISTRATOR when there is change of less than fifty percent (50%) of Board of Directors or any governing body of CONTRACTOR at one time.

C. CONTRACTOR's obligations undertaken pursuant to this Agreement may be carried out by means of subcontracts, provided such subcontracts are approved in advance, in writing by ADMINISTRATOR, meet the requirements of this Agreement as they relate to the service or activity under subcontract, and include any provisions that ADMINISTRATOR may require.

1. After approval of a subcontract, ADMINISTRATOR may revoke the approval of a subcontract upon five (5) calendar days' written notice to CONTRACTOR if the subcontract subsequently fails to meet the requirements of this Agreement or any provisions that ADMINISTRATOR has required.

2. No subcontract shall terminate or alter the responsibilities of CONTRACTOR to COUNTY pursuant to this Agreement.

3. ADMINISTRATOR may disallow, from payments otherwise due CONTRACTOR, amounts claimed for subcontracts not approved in accordance with this paragraph.

4. This provision shall not be applicable to service agreements usually and customarily entered into by CONTRACTOR to obtain or arrange for supplies, technical support, and professional services provided by consultants.

# IX. EMPLOYEE ELIGIBILITY VERIFICATION

CONTRACTOR warrants that it shall fully comply with all federal and state statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and to ensure that employees, subcontractors, and consultants performing work under this Agreement meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in federal statutes and regulations. CONTRACTOR shall obtain, from all employees, subcontractors, and consultants performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by federal or state statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 USC §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. CONTRACTOR shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees, subcontractors, and consultants for the period prescribed by the law.

# X. EQUIPMENT

A. Unless otherwise specified in writing by ADMINISTRATOR, Equipment is defined as all property of a Relatively Permanent nature with significant value, purchased in whole or in part by ADMINISTRATOR to assist in performing the services described in this Agreement. "Relatively

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Permanent" is defined as having a useful life of one year or longer. Equipment which costs \$5,000 or 1 over, including freight charges, sales taxes, and other taxes, and installation costs are defined as Capital 2 Assets. Equipment which costs between \$600 and \$5,000, including freight charges, sales taxes and 3 other taxes, and installation costs, or electronic equipment that costs less than \$600 but may contained 4 PHI or PII, are defined as Controlled Equipment. Controlled Equipment includes, but is not limited to 5 phones, tablets, audio/visual equipment, computer equipment, and lab equipment. The cost of 6 Equipment purchased, in whole or in part, with funds paid pursuant to this Agreement shall be 7 depreciated according to GAAP. 8

B. CONTRACTOR shall obtain ADMINISTRATOR's prior written approval to purchase any Equipment with funds paid pursuant to this Agreement. Upon delivery of Equipment, CONTRACTOR shall forward to ADMINISTRATOR, copies of the purchase order, receipt, and other supporting documentation, which includes delivery date, unit price, tax, shipping and serial numbers. CONTRACTOR shall request an applicable asset tag for said Equipment and shall include each purchased asset in an Equipment inventory.

C. Upon ADMINISTRATOR's prior written approval, CONTRACTOR may expense to COUNTY the cost of the approved Equipment purchased by CONTRACTOR. To "expense," in relation to Equipment, means to charge the proportionate cost of Equipment in the fiscal year in which it is purchased. Title of expensed Equipment shall be vested with COUNTY.

D. CONTRACTOR shall maintain an inventory of all Equipment purchased in whole or in part with funds paid through this Agreement, including date of purchase, purchase price, serial number, model and type of Equipment. Such inventory shall be available for review by ADMINISTRATOR, and shall include the original purchase date and price, useful life, and balance of depreciated Equipment cost, if any.

E. CONTRACTOR shall cooperate with ADMINISTRATOR in conducting periodic physical inventories of all Equipment. Upon demand by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall return any or all Equipment to COUNTY.

F. CONTRACTOR must report any loss or theft of Equipment in accordance with the procedure approved by ADMINISTRATOR and the Notices Paragraph of this Agreement. In addition, CONTRACTOR must complete and submit to ADMINISTRATOR a notification form when items of Equipment are moved from one location to another or returned to COUNTY as surplus.

G. Unless this Agreement is followed without interruption by another agreement between the parties for substantially the same type and scope of services, at the termination of this Agreement for any cause, CONTRACTOR shall return to COUNTY all Equipment purchased with funds paid through this Agreement.

H. CONTRACTOR shall maintain and administer a sound business program for ensuring the proper use, maintenance, repair, protection, insurance, and preservation of COUNTY Equipment.

# **XI. FACILITIES, PAYMENTS AND SERVICES**

A. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide the services, staffing, facilities, and supplies in accordance with this Agreement. COUNTY shall compensate, and authorize, when applicable, said services. CONTRACTOR shall operate continuously throughout the term of this Agreement with at least the minimum number and type of staff which meet applicable federal and state requirements, and which are necessary for the provision of the services hereunder.

B. In the event that CONTRACTOR is unable to provide the services, staffing, facilities, or supplies as required, ADMINISTRATOR may, at its sole discretion, reduce the Maximum Obligation. The reduction to the Maximum Obligation shall be in an amount proportionate to the number of days in which CONTRACTOR was determined to be unable to provide services, staffing, facilities or supplies.

## **XII. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE**

CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by COUNTY, and hold COUNTY, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents and those special districts and agencies for which COUNTY's Board of Supervisors acts as the governing Board ("COUNTY INDEMNITEES") harmless from any claims, demands or liability of any kind or nature, including but not limited to personal injury or property damage, arising from or related to the services, products or other performance provided by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement. If judgment is entered against CONTRACTOR and COUNTY by a court of competent jurisdiction because of the concurrent active negligence of COUNTY or COUNTY INDEMNITEES, CONTRACTOR and COUNTY agree that liability will be apportioned as determined by the court. Neither party shall request a jury apportionment.

B. Prior to the provision of services under this Agreement, CONTRACTOR agrees to purchase all 23 required insurance at CONTRACTOR's expense and to submit to COUNTY the COI, including all 24 endorsements required herein, necessary to satisfy COUNTY that the insurance provisions of this 25 Agreement have been complied with and to maintain such insurance coverage with COUNTY during 26 the entire term of this Agreement. In addition, all subcontractors performing work on behalf of 27 CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement shall obtain insurance subject to the same terms and 28 conditions as set forth herein for CONTRACTOR. 29

C. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all subcontractors performing work on behalf of 30 CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement shall be covered under CONTRACTOR's insurance as an 31 Additional Insured or maintain insurance subject to the same terms and conditions as set forth herein for CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall not allow subcontractors to work if subcontractors have less than the level of coverage required by COUNTY from CONTRACTOR under this Agreement. It is the obligation of CONTRACTOR to provide notice of the insurance requirements to every subcontractor and to receive proof of insurance prior to allowing any subcontractor to begin work. Such proof of insurance Ц

c. If CONTRACTOR is assessed a late penalty, the amount shall be deducted from CONTRACTOR's monthly invoice.

4. In no cases shall assurances by CONTRACTOR, its employees, agents, including any insurance agent, be construed as adequate evidence of insurance. COUNTY will only accept valid COIs and endorsements, or in the interim, an insurance binder as adequate evidence of insurance coverage."

# XIVXIII. INSPECTIONS AND AUDITS

A. ADMINISTRATOR, any authorized representative of COUNTY, any authorized representative of the State of California, the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services, the Comptroller General of the United States, or any other of their authorized representatives, shall have access to any books, documents, and records, including but not limited to, financial statements, general ledgers, relevant accounting systems, medical and client records, of CONTRACTOR that are directly pertinent to this Agreement, for the purpose of responding to a beneficiary complaint or conducting an audit, review, evaluation, or examination, or making transcripts during the periods of retention set forth in the Records Management and Maintenance Paragraph of this Agreement. Such persons may at all reasonable times inspect or otherwise evaluate the services provided pursuant to this Agreement, and the premises in which they are provided.

B. CONTRACTOR shall actively participate and cooperate with any person specified in Subparagraph A. above in any evaluation or monitoring of the services provided pursuant to this Agreement, and shall provide the above-mentioned persons adequate office space to conduct such evaluation or monitoring.

C. AUDIT RESPONSE

1. Following an audit report, in the event of non-compliance with applicable laws and regulations governing funds provided through this Agreement, COUNTY may terminate this Agreement as provided for in the Termination Paragraph or direct CONTRACTOR to immediately implement appropriate corrective action. A plan of corrective action shall be submitted to ADMINISTRATOR in writing within thirty (30) calendar days after receiving notice from ADMINISTRATOR.

2. If the audit reveals that money is payable from one party to the other, that is, reimbursement

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by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY, or payment of sums due from COUNTY to CONTRACTOR, said funds shall be due and payable from one party to the other within sixty (60) calendar days of receipt of the audit results. If reimbursement is due from CONTRACTOR to COUNTY, and such reimbursement is not received within said sixty (60) calendar days, COUNTY may, in addition to any other remedies provided by law, reduce any amount owed CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the reimbursement due COUNTY.

D. CONTRACTOR shall retain a licensed certified public accountant, who will prepare an annual Single Audit as required by 31 USC 7501 – 7507, as well as its implementing regulations under 2 CFR Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards. CONTRACTOR shall forward the Single Audit to ADMINISTRATOR within fourteen (14) calendar days of receipt.

E. CONTRACTOR shall forward to ADMINISTRATOR a copy of any audit report within fourteen (14) calendar days of receipt. Such audit shall include, but not be limited to, management, financial, programmatic or any other type of audit of CONTRACTOR's operations, whether or not the cost of such operation or audit is reimbursed in whole or in part through this Agreement.

# XVXIV. LICENSES AND LAWS

A. CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees, affiliates, and subcontractors shall, throughout the term of this Agreement, maintain all necessary licenses, permits, approvals, certificates, accreditations, waivers, and exemptions necessary for the provision of the services hereunder and required by the laws, regulations and requirements of the United States, the State of California, COUNTY, and all other applicable governmental agencies. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR immediately and in writing of its inability to obtain or maintain, irrespective of the pendency of any hearings or appeals, permits, licenses, approvals, certificates, accreditations, waivers and exemptions. Said inability shall be cause for termination of this Agreement.

B. ENFORCEMENT OF CHILD SUPPORT OBLIGATIONS

1. CONTRACTOR agrees to furnish to ADMINISTRATOR within thirty (30) calendar days of the award of this Agreement:

a. In the case of an individual contractor, his/her name, date of birth, social security number, and residence address;

b. In the case of a contractor doing business in a form other than as an individual, the name, date of birth, social security number, and residence address of each individual who owns an interest of ten percent (10%) or more in the contracting entity;

c. A certification that CONTRACTOR has fully complied with all applicable federal and state reporting requirements regarding its employees;

d. A certification that CONTRACTOR has fully complied with all lawfully served Wage
 and Earnings Assignment Orders and Notices of Assignment, and will continue to so comply.

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1	2. Failure of CONTRACTOR to timely submit the data and/or certifications required by

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# XVIXV. LITERATURE, ADVERTISEMENTS, AND SOCIAL MEDIA

A. Any written information or literature, including educational or promotional materials, distributed by CONTRACTOR to any person or organization for purposes directly or indirectly related to this Agreement must be approved at least thirty (30) days in advance and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR before distribution. For the purposes of this Agreement, distribution of written materials shall include, but not be limited to, pamphlets, brochures, flyers, newspaper or magazine ads, and electronic media such as the Internet.

B. Any advertisement through radio, television broadcast, or the Internet, for educational or promotional purposes, made by CONTRACTOR for purposes directly or indirectly related to this Agreement must be approved in advance at least thirty (30) days and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR.

C. If CONTRACTOR uses social media (such as Facebook, Twitter, YouTube or other publicly available social media sites) in support of the services described within this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall develop social media policy and procedures and have them available to ADMINISTRATOR upon reasonable notice. CONTRACTOR shall inform ADMINISTRATOR of all forms of social media used to either directly or indirectly support the services described within this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall comply with COUNTY Social Media Use Policy and Procedures as they pertain to any social media developed in support of the services described within this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall also include any required funding statement information on social media when required by ADMINISTRATOR.

D. Any information as described in Subparagraphs A. and B. above shall not imply endorsement by COUNTY, unless ADMINISTRATOR consents thereto in writing.

# **XVIIXVI. MAXIMUM OBLIGATION**

— The Maximum Obligation of COUNTY for services provided in accordance with this Agreement is as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement.

"The Total Maximum Obligations of COUNTY for services provided in accordance with this Agreement and the separate Maximum Obligations for Period One and Period Two are as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement."

# **<u>XVIII</u>XVII**. <u>NONDISCRIMINATION</u>

## A. EMPLOYMENT

1. During the term of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of his/her race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status. Additionally, during the term of this Agreement,

1 CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall require in its subcontracts that subcontractors shall 2 not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of his/her race, 3 religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, 4 genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual 5 orientation, or military and veteran status.

2. CONTRACTOR and its Covered Individuals shall not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment in the areas of employment, promotion, demotion or transfer; recruitment orrecruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rate of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship.

3. CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate between employees with spouses and employees with domestic partners, or discriminate between domestic partners and spouses of those employees, in the provision of benefits.

4. CONTRACTOR shall post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices from ADMINISTRATOR and/or the United States Equal Employment Opportunity Commission setting forth the provisions of the Equal Opportunity clause.

5. All solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor shall state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status. Such requirements shall be deemed fulfilled by use of the term EOE.

6. Each labor union or representative of workers with which CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding must post a notice advising the labor union or workers' representative of the commitments under this Nondiscrimination Paragraph and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

B. SERVICES, BENEFITS AND FACILITIES – CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor shall not 27 discriminate in the provision of services, the allocation of benefits, or in the accommodation in facilities 28 on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental 29 disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender 30 expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status in accordance with Title IX of the 31 Education Amendments of 1972 as they relate to 20 USC §1681 - §1688; Title VI of the Civil Rights 32 Act of 1964 (42 USC §2000d); the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 USC §6101); Title 9, Division 4, 33 Chapter 6, Article 1 (§10800, et seq.) of the California Code of Regulations; and Title II of the Genetic 34 Information Nondiscrimination Act of 2008, 42 USC 2000ff, et seq. as applicable, and all other pertinent 35 rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, and as otherwise provided by state law and 36 regulations, as all may now exist or be hereafter amended or changed. For the purpose of this 37

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Nondiscrimination paragraph, Discrimination includes, but is not limited to the following based on one
 or more of the factors identified above:

1. Denying a client or potential client any service, benefit, or accommodation.

2. Providing any service or benefit to a client which is different or is provided in a different manner or at a different time from that provided to other clients.

3. Restricting a client in any way in the enjoyment of any advantage or privilege enjoyed by others receiving any service or benefit.

4. Treating a client differently from others in satisfying any admission requirement or condition, or eligibility requirement or condition, which individuals must meet in order to be provided any service or benefit.

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5. Assignment of times or places for the provision of services.

C. COMPLAINT PROCESS – CONTRACTOR shall establish procedures for advising all clients through a written statement that CONTRACTOR's and/or subcontractor's clients may file all complaints alleging discrimination in the delivery of services with CONTRACTOR, subcontractor, and ADMINISTRATOR or COUNTY's Patient Rights Office.

1. Whenever possible, problems shall be resolved informally and at the point of service. CONTRACTOR shall establish an internal informal problem resolution process for clients not able to resolve such problems at the point of service. Clients may initiate a grievance or complaint directly with CONTRACTOR either orally or in writing.

a. COUNTY shall establish a formal resolution and grievance process in the event informal processes do not yield a resolution.

b. Throughout the problem resolution and grievance process, client rights shall be maintained, including access to the Patients' Rights Office at any point in the process. Clients shall be informed of their right to access the Patients' Rights Office at any time.

2. Within the time limits procedurally imposed, the complainant shall be notified in writing as to the findings regarding the alleged complaint and, if not satisfied with the decision, may file an appeal.

D. PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES – CONTRACTOR and/or subcontractor agree to comply with the provisions of §504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, (29 USC 794 et seq., as implemented in 45 CFR 84.1 et seq.), and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 USC 12101 et seq.), as applicable, pertaining to the prohibition of discrimination against qualified persons with disabilities in all programs or activities; and if applicable, as implemented in Title 45, CFR, §84.1 et seq., as they exist now or may be hereafter amended together with succeeding legislation.

E. RETALIATION – Neither CONTRACTOR nor subcontractor, nor its employees or agents shall intimidate, coerce or take adverse action against any person for the purpose of interfering with rights secured by federal or state laws, or because such person has filed a complaint, certified, assisted or otherwise participated in an investigation, proceeding, hearing or any other activity undertaken to enforce rights secured by federal or state law.

F. In the event of non-compliance with this Paragraph or as otherwise provided by federal and state law, this Agreement may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and CONTRACTOR or subcontractor may be declared ineligible for further contracts involving federal, state or county funds.

# XIXXVIII. NOTICES

A. Unless otherwise specified, all notices, claims, correspondence, reports and/or statements authorized or required by this Agreement shall be effective:

1. When written and deposited in the United States mail, first class postage prepaid and addressed as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement or as otherwise directed by ADMINISTRATOR;

2. When faxed, transmission confirmed;

3. When sent by Email; or

4. When accepted by U.S. Postal Service Express Mail, Federal Express, United Parcel Service, or other expedited delivery service.

B. Termination Notices shall be addressed as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement or as otherwise directed by ADMINISTRATOR and shall be effective when faxed, transmission confirmed, or when accepted by U.S. Postal Service Express Mail, Federal Express, United Parcel Service, or other expedited delivery service.

C. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, within twenty-four (24) hours of becoming aware of any occurrence of a serious nature, which may expose COUNTY to liability. Such occurrences shall include, but not be limited to, accidents, injuries, or acts of negligence, or loss or damage to any COUNTY property in possession of CONTRACTOR.

D. For purposes of this Agreement, any notice to be provided by COUNTY may be given by ADMINISTRATOR.

# XXXIX. NOTIFICATION OF DEATH

A. Upon becoming aware of the death of any person served pursuant to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify ADMINISTRATOR.

B. All Notifications of Death provided to ADMINISTRATOR by CONTRACTOR shall contain the name of the deceased, the date and time of death, the nature and circumstances of the death, and the name(s) of CONTRACTOR's officers or employees with knowledge of the incident.

1. TELEPHONE NOTIFICATION – CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR by telephone immediately upon becoming aware of the death due to non-terminal illness of any person served pursuant to this Agreement; provided, however, weekends and holidays shall not be included for purposes of computing the time within which to give telephone notice and, notwithstanding the time limit herein specified, notice need only be given during normal business hours.

## 2. WRITTEN NOTIFICATION

a. NON-TERMINAL ILLNESS – CONTRACTOR shall hand deliver, fax, and/or send via encrypted email to ADMINISTRATOR a written report within sixteen (16) hours after becoming aware of the death due to non-terminal illness of any person served pursuant to this Agreement.

b. TERMINAL ILLNESS – CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR by written report hand delivered, faxed, sent via encrypted email, and/or postmarked and sent via U.S. Mail within forty-eight (48) hours of becoming aware of the death due to terminal illness of any person served pursuant to this Agreement.

C. If there are any questions regarding the cause of death of any person served pursuant to this Agreement who was diagnosed with a terminal illness, or if there are any unusual circumstances related to the death, CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify ADMINISTRATOR in accordance with this Notification of Death Paragraph.

## XXIXX. NOTIFICATION OF PUBLIC EVENTS AND MEETINGS

A. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR of any public event or meeting funded in whole or part by the COUNTY, except for those events or meetings that are intended solely to serve clients or occur in the normal course of business.

B. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR at least thirty (30) business days in advance of any applicable public event or meeting. The notification must include the date, time, duration, location and purpose of public event or meeting. Any promotional materials or event related flyers must be approved by ADMINISTRATOR prior to distribution.

# XXIIXXI. RECORDS MANAGEMENT AND MAINTENANCE

A. CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees and subcontractors shall, throughout the term of this Agreement, prepare, maintain and manage records appropriate to the services provided and in accordance with this Agreement and all applicable requirements.

B. CONTRACTOR shall implement and maintain administrative, technical and physical safeguards to ensure the privacy of PHI and prevent the intentional or unintentional use or disclosure of PHI in violation of the HIPAA, federal and state regulations and/or CHPP. CONTRACTOR shall mitigate to the extent practicable, the known harmful effect of any use or disclosure of PHI made in violation of federal or state regulations and/or COUNTY policies.

C. CONTRACTOR's participant, client, and/or patient records shall be maintained in a secure manner. CONTRACTOR shall maintain participant, client, and/or patient records and must establish and implement written record management procedures.

D. CONTRACTOR shall retain all financial records for a minimum of seven (7) years from the commencement of the contract, unless a longer period is required due to legal proceedings such as litigations and/or settlement of claims.

E. CONTRACTOR shall make records pertaining to the costs of services, client fees, charges,
 billings, and revenues available at one (1) location within the limits of the County of Orange.

F. CONTRACTOR shall ensure all HIPAA (DRS) requirements are met. HIPAA requires that clients, participants and/or patients be provided the right to access or receive a copy of their DRS and/or request addendum to their records. Title 45 CFR §164.501, defines DRS as a group of records maintained by or for a covered entity that is:

1. The medical records and billing records about individuals maintained by or for a covered health care provider;

2. The enrollment, payment, claims adjudication, and case or medical management record systems maintained by or for a health plan; or

3. Used, in whole or in part, by or for the covered entity to make decisions about individuals.

G. CONTRACTOR may retain client, and/or patient documentation electronically in accordance with the terms of this Agreement and common business practices. If documentation is retained electronically, CONTRACTOR shall, in the event of an audit or site visit:

1. Have documents readily available within forty-eight (48) hour notice of a scheduled audit or site visit.

2. Provide auditor or other authorized individuals access to documents via a computer terminal.

3. Provide auditor or other authorized individuals a hardcopy printout of documents, if requested.

H. CONTRACTOR shall ensure compliance with requirements pertaining to the privacy and security of PII and/or PHI. CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY immediately by telephone call plus email or fax upon the discovery of a Breach of unsecured PHI and/or PII.

I. CONTRACTOR may be required to pay any costs associated with a Breach of privacy and/or security of PII and/or PHI, including but not limited to the costs of notification. CONTRACTOR shall pay any and all such costs arising out of a Breach of privacy and/or security of PII and/or PHI.

J. CONTRACTOR shall retain all client and/or patient medical records for seven (7) years following discharge of the client and/or patient, with the exception of non-emancipated minors for whom records must be kept for at least one (1) year after such minors have reached the age of eighteen (18) years, or for seven (7) years after the last date of service, whichever is longer.

# XXIIIXXIII. RESEARCH AND PUBLICATION

CONTRACTOR shall not utilize information and data received from COUNTY or arising out of, or developed, as a result of this Agreement for the purpose of personal or professional research, or for publication.

# XXIVXXIII. <u>REVENUE</u>

A. CLIENT FEES – CONTRACTOR shall charge, unless waived by ADMINISTRATOR, a fee to

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clients to whom billable services, other than those amounts reimbursed by Medicare, Medi-Cal or other
third party health plans, are provided pursuant to this Agreement, their estates and responsible relatives,
according to their ability to pay as determined by the State Department of Health Care Services'
"Uniform Method of Determining Ability to Pay" (UMDAP) procedure or by any other payment
procedure as approved in advance, and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR; and in accordance with Title 9
of the California Code of Regulations. Such fee shall not exceed the actual cost of services provided.
No client shall be denied services because of an inability to pay.

B. THIRD-PARTY REVENUE – CONTRACTOR shall make every reasonable effort to obtain all available third-party reimbursement for which persons served pursuant to this Agreement may be eligible. Charges to insurance carriers shall be on the basis of CONTRACTOR's usual and customary charges.

C. PROCEDURES – CONTRACTOR shall maintain internal financial controls which adequately ensure proper billing and collection procedures. CONTRACTOR's procedures shall specifically provide for the identification of delinquent accounts and methods for pursuing such accounts. CONTRACTOR shall provide ADMINISTRATOR, monthly, a written report specifying the current status of fees which are billed, collected, transferred to a collection agency, or deemed by CONTRACTOR to be uncollectible.

D. OTHER REVENUES – CONTRACTOR shall charge for services, supplies, or facility use by persons other than individuals or groups eligible for services pursuant to this Agreement.

# XXVXXIV. MINIMUM WAGE LAWS

A. Pursuant to the United States of America Fair Labor Standard Act of 1938, as amended, and State of California Labor Code, §1178.5, CONTRACTOR shall pay no less than the greater of the federal or California Minimum Wage to all its employees that directly or indirectly provide services pursuant to this Agreement, in any manner whatsoever. CONTRACTOR shall require and verify that all its contractors or other persons providing services pursuant to this Agreement on behalf of CONTRACTOR pay their employees no less than the greater of the federal or California Minimum Wage.

B. CONTRACTOR shall comply and verify that its contractors comply with all other federal and State of California laws for minimum wage, overtime pay, record keeping, and child labor standards pursuant to providing services pursuant to this Agreement.

C. Notwithstanding the minimum wage requirements provided for in this clause, CONTRACTOR, where applicable, shall comply with the prevailing wage and related requirements, as provided for in accordance with the provisions of Article 2 of Chapter 1, Part 7, Division 2 of the Labor Code of the State of California (§§1770, et seq.), as it exists or may hereafter be amended.

# <u>XXVI<mark>XXV</mark>. <u>SEVERABILITY</u></u>

If a court of competent jurisdiction declares any provision of this Agreement or application thereof to any person or circumstances to be invalid or if any provision of this Agreement contravenes any federal, state or county statute, ordinance, or regulation, the remaining provisions of this Agreement or the application thereof shall remain valid, and the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect, and to that extent the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

## XXVII<mark>XXVI</mark>. SPECIAL PROVISIONS

A. CONTRACTOR shall not use the funds provided by means of this Agreement for the following purposes:

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1. Making cash payments to intended recipients of services through this Agreement.

2. Lobbying any governmental agency or official. CONTRACTOR shall file all certifications and reports in compliance with this requirement pursuant to Title 31, USC, §1352 (e.g., limitation on use of appropriated funds to influence certain federal contracting and financial transactions).

3. Fundraising.

4. Purchase of gifts, meals, entertainment, awards, or other personal expenses for CONTRACTOR's staff, volunteers, or members of the Board of Directors or governing body.

5. Reimbursement of CONTRACTOR's members of the Board of Directors or governing body for expenses or services.

6. Making personal loans to CONTRACTOR's staff, volunteers, interns, consultants, subcontractors, and members of the Board of Directors or governing body, or its designee or authorized agent, or making salary advances or giving bonuses to CONTRACTOR's staff.

7. Paying an individual salary or compensation for services at a rate in excess of the current Level I of the Executive Salary Schedule as published by the OPM. The OPM Executive Salary Schedule may be found at www.opm.gov.

8. Severance pay for separating employees.

9. Paying rent and/or lease costs for a facility prior to the facility meeting all required building codes and obtaining all necessary building permits for any associated construction.

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10. Supplanting current funding for existing services

B. Unless otherwise specified in advance and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR, CONTRACTOR shall not use the funds provided by means of this Agreement for the following purposes:

1. Funding travel or training (excluding mileage or parking).

2. Making phone calls outside of the local area unless documented to be directly for the purpose of client care.

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3. Payment for grant writing, consultants, certified public accounting, or legal services.

4. Purchase of artwork or other items that are for decorative purposes and do not directly
contribute to the quality of services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.

5. Purchasing or improving land, including constructing or permanently improving any

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6. Providing inpatient hospital services or purchasing major medical equipment.

7. Satisfying any expenditure of non-federal funds as a condition for the receipt of federal funds (matching).

# XXVIIIXXVIII. STATUS OF CONTRACTOR

CONTRACTOR is, and shall at all times be deemed to be, an independent contractor and shall be wholly responsible for the manner in which it performs the services required of it by the terms of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR is entirely responsible for compensating staff, subcontractors, and consultants employed by CONTRACTOR. This Agreement shall not be construed as creating the relationship of employer and employee, or principal and agent, between COUNTY and CONTRACTOR or any of CONTRACTOR's employees, agents, consultants, or subcontractors. CONTRACTOR assumes exclusively the responsibility for the acts of its employees, agents, consultants, or subcontractors as they relate to the services to be provided during the course and scope of their employment. CONTRACTOR, its agents, employees, consultants, or subcontractors, shall not be entitled to any rights or privileges of COUNTY's employees and shall not be considered in any manner to be COUNTY's employees.

# XXIXXXVIII. TERM

A. The term of this Agreement shall commence as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement or the execution date, whichever is later. This Agreement shall terminate as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement unless otherwise sooner terminated as provided in this Agreement; provided, however, CONTRACTOR shall be obligated to perform such duties as would normally extend beyond this term, including but not limited to, obligations with respect to confidentiality, indemnification, audits, reporting and accounting.

B. Any administrative duty or obligation to be performed pursuant to this Agreement on a weekend or holiday may be performed on the next regular business day.

# XXXXXIX. TERMINATION

A. Either party may terminate this Agreement, without cause, upon thirty (30), calendar days' written notice given the other party.

B. Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, COUNTY may terminate this Agreement upon five (5) calendar days' written notice if CONTRACTOR fails to perform any of the terms of this Agreement. At ADMINISTRATOR's sole discretion, CONTRACTOR may be allowed up to thirty (30) calendar days for corrective action.

C. COUNTY may terminate this Agreement immediately, upon written notice, on the occurrence of any of the following events:

1. The loss by CONTRACTOR of legal capacity. 1 2. Cessation of services. 2 3. The delegation or assignment of CONTRACTOR's services, operation or administration to 3 another entity without the prior written consent of COUNTY. 4 4. The neglect by any physician or licensed person employed by CONTRACTOR of any duty 5 required pursuant to this Agreement. 6 5. The loss of accreditation or any license required by the Licenses and Laws Paragraph of this 7 Agreement. 8 6. The continued incapacity of any physician or licensed person to perform duties required 9 pursuant to this Agreement. 10 7. Unethical conduct or malpractice by any physician or licensed person providing services 11 pursuant to this Agreement; provided, however, COUNTY may waive this option if CONTRACTOR 12 removes such physician or licensed person from serving persons treated or assisted pursuant to this 13 Agreement. 14 D. CONTINGENT FUNDING 15 1. Any obligation of COUNTY under this Agreement is contingent upon the following: 16 a. The continued availability of federal, state and county funds for reimbursement of 17 COUNTY's expenditures, and 18 b. Inclusion of sufficient funding for the services hereunder in the applicable budget(s) 19 approved by the Board of Supervisors. 20 2. In the event such funding is subsequently reduced or terminated, COUNTY may suspend, 21 terminate or renegotiate this Agreement upon thirty (30) calendar days' written notice given 22 CONTRACTOR. If COUNTY elects to renegotiate this Agreement due to reduced or terminated 23 funding, CONTRACTOR shall not be obligated to accept the renegotiated terms. 24 E. In the event this Agreement is suspended or terminated prior to the completion of the term as 25 specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of this Agreement, ADMINISTRATOR may, at its sole 26 discretion, reduce the Maximum Obligation of this Agreement in an amount consistent with the reduced 27 term of the Agreement. 28 F. In the event this Agreement is terminated by either party pursuant to Subparagraphs B., C. or D. 29 above, CONTRACTOR shall do the following: 30 1. Comply with termination instructions provided by ADMINISTRATOR in a manner which is 31 consistent with recognized standards of quality care and prudent business practice. 32 2. Obtain immediate clarification from ADMINISTRATOR of any unsettled issues of contract 33 performance during the remaining contract term. 34 3. Until the date of termination, continue to provide the same level of service required by this 35 Agreement. 36 4. If clients are to be transferred to another facility for services, furnish ADMINISTRATOR, 37

upon request, all client information and records deemed necessary by ADMINISTRATOR to effect an 1 orderly transfer. 2

5. Assist ADMINISTRATOR in effecting the transfer of clients in a manner consistent with client's best interests.

6. If records are to be transferred to COUNTY, pack and label such records in accordance with directions provided by ADMINISTRATOR.

7. Return to COUNTY, in the manner indicated by ADMINISTRATOR, any equipment and supplies purchased with funds provided by COUNTY.

8. To the extent services are terminated, cancel outstanding commitments covering the procurement of materials, supplies, equipment, and miscellaneous items, as well as outstanding commitments which relate to personal services. With respect to these canceled commitments, CONTRACTOR shall submit a written plan for settlement of all outstanding liabilities and all claims arising out of such cancellation of commitment which shall be subject to written approval of ADMINISTRATOR.

G. The rights and remedies of COUNTY provided in this Termination Paragraph shall not be exclusive, and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this Agreement.

# XXXIXXX. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY

Neither party hereto intends that this Agreement shall create rights hereunder in third parties including, but not limited to, any subcontractors or any clients provided services pursuant to this Agreement.

# XXXIIXXXI. WAIVER OF DEFAULT OR BREACH

Waiver by COUNTY of any default by CONTRACTOR shall not be considered a waiver of any subsequent default. Waiver by COUNTY of any breach by CONTRACTOR of any provision of this Agreement shall not be considered a waiver of any subsequent breach. Waiver by COUNTY of any default or any breach by CONTRACTOR shall not be considered a modification of the terms of this Agreement.

9	I. <u>COMMON TERMS AND DEFINITIONS</u>
10	The following standard definitions are for reference purposes only and may or may not apply in
11	their entirety throughout the Agreement. The parties agree to the following terms and definitions, and to
12	those terms and definitions which, for convenience, are set forth elsewhere in the Agreement.
13	A. Active and Ongoing Case Load means documentation, by CONTRACTOR, for completion of
14	entry and evaluation services provided to Clients into IRIS Documentation also includes level,
15	frequency, and duration of services received by Clients, and these services must be consistent with
16	Clients' level of impairments as well as treatment goals. In addition, services are to be individualized
17	and solution-focused, using evidenced-based practices.
18	B. <u>Administrative Support</u> means individual(s) who is/are responsible for providing a broad range
19	of office support to program and management staff that includes: answering and directing phone calls,
20	writing correspondences, entering data in spreadsheets, preparing invoices for payment, maintaining
21	tracking reports and files, and working on special projects, as assigned.
22	C. <u>Admission</u> means documentation, by CONTRACTOR, for completion of entry and evaluation
23	services provided to Clients into IRIS.
24	D. Care Coordinator means an individual with a Bachelor's degree in human services or related
25	field who will be responsible for developing and leading the Family Team and guiding the evolution of
26	a POC for a Client.
27	E. <u>Client</u> means any individual, referred or enrolled, for services under the Agreement who is
28	living with mental, emotional, or behavioral disorders.
29	F. <u>Clinical Director</u> means an individual who is responsible for the day-to-day clinical services of
30	the program, meets the minimum requirements set forth in Title 9, CCR, and has at least two (2) years of
31	full-time professional experience working with children and/or TAY in a mental health setting.
32	G. <u>Crisis Intervention</u> means a service, lasting less than twenty-four (24) hours that is provided to
33	or on the behalf of a Client for a condition that requires more timely response than a regularly scheduled
34	visit. Service activities may include, but are not limited to: assessment, individual therapy, collateral
35	therapy, family therapy, case management, and psychiatric evaluation.
36	H. <u>Data Collection System</u> means software used for the collection, tracking, and reporting of
37	outcomes data for Clients enrolled in the FSP programs.

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EXHIBIT A

1. <u>3 M's</u> means the Quarterly Assessment Form being completed for each Client every three months in the approved data collection system.

2. Data Certification means reviewing outcome data mandated by the State and COUNTY for accuracy and signing a Certification of Accuracy of Data form indicating that the data is accurate.

3. KET means the tracking of a Client's service movement or changes in the approved data collection system. A KET must be completed and entered accurately each time the CONTRACTOR is reporting a change from previous Client status in certain categories. These categories include: residential status, employment status, education and benefits establishment.

4. PAF means the baseline assessment for each Client that must be completed and entered into the data collection system within thirty (30) days of the Partnership date.

Diagnosis means identifying the nature of a Client's disorder. When formulating the diagnosis of Client, CONTRACTOR shall use the diagnostic codes and axes as specified in the most current edition of the Diagnostic and DSM published by the American Psychiatric Association. DSM diagnoses will be recorded on all IRIS documents, as appropriate.

J. <u>DSH</u> means the time, measured in hours and portions of hours, that a clinician spends providing services to Clients or significant others on behalf of Clients. DSH credit, both billable and non-billable minutes, is obtained by providing mental health, case management, medication support, and crisis intervention services to Clients open in IRIS.

K. Early Periodic Screening, Diagnosis & Treatment (EPSDT) means the State of California's implementation of the Federal child health component of Medicaid program which provides physical, mental, and developmental health services for children and young adults.

L. Education Coordinator means an individual who is responsible for providing assistance and support with educational and vocational services as well as developing resources for those Clients that wish to further their education or training.

M. Employment Coordinator means an individual who provides pre-employment training, job orientation, and site training to Clients. This individual is also responsible for assisting Clients with job application procedures; teaching social, grooming and dress-for-success personal hygiene skills to Clients; and coaching Clients on how to maintain employment. In addition, the Employment Coordinator may provide on-the-job mentoring and will work closely with the hiring companies and Clients.

N. Engagement means the process where a trusting relationship between CONTRACTOR's staff and Client is developed over a short period of time, so CONTRACTOR and Client can develop a plan to link the Client to appropriate services within the community. Engagement of the Client is the objective of a successful outreach.

O. Face-to-Face Contact means, as it pertains to a FSP, a direct encounter between CONTRACTOR's staff and Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s). This does not include contact by phone, //

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email, etc. For the purpose of completing an Encounter Document, Face-to-Face Contact means a direct 1 encounter between staff and Client(s), regardless if another individual(s) is/are present or not. 2

P. Family Resource Center Services means Mental Health Services provided to Clients that are actively enrolled at the COUNTY's SSA's FRC. FRC is a consortium of agencies providing human services in a single site and under the auspices of SSA.

Family Team means a group formed to meet the needs of a FSP eligible Client through О. whatever means possible, and this team includes a program staff, the eligible Client, the Client's family members, and other support individual(s) the family agrees to include on the team.

R. FSP means a program model described in COUNTY's MHSA plan that has been approved by The MHSA plan describes how COUNTY will utilize MHSA funds to develop and the State. implement treatment plans for mental health Clients through FSPs. A FSP is an evidence-based and strength-based model with the focus on the individual rather than the disease.

S. FSW means the specific program model described in COUNTY's MHSA plan. The FSW program provides culturally competent in-home, intensive, mental health care coordination services that will address family needs across all life domains of the Client.

T. Group Home is a facility for housing youth and is licensed by Community Care Licensing under the provisions of CCR, Title 22, Division 6, et seq.

U. Head of Service means an individual ultimately responsible for overseeing the program and is required to be licensed as a mental health professional.

V. Housing Coordinator means an individual who is responsible for assisting Clients with housing solutions. This individual is also responsible for outreach and networking within the community to maintain an up-to-date record of available housing resources. In addition, the coordinator will work with the Family Team to assess the needs of Clients.

W. Individual Services and Support Funds (Flexible Funds a.k.a. Flex Funds) means funds used to provide Clients and/or their families with immediate assistance, as deemed necessary, for the treatment of their mental illness and improve their overall quality of life. Flexible Funds are generally categorized as housing, Client transportation, food, clothing, medical, and miscellaneous expenditures that are individualized and appropriate to support Clients' mental health treatment activities.

X. Intake means the initial meeting between a Client and CONTRACTOR's staff, and includes an evaluation of the Client to determine if the Client meets program criteria and is willing to seek services.

Y. IRIS means the ADMINISTRATOR's database system that collects Clients' information such as registration, scheduled appointments, laboratory information system, invoice and reporting capabilities, compliance with regulatory requirements, electronic medical records, and other relevant applications.

Z. LCSW means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 14 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be //

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current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has
 at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

AA. <u>Licensed MFT</u> means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 13 of the California Business and Professions Code, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 14 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

AB. <u>LPCC</u> means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 13 of the California Business and Professions Code, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 16 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical service to Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

AC. <u>LPT</u> means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 10 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

AD. <u>Licensed Psychologist</u> means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 6.6 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

AE. <u>LVN</u> means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 6.5 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

AF. <u>Live Scan</u> means an inkless, electronic fingerprint which is transmitted directly to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the completion of a criminal record check, typically required of employees who have direct contract with Clients.

AG. <u>Medi-Cal</u> means the State of California's implementation of the Federal Medicaid health care program which pays for a variety of medical services for children and adults who meet eligibility criteria.

AH. <u>Medical Necessity</u> means diagnosis, impairment, and intervention related criteria as defined in the COUNTY's MHP under Medical Necessity for Medi-Cal reimbursed Specialty Mental Health Services.

AI. <u>Medication Services</u> means face-to-face or telephone services provided by a licensed physician, registered nurse, or other qualified medical staff. This service includes evaluation and documentation of the clinical justification for use of the medication, dosage, side effects, compliance, and response of the Client to medication.

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AJ. Mental Health Rehabilitation Specialist means an individual with a Bachelor's Degree who has 1 four years of experience in a mental health services setting as a specialist in the fields of physical 2 restoration, social adjustment, and/or vocational adjustment. 3

AK. Mental Health Services means an individual or a group therapy and intervention being provided to Clients that is designed to reduce mental disability and restores or improves daily functioning. These Mental Health Services must be consistent with goals of learning and development, as well as independent living and enhanced self-sufficiency. In addition, these services cannot be provided as a component of adult residential services, crisis residential treatment services, crisis intervention, crisis stabilization, day rehabilitation, or day treatment intensive. Service activities may include, but are not limited to: assessment, plan development, rehabilitation, and collateral. Also, Mental Health Services may be either Face-to-Face Contact, or by telephone with Clients or significant support individuals, and services may be provided anywhere in the community.

1. Assessment means a service activity, which may include a clinical analysis of the history and current status of a Client's mental, emotional, behavioral disorder, and relevant cultural issues. The Assessment also needs to include history of services being provided, diagnosis, and use of testing procedures.

2. Collateral means significant support individual(s) in a Client's life and is/are used to define services provided to the Client with the intent of improving or maintaining the mental health status of the Client. The Client may or may not be present for this service activity.

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3. Co-Occurring see DD Integrated Treatment Model.

4. DD Integrated Treatment Model means a program that uses a stage-wise treatment model and is non-confrontational, follows behavioral principles, considers interactions between mental illness and substance abuse, and has gradual expectations of abstinence. Mental illness and substance abuse research has strongly indicated that a Client with co-occurring disorder needs treatment for both problems to recover fully and focusing on one does not ensure the other will go away. Dual diagnosis services integrate assistance for each condition by helping Clients recover from mental illness and substance abuse in one setting and at the same time.

5. Medication Support Services means services provided by licensed physicians, registered nurses, or other qualified medical staff, which include: prescribing, administering, dispensing and monitoring of psychiatric medications or biologicals that are necessary to alleviate symptoms of mental illness. These services also include evaluation and documentation of the clinical justification and effectiveness of medication, dosage, side effects, compliance, and response to medication. In addition, the licensed physicians, registered nurses, or other qualified medical staff must obtain informed consent from Clients prior to providing medication education and plan development related to the delivery of these services and/or assessment to Clients.

6. Rehabilitation Service means an activity which includes assistance to improving, 36 maintaining, or restoring a Client's or group of Clients' functional skills, daily living skills, social and 37

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leisure skill, grooming and personal hygiene skills, meal preparation skills, support resources and/or
 medication education.

7. <u>Targeted Case Management</u> means services that assist a Client to access needed medical, educational, social, prevocational, vocational, rehabilitative, or other community services. These service activities may include, but are not limited to: communicating and coordinating services through referral; monitoring service delivery to ensure Clients' access to service and the service delivery system; and tracking of Clients' progress and plan development.

8. <u>TBS</u> means one-on-one behavioral interventions with a Client, which is designed to reduce or eliminate targeted behaviors as identified in the Client's treatment plan. Collateral services are also provided to parent(s)/guardian(s) as part of TBS. Clients must be Medi-Cal eligible and meet TBS class membership and service need requirements. Documentation in the medical record must support Medical Necessity for these intensive services. Cases in which Clients are receiving more than twenty (20) hours per week of TBS or those who are expected to receive more than four months (120 days) of TBS must be approved by ADMINISTRATOR. ADMINISTRATOR has to approve individuals that are delivering these intervention services to ensure they are qualified to deliver these services.

9. <u>Therapy</u> means a therapeutic intervention that focuses primarily on symptom reduction as a means to improve functional impairments. Therapy may be delivered to a Client or a group of Clients, which may include family therapy with Client being present.

AL. <u>MHSA</u> means the State of California law that provides funding for expanded community mental health services. It is also known as "Proposition 63."

AM. <u>Mental Health Worker</u> means an individual who has obtained a Bachelor's degree in a mental health field or has a high school diploma along with two (2) years of experience delivering services in a mental health field.

AN. <u>Mentoring Services</u> means a service that provides support to Clients by building a structured and trusting relationship over a prolonged period of time between a Client and a mentor. The mentor is a peer or older individual who provides one-to-one contact and support in the following areas to assist Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s): consistent support, guidance, and coaching in life skills; concrete help and/or other relationship-building activities to the Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s); and linking the Client(s)/parent(s)/guardian(s) to other services within the COUNTY and contract operated programs.

1. <u>Paid Parent Mentor</u> means an individual, age twenty-six (26) and older, who has been screened and trained to provide Mentoring Services and is reimbursed for providing such services under the Mentoring Services Contract. A different designation for this position is permissible for purposes of CONTRACTOR's employment records and recruitment efforts if such designation is accompanied by clear cross-referencing in all reports and communications to ADMINISTRATOR.

2. <u>Paid TAY Mentor</u> means an individual, age eighteen (18) to twenty-five (25), who has been
 screened and trained to provide Mentoring Services and is reimbursed for providing such services under
 the Mentoring Services Contract. A different designation for this position is permissible for purposes of

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CONTRACTOR's employment records and recruitment efforts if such designation is accompanied by clear cross-referencing in all reports and communications to ADMINISTRATOR. 2

3. Volunteer Mentor means an individual, age eighteen (18) and older, who has been screened and trained to provide Mentoring Services and is not reimbursed for providing such services under the Mentoring Services Contract. "Reimbursement" for services excludes expenses such as transportation costs, as transportation costs are allowable and reimbursable costs. A different designation for this position is permissible for purposes of CONTRACTOR's employment records and recruitment efforts if such designation is accompanied by clear cross-referencing in all reports and communications to ADMINISTRATOR.

AO. NPI means the standard unique health identifier that was adopted by the Secretary of HHS Services under HIPPA of 1996 for health care providers. All HIPAA covered healthcare providers, individuals, and organizations must obtain an NPI for use to identify themselves in HIPAA standard transactions. The NPI is assigned for life.

AP. NOA-A means a Medi-Cal requirement that informs the beneficiary that she/he is not entitled to any specialty mental health service. The COUNTY has expanded the requirement for an NOA-A to all beneficiaries requesting an assessment for services and found not to meet the Medical Necessity criteria for specialty mental health services.

AQ. NPP means a document that notifies Clients of uses and disclosures of PHI. The NPP may be made by, or on behalf of, the health plan or health care provider as set forth in the of 1996 HIPAA.

AR. Outcomes Analyst/Data Mining Analyst means an individual who ensures that an FSP program 20 maintains a focus on program outcomes. This individual will be responsible for reviewing outcome 21 data, analyzing data, and developing strategies for gathering new data from Client's perspective to 22 improve FSP's understanding of Client's needs and desires towards furthering their Recovery. This 23 individual will also provide feedback to the program and work collaboratively with the employment 24 specialist, education specialist, benefits specialist, and other staff in the program to strategize and 25 improve outcomes in service delivery. In addition, this position will be responsible for attending all data 26 and outcome related meetings and ensuring that the FSP is being proactive in all data collection 27 requirements and changes at the local and state levels. 28

AS. Outreach means linking potential Clients to appropriate mental health services within the 29 community. Outreach activities will include educating the community about the services offered and 30 requirements for participation in the programs. Such activities may result in the CONTRACTOR 31 developing referral sources for Clients from various programs being offered within the community. 32

AT. Parent Partner means an individual who supports and assists other parent(s)/guardian(s) with 33 children or youth in the system and is hired due to his/her own personal experience and knowledge in 34 raising a child or youth with emotional/behavioral disturbance. For Wraparound Orange County, it is 35 required that this individual has exposure to COUNTY's Welfare Services, Probation, or Mental Health 36 System and can provide support to the Family Team and the parent(s)/guardian(s) in particular. 37

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AU. <u>PSC</u> means an individual with a Bachelor's degree in human services or related field. It is preferred that the individual has at least two years of related experience with mental health services, or three years' experience as a Client in a similar program who has graduated to self-sufficiency. A PSC leads the implementation of a service plan covering an entire range of needs for the Client and/or Client's family to promote success, safety, and permanence in the home, school, workforce, and community and lead Clients to self-sufficiency.

AV. <u>PBM Company</u> means a company contracted by the COUNTY that manages the medication benefits for Clients that are qualified for medication benefits.

AW. <u>POC</u> means a written plan, including by reference any Juvenile Court order(s), developed and signed by the Family Team that includes the following elements:

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A statement of an overall goal or vision for the Client and Client's family.
 The strengths of the Client and Client's family.

3. The needs, as defined by specific life areas that must be met to achieve the goal(s) of the Client and Client's family.

- 4. Prevention and intervention Safety Plans.
- 5. The type, frequency, and duration of intervention strategies.
- 6. Financial responsibility for the components of the POC.
- 7. Desired outcomes.

AX. <u>Pre-Licensed Psychologist</u> means an individual who has a Ph.D. or Psy.D. in Clinical Psychology and is registered with the Board of Psychology as a Registered Psychologist or Psychological Assistant, while acquiring hours for licensing and providing services under a waiver in accordance with WIC section 575.2. The waiver may not exceed five (5) years.

AY. <u>Pre-Licensed Therapist</u> means an individual who has a Master's Degree in social work or MFT, PCC and is registered with the BBS as an associate clinical social worker, PCC intern, or MFT intern, while acquiring hours for licensing. Registration is subject to regulations adopted by BBS.

AZ. <u>Program Director</u> means an individual who is responsible for all aspects of administration and clinical operations of the mental health program, including development and adherence to the annual budget. This individual will also be responsible for the following: hiring, development and performance management of professional and support staff, and ensuring mental health treatment services are provided in concert with local and state rules and regulations.

BA. <u>Promotora de Salud Model</u> means a model where trained individuals, Promotores, work towards improving the health of the communities by linking neighbors to health care and social services as well as educating peers about mental illness, disease and injury prevention.

BB. <u>Promotores</u> means individuals who are members of the community that function as natural helpers to address some of the communities' unmet mental health, health and human service needs.

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1 They are individuals who represent the ethnic, socio-economic and educational traits of the population 2 being served. Promotores are respected and recognized by peers and have the pulse of the community's 3 needs.

BC. <u>PHI</u> means individually identifiable health information usually transmitted through electronic media. PHI can be maintained in any medium as defined in the regulations, or for an entity such as a health plan, transmitted or maintained in any other medium. It is created or received by a covered entity and is related to the past, present, or future physical or mental health or condition of an individual, provision of health care to an individual, or the past, present, or future payment for health care provided to an individual.

BD. <u>Psychiatrist</u> means an individual who meets the minimum professional and licensure requirements set forth in Title 9, CCR, Section 623, and, preferably, has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

BE. <u>Psychology Student or Psychology Intern</u> means an individual who is in school pursuing a Ph.D. or Psy.D. in Clinical Psychology, and may or may not meet the criteria for a DHCS Waiver in order to provide services in accordance with DHCS Information Letter No. 10-03. The waiver may not exceed (5) years.

BF. <u>QIC</u> means a committee that meets quarterly to review one percent (1%) of all "high-risk" Medi-Cal Clients in order to monitor and evaluate the quality and appropriateness of services provided. At a minimum, the committee is comprised of one (1) ADMINSTRATOR, one (1) clinician, and one (1) physician who are not involved in the clinical care of the cases.

BG. <u>RCL Group Home</u> means a group home reviewed by the State Department of Social Services, Foster Care Rates Bureau, that meets the requirements for a RCL of 1 to 14, to provide eligible minors room and board and supervision.

BH. <u>Referral</u> means effectively linking Clients to other services within the community and documenting follow-up provided within five (5) business days to assure that Clients have made contact with the referred service(s).

BI. <u>Registered Nurse</u> means a licensed individual, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 6 of the California Business and Professions Code, who can provide clinical services to Clients. The license must be current and in force, and has not been suspended or revoked. Also, it is preferred that the individual has at least one (1) year of experience treating children and TAY.

BJ. <u>Student Intern</u> means student(s) currently enrolled in an accredited graduate or undergraduate program and is/are accumulating supervised work experience hours as part of field work, internship, or practicum requirements. Acceptable programs include all programs that assist students in meeting the educational requirements to be a Licensed MFT, a LCSW, a Licensed Clinical Psychologist, a Licensed PCC, or to obtain a Bachelor's degree. Individuals with graduate degrees and have two (2) years of fulltime experience in a mental health setting, either post-degree or as part of the program leading to the graduate degree, are not considered as students.

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BK. Supervisory Review means ongoing clinical case reviews in accordance with procedures 1 developed by the COUNTY to determine the appropriateness of the diagnosis and treatment plan for 2 Clients, as well as to monitor compliance to the minimum ADMINISTRATOR and Medi-Cal charting 3 standards. Supervisory review is conducted by the program/clinic director or designee. 4

BL. Token means the security device which allows an end-user to access ADMINISTRATOR's 5 computer based IRIS. 6

BM. UMDAP means the method used for determining the annual Client liability for mental health services received from the COUNTY's mental health system and is set by the State of California.

BN. Wellness Coordinator means an individual who specializes in assisting Clients with access to a 9 myriad of health care needs, nutrition resources, and other community supports. This individual will be 10 responsible for documenting the services required, as well as communicating the needs of Clients to the Family Team. 12

BO. Wraparound Orange County means the wraparound program administered by COUNTY's SSA and is available to children and TAY who are returning from or being considered for placement in group homes.

BP. Youth Partner/Specialist means an individual who has a high school diploma, preferably a 16 bachelor's degree in human services or a related field, and has a background working with children and 17 TAY. This individual is to provide consistent, reinforcing support to Clients by allowing opportunities 18 19 for Clients to learn and practice social behavior, problem solving skills, and coping skills. In the spirit of MHSA, these positions can be filled by adequate numbers of bilingual, bicultural staff in order to 20 meet the referral needs of the program and the threshold language requirements for COUNTY. It is also 21 recommended by COUNTY that former mental health Clients and/or their family members be given 22 priority for these positions due to their unique insight into the experiences of Clients.

B. CONTRACTOR agrees The total cost of services provided for in the Agreement are based upon projected revenue generation and shall be reimbursed by federal Medi-Cal and COUNTY MHSA revenues. CONTRACTOR agrees that if actual federal Medi-Cal reimbursement, based upon the completed Cost Report, as specified in the Cost Report Paragraph of the Agreement, for each Fiscal Year is less than budgeted, the Maximum Obligation may, at ADMINISTRATOR's sole discretion, be adjusted down by the amount of under generated federal Medi-Cal revenue. CONTRACTOR further agrees that MHSA revenue shall be used to cover the cost of non-Medi-Cal Clients and/or non-Medi-Cal billable services and shall not exceed the amounts specified in the Budget Paragraph, Subparagraph A. of this Exhibit A to the Agreement, unless authorized, in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR.

C. In the event CONTRACTOR collects fees and insurance, including Medicare, for services provided pursuant to the Agreement, CONTRACTOR may make written application to ADMINISTRATOR to retain such revenues; provided, however, the application must specify that the fees and insurance shall be utilized exclusively to provide Mental Health Services. ADMINISTRATOR may, at its sole discretion, approve any such retention of revenues. Approval by ADMINISTRATOR shall be in writing to CONTRACTOR and shall specify the amount of said revenues to be retained and the quantity of services to be provided by CONTRACTOR

32 D. BUDGET/STAFFING MODIFICATIONS - CONTRACTOR may request to shift funds 33 between budgeted line items for the purpose of meeting specific program needs or for providing 34 continuity of care to its members, by utilizing a Budget/Staffing Modification Request form provided by 35 ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall submit a properly completed Budget/Staffing Modification 36 Request to ADMINISTRATOR for consideration, in advance, which shall include a justification 37 narrative specifying the purpose of the request, the amount of said funds to be shifted, and the sustaining

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impact of the shift as may be applicable to the current contract period and/or future contract periods.
 CONTRACTOR shall obtain written approval of any Budget/Staffing Modification Request(s) from
 ADMINISTRATOR prior to implementation by CONTRACTOR. Failure of CONTRACTOR to obtain
 written approval from ADMINISTRATOR for any proposed Budget/Staffing Modification Request(s)
 may result in disallowance of those costs.

E. In the event CONTRACTOR collects fees and insurance, including Medicare, for services provided pursuant to the Agreement, CONTRACTOR may make written application to ADMINISTRATOR to retain such revenues; provided, however, the application must specify that the fees and insurance shall be utilized exclusively to provide Mental Health Services. ADMINISTRATOR may, at its sole discretion, approve any such retention of revenues. Approval by ADMINISTRATOR shall be in writing to CONTRACTOR and shall specify the amount of said revenues to be retained and the quantity of services to be provided by CONTRACTOR.

F. FINANCIAL RECORDS – CONTRACTOR shall prepare and maintain accurate and complete financial records of its cost and operating expenses. Such records will reflect the actual cost of the type of service for which payment is claimed. Any apportionment of or distribution of costs, including indirect costs, to or between programs or cost centers of CONTRACTOR shall be documented, and will be made in accordance with GAAP.

G. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the Budget Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

# III. <u>PAYMENTS</u>

A. COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR monthly, in arrears, the provisional amount of \$274,167 per month for each period as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of the Agreement. All payments are interim payments only, and subject to Final Settlement in accordance with the Cost Report Paragraph of the Agreement for which CONTRACTOR shall be reimbursed for the actual cost of providing the services hereunder; provided, however, the total of such payments does not exceed COUNTY's Maximum Obligation as specified in the Referenced Contract Provisions of the Agreement and, provided further, CONTRACTOR's costs are reimbursable pursuant to COUNTY, state, and federal regulations. ADMINISTRATOR may, at its discretion, pay supplemental invoices for any month for which the provisional amount specified above has not been fully paid.

1. In support of the monthly invoice, CONTRACTOR shall submit an Expenditure and Revenue Report as specified in the Reports Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement. ADMINISTRATOR shall use the Expenditure and Revenue Report to determine payment to CONTRACTOR as specified in Subparagraphs A.2. and A.3., below.

2. If, at any time, CONTRACTOR's Expenditure and Revenue Reports indicate that the
 provisional amount payments exceed the actual cost of providing services, ADMINISTRATOR may
 reduce payments to CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the difference between the

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year-to-date provisional amount payments to CONTRACTOR's and the year-to-date actual cost
 incurred by CONTRACTOR.

3. If, at any time, CONTRACTOR's Expenditure and Revenue Reports indicate that the provisional amount payments are less than the actual cost of providing services, ADMINISTRATOR may authorize an increase in the provisional amount payment to CONTRACTOR by an amount not to exceed the difference between the year-to-date provisional amount payments to CONTRACTOR and the year-to-date actual cost incurred by CONTRACTOR.

B. CONTRACTOR's invoices shall be on a form approved or supplied by ADMINISTRATOR and provide such information as is required by ADMINISTRATOR. Invoices are due the tenth (10th) day of each month. Invoices received after the due date may not be paid within the same month. Payments to CONTRACTOR should be released by COUNTY no later than twenty-one (21) calendar days after receipt of the correctly completed invoice.

C. All invoices to COUNTY shall be supported at CONTRACTOR's facility, by source documentation including, but not limited to, ledgers, journals, time sheets, invoices, bank statements, canceled checks, receipts, receiving records, and records of services provided.

D. ADMINISTRATOR may withhold or delay any payment if CONTRACTOR fails to comply with any provision of the Agreement.

E. COUNTY shall not reimburse CONTRACTOR for services provided beyond the expiration and/or termination of the Agreement, except as may otherwise be provided under the Agreement, or specifically agreed upon in a subsequent Agreement.

F. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the Payments Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

# IV. <u>REPORTS</u>

A. FISCAL

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1. CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly Expenditure and Revenue Reports to ADMINISTRATOR. These reports shall be on a form acceptable to, or provided by, ADMINISTRATOR and shall report actual costs and revenues for CONTRACTOR's program described in the Services Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement. Any changes, modifications, or deviations to any approved budget line item must be approved in advance and in writing by ADMINISTRATOR and annotated on the monthly Expenditure and Revenue Report, or said cost deviations may be subject to disallowance. Such reports shall be received by ADMINISTRATOR no later than twenty (20) calendar days following the end of the month being reported.

CONTRACTOR shall submit Year-End Projection Reports to ADMINISTRATOR. These
 reports shall be on a form acceptable to, or provided by, ADMINISTRATOR and shall report
 anticipated year-end actual costs and revenues for CONTRACTOR's program described in the Services
 Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement. Such reports shall include actual monthly costs and

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revenue to date and anticipated monthly costs and revenue to the end of the fiscal year, and shall include
 a projection narrative justifying the year-end projections. Year-End Projection Reports shall be
 submitted in conjunction with the Monthly Expenditure and Revenue Reports.

B. STAFFING REPORT –CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly Staffing Reports to ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR's reports shall contain required information, and be on a form acceptable to, or provided by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall submit these reports no later than twenty (20) calendar days following the end of the month being reported.

C. PROGRAMMATIC –CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly Programmatic reports to ADMINISTRATOR. These reports shall be in a format approved by ADMINISTRATOR and shall include but not limited to, descriptions of any performance objectives, outcomes, and or interim findings as directed by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall be prepared to present and discuss the programmatic reports at the monthly meetings with ADMINISTRATOR, to include whether or not CONTRACTOR is progressing satisfactorily and if not, specify what steps are being taken to achieve satisfactory progress. Such reports shall be received by ADMINISTRATOR no later than twentieth (20th) calendar day following the end of the month being reported.

D. ADDITIONAL REPORTS – Upon ADMINISTRATOR's request, CONTRACTOR shall make such additional reports as required by ADMINISTRATOR concerning CONTRACTOR's activities as they affect the services hereunder. ADMINISTRATOR shall be specific as to the nature of information requested and allow thirty (30) calendar days for CONTRACTOR to respond.

E. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the Reports Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

# V. <u>SERVICES</u>

# A. FACILITIES

1. CONTRACTOR shall maintain a minimum of one (1) fully licensed and appropriate facility for the provision of Children and Transitional Age Youth Full Service Partnership/Wraparound Services which meets the minimum requirements for Medi-Cal eligibility at the following location or any other location(s) approved by ADMINISTRATOR:

3188 "F" Airway Avenue, Suite F/G Costa Mesa, CA 92626

2. CONTRACTOR shall maintain regularly scheduled service hours, throughout the year, and maintain the capability to provide services during after-school hours on weekdays, and on the weekends, if necessary, in order to accommodate Clients.

a. CONTRACTOR's administrative staff holiday schedule shall be consistent with COUNTY's holiday schedule unless otherwise approved, in advance and in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR.

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1	b. CONTRACTOR shall provide Clients and/or their family members with twenty-four
2	(24)-hour a day, seven (7) day a week, and three hundred and sixty five (365) day a year access to their
3	assigned case manager or designee acceptable to COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall also develop with
4	each Client and/or Client's family a plan for crisis intervention services which includes whom to contact
5	for emergency services.
6	3. Upon COUNTY's certification of the provider's existing site, the CONTRACTOR shall be
7	responsible for making any necessary changes to meet and maintain Medi-Cal site standards.
8	B. FSP/FSW SERVICES
9	1. CONTRACTOR shall assess potential Clients meeting the following criteria unless written
10	exception is granted by ADMINISTRATOR:
11	a. Individuals under the age of eighteen (18) years of age (until eighteenth [18th]
12	birthday);
13	b. Individuals eighteen (18) through twenty-five (25) years of age (until twenty-sixth
14	[26th] birthday) who are legally residing in COUNTY and otherwise eligible for public services under
15	federal and state law;
16	c. Displaying behaviors or a history indicative of Serious Emotional Disorder as defined
17	by the WIC Section 5600.3; and
18	d. In one of the following target groups:
19	1) homeless;
20	2) unserved or underserved because of linguistic or cultural isolation;
21	3) with a history of multiple psychiatric hospitalizations;
22	4) experiencing their first psychotic episodes;
23	5) uninsured and exiting the Social Service or Probation systems;
24	6) with special needs and/or co-occurring disorders; or
25	2. CONTRACTOR shall coordinate referrals with other existing wraparound and mental
26	health services to ensure that all Clients and/or their families are given access to the most appropriate
27	level and type of services. Other services may include Wraparound Orange County, MHSA FSP
28	programs for children and/or adults, and other COUNTY mental health services.
29 20	3. CONTRACTOR shall provide supportive services for all persons referred but not admitted
30	to the FSW until those persons can be engaged in alternative services. Referrals to alternate services,
31	and the supported services provided until engagement, will be reviewed and approved by ADMINISTRATOR.
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33 24	4. CONTRACTOR shall provide a FSW program that will provide in-home, intensive, mental health case management services addressing family needs across all life domains of the Client. In the
34 25	program, a case manager and an enrollee/family will form a service team which will identify strengths,
35 36	needs and resources, including additional people to be added to the team. The team will develop a
36 37	service plan for each enrollee within thirty (30) calendar days of enrollment. The implementation of the
51	service plan for each enfonce within unity (50) calchdar days of enforment. The implementation of the

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service plan will be the responsibility of the team using a "whatever-it-takes" approach to promote success, safety and permanence in the home, school, and community. The plan will cover the entire range of needs for the Client and/or their family: housing, employment and medical, etc. in addition to mental health services. The team will be responsible for identifying ways of addressing need through linkage to existing services in the community and will also have limited access to additional funding to access other needed services or support as necessary.

5. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that every Client is engaged in mental health treatment appropriate to his/her diagnosis and level of distress. Therapists, psychiatrist, and others providing treatment will be included on the FSW team unless otherwise approved in writing by ADMINISTRATOR.

6. CONTRACTOR shall collect and input all data about characteristics and progress of the Clients into a Data Collection System or other database as mandated by the State and/or ADMINISTRATOR.

7. CONTRACTOR shall review the financial status of all enrollees using the UMDAP, unless otherwise approved in writing by COUNTY.

8. CONTRACTOR shall maximize collection of Medi-Cal and other third party payors whenever appropriate and in accordance with all State and COUNTY procedures.

9. CONTRACTOR shall secure agreement from ADMINISTRATOR prior to recommending a Client for discharge. Planning for discharge or transition to an appropriate alternative service shall be initiated at admission to the FSW and be incorporated into the service plan.

10. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain an advisory committee for the FSW services, which shall meet at least monthly to review and comment on the progress of the program. Clients, former Clients, and/or their family members shall be represented on the committee, as well as relevant community representatives mutually agreed upon by ADMINISTRATOR and CONTRACTOR.

11. CONRACTOR shall participate in any clinical case review and implement any recommendations made by COUNTY to improve Client care.

12. CONTRACTOR shall conduct Supervisory Review at sixty (60) calendar day and six (6) month intervals, in accordance with procedures developed by ADMINISTRATOR. CONTRACTOR shall conduct thirty (30)-day review of open cases, or previously opened with another provider. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all chart documentation complies with all federal, state, and local guidelines and standards.

13. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all clinical documentation is completed promptly and is reflected on the Client's chart within twenty-four (24) hours after the completion of services.

C. FLEXIBLE FUNDS

CONTRACTOR shall follow the procedures identified below and as specified by
 ADMINISTRATOR, regarding the request for, use, and accounting of Individual Services and Support
 funds (Flexible Funds):

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a. Flexible Funds shall be individualized, appropriate, reasonable, and justified for the treatment of a Client's mental illness and overall quality of life;

b. Flexible Funds may be utilized when other community resources such as family/friends, food banks, shelters, charitable organizations, etc. are not available and/or accessible in a timely manner, or are not appropriate for a Client's situation. Designated CONTRACTOR staff shall assist Clients in exploring other available resources whenever possible, prior to utilizing Flexible Funds;

c. Flexible Funds expenditures for various types of purchases shall be identified as allowable, unallowable, or require discussion with ADMINISTRATOR;

d. Flexible Funds shall not to be used for housing for Clients that have not been enrolled in CONTRACTOR's program, unless approved, in advance and in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR;

e. Flexible Funds shall not be given in the form of cash to any Client, either enrolled or in the outreach and engagement phase of the CONTRACTOR's program;

f. Pre-purchases shall only be for food, transportation, clothing and motels or other purchases as required and appropriate, and approved in advance and in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR;

g. Pre-purchases of food, transportation, and clothing vouchers and/or gift cards shall be limited to a combined \$5,000 supply on-hand at any given time, and that all voucher and/or gift card purchases and disbursements shall be tracked and logged by designated CONTRACTOR staff. Vouchers and/or gift cards shall be limited in monetary value to not more than \$25 each, unless otherwise approved in advance and in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR.

h. Pre-purchases for motels shall be on a case-by-case basis and time-limited in nature, and only utilized while more appropriate housing is being located. Pre-purchases of motel rooms shall be tracked and logged upon purchase and disbursement.

2. CONTRACTOR's process for documenting and accounting for all Flexible Fund expenditures, shall include, but not be limited to, retention of comprehensible source documentation such as receipts, copies of lease/rental agreements for Client housing, general ledgers, and needs shall be documented in Client's MHP;

3. CONTRACTOR shall obtain written authorization from ADMINISTRATOR for individual purchases made on behalf of a Client and/or Client family member(s) in the amount(s) as determined by ADMINISTRATOR;

a. Gift cards and vouchers for Clients shall be securely stored and documentation of their disbursement, including end-of-year process accounting for gift cards still in staff possession, shall be maintained by CONTRACTOR.

b. A single Flexible Fund expenditure, in excess of \$1,000, shall not be made without prior written approval of ADMINISTRATOR. In emergency situations, CONTRACTOR may exceed the \$1,000 limit, if appropriate and justified, and shall notify ADMINISTRATOR the next business day of such an expense. Said notification shall include total costs and a justification for the expense. Failure to notify ADMINISTRATOR within the specified timeframe may result in disallowance of the

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expenditure;

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4. CONTRACTOR shall designate staff to authorize Flexible Fund expenditures and that the mechanism used to ensure this staff has timely access to Flexible Funds is identified;

5. CONTRACTOR shall report Flexible Funds expenditure detail monthly, on a form provided or approved by ADMINISTRATOR. The Flexible Fund report shall be submitted with CONTRACTOR's monthly Expenditure and Revenue Report. The report will be received by ADMINISTRATOR no later than the twentieth (20th) day following the end of the month being reported. CONTRACTOR must request in writing any extensions to the due date of the monthly report.

6. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a P&P regarding Flexible Funds that incorporates at a minimum the requirements as specified in Subparagraph C.1., above. CONTACTOR shall submit said P&P to ADMINISTRATOR no later than twenty (20) calendar days from the start of the Agreement. If the Flexible Fund P&P has not been approved by ADMINISTRATOR within sixty (60) calendar days from the start of the Agreement, any subsequent Flexible Fund expenditures may be disallowed by ADMINISTRATOR.

D. CONTRACTOR and ADMINISTRATOR may mutually agree, in writing, to modify the Services Paragraph of this Exhibit A to the Agreement.

# VI. STAFFING

A. CONTRACTOR shall, at a minimum, provide the following staffing pattern expressed in FTEs continuously throughout the term of the Agreement. One (1) FTE shall be equal to an average of forty (40) hours of work per week to provide FSW services.

B. CONTRACTOR shall have as Head of Service; a licensed mental health professional, in conformance to one of the following staff categories: Psychiatrist, Licensed Psychologist, LCSW, LPCC, Licensed MFT, RN, LVN, or LPT.

C. CONTRACTOR shall include bilingual/bicultural services to meet the needs of threshold languages as determined by COUNTY. Whenever possible, bilingual/bicultural staff should be retained. Any clinical vacancies occurring at a time when bilingual and bicultural composition of the clinical staffing does not meet the above requirement must be filled with bilingual and bicultural staff unless ADMINISTRATOR consents, in advance and in writing, to the filling of those positions with non-bilingual staff. Salary savings resulting from such vacant positions may not be used to cover costs other than salaries and employees benefits unless otherwise authorized, in advance and in writing, by ADMINISTRATOR.

D. CONTRACTOR shall maintain personnel files for each staff person, including management and other administrative positions, both direct and indirect to the Agreement, which shall include, but not be limited to, an application for employment, qualifications for the position, applicable licenses, Live Scan results, waivers, registrations, documentation of bicultural/bilingual capabilities (if applicable), pay rate and evaluations justifying pay increases.

E. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, no later than seventy-two (72) hours of any staffing vacancies or filling of vacant positions that occur during the term of the Agreement. CONTRACTOR's notification shall include at a minimum the following information: employee name(s), position title(s), date(s) of resignation, date(s) of hire, and a description of recruitment activity.

F. CONTRACTOR shall notify ADMINISTRATOR, in writing, no later than seven (7) business days, in advance, of any proposed staffing changes, including but not limited to promotions, temporary FTE changes, and temporary staffing assignments that occur during the term of the Agreement.

G. CONTRACTOR shall make its best effort to provide services pursuant to the Agreement in a manner that is culturally and linguistically appropriate for the population(s) served. CONTRACTOR shall maintain documentation of such efforts which may include, but not be limited to: records of participation in COUNTY sponsored or other applicable training; recruitment and hiring P&Ps; copies of literature in multiple languages and formats, as appropriate; and descriptions of measures taken to enhance accessibility for, and sensitivity to, individuals who are physically challenged.

H. CONTRACTOR shall recruit, hire, train, and maintain staff that are persons in recovery, and/or
 family members of persons in recovery. These individuals shall not be currently receiving services

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directly from CONTRACTOR. Documentation may include, but not be limited to, the following:
 records attesting to efforts made in recruitment and hiring practices and identification of measures taken
 to enhance accessibility for potential staff in these categories.

I. CONTRACTOR shall provide a minimum of one (1) hour of individual or two (2) hours of group supervision weekly to FSW direct service staff covering suicide assessment and crisis intervention, developing safety plans, maintaining healthy boundaries, reporting child abuse, dealing with difficult Clients, meeting facilitation and medication, confidentiality, identification of strengths, promoting life skills and such other topics identified by the ADMINISTRATOR. The parties agree that a business associate relationship under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations between the CONTRACTOR and COUNTY arises to the extent that CONTRACTOR performs, or delegates to subcontractors to perform, functions or activities on behalf of COUNTY pursuant to, and as set forth in, the Agreement that are described in the definition of "Business Associate" in 45 CFR § 160.103. 3. The COUNTY wishes to disclose to CONTRACTOR certain information pursuant to the terms of the Agreement, some of which may constitute PHI, as defined below in Subparagraph B.10, to be used or disclosed in the course of providing services and activities pursuant to, and as set forth, in the Agreement. 4. The parties intend to protect the privacy and provide for the security of PHI that may be created, received, maintained, transmitted, used, or disclosed pursuant to the Agreement in compliance with the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations as they may exist now or be hereafter amended. 5. The parties understand and acknowledge that HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations do not pre-empt any state statutes, rules, or regulations that are not otherwise pre-empted by other Federal law(s) and impose more stringent requirements with respect to privacy of PHI. 6. The parties understand that the HIPAA Privacy and Security rules, as defined below in Subparagraphs B.9 and B.14, apply to the CONTRACTOR in the same manner as they apply to the covered entity (COUNTY). 2) Any inadvertent disclosure by a person who is authorized to access PHI at CONTRACTOR to another person authorized to access PHI at the CONTRACTOR, or organized health care arrangement in which COUNTY participates, and the information received as a result of such disclosure is not further used or disclosed in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

3) A disclosure of PHI where CONTRACTOR or COUNTY has a good faith belief that an unauthorized person to whom the disclosure was made would not reasonably have been able to retains such information.

b. Except as provided in paragraph (a) of this definition, an acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule is presumed to be a breach unless CONTRACTOR demonstrates that there is a low probability that the PHI has been compromised based on a risk assessment of at least the following factors:

1) The nature and extent of the PHI involved, including the types of identifiers and the likelihood of re-identification;

2) The unauthorized person who used the PHI or to whom the disclosure was made;

3) Whether the PHI was actually acquired or viewed; and

4) The extent to which the risk to the PHI has been mitigated.

6. CONTRACTOR agrees to ensure that any Subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or transmit PHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree to the same restrictions and conditions that apply through this Business Associate Contract to CONTRACTOR with respect to such information.

7. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide access, within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of a written request by COUNTY, to PHI in a DRS, to COUNTY or, as directed by COUNTY, to an Individual in order to meet the requirements under 45 CFR § 164.524. If CONTRACTOR maintains an EHR with PHI, and an individual requests a copy of such information in an electronic format, CONTRACTOR shall provide such information in an electronic format.

8. CONTRACTOR agrees to make any amendment(s) to PHI in a DRS that COUNTY directs or agrees to pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.526 at the request of COUNTY or an Individual, within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of said request by COUNTY. CONTRACTOR agrees to document any Disclosures of PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY, and to make information related to such Disclosures available as would be required for COUNTY to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528.

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11. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide COUNTY or an Individual, as directed by COUNTY, in a time and manner to be determined by COUNTY, that information collected in accordance with the Agreement, in order to permit COUNTY to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528.

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12. CONTRACTOR agrees that to the extent CONTRACTOR carries out COUNTY's obligation under the HIPAA Privacy and/or Security rules CONTRACTOR will comply with the requirements of 45 CFR Part 164 that apply to COUNTY in the performance of such obligation.

13. If CONTRACTOR receives Social Security data from COUNTY provided to COUNTY by a state agency, upon request by COUNTY, CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY with a list of all employees, subcontractors, and agents who have access to the Social Security data, including employees, agents, subcontractors, and agents of its subcontractors.

14. CONTRACTOR will notify COUNTY if CONTRACTOR is named as a defendant in a criminal proceeding for a violation of HIPAA. COUNTY may terminate the Agreement, if CONTRACTOR is found guilty of a criminal violation in connection with HIPAA. COUNTY may terminate the Agreement, if a finding or stipulation that CONTRACTOR has violated any standard or requirement of the privacy or security provisions of HIPAA, or other security or privacy laws are made in any administrative or civil proceeding in which CONTRACTOR is a party or has been joined. COUNTY will consider the nature and seriousness of the violation in deciding whether or not to terminate the Agreement.

15. CONTRACTOR shall make itself and any subcontractors, employees or agents assisting CONTRACTOR in the performance of its obligations under the Agreement, available to COUNTY at no cost to COUNTY to testify as witnesses, or otherwise, in the event of litigation or administrative proceedings being commenced against COUNTY, its directors, officers or employees based upon claimed violation of HIPAA, the HIPAA regulations or other laws relating to security and privacy, which involves inactions or actions by CONTRACTOR, except where CONTRACTOR or its subcontractor, employee, or agent is a named adverse party.

16. The Parties acknowledge that federal and state laws relating to electronic data security and privacy are rapidly evolving and that amendment of this Business Associate Contract may be required to provide for procedures to ensure compliance with such developments. The Parties specifically agree to take such action as is necessary to implement the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations and other applicable laws relating to the security or privacy of PHI. Upon COUNTY's request, CONTRACTOR agrees to promptly enter into negotiations with COUNTY concerning an amendment to this Business Associate Contract embodying written assurances consistent with the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations or other applicable laws. COUNTY may terminate the Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice in the event: //

a. CONTRACTOR does not promptly enter into negotiations to amend this Business Associate Contract when requested by COUNTY pursuant to this subparagraph C; or

b. CONTRACTOR does not enter into an amendment providing assurances regarding the safeguarding of PHI that COUNTY deems are necessary to satisfy the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations.

17. CONTRACTOR shall work with COUNTY upon notification by CONTRACTOR to COUNTY of a Breach to properly determine if any Breach exclusions exist as defined in Subparagraph B.2.a above.

D. SECURITY RULE

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1. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.306 and establish and maintain appropriate Administrative, Physical and Technical Safeguards in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.308, § 164.310, and § 164.312, with respect to electronic PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and security program that includes Administrative, Physical, and Technical Safeguards appropriate to the size and complexity of CONTRACTOR's operations and the nature and scope of its activities.

2. CONTRACTOR shall implement reasonable and appropriate policies and procedures to comply with the standards, implementation specifications and other requirements of 45 CFR Part 164, Subpart C, in compliance with 45 CFR § 164.316. CONTRACTOR will provide COUNTY with its current and updated policies upon request.

3. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the continuous security of all computerized data systems containing electronic PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall protect paper documents containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. These steps shall include, at a minimum:

a. Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed under subparagraphs E, below;

b. Achieving and maintaining compliance with the HIPAA Security Rule, as necessary in conducting operations on behalf of COUNTY;

c. Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and scope of security established by the OMB in OMB Circular No. A-130, Appendix III - Security of Federal Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for automated information systems in Federal agencies;

4. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that any subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or
 transmit ePHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree through a contract with CONTRACTOR to the same
 restrictions and requirements contained in this subparagraph D of this Business Associate Contract.
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5. CONTRACTOR shall report to COUNTY immediately any Security Incident of which it becomes aware. CONTRACTOR shall report Breaches of Unsecured PHI in accordance with subparagraph E below and as required by 45 CFR § 164.410.

6. CONTRACTOR shall designate a Security Officer to oversee its data security program who shall be responsible for carrying out the requirements of this paragraph and for communicating on security matters with COUNTY.

# E. DATA SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

1. Personal Controls

a. Employee Training. All workforce members who assist in the performance of functions or activities on behalf of COUNTY in connection with Agreement, or access or disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY, must complete information privacy and security training, at least annually, at CONTRACTOR's expense. Each workforce member who receives information privacy and security training must sign a certification, indicating the member's name and the date on which the training was completed. These certifications must be retained for a period of six (6) years following the termination of Agreement.

b. Employee Discipline. Appropriate sanctions must be applied against workforce members who fail to comply with any provisions of CONTRACTOR's privacy P&Ps, including termination of employment where appropriate.

c. Confidentiality Statement. All persons that will be working with PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must sign a confidentiality statement that includes, at a minimum, General Use, Security and Privacy Safeguards, Unacceptable Use, and Enforcement Policies. The statement must be signed by the workforce member prior to access to such PHI. The statement must be renewed annually. The CONTRACTOR shall retain each person's written confidentiality statement for COUNTY inspection for a period of six (6) years following the termination of the Agreement.

d. Background Check. Before a member of the workforce may access PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY, a background screening of that worker must be conducted. The screening should be commensurate with the risk and magnitude of harm the employee could cause, with more thorough screening being done for those employees who are authorized to bypass significant technical and operational security controls. The CONTRACTOR shall retain each workforce member's background check documentation for a period of three (3) years.

2. Technical Security Controls

a. Workstation/Laptop encryption. All workstations and laptops that store PHI COUNTY
 discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of
 COUNTY either directly or temporarily must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which

is 128bit or higher, such as AES. The encryption solution must be full disk unless approved by the COUNTY.

b. Server Security. Servers containing unencrypted PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have sufficient administrative, physical, and technical controls in place to protect that data, based upon a risk assessment/system security review.

c. Minimum Necessary. Only the minimum necessary amount of PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY required to perform necessary business functions may be copied, downloaded, or exported.

d. Removable media devices. All electronic files that contain PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must be encrypted when stored on any removable media or portable device (i.e. USB thumb drives, floppies, CD/DVD, Blackberry, backup tapes etc.). Encryption must be a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which is 128bit or higher, such as AES. Such PHI shall not be considered "removed from the premises" if it is only being transported from one of CONTRACTOR's locations to another of CONTRACTOR's locations.

e. Antivirus software. All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or store PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have installed and actively use comprehensive anti-virus software solution with automatic updates scheduled at least daily.

f. Patch Management. All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or store PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have critical security patches applied, with system reboot if necessary. There must be a documented patch management process which determines installation timeframe based on risk assessment and vendor recommendations. At a maximum, all applicable patches must be installed within thirty (30) calendar or business days of vendor release. Applications and systems that cannot be patched due to operational reasons must have compensatory controls implemented to minimize risk, where possible.

g. User IDs and Password Controls. All users must be issued a unique user name for 29 accessing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, 30 or transmits on behalf of COUNTY. Username must be promptly disabled, deleted, or the password 31 changed upon the transfer or termination of an employee with knowledge of the password, at maximum 32 within twenty-four (24) hours. Passwords are not to be shared. Passwords must be at least eight 33 characters and must be a non-dictionary word. Passwords must not be stored in readable format on the 34 computer. Passwords must be changed every ninety (90) days, preferably every sixty (60) days. 35 Passwords must be changed if revealed or compromised. Passwords must be composed of characters 36 from at least three (3) of the following four (4) groups from the standard keyboard: 37

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1) Upper case letters (A-Z)

- 2) Lower case letters (a-z)
- 3) Arabic numerals (0-9)
- 4) Non-alphanumeric characters (punctuation symbols)

h. Data Destruction. When no longer needed, all PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must be wiped using the Gutmann or DoD 5220.22-M (7 Pass) standard, or by degaussing. Media may also be physically destroyed in accordance with NIST Special Publication 800-88. Other methods require prior written permission by COUNTY.

i. System Timeout. The system providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must provide an automatic timeout, requiring re-authentication of the user session after no more than twenty (20) minutes of inactivity.

j. Warning Banners. All systems providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must display a warning banner stating that data is confidential, systems are logged, and system use is for business purposes only by authorized users. User must be directed to log off the system if they do not agree with these requirements.

k. System Logging. The system must maintain an automated audit trail which can identify the user or system process which initiates a request for PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY, or which alters such PHI. The audit trail must be date and time stamped, must log both successful and failed accesses, must be read only, and must be restricted to authorized users. If such PHI is stored in a database, database logging functionality must be enabled. Audit trail data must be archived for at least 3 years after occurrence.

l. Access Controls. The system providing access to PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must use role based access controls for all user authentications, enforcing the principle of least privilege.

m. Transmission encryption. All data transmissions of PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY outside the secure internal network must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which is 128bit or higher, such as AES. Encryption can be end to end at the network level, or the data files containing PHI can be encrypted. This requirement pertains to any type of PHI in motion such as website access, file transfer, and E-Mail.

n. Intrusion Detection. All systems involved in accessing, holding, transporting, and protecting PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, //

or transmits on behalf of COUNTY that are accessible via the Internet must be protected by a comprehensive intrusion detection and prevention solution.

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3. Audit Controls

a. System Security Review. CONTRACTOR must ensure audit control mechanisms that record and examine system activity are in place. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have at least an annual system risk assessment/security review which provides assurance that administrative, physical, and technical controls are functioning effectively and providing adequate levels of protection. Reviews should include vulnerability scanning tools.

b. Log Reviews. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have a routine procedure in place to review system logs for unauthorized access.

c. Change Control. All systems processing and/or storing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must have a documented change control procedure that ensures separation of duties and protects the confidentiality, integrity and availability of data.

4. Business Continuity/Disaster Recovery Control

a. Emergency Mode Operation Plan. CONTRACTOR must establish a documented plan to enable continuation of critical business processes and protection of the security of PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY kept in an electronic format in the event of an emergency. Emergency means any circumstance or situation that causes normal computer operations to become unavailable for use in performing the work required under this Agreement for more than 24 hours.

b. Data Backup Plan. CONTRACTOR must have established documented procedures to backup such PHI to maintain retrievable exact copies of the PHI. The plan must include a regular schedule for making backups, storing backup offsite, an inventory of backup media, and an estimate of the amount of time needed to restore DHCS PHI or PI should it be lost. At a minimum, the schedule must be a weekly full backup and monthly offsite storage of DHCS data. BCP for contractor and COUNTY (e.g. the application owner) must merge with the DRP.

5. Paper Document Controls

a. Supervision of Data. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY in paper form shall not be left unattended at any time, unless it is locked in a file cabinet, file room, desk or office. Unattended means that information is not being observed by an employee authorized to access the information. Such PHI in paper form shall not be left unattended at any time in vehicles or planes and shall not be checked in baggage on commercial airplanes.

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b. Escorting Visitors. Visitors to areas where PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY is contained shall be escorted and such PHI shall be kept out of sight while visitors are in the area.

PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or c. Confidential Destruction. CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must be disposed of through confidential means, such as cross cut shredding and pulverizing.

d. Removal of Data. PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY must not be removed from the premises of the CONTRACTOR except with express written permission of COUNTY.

Faxes containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or e. Faxing. CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY shall not be left unattended and fax machines shall be in secure areas. Faxes shall contain a confidentiality statement notifying persons receiving faxes in error to destroy them. Fax numbers shall be verified with the intended recipient before sending the fax.

f. Mailing. Mailings containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY shall be sealed and secured from damage or inappropriate viewing of PHI to the extent possible. Mailings which include five hundred (500) or more individually identifiable records containing PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY in a single package shall be sent using a tracked mailing method which includes verification of delivery and receipt, unless the prior written permission of COUNTY to use another method is obtained.

# F. BREACH DISCOVERY AND NOTIFICATION

1. Following the discovery of a Breach of Unsecured PHI, CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY of such Breach, however both parties agree to a delay in the notification if so advised by a law enforcement official pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.412.

a. A Breach shall be treated as discovered by CONTRACTOR as of the first day on which such Breach is known to CONTRACTOR or, by exercising reasonable diligence, would have been known to CONTRACTOR.

b. CONTRACTOR shall be deemed to have knowledge of a Breach, if the Breach is known, or by exercising reasonable diligence would have known, to any person who is an employee, officer, or other agent of CONTRACTOR, as determined by federal common law of agency.

2. CONTRACTOR shall provide the notification of the Breach immediately to the COUNTY Privacy Officer. CONTRACTOR's notification may be oral, but shall be followed by written notification within 24 hours of the oral notification.

3. CONTRACTOR's notification shall include, to the extent possible:

a. The identification of each Individual whose Unsecured PHI has been, or is reasonably believed by CONTRACTOR to have been, accessed, acquired, used, or disclosed during the Breach;

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b. Any other information that COUNTY is required to include in the notification to 1 Individual under 45 CFR §164.404 (c) at the time CONTRACTOR is required to notify COUNTY or 2 promptly thereafter as this information becomes available, even after the regulatory sixty (60) day period set forth in 45 CFR § 164.410 (b) has elapsed, including:

1) A brief description of what happened, including the date of the Breach and the date of the discovery of the Breach, if known;

2) A description of the types of Unsecured PHI that were involved in the Breach (such as whether full name, social security number, date of birth, home address, account number, diagnosis, disability code, or other types of information were involved);

3) Any steps Individuals should take to protect themselves from potential harm resulting from the Breach;

4) A brief description of what CONTRACTOR is doing to investigate the Breach, to mitigate harm to Individuals, and to protect against any future Breaches; and

5) Contact procedures for Individuals to ask questions or learn additional information, which shall include a toll-free telephone number, an e-mail address, Web site, or postal address.

4. COUNTY may require CONTRACTOR to provide notice to the Individual as required in 45 CFR § 164.404, if it is reasonable to do so under the circumstances, at the sole discretion of the COUNTY.

5. In the event that CONTRACTOR is responsible for a Breach of Unsecured PHI in violation of the HIPAA Privacy Rule, CONTRACTOR shall have the burden of demonstrating that CONTRACTOR made all notifications to COUNTY consistent with this subparagraph F and as required by the Breach notification regulations, or, in the alternative, that the acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI did not constitute a Breach.

6. CONTRACTOR shall maintain documentation of all required notifications of a Breach or its risk assessment under 45 CFR § 164.402 to demonstrate that a Breach did not occur.

7. CONTRACTOR shall provide to COUNTY all specific and pertinent information about the Breach, including the information listed in Section E.3.b.(1)-(5) above, if not yet provided, to permit COUNTY to meet its notification obligations under Subpart D of 45 CFR Part 164 as soon as practicable, but in no event later than fifteen (15) calendar days after CONTRACTOR's initial report of the Breach to COUNTY pursuant to Subparagraph F.2 above.

8. CONTRACTOR shall continue to provide all additional pertinent information about the Breach to COUNTY as it may become available, in reporting increments of five (5) business days after the last report to COUNTY. CONTRACTOR shall also respond in good faith to any reasonable requests for further information, or follow-up information after report to COUNTY, when such request is made by COUNTY.

9. If the Breach is the fault of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR shall bear all expense or other costs associated with the Breach and shall reimburse COUNTY for all expenses COUNTY incurs 37

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in addressing the Breach and consequences thereof, including costs of investigation, notification, 1 remediation, documentation or other costs associated with addressing the Breach. 2

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G. PERMITTED USES AND DISCLOSURES BY CONTRACTOR

1. CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR as necessary to perform functions, activities, or services for, or on behalf of, COUNTY as specified in the Agreement, provided that such use or Disclosure would not violate the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done by COUNTY except for the specific Uses and Disclosures set forth below.

a. CONTRACTOR may use PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary, for the proper management and administration of CONTRACTOR.

b. CONTRACTOR may disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR for the proper management and administration of CONTRACTOR or to carry out the legal responsibilities of CONTRACTOR, if:

1) The Disclosure is required by law; or

2) CONTRACTOR obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the PHI is disclosed that it will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for the purposes for which it was disclosed to the person and the person immediately notifies CONTRACTOR of any instance of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has been breached.

c. CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR to provide Data Aggregation services relating to the Health Care Operations of CONTRACTOR.

2. CONTRACTOR may use PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary, to carry out legal responsibilities of CONTRACTOR.

3. CONTRACTOR may use and disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR consistent with the minimum necessary policies and procedures of COUNTY.

4. CONTRACTOR may use or disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR as required by law.

H. PROHIBITED USES AND DISCLOSURES

1. CONTRACTOR shall not disclose PHI COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of COUNTY about an individual to a health plan for payment or health care operations purposes if the PHI pertains solely to a health care item or service for which the health care provider involved has been paid out of pocket in full and the individual requests such restriction, in accordance with 42 USC § 17935(a) and 45 CFR § 164.522(a).

2. CONTRACTOR shall not directly or indirectly receive remuneration in exchange for PHI 34 COUNTY discloses to CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on 35 behalf of COUNTY, except with the prior written consent of COUNTY and as permitted by 42 USC § 36 17935(d)(2). 37

DEFINITIONS 14 1. "Breach" shall have the meaning given to such term under the IEA and CMPPA. It shall 15 include a "PII loss" as that term is defined in the CMPPA. 16 2. "Breach of the security of the system" shall have the meaning given to such term under the 17 CIPA, Civil Code § 1798.29(d). 18 19 3. "CMPPA Agreement" means the CMPPA Agreement between the SSA and CHHS. 4. "DHCS PI" shall mean Personal Information, as defined below, accessed in a database 20 maintained by the COUNTY or DHCS, received by CONTRACTOR from the COUNTY or DHCS or 21 acquired or created by CONTRACTOR in connection with performing the functions, activities and 22 services specified in the Agreement on behalf of the COUNTY. 23 5. "IEA" shall mean the Information Exchange Agreement currently in effect between the 24 SSA and DHCS. 25 6. "Notice-triggering Personal Information" shall mean the personal information identified in 26 California Civil Code § 1798.29(e) whose unauthorized access may trigger notification requirements 27 under California Civil Code § 1709.29. For purposes of this provision, identity shall include, but not be 28 limited to, name, identifying number, symbol, or other identifying particular assigned to the individual, 29 such as a finger or 30 voice print, a photograph or a biometric identifier. Notice-triggering PI includes PI in electronic, paper 31 or any other medium. 32 7. "PII" shall have the meaning given to such term in the IEA and CMPPA. 33 8. "PI" shall have the meaning given to such term in California Civil Code§ 1798.3(a). 34 9. "Required by law" means a mandate contained in law that compels an entity to make a use 35 or disclosure of PI or PII that is enforceable in a court of law. This includes, but is not limited to, court 36 orders and court-ordered warrants, subpoenas or summons issued by a court, grand jury, a governmental 37

1 or tribal inspector general, or an administrative body authorized to require the production of 2 information, and a civil or an authorized investigative demand. It also includes Medicare conditions of 3 participation with respect to health care providers participating in the program, and statutes or 4 regulations that require the production of information, including statutes or regulations that require such 5 information if payment is sought under a government program providing public benefits.

10. "Security Incident" means the attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure, modification, or destruction of PI, or confidential data utilized in complying with this Agreement; or interference with system operations in an information system that processes, maintains or stores Pl.

### B. TERMS OF AGREEMENT

1. Permitted Uses and Disclosures of DHCS PI and PII by CONTRACTOR. Except as otherwise indicated in this Exhibit, CONTRACTOR may use or disclose DHCS PI only to perform functions, activities, or services for or on behalf of the COUNTY pursuant to the terms of the Agreement provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the CIPA if done by the COUNTY.

2. Responsibilities of CONTRACTOR

CONTRACTOR agrees:

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a. Nondisclosure. Not to use or disclose DHCS PI or PII other than as permitted or required by this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract or as required by applicable state and federal law.

b. Safeguards. To implement appropriate and reasonable administrative, technical, and physical safeguards to protect the security, confidentiality and integrity of DHCS PI and PII, to protect against anticipated threats or hazards to the security or integrity of DHCS PI and PII, and to prevent use or disclosure of DHCS PI or PII other than as provided for by this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract. CONTRACTOR shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and security program that include administrative, technical and physical safeguards appropriate to the size and complexity of CONTRACTOR's operations and the nature and scope of its activities, which incorporate the requirements of subparagraph (c), below. CONTRACTOR will provide COUNTY with its current policies upon request.

c. Security. CONTRACTOR shall ensure the continuous security of all computerized data systems containing DHCS PI and PII. CONTRACTOR shall protect paper documents containing DHCS PI and PII. These steps shall include, at a minimum:

1) Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed in subparagraph E of the Business Associate Contract, Exhibit B to the Agreement; and

2) Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and
scope of security established by the Office of Management and Budget in OMB Circular No. A-130,
Appendix III-Security of Federal Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for
automated information systems in Federal agencies.

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3) If the data obtained by CONTRACTOR from COUNTY includes PII, 1 CONTRACTOR shall also comply with the substantive privacy and security requirements in the 2 CMPPA Agreement between the SSA and the CHHS and in the Agreement between the SSA and 3 DHCS, known as the IEA. The specific sections of the IEA with substantive privacy and security requirements to be complied with are sections E, F, and G, and in Attachment 4 to the IEA, Electronic Information Exchange Security Requirements, Guidelines and Procedures for Federal, State and Local Agencies Exchanging Electronic Information with the SSA. CONTRACTOR also agrees to ensure that any of CONTRACTOR's agents or subcontractors, to whom CONTRACTOR provides DHCS PII agree to the same requirements for privacy and security safeguards for confidential data that apply to CONTRACTOR with respect to such information.

d. Mitigation of Harmful Effects. To mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known to CONTRACTOR of a use or disclosure of DHCS PI or PII by CONTRACTOR or its subcontractors in violation of this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract.

e. CONTRACTOR's Agents and Subcontractors. To impose the same restrictions and conditions set forth in this Personal Information and Security Contract on any subcontractors or other agents with whom CONTRACTOR subcontracts any activities under the Agreement that involve the disclosure of DHCS PI or PII to such subcontractors or other agents.

f. Availability of Information. To make DHCS PI and PII available to the DHCS and/or COUNTY for purposes of oversight, inspection, amendment, and response to requests for records, injunctions, judgments, and orders for production of DHCS PI and PII. If CONTRACTOR receives DHCS PII, upon request by COUNTY and/or DHCS, CONTRACTOR shall provide COUNTY and/or DHCS with a list of all employees, contractors and agents who have access to DHCS PII, including employees, contractors and agents of its subcontractors and agents.

g. Cooperation with COUNTY. With respect to DHCS PI, to cooperate with and assist the COUNTY to the extent necessary to ensure the DHCS's compliance with the applicable terms of the CIPA including, but not limited to, accounting of disclosures of DHCS PI, correction of errors in DHCS PI, production of DHCS PI, disclosure of a security Breach involving DHCS PI and notice of such Breach to the affected individual(s).

h. Breaches and Security Incidents. During the term of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR agrees to implement reasonable systems for the discovery of any Breach of unsecured DHCS PI and PII or security incident. CONTRACTOR agrees to give notification of any beach of unsecured DHCS PI and PII or security incident in accordance with subparagraph F, of the Business Associate Contract, Exhibit B to the Agreement.

i. Designation of Individual Responsible for Security. CONTRACTOR shall designate an individual, (e.g., Security Officer), to oversee its data security program who shall be responsible for carrying out the requirements of this Personal Information Privacy and Security Contract and for communicating on security matters with the COUNTY.
